55TH BATTALION WILL PASS HERE FOR VALCARTIER TONIGHT

Campbellton Has Made Record By Raising Eighty-Five Recruits When Only Seventy Were Asked For—Lieut. Larzen Joins Train Tonight.

Recruiting for the 55th Battalion has now finished here and Lieut. O. J. Larzen leaves tonight with the balance of his recruits for Valcartier. The special train will pass through Campbellton probably about 9.30 or 10 p. m., and the volunteers will no doubt receive a hearty send off.

While the other towns in the province have been putting forth extra efforts to induce young men to join the ranks, Lieut. Larzen has been quietly working away, and now at the conclusion of his campaign, has the grand total of 85 recruits, when the number asked from this centre was only 70. This is a record unsurpassed by any other town in the province, and speaks well both for the recruiting officer and the young men of this district. All honor to the young men of Campbellton and district, who in such a spirit of patriotism have answered the call of their King and country.

YACHT WRECKED IN FRIDAY'S STORM

Dr. Sproul's Schooner Wrecked at Cape Rosier.—Two Men are Drowned

Word was received on Tuesday by Dr. Sproul of the wreck of his yacht near Cape Rosier, P. Q. One of the boat hands Octave Cyr, who was drowned was well-known here having been clerk in St. Louis Hotel some time ago.

Our correspondent at Gaspé telegraphs us the following version of the wreck.

Gaspé, Que., July 14.—Boat wrecked off Cape Rosier, Gaspé, Ju. 9th, has been identified as Dr. Sproul's yacht. The description is as follows, length 26½ feet, breadth 9½ feet. Clinker built schooner, one white line, interior painted grey and one row boat painted grey. Gasoline engine from 15 to 20 Horse Power, four cylinders, one pump with name R. McDonald Co., Galt, Canada No. 2 stamped on it, two gasoline tanks one on either side of the engine capable of holding from 20 to 30 gallons apiece, one fox found drowned in its cage, also 25 fox traps. Written inside the vessels in pencil were the following names, Daniel Lapierre, Grand River, A. Boutin, Grand River, Arthur Butler. The wreck occurred as follows. The yacht was seen sailing towards the shore when a mountainous wave struck and disabled her. Two men were seen on deck, the row boat put out to sea manned by one man, but after rowing a little distance the occupant noticed his companion signalling him. He then returned to the yacht and managed to drag his friend into the boat. He again started for the shore, but a huge wave struck and overwhelmed the frail craft. Nothing else was seen for a long while and the boat was washed ashore a little later empty. It is reported by eye witnesses that if the man had continued on his first journey he would have been saved, but returning to rescue his companion and losing his life in the attempt, was a heroic deed. He gave his life for his friend, the greatest deed a man can do. On July 10 the body of a man supposed to be Anse Cyr, Maria, was washed ashore. He was stripped bare of all apparel, excepting his boots and necktie, which was still around his neck. The above victim was six feet tall, weighed about 180 pounds, fair hair and blue eyes.

Another Account.
Grand Greve, July 14th.—A sad drowning accident occurred at Cap des Rosiers during the storm of July 9th. A large unknown motor boat was driven ashore, both the occupants losing their lives. One of the bodies was found on the beach next morning and taken to Wm. Fruing's store, where it remained until burial. Coroner Jones, of Gaspé was notified and at the inquest held on the 13th, the body was still unidentified. Telegraphic enquiries were sent all along the Baie des Chaleurs coast with no result. Body was interred at Anse a Louise R. C. cemetery on Tuesday, July 13th.

LIEUT. O. A. MOWAT HAS NARROW ESCAPE

German Shell Played Havoc
With Firing Party of the
12th Battery.

Lieut. O. A. Mowat of Campbellton, N. B., is at the front in Flanders with the First Canadian Expeditionary Force.

Lieut. Mowat is observing officer with the 12th Battery, 3rd Artillery Brigade, and his duties are such as to place him in an exposed position very often so that he can properly observe the results of the battery's fire.

Writing to friends in Fredericton he tells of some of his experiences which have been of a most exciting nature. On one occasion the Germans got the range of where his party was stationed and one of their shells killed five of the Canadians, Lieut. Mowat himself having a narrow escape. That night the Germans also shelled the building 1800 yards in the rear, where Lieut. Mowat and his party were sleeping, and they had to leave the place and dig themselves in—Globe.

TWO SLIGHT FIRES DURING FRIDAY'S STORM

Terrific Gale Responsible for Two
Scars That Heavy Rain Prevented
From Becoming Serious

(From the Gloucester Northern Light)

The furious wind and rain storm of last Friday was just getting well under way when the fire bells alarmed the town about ten o'clock in the morning for a blaze in some lumber piles in the Bathurst Lumber Co's yard. The fire department turned out promptly, but beyond assisting to tear down the pile in which the fire was located their services were not required, as the heavy rain quenched the fire effectually as soon as it became exposed. Had it not been for the extremely heavy rain, there would probably have been a very serious fire for the tremendous wind carried cinders from the Company's burner, which is an open one, in great quantities, a distance of several hundred yards into the lumber yard where great piles of dry lumber have been stored for a considerable time. A number of the firemen were detailed to watch the locality for several hours, but no further outbreaks occurred.

Another alarm was sounded about ten o'clock in the evening for a fire in the Leaky store in the Village, caused by the poor insulation of an electric wire. The firemen again turned out, but very little damage resulted as everything was so wet after the day's rain that even the fierce wind could not work up a blaze.

FUNERAL OF LATE ANDREW KERR

An unusually long line of sorrowing friends followed the remains of the late Andrew Kerr to their resting place in the Presbyterian cemetery on Tuesday afternoon the 6th inst.

The pall bearers were Messrs. A. T. Hinton, George Robertson, Duncan Paterson, Artimus Hinton, and Ed. Morrison. Rev. W. McN. Matthews conducted the religious services at the house and grave, assisted by Revs. F. A. Wightman and J. A. Cooper.

Mr. Kerr leaves his widow, four daughters—Mrs. H. A. Marquis of Campbellton; Mrs. J. C. Morrison of P. E. I.; Mrs. E. C. Daly of Bangor, Me. and Mrs. Roland Smith of St. John; and two sons, John and Sherman, both residing in Campbellton. He is also survived by four sisters and two brothers. The sisters are Mrs. E. McLean, Mrs. Robt. Good and Miss Mary Kerr of this town, and Mrs. Donald Currie of San Francisco. The brothers are Robt. and Alex. of the western States.

FRIDAY'S STORM DOES GREAT HAVOC

Booms on the Miramichi Are
Forced Out and Logs Go
Adrift

That the damage done by Friday's terrible rain and wind storm will probably amount to over \$500,000 in the Miramichi district alone is now generally conceded as well as that it practically marks a record for destructiveness by the elements of wind and rain during the summer season.

Both the booms on the Northwest Miramichi at Redbank and on the Southwest at Derby were forced under the terrible pressure of water and logs and probably \$200,000 worth of logs have been lost. The water rose over four feet in the course of Friday's storm and carried everything before it. Fortunately for the operators on the Northwest it was found possible to stretch a boom across at the bridge lower down and practically all the logs were caught there.

On the Southwest, however, it was harder work and despite all the efforts made the logs were running down all Friday night and Saturday. A large number were caught in temporary pockets but thousands drifted down and out to sea.

On the Black River where Messrs. J. W. MacNaughton and Thomas Gill are the chief operators the boom at Mr. MacNaughton's, gave away and 10,000,000 feet of lumber rushed down the swollen river. Two bridges on the north side of the stream were washed out and traffic is impassable along that route. The bridges were at John Ross' and Donald Watling's places.

In the vicinity of Napan and other places where the soil is mixed with clay great damage was done by the brooks widely overflowing their banks and carrying on to the fields a deposit of mud and sand that has in many places utterly covered all vegetation and spoiled valuable farming lands.

The boom at Bartibouge held well as the company had erected two new blocks early this spring.





AWAKENED SOULS

Real Christian Soldiers Marching to War for Righteous Cause

(The writer of this sketch from the Montreal Daily Star, shows the strength and virtue of early Christian training in the use of the good old hymns at home and in the church services.)

In the square of its forgo told the tale of old times, in the city of Montreal.

Abide with me, fast falls the evening tide, The darkness deepens, Lord, with me abide.

The last time I heard these words was in an old church, set among trees that stretched up a mountain side, towering in majestic grandeur over one of Scotland's loveliest Highland lochs; this time is "somewhere in France."

I had come back from the firing line through a variable Valley of the Shadows, and in the fading light of that Sabbath evening my ears, worn with the thunder of battle, eagerly drank in the soft cadences of the old familiar hymn.

In the square of that little town, ravaged nine months ago by the Germans, great war waggon were ranged line upon line. Under a grove of chestnut trees a wayside motor repair workshop had been set out, the glow of its forgo told the tale of toil, that knows no end of days that have no settled length and weeks of days that have no name. But their Sunday's task completed, the choir—as they call it—had assembled in a circle, under the trees, with a staff sergeant to lead their singing.

"LEAD KINDLY LIGHT"

Worn and weary though I was with fifty hours of duty, I could not pass them by but brought my car to rest. The major commanding the column, his officers by his side, stood just where I was on the fringe of the gathering; in the darker shadows, but dimly seen, many of the townspeople were collected, scarce understanding, yet held in a spell by the soft sweetness of the music. From Yorkshire's West Riding came most of the singers, as one might have guessed from the great white roses adorning each waggon; but it was the broad Scots accent of the little conductor perhaps which brought to me a memory of far-off days and the distant land of my birth. In many countries I have wandered, in many strange scenes I have taken some part but never before in an alien land had home come back to me as there in that twilight hour.

For a moment of two the singing ceased; the hymn was ended. The roll of the guns but a mile or two away seemed strangely unreal; even then they were silent. A few low, crooning notes, scarce a whisper, like the sighs of a night wind in the tree tops, and there came to us who listened: Lead, kindly Light,

Amid the encircling gloom.

Who in all this world, to whom these lines are familiar could have remained silent? Many had been content only to listen at the previous hymn, but with the grey shadows deepening around us until all was indistinct—what the tread music of La Bassee's fight vibrating on the still night air—no mortal soul so dulled and dead, but stretched out its being to the Great God of Battles. Over that old square lined with high-pitched gables, its outmoded church tower a shapeless blot on the sky, against which the lurid light of battle stabbed the darkness, the plea for guidance rolled on and upward to the very gates of Heaven. No rank and file there, but one great appeal from the very human souls of that little wayside group; indeed, a song of prayer wrung from those who felt that amidst the dangers so real, so near only one Power could lead them in the way of safety.

"ONWARD, CHRISTIAN SOLDIERS"

That, too, ended, and to us who have lived for months within earshot of the guns, the mutterings that came from beyond the darkness were as a silence of their own. Still, though the circle wavered a little, these soldiers
