Royal Canadian Regiment to Return. Toronto, Aug. 24.—(Special)—The Telegram's special cable from London says: It is possible that the Royal Canadian Regiment of infantry will soon be relieved from service in South Africa. From several sources news has come that the Canadian first contingent would be kept but a short time longer in the field. A despatch from Cape Town goes to strengthen this report. Capt. Maynard Rogers, of "D" Company, was in Cape Town three weeks ago endeavoring to make arrangements for the early return to Canada of the regiment in which he serves. This is taken as providing a reliable indication that the Royal Canadian Regiment will shortly sail for home.

Steamer a Total Loss—Crew Escaped After Six Days' Hardship. Manila, Aug. 24.—The Japanese liner Putani Maru, Captain Thon, bound from Australia to Manila with a cargo of stores for the American government, went aground and was broken in two on the island of Mindamo. The passengers and crew camped for six days on the island. They are now being brought to Manila by the British steamer Australian, Captain Kock, the officers of the luckless liner remaining behind. There were no casualties, but the cargo, baggage and vessel will probably prove a total loss.
