NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—A special cable to the Herald from Buenos Ayres, dated September 6, says: "Two thou-sand men were killed and 4,000 woundtween the Uruguayan government forces and the revolutionists. Gen. Vassquez, minister of war, who led the government troops was defeated and he has retreated abandoning arms and

munitions.

While Gen. Vesaquez recently reported to the government that he had won an important victory over the revolutionists it seems from later news received from the field that his own forces were routed. In a recent bactile the revolutionists were driven back and Gen. Vaszquez, while pressing his victory was suddenly met by stubborn resistance. 
