

New York, June 11—The dismembered body of a murdered man which, wrapped in oilcloth. was left by a stranger in the care of a boy in Catherine street last night, was identified today as that of Samuel Bersin, 22 years old, a painter of East 98th street.

The man's head, which was missing last night was found lying on a pile of refuse near the Brooklyn bridge some distance from the point where the body was left.
