NOTE IS 3,800 YEARS OLD.
Philadelphia, Aug. 10.—(Associated Press)—An unpaid note for four shakels in silver bearing forty per cent annual interest for nearly four thousand years recently was found among the clay tablets at the University of Pennsylvania Museum by Dr. Leon Legrain. The note was given by a man named Bur-Mama to U Sinsatum, in October, 1922 B.C., the "year in which King RimSin occupied the town of Dur-Damigilishu."
There were four witnesses to the note. Instead of signatures the note was placed their seals on the document and were not liable for payment unless it was shown they knew the character of Bur-Mama was had when they swore it was good.
Although comparisons are difficult, Dr. Legrain said, a shakel of silver at the time the note was made was equal to about \$100 at the present time.

RETURNED MAN PICKED UP BY TRAIN
David Kincaid Has Been Missing Two Weeks.
PORT ARTHUR, ONT., Aug. 9.—David Kincaid a returned soldier, who has been missing in the neighborhood of Eton Lake, ninety miles east of Port Arthur, was picked up by a passing train Saturday, at Mile 92. Kincaid had been in the woods for the past two weeks, apparently living on berries and roots. He was taken to his home in Port William.
The finding of Kincaid brings to a close one of the longest man hunts in this section of the country. Ever since his disappearance hundreds of citizens from Port Arthur and Port William, Indiana, mounted police and returned soldiers have been scouring the woods. According to the story of the train crew, Kincaid crawled out to the track, being too weak to walk and was placed in the caboose of the freight. He was too weak to tell of his experience.

DOUBLE 1914 SALARIES FOR 1921
Four Western Provinces and Ontario Agree on Scales.
TORONTO, Aug. 9.—All doubts as to whether Toronto representatives of teachers organizations had taken their stand on the slogan of "double 1914 salaries for 1921" were dispelled by Principal Charles G. Fraser, president of the Ontario Educational Association, who has just returned from the western convention of teachers at Calgary.
According to his statements, the newly formed Canadian Teachers' Federation had unanimously taken this position and that steps would be taken to secure the necessary increase before the year closed.
Thus far the Canadian Teachers' Federation only embraces teachers of the four western provinces and Ontario, with provision made for the addition of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

NEW POSITION FOR REV. W. D. WILSON

May be General Secretary of the N. B. Temperance Alliance.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 10.—President Donald Fraser, of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, announced here last evening that Rev. W. D. Wilson, now chief inspector under the New Brunswick Prohibition Act, had been offered an appointment as general secretary for the alliance, a new position which it has been decided to create.
Mr. Wilson's present position as chief inspector is a Provincial Government appointment, and it is understood that while he has not resigned he will do so shortly. Before leaving for St. Leonard's, last evening, to investigate thefts of seized alcohol in Madawaska County, he was asked as to his intentions for the future, and admitted he had been offered the new post, but would not state definitely whether he would accept or not.
Rev. A. F. Boothroy, who has been field secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, and acted as organizer during the year preceding the recent provincial plebiscite, is retiring from his position with the Alliance, and will resume a pastoral charge at the New Brunswick Conference of Methodist Church.
There is no intimation thus far as to who will probably be the successor to Rev. Mr. Wilson in the event of his retirement.

JUDGE DECLARED MARRIAGE VOID
Third Wife Given Liberty by Court Defendant Admitted Committing Bigamy.
Montreal.—In a judgment handed down on Saturday morning by Mr. Justice Loranget, the marriage of Marie Louise Eva Poirer and T. R. Nobert was annulled. Nobert was married to the petitioner on April 5, 1920, when he was already married. The evidence placed before the judge in the allegations made by the petitioner showed that Nobert had married Miss H. Houle in 1918 while a first wife was still alive. The first wife died three days after the marriage.
When Nobert's second wife learned that he had married a third time she took action against him in the criminal courts and the third wife took action in the civil courts, asking that the marriage be annulled. In the judgment, Judge Loranget found that the marriage was null and void, as the defendant was already married twice at the time.
In the case before the criminal courts, Nobert appeared last week before the crime of bigamy. He was remanded until August 12 for sentence.

NEW WARDEN FOR DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY
William Meighen, of Edmonton, Alt. Brother of Canada's Premier, Receives the Appointment.
Prince Albert, Sask., Aug. 2.—William Meighen of this city, who was deputy warden of the Edmonton penitentiary when that institution was closed, has been appointed warden of the penitentiary at Dorchester (N. B.) He is a brother of Premier Arthur Meighen. He began his career in the service as an accountant at the Prince Albert penitentiary and is said to have made a great success of his work.

MUCH DAMAGE BY LIGHTNING
Storm on Saturday Cat Property.
Much Damage Done by Lightning. A severe electrical storm broke out here on Saturday afternoon and was especially heavy at Charlo and vicinity. About four o'clock the residence of W. D. Miller at Black Lands was destroyed by lightning, the fire sweeping the house, barn and outbuilding. Mr. Miller was away from home at the time, being employed at the mill in Dalhousie and his wife was also away from home, several children being left in charge, but with the help of three men who were close by, they succeeded in saving the farm machinery of which there was considerable. All livestock in barn was destroyed. The house had been occupied by three generations and no insurance was carried on the property.
At Broadlands, Que., a barn owned by Wm. Nichol was struck by lightning and burned to the ground with all its contents including this year's crop of hay which had only a few days previous been harvested. A horse which at the time of storm was being unharmed was killed but the boy in charge of same, miraculously escaped unhurt.

NAVAL VESSELS FOR CANADA TO ARRIVE SOON
Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Towards the end of September the flotilla of naval vessels comprising an oil burning cruiser, the Aurora, two destroyers and two submarines, which are the gift of the British admiralty to Canada, will arrive at Halifax. After a demonstration they will be brought to Quebec and later to Montreal. If it is found practicable the submarines will be brought up some of the Canadian canals to the Great Lakes. If their draught is sixteen feet as is supposed this may be a matter of difficulty. It is the intention to keep all these vessels at sea as training to officers and crew to form a nucleus for working out any future naval policy adopted by Canada as a result of the 1921 imperial conference and subsequent deliberations in parliament.
The obtaining of the Aurora, an oil burning vessel, is a subject of some self-congratulations to the government as it is understood that Admiral Jellicoe, when in Canada, informed the dominion government that there was no hope of any vessels other than coal burning vessels being taken over. The story goes, however, that the minister of marine has persistently and consistently refused every coal burning cruiser offered and that representations made concurrently in London that only a modern vessel would make Canada consider it worth while, eventually brought about the offer of the Aurora.

PROFITING IN CUBA.
If there is one country in the world that did well financially out of the war it is that beautiful island of Cuba. At the moment, owing to the sugar and tobacco industries the Cubans are literally drunk with prosperity. And now they propose to further tie up the sugar consuming world by a combine that will hold the available stocks of unsoft sugar until the price reaches 24 cents per pound. Think of it. Twenty-four cents per pound for raw sugar which previous to the war sold for the most part around three or four cents per pound. Pirate Morgan, who cruised those waters in the olden time, never did better business than this.
Of course it is a case of come easy, go easy for today the Cubans are the biggest spenders in the world. The city homes of the planter in Havana and other centres are taken as a whole, incomparably finer than anything we have on this continent. The wealthy Cubans—and all Cubans seem to be wealthy—think little of spending anywhere from one hundred to two hundred thousand dollars on a city house; pays \$20 each for opera boxes; buys his wife Paris dresses at \$1,000 each, and provides his family with a \$10,000 car.
SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS IN DORCHESTER
Tried to Pass Forged Cheque Amount to Eighty-nine Dollars at Sackville Stores.
Montreal, N. B.—Fred Baucher, aged 19 years, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester penitentiary at Dorchester recently. Baucher, who claims to have been from Sackville, was arrested in Sackville a few days ago, charged with attempting to pass a forged cheque amounting to \$89 and carrying the signature of H. C. Anderson, a harnessmaker of Amherst, N. S. The trial took place under the Speedy Trials Act.

MYSTERY IS TO BE SOLVED
The mystery, which surrounded the disappearance of the \$10,000, of registered money, at the time of the Ocean Limited mail hold-up last year, at Montmagny, is on the eve of being solved according to information given to the Telegraph, this morning. Since the hearing of the case the postal authorities and the insurance interests have been busy looking for the lost money, and developments of great interest may be expected at any time.

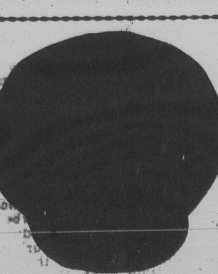

Irish Political Status

Shows Fallacy of Claims

Made by Both the Parties

HERE has just been published by the Proportional Representation Society of Ireland, a leaflet giving a tabulated result of the recent municipal elections in Ireland. In studying these figures in order to estimate their bearing on the political situation, it must be remembered that the proportion of population in the towns varies greatly. Also that in Ulster there is a much higher number of Unionists in the towns than Nationalists. Thus, in County Antrim about one-third of the population is in the towns, while in County Galway there is only one-tenth. This applies also to the provinces. In Ulster 14 per cent. of the population is in the towns, while in the three southern provinces there is only 11 per cent. Now, assuming the areas in which there were no contest, and leaving out the 2.9 per cent. of spoilt votes, there is left a total of 222,244 votes to fill 1,735 seats. Table III. of the leaflet shows the return of "first preference" votes which will be worth studying. The Irish Parliamentary election at the end of 1919 gave the following percentages: Unionist, 22 per cent.; Nationalist, 7.6 per cent.; Sinn Fein, 69.5 per cent. making up the 102 per cent. For the municipal elections the figures work out as follows:

Sinn Fein . . . 27.1 per cent. 47,311

Unionist . . . 26.7 per cent. 45,932

Labor . . . 17.9 per cent. 27,526

Nationalist . . . 14.6 per cent. 47,192

Independent . . . 13.7 per cent. 44,772

100.0 per cent. 322,244

It is true that the municipal elections should be fought out in order to get the best men to carry out the public work, but in the present state of Ireland, these are as a whole political views are more often voted for.

It is frequently claimed by Sinn Fein that in the Parliamentary elections they swept the country by 5 to 1, but this claim is entirely untrue. If, in the three southern provinces, Sinn Fein and Labor are grouped together as the revolutionary party, and the Unionist, Nationalist, and Independents as non-revolutionary, the figures work out roughly at 165,000 to 79,000, or very nearly 5 to 2, a very different thing from 5 to 1.

Now, the leaflet is, in way, even more informative on the state of things in Ulster, for as mentioned before, it has to be remembered that the municipal elections deal only with urban areas, which are far bigger in Ulster. First preference votes work out as follows:

Unionist . . . 72,233 or 52.6 per cent.

Labor . . . 27,504 or 19.8 per cent.

Nationalist . . . 25,719 or 14.9 per cent.

Sinn Fein . . . 15,457 or 8.8 per cent.

Independent . . . 5,354 or 3.8 per cent.

Now, more than half of the urban population of Ulster lives in Belfast, and actually 85 per cent. in the four counties of Antrim, Armagh, Down, and Derry, so that the figures show that Ulster, which is always claimed to be homogeneous, is really more divided than the southern provinces. The Parliamentary election showed: Unionist, 73 per cent.; Nationalist, 16 per cent.; Sinn Fein, 10 per cent., so that the idea that Ulster is solid in the north is just as fallacious as the idea that Sinn Fein has an absolute majority in the south and west.

A year or more ago, when the demand for proportional representation in Ireland was gathering strength, the Irish Parliamentary party published the proposals of some of its leaders of this movement to set up a constitutional assembly elected by proportional representation, but making it a sine qua non that the final arbitration should be with the League of Nations. Sir Horace Plunkett, immediately on his return from America, made a speech in which he said: "Get up an Irish Constituent Assembly, and then refuse all outside interference," though, as the Dominion League have always proposed to leave certain matters to the Imperial Government, it would be difficult to get away from interference.

Arthur Griffith was pressed, just after this speech, to the Dominion League should submit her case to the League of Nations, and replied, "Yes, when it is properly organized, and America exerts her full influence in it." The originators of the constituent assembly idea, say: "Set up your constituent assembly of Irishmen to draw up their constitution, which they will submit to Parliament, who would certainly offer amendments, and when both parties have done all possible from their respective points of view, final points of difference would be submitted to the League of Nations, from the same die, and ten members from the United States should be sitting. But it is a vital point that Ireland should be represented as a nation in the League of Nations."

Where Nails Are Hand-Made.

It seems a pity that Cathail, a pretty Worcestershire village which supplies Birmingham with strawberries and market garden produce, should have revived its nail-working industry. Thirty years ago the villagers were famous at the craft. Then the Belgians flooded the market with cheap machine-made nails. Cathail was "ruined," and has since taken profitably to rural pursuits.

Owing to the present high price of nails, the cottage forges have been re-lighted and some of the old nailers are making as much as £5 and £5 a week. But they are bound to be reconstructed with hand-made nails.

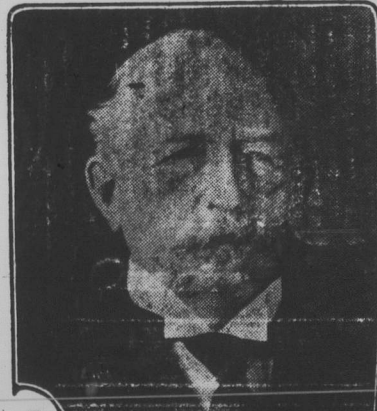

Two Notable Canadians

Two notable Canadians were made honorary members of the Canadian Institute of Civil Engineers at the annual meeting of the Institute recently held in Montreal. Lord Shaghnessy, the Chairman of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and Sir John Kennedy, the Dean of Canada's engineering profession. Although Lord Shaghnessy is not a professional engineer, and therefore could not become a regular member of the Institute, he was made an honorary member, in view of his distinguished career as the head of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in which position for many years he has been intimately connected with engineering, and probably employed more engineers than any man in Canada.

For the presentation there was one of the most

University. Vertly a galaxy of distinguished men with whom even such citizens as Lord Shaghnessy and Sir John Kennedy may well feel honored to be associated.

Prolonged applause greeted the two new honorary members as President Walter J. Francis pinned the golden badge on their lapels, a note of pathos being added by the fact that Sir John Kennedy will never see his badge, his eyesight having completely failed him during the past number of years.

The applause was renewed when Lord Shaghnessy rose to reply. The Chairman of the Canadian Pacific said that although he would not claim the honor of being an engineer his many years as President of the C. P. R. had brought him into very intimate relations with that profession.

"I have probably employed more engineers of various kinds than any man in Canada," said His Lordship, "and I have always had the highest respect for the members of the profession, and never found them break their trust. In engineering matters I always relied entirely upon their expert advice and the Canadian Pacific was never the loser for it. Of course there were mistakes made during the years, but both were jointly responsible, and the C. P. R. did not pass the blame on to the engineers, but went to work to prevent any mistakes made—and there were not many."

In conclusion Lord Shaghnessy made brief reference to the encroachment of years, which had brought a new President to the Canadian Pacific. Mr. E. W. Bestly. He said that in all probability he would not have many years to wear the golden badge of his honorary membership of the Engineering Institute, but that he should always treasure it with pride and a warm gratitude for the honor conferred upon him.

Sir John Kennedy, who sat with his old friend, Lord Shaghnessy, also made a brief response. He spoke of the importance of the engineering profession, especially in the upbuilding of a young and developing country such as the Dominion. In fact he considered that the progress of Canada and the advancement of the engineering profession were on parallel lines. As Dean of the profession he recalled the visit of the Prince of Wales (the late King Edward) to Hamilton in 1897, when the Prince had visited the first turbine pump in Canada, and as a young engineer, on the same occasion had the honor of starting the engine.

The ceremony closed with hearty cheers for Lord Shaghnessy and Sir John Kennedy.

QUEBEC IN CHARGE OF LIQUOR TRADE

Will Assume Control in Statement of Liberal Newspaper.

Quebec, Aug. 11.—That the government of Quebec will soon take over the control of trading in alcoholic liquors in the Province of Quebec, was an announcement made yesterday by the Quebec Telegraph, the local Liberal organ, as coming from a responsible party well informed on government projects.

The paper adds: "No details are available as to the manner in which this control or monopoly will be enforced but it is quite understood that it will not extend to the sales of beer and wine, which will remain as at present, licensed under the provincial temperance act."

"In regard to the Scott Act, the repeal of which was to take place in July, the recall has been delayed till September to get a more extended view of the question from voters."

WHEAT PRODUCTION.—Winnipeg, Aug. 9.—Canada's wheat fields will yield from 226,000,000 to 250,000,000 bushels. This estimate was made today by W. A. RAISING "PERS" FOR LIQUOR LIKE CHEQUES

Vendor at Dalhousie Charged in Seven Cases—Seizures at St. Leonard's.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, Chief Inspector, has returned from Dalhousie, where he went in connection with seven different Prohibition cases, which were heard before Magistrate MacNeill, of that place, on Friday and Saturday. The charge was all against George E. Mercier, vendor, of Dalhousie, who was charged with selling liquor not prescribed for, the quantities of liquor on the "pers" having been raised. The cases were concluded and adjourned for judgment, which will be given some time during the present week.

Word has been received by the Chief Inspector that Inspector McLaughlin had seized 250 gallons of alcohol at St. Leonard's on Saturday, and was shipping it on to this city for storage. The alcohol was in five and ten gallon tins and was consigned to a hotel at St. Leonard's. Along with the alcohol, a shipment of whiskey, brandy, ale and gin, consigned to the Chief Inspector as part of the seizure made recently by Inspector Daigle and Deming, will arrive here for storage.

The oats which were seized along with half a carload of liquor recently in Madawaska County were disposed of by tender this morning. The whole lot, amounting to between 900 and 1000 bushels going to Arthur M. Gibson, of this city. The oats, which had been stored in the departmental buildings, were moved this morning.

ARCHBISHOP MANNIX

ARRIVES IN LONDON

Expect an Attempt Will Be
Made to Go to
Ireland.

London, Aug. 10.—Archbishop Dan-
iel Mannix of Australia, who was
landed yesterday at Penzance by a
British destroyer, which had taken
him from aboard the White Star line
Baltic off the Irish coast, arrived here
at six o'clock today.

There were only a few reporters
and a handful of priests present to
greet the archbishop, but a heavy po-
lice guard was maintained about the
station. There were no untoward
incidents.

A less impressive welcome could
hardly have been staged than that
which greeted him when he arrived
at Paddington Station. Only the late
editions of last night's newspapers
published the fact that he had landed
at Penzance and was coming to this
city.

Therefore only a few knew that he
was to arrive at an early hour today.
Even the priests were not allowed to
greet the archbishop until he had passed
the barriers into the station proper.
Here the police had some difficulty in
handling even such a small crowd, as
nearly everyone insisted in kneeling
before the archbishop and kissing his
hand.

Efforts of those who took Arch-
bishop Mannix from the station to
evade the public seemed to lend strength
to statements of Irishmen that
the Australian prelate will attempt to
go to Ireland notwithstanding the
government demand that he shall not.
He was first led to the subway plat-
form and then suddenly hurried to an
automobile into which his luggage
had been placed. He was driven to
the home of a priest in the suburbs.

No Mission in England.
Penzance, Eng., Aug. 9.—When ask-
ed by the correspondent of the Assoc-
iated Press if he cared to say any-
thing about his mission Archbishop
Mannix replied:

"I have no mission in England, my
lanquage in England is involuntary.
I had no desire to go to England, but
wanted to go to Ireland. Ireland is
my home. I am an active of Ireland
and it is seven years since I left. It
is about time I returned. I have lived
in Australia the whole time."

Few people witnessed the arrival
of the prelate. He remained at the home
of Canon Wade until his departure on
the night train for London.

Archbishop Mannix told the corres-
pondent that the commander of the
"Wyvern" had shown great courtesy
and "left nothing undone to make my
involuntary cruise as comfortable as
possible."

His love rekindled. On September
10, 1916, "Philip Ray" and "Annie
Lee"—Peel and Esther—were mar-
ried.

In June, 1919, Enoch Arden came
home. "Not to tell her, never to let
her know," the words of Tennyson's
Enoch Arden never occurred to Curtis.
"He acted as though nothing had
happened since he left his wife, and
he lived with her," Peel told the
judge. "She seemed to prefer him to
me, so after a quarrel with her I
left, going to Texas."

"You seem to be the victim of a
man who never read Enoch Arden,"
said Judge Barney. "You are en-
titled to a divorce."

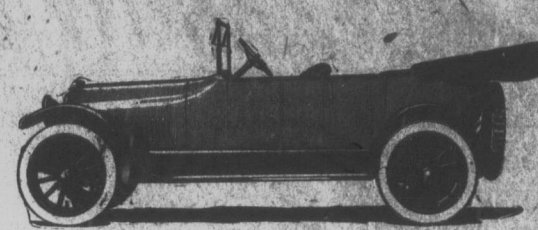
Mr. David Girwood.

APPLE CROP ONLY SIXTY PER CENT OF LAST YEAR'S

According to a statement given out by A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturist, the apple crop for the present year will amount to about sixty per cent of last year's crop.

The same situation is true of Nova Scotia, this being a poorer year than last year for the fruit. Last year was a full year and a bumper crop resulted while this year at the first of the season the absence of rain had a serious effect upon the crop and a heavy drop resulted. This was general throughout the province and not confined to a few districts. While the bulk of the crop, consisting of Dudley Winter, the Wealthy and the McIntosh, will have a good yield, the Alexander and Fameuse will be much smaller than usual.

FRANCISCO VILLA HAS SURRENDERED

Capitulates to Federal Authorities After Years of Banditry and Difference.

San Pedro, Coahuila, Mexico, Aug. 10.—Francisco Villa surrendered today. After years of banditry and defiance of the Mexican and United States Governments, the famous outlaw delivered himself into the hands of the Federal authorities and was taken to a place of confinement. The formal surrender ceremonies will take place later, with pomp and circumstance but Villa actually placed his person in the hands of his former enemies today.

He met General Eugenio Martinez the Federal Commander under an old tree on a ranch five miles from San Pedro. Villa marched as far as San Pedro with his men. He left his troops in the town and with only a handful of retainers rode on to the rendezvous to deliver himself up in accordance with the agreement reached with the government recently.

Bandit Cheered by Populace. San Pedro, Coahuila, (via Laredo Tex.) Aug. 10.—Francisco Villa marched into San Pedro Monday night between the lines of a cheering populace which greeted him with cheers of "Viva Villa." Behind him came his band of faithful followers, which with their leader surrendered to the De La Huerta Government, under terms agreed upon recently at Salinas.

There were nine hundred men in the band which Villa led into San Pedro all of which reached this town after a twenty-four hour march across the desert country without food or water for man or beast.

Villa's entrance into San Pedro marked the first time in ten years of revolution that the bandit leader had reached a city without a plan of conquest or a hunted fugitive.

He was greeted and embraced by generals who two weeks ago were leading thousands of soldiers in an attempt to capture him.

CHATHAM BOY IS CHAMPION OF BRONCHO BUSTERS. Leo F. Moran, now of East Boston, Confident of Winning in Texas Tournament in Fall. (Chatham World.)

The hero of the following sketch, which we find in a late Boston paper, was born in Chatham, the son of Michael Moran and nephew of Thos. Moran of Douglas avenue. He left here with a band of Gypsies, when he was a boy, being unable to resist the lure of a horse, and appears to have lived with and on horses ever since.

What! Whoopie! Yahoo! and everything else they yell on the plains of the west. For Boston has a real broncho buster, and if the stories they tell about him are true, he is a champion highkicker on any kind of a dazed horse, be he from New Mexico or Texas or Maine.

Boston ought to have the shivers, or else swell with pride, to know that within its classic borders, which hold so much of the world's wonder, she has corralled the only dyed in the wool champion broncho buster of the country.

His name is Leo F. Moran, and he lives in East Boston. He is going to prove his mettle by taking in the world broncho busting contest in Dallas, Texas, in the fall. He is confident of winning the \$2,000 prize and coming home to Noddle Island with the championship belt, or sohbbero, in his hand.

He will be pitted against Buck Peters of Bliss, Ok., the present title holder.

Served Three Years in France. Moran during the World War was a member of the Canadian army—for he is a native born Canadian—and served three years in France at active fighting. He is only twenty-four years old now, and after the carnage on the battlefields of France, he avows he fears no four-footed animal that walks, or bucks, the plains.

He has been for much of his life a wild west rider with various circuses, but shook the tented arena to get a good rest in Boston before mounting the cussedness of the most emery beast in the shape of a horse that Texas can produce.

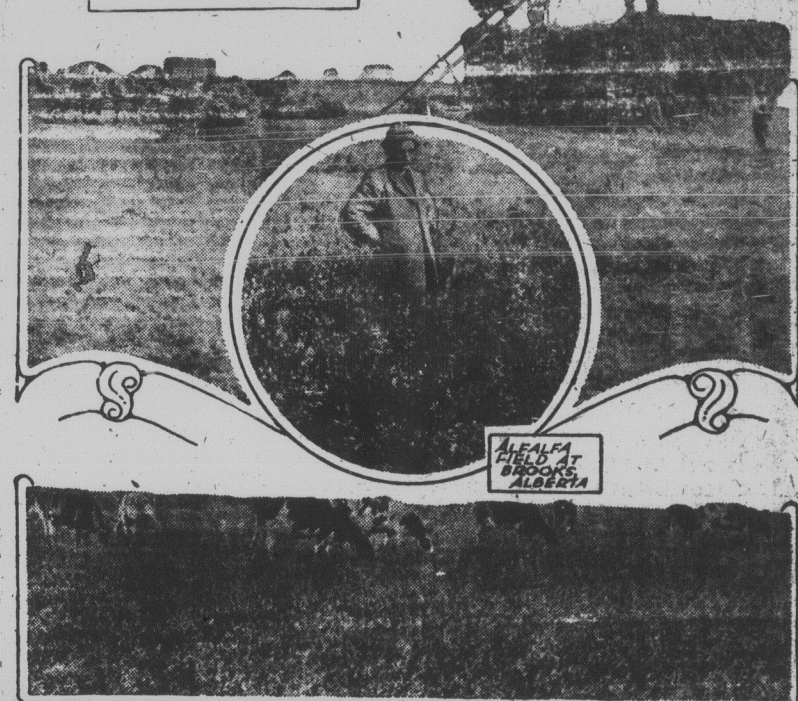

GRASSES OF CANADIAN PRAIRIES MAKE MOUNTAINS OF BUTTER

STACKING ALFALFA AT COALDALE



Alberta's 1920 contribution to the butter market was a fair sized lump weighing ten and one-half million pounds that put \$6,512,000 into the butter-makers' pockets. The quality of this butter was unquestionable as attested by the fact that Alberta carried off the first prizes for block butter at the recent National Dairy Council Exhibition held at Winnipeg. Alberta's butter output increased during the past four years almost 40% in volume and over 15% in value. There are 65 co-operative creameries in the province—all community owned and operated, and 15 privately owned and operated. In addition to these there are in the farms centers such as Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat, large centralized creameries or dairies. These operate collection branches or cream buying stations along the railway lines. Cheese making has become a considerable industry too, but does not keep pace in growth with the butter industry as farmers generally prefer to sell their cream and feed the milk by-product to growing stock. Eleven cheese factories are in operation in the province and turned out in 1919 a half million pounds valued at \$140,000. Dairying is fast becoming one of the big industries of the prairie provinces, following close on the heels of grain growing and stock raising. Mixed farming has been strongly advocated to Canadian farmers and they have seen its advantages. Today it is generally practiced. If a crop fails, disaster is not the result, there is always plenty of grazing and fodder to insure the weekly cream check for the man with a dairy herd. The progress of the dairying industry has been very much helped by the increased cultivation in irrigated territories. Alberta is the greatest fodder yet discovered for dairy cattle, and is bringing wonderful prosperity to districts such as Coalville and Brooks.
