Ontario Election Scenes. A writer in the Toronto Globe describes from the Opposition point of view certain election scenes in the South Riding of Hants. We have never heard of anything in the Lower Provinces to match this state of things, so far forth in its communication. It is alleged that in three backwoods townships there were more votes polled for Mr. O'Reilly, the Government man (by the way, the celebrated O'Reilly who conducted the case for the Crown against Whelan, the murderer of McGee), than there were people in the districts—men, women and children. The Returning Officer is described as a violent religious bigot and political partisan. The Opposition candidate, fearing unfair treatment at his hands, decided to send to at least four polling places a lawyer with an escort of ten men—that is, four lawyers and forty men to the four points selected. This posse travelled together for a part of the way, and their appearance was the signal for a counter demonstration of a formidable character, which is thus described:

They set out together from Renfrew on Monday about noon, and reached Eggleston about ten. O'Reilly and a number of men of Pat Kelly telegraphed to their partners in Eggleston, and to T. F. French and the priest at Broadford. Mr. O'Reilly from Broadford had set out for the purpose of murdering them all, and urging them to be prepared to suffer death rather than let them proceed. I am told that the wildest excitement prevailed, and that the whole posse were armed with revolvers, shotguns, belted and horse-mounted, and were dispatched in all directions to hunt up the main posse and ammunition. Two kegs of powder were brought from Eggleston. Whiskey was abundant, and doled out without stint.

At Eggleston, two of the agents, (Messrs. O'Reilly and French) started along to their respective polling places, and the rest went to Broadford. A distance of less than twenty miles separates the two places, and the road had been barricaded and obstructed by felled trees in several places. About two miles from Broadford corners they were promiscuously ordered to halt and proceed no farther, under pain of certain death. Finding that O'Reilly was chief spokesman, with several other Government officials from Ottawa, amongst whom are Mr. C. Higgins, of the Post Office department; Mr. O'Reilly, of the Finance; Mr. Williams, immigration agent. Finding that bloodshed and massacre were inevitable, the party concluded on returning. Indeed, it would be worse than massacre for a few unarmed men to face an inflated, armed rabble, deluged from the sky with whiskey. Before starting, the agents asked permission to be allowed to proceed along to their destination. This was denied them.

Mr. French and other agents of the Opposition candidates were in danger of their lives at one of the Hants polling places. They had been there but two hours when they were commanded to leave, if they valued their lives, the place being in possession of armed, drunken rowdies; and they did leave. The conduct of the Deputy Returning Officer in another district is thus described:

The functionary representing the Crown acted in the triple capacity of Deputy Returning Officer, Constable and Agent for O'Reilly. He took on himself to make, expound and administer the law. He judged the voters by their physiognomy. He would record no name on the poll book unless he approved of the individual in advance. He claimed that his motto was "qualifications, cash, or other formality. He administered each cash as he pleased, and had on his own more votes than every one of McDougall's voters. He also directly refused to record eight votes for McDougall, each of whom declared he was ready to take the oath administered to the others. One of those whom he refused, he on second thought agreed to take, but the man was naturally so indignant at the slight put on him, that he would not return. He was most offensive and insulting to the people, saying that in his extraordinary capacity he would issue warrants for them, and in his ordinary capacity (magistrate's hall) he would send his day executioner to their doors. After drawing a revolver they hustled him about without striking him. He then closed the poll about 1:30 p. m., against the protest of Mr. McDougall's agent. Six votes only were polled. If the deputy had acted honestly and impartially McDougall would have polled about twenty.

Other instances of outrage are cited, the writer concluding with the prediction that "O'Reilly will not dare to take his seat for the Riding, even though his partisan Returning Officer should declare him not the slightest chance of being verified. For contrast, when Mr. O'Reilly returned to Kingston after the election, he represented himself as a much injured man. He declared, if we remember rightly, that he had been mobbed by the Grits, and his case had suffered injury by their violence and lawlessness. Memories of H. B. Wilton, THE FIRST WORKMAN RETURNED TO THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT. From the Montreal Witness. Henry Buckingham Wilton, M. P. for Hamilton, was born at the small village of South Lopham, Norfolk, England, October 31st, 1831, and is now forty-one years of age. His birthplace is in the beautiful valley of the Watney, the delightful scenery of which has been admirably described by the poet, "The Village of South Lopham." Near South Lopham is the town of Skeiton, whom Erasmus named "The glory and the light of British Literature." At this Mr. Wilton received his education, very imperfect and rudimentary, with his parents, who were poor, could with difficulty afford to give him.
