The relations in the Yarmouth case are unreasonably bad. We cannot, however, see in any of the Tory journals or in any of the facts submitted anything connecting Mr. Lovitt personally with the bribery. They will apply themselves to their work so long as they can raise the wind. The late election furnished a fair sample of their work in this respect. We doubt that there is a Tory in parliament whose seat was not bought. Even the Minister of Justice, in whom we should expect to find at least some degree of honesty, has been charged by responsible persons with the grossest corruption, and abuse of position, to secure his election. The election of the Prime Minister we know to have been carried by every means that was dishonorable.
