Symbilion of Ranch Bred Silver Foxe

An unique exhibition under the im ment of the Con sion of Canada, will be held in Montreal on November 24, 25 and 26. It be the first international exhibi Fur-farming is rapidly becoming a scientific branch of animal husbandry and, although little more than a de cade old, is one of Canada's most flow ishing industries.

While the greater number of Cana dian fox ranchers are to be found in the Maritime Provinces and chiefly in Prince Edward Island, there are many in each of the other provinces and the number is steadily increasing The interest evinced in Quebec, Ontario and Western Canada generally demonstrates that many Canadians are desirous of embarking in the fur farming of mink, beaver, fisher, marten and other fur-bearers.

Present advices indicate that fully 150 animals will be brought from Prince Edward Island alone. It is confidently expected that other provinces will send an equally large number in proportion to the number of their fur-farmers and many ensuiries have been received from the United States. The Secretary of the exhibition is F. C. Numick, Commission of Conserva-tion, Ottawa.

A healthy growth of the industry

A healthy growth of the industry should do much to check the rapid depletion of wild fur-bearing animals and to steady unstable conditions in the large fur markets. It is confidently expected that the exhibition at Montreal will result in the formation of the Fur Breaders' Association of Canada, which can do much to establish and keep accurate breeding records of pedigreed fox stock and, in general, advance the interests of the industry.

ABOUT THE STORAGE BATTERY IN YOUR CAR

A fully charged battery consists of a container to hold the three cells of current to run your starting motor that go to make a 6 volt battery. Each cell is contained in a hard rubber jar. The Active Elements of a cell are the Positive plates which are made of finely divided peroxide of lead, pasted and formed on lead grids; the Negative plates are made of sponge metal- fect contact. Batteries must have a lic lead, also formed on lead grids. These two platesibeing insulated from each other by treated wood separators are immersed in the electrolyte or liquid which is the remaining active

element of the battery. Electrolyte is made of chemically pure Sulphuric Acid, which has a specific gravity of 1800, diluted with distilled water to 1.300. On discharge the acid is gradually taken into the plates until the gravity of the remaining liquid drops to 1.150 when the battery is practically discharged. At this point the peroxide of lead and sponge metallic lead in the plates is partly changed to sulphate of lead. This is known as normal sulphating and can easily be removed by recharging. Abnormal Sulphating, which is very injurious and hard to remove begins when the battery is allowed to remain in this condition, and if left for any considerable time will cause the end of its usefulness or leave it with a capacity so small that it will require a recharge from an outside source very often The Sulphuric Acid in the electrolyte does not evap orate, but the water does, so nothing but pure water should be added except to replace loss from spilling or leaky jar. Replacing water which has evaporated with acid is a mistake too often practised by charging men to make the battery "show more charge." Enough acid is already in the battery, however, and adding more only deludes the person who puts it in. This mistake is carefully guarded against by the manufacturer of the battery by printed instructions with each new battery and should be strict ly adhered to by everyone connected



with the use or care of a battery. A battery in a discharged condition will freeze at 13 degrees above zero, % discharged at zero, % discharged at 38 degrees below zero, ¼ discharged at 60 degrees below zero, a fully charged battery at 100 below



WORLD'S LARGEST UNCUT GEM

"Black Opal," Found in Nevada 1917, Was a Quarter the Size of a Brick.

What is believed to be the largest What is believed to be the largest uncut gem in the world has come to light in a recently opened mining district in Nevada, where it was discovered in the spring of 1917. The stone is a "black opal," so-called because dark tones predominate in it. It shows mostly dark peaceck blues and emergid greens, with a considerable emerald greens, with a considerable amount of red, and several less prominent shades.

In size this great gem approaches a quarter of an ordinary brick, being three and fifteen-sixteenths inches in length, three and one-eighth in width, and two and one-eighth thick at the bulklest point. Its weight is eighteen and six-fenths avoirdupois bunces, which expressed in sem diction is \$,188 grafts, or 2,568,56 carats. More than a pound of opal is surely some stone! And it is all solid, uncracked, finders gem material, free from matrix or athering rock except for a paper thin skin energating the two major surfaces. Little specks broken from this skin hers and there reveal the brilliant play of colors within, while the exposen ends and edge crabible the full refracting radiance of the mass.

The Cullinan diamond was roughly the size and shape of a small fist, and, if it had been an opal, would have weighed but 1,720 carata. It is compared with the new opal on this basis since the specific gravity of the diamond is 75 per cent greater than that of the opal.—Archie Rice in the Scientific American,
