west Land Regulations. Any person who is the sole head of

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a guarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-cant must apprar in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intend-ing homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quar-ter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.-Must're-side six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (includ-ing the time required to earn home-stead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

DALIDOADS

extra: A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.-Must reside six months in each of three years, cul-timeter of the sector and area the house tivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
