

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

(Continued from 2nd page.)

provide for an election in June and a plebiscite in September on the question as to whether the Ward system or Councilors at large should be adopted.

Hon. Mr. ROBINSON thought there was nothing to justify the expense of two elections when one would suffice. People would be just as capable of voting on the question of Ward system in June as in September.

Hon. Mr. ANDERSON agreed with this view. He paid a special tribute to the work done by Chairman Gosling, and also by Commissioner Bradshaw, who had spent an enormous amount of time and trouble over civic matters and the preparation of the Charter.

Hon. Mr. HARVEY pointed out that it was at the request of the Commissioners themselves that the plebiscite on the Ward system should not be taken at the same time as the election.

Hon. Mr. GIBBS then moved an Amendment whereby the present Board of Commissioners should be continued in office until the Charter could be fully dealt with by the Joint Committee and finally dealt with by the Legislature.

The Assembly's Amendments to the Weights and Measures Bill and the Housing Bill were read and adopted.

Hon. Mr. ANDERSON then asked leave to introduce a Daylight Saving Bill to come into force provided a similar Bill should be passed in England.

Hon. Mr. ROBINSON objected, as there was no possible opportunity to discuss the Bill intelligently in the short time before the closing of the Legislature. He was supported in this contention by Hon. Mr. GIBBS, who could see no necessity for such a Bill in Newfoundland.

On the other hand Hon. Mr. MILLEY, Mr. HARVEY, Mr. BISHOP, AND MR. ANGLER were in favour of the Bill, and would like to have seen it brought in earlier in the Session. The Bill was therefore withdrawn. The House then adjourned till tomorrow at 2.30.

Thursday, May 4th, 1916.

The House met at 2.30 p.m., and at 3 p.m. His Excellency formerly closed the Session, after giving his assent to the various Bills passed.

A Letter From Beatty

London, June 6.—Rear-Admiral Sir Hedworth Meux, who was elected to the seat in the Commons left vacant by Admiral Lord Charles Bessford, when the latter was created Baron, and who has become spokesman for the Navy, read at a public meeting today the following letter from Vice Admiral Sir David Beatty, who commanded the battle cruiser squadron in the North Sea fight: "We drew the enemy into the jaws of our fleet. I have no regrets except for the gallant lives lost; for pals that have gone who died gloriously. It would have warmed your heart to have seen how gallant Hood brought his squadron into action. Would to God we had been more successful in the general result. We will be ready for them next time, and please God it will come soon. The battle cruiser fleet is still alive, and has a very big kick in her."

Requiem Mass

New York, May 31.—Solemn Mass of Requiem for Irish men who fell in the recent revolt in Ireland, or who were executed for taking part in it, was celebrated in All Saints Cathedral Church today. Members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians attended. In the altar rail stood color bearers, with the American flag, the green flag of Ireland, and the flag of the short-lived Irish republic proclaimed by Sinn Feiners.



Help in Case of Accident

DROWNING

- 1. Loosen clothing, if any. 2. Empty lungs of water by laying body on its stomach and lifting it by the middle so that the head hangs down. Jerk the body a few times. 3. Pull tongue forward, using handkerchief, or pin with string, if necessary. 4. Imitate motion of respiration by alternately compressing and expanding the lower ribs, about twenty times a minute. Alternately raising and lowering the arms from the sides up above the head will stimulate the action of the lungs. Let it be done gently but persistently. 5. Apply warmth and friction to extremities. 6. By holding tongue forward, closing the nostrils and pressing the "Adam's apple" back (so as to close entrance to stomach), direct inflation can be tried. Take a deep breath and breathe it forcibly into the mouth of patient, compress the chest to expell the air and repeat the operation. 7. Don't give up! People have been saved after hours of patient, vigorous effort. 8. When breathing begins, get patient into a warm bed, give warm drinks, or spirits in teaspoonfuls, fresh air and quiet.

War News

The Governor, St. John's: London, June 12.—In the naval battle the enemy admits the loss of the Lutnow and Kostock.

The Hampshire survivors number 22, there is no hope of further rescue. The enemy has captured Fort Vaux after a week's fierce bombardment. The position is not perceptibly modified.

At Ypres there was heavy fighting in the early part of the week. Our troops, Australian and British, made successful raids at various points.

In Italy the Austrian advance is held. General Smuts' troops have progressed further in East Africa.

The Russians have developed an offensive from Pripiet to the Rumanian frontier, capturing Lutak and Dubnc. A hundred and thirteen thousand prisoners, one hundred and four guns, and eighty machine guns have been taken. BONAR LAW.

Always put the regimental number, full name, rank and Company (if known) of the addressee.

- 1. If the addressee is understood to be at the Depot in Scotland the letters and parcels should be addressed as follows: (No.)—(Rank)—(Name)—Company—Newfoundland Regiment Newton-on-Ayr, Scotland. 2. If the addressee is understood to be on active service: (No.)—(Rank)—(Name)—Company—1st Newfoundland Regiment British Expeditionary Force c/o Newfoundland Pay and Record Office 58 Victoria Street London, S. W., England. 3. If the addressee is understood to have been invalided to Great Britain and is in Hospital: (No.)—(Rank)—(Name)—c/o Newfoundland Contingent Pay and Record Office 58 Victoria Street London, S. W., England.

If in doubt of the whereabouts of a member of the Regiment, use same address as above. Never address a letter in care of the War Office or in care of the G. P. O., London.

With regard to Parcels, they should be carefully packed and bear a Customs declaration specifying contents. The outer cover should be of strong linen, calico, canvas or other textile, and must be securely sewn up. Packing in cardboard or paper is not sufficient.

- (a) The address must be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indelible pencil and not on a label, whether tied or pasted on. The name and address of the sender must be shown on the cover. (b) Wooden or metal boxes with square corners should not be sent unless well padded, as such boxes are liable to damage other parcels in transit. (c) No perishable articles may be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolates or sweets, must be packed in tins well fastened down. Bottles, pudding basins, and the like are prohibited and will not be accepted for transmission. (d) Cigarettes and Tobacco should be packed in tin boxes, soldered to make them airtight, and these should then be placed in wooden boxes, otherwise they are liable to be spoiled by damp. "An Act Respecting the Refining of Cod Liver Oils"

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

- 1.—From and after the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, no person in Newfoundland shall engage in the business of refining Cod Liver Oil without having first obtained a License from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same. 2.—Such Licenses shall be issued by the said Department subject to such rules and regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council in that behalf. 3.—Any person who, after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, shall export from Newfoundland any refined Cod Liver Oil without having the same first inspected and branded in accordance with the provisions of Chapter one hundred and four of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Second Series) shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for the same. 4.—One half of all penalties recovered under the provisions of this Act shall be paid to the party giving the information, and the other half to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony.

The foregoing is published for the information and guidance of those interested, and they are required to govern themselves accordingly, and apply for a License to the Department of Marine and Fisheries immediately.
