Japanese Mining Engineer Pays Visi To Boundary Mines and Smelters. (Special to The Daily News)

STUDYING WESTERN METHODS

Phoenix, July 20,-Yesterday J. Ko

ima. M.E., from Tokio, Japan, was a vis itor in Phoenix, for the purpose of in-specting the mines of the Granby Consolidated being shown over and through the properties by superintendent Smith having already seen the Granby smelting works at Grand Forks. Mr. Kojima is a mining engineer of note, a grad-uate of the university of Japan, and is in charge of the Ashio copper mines, one of the largest producers in the land of the Mikado. He left here for Seattle whence he sails next week for home, having spent six months in inspecting the largest and most important mines and metallurgical works in the United States and Canada. He took in the great copper mines of Arizona, New Mexico, and California. Then he went to Colorado, Montana, Minnesota and Michigan, visited the hydro-electrical works at Niagara Falls, went to Boson and New York, and then to the Nichols Copper Co.'s refining works in New Jersey, and locomotive works in Philadelphia and steel works at Pit'sourg. After that he went to Utah and Nevada, where he inspected the world famous copper, gold and silver producers in those states, not excepting the Homestake mine in South Dakota.

ountry and the works of the Granby and has had an opportunity of visiting most of the great producers of gold, silver and copper in the United States in a shorter space of time than many men and taking notes of new and improved

most extensively worked copper mines in Japan. In the Ashio mines he em ploys some 3200 hands, and as many more in the concentrating and smelting works of the concern, the Furukaw Copper Co., named after the chief own-er, Ichibei Furukawa, of Tokio . The Ashio mines have been worked for som 00 years in a primitive manner, but 300 years in a primitive manner, but only in comparatively recent years have modern methods prevailed, for which much credit is given to Mr. Furukawa. The properties, which are the largest of their kind in Japan, have some 50 miles of underground workings, and are operated to a depth of 2000 feet. Electricity is used for motive power, there being the best of opportunity for economical hydro-electrical development in the

teep mountains of that country. Last year the Ashlo mines produced about 15,000,000 pounds of refined copper. The smelter of the company has seven blast furnaces each with a capacity of 200 tons daily of which four are now in use. The company has also re cently completed its own refining works. Laborers receive about 30 cents a day, and the machinery used is of American make. The ore runs about 14 per cent in copper with some silver values, and the refined product is absorbed at home.

## CHANGE CAUSESTROUBLE

FRUIT SHIPMENTS ARE DELAYED TWENTY-FOUR HOURS

TO INTERFERENCE WITH THE MAIL SERVICE

The C.P.R. people have naturally great faith in the far reaching effect of a notice published in the columns of this newspaper and consequently when it was announced in last Wednesday's issue of The Daily News, on the front page that "On Friday morning next, and until further notice" the C.P.R. steamer Kuskanook would start at 6:30 in place of 4:30 and would make only limited stops between this city and Kootenay landing, thought no other intimation was necesstry. The ranchers all along the lake read the notice all right, though some of them did not read it carefully and understood that the change would be made "after Friday, instead of as published. Consequently there was plenty of trouble yesterday when the Kuskanook sailed on her way and did

not make the usual cells.

Fred Starkey was very indignant over the quick change made and said yesterday that the C.P.B. people were not showing Nelson people and the ranchers ordinary business civility and that the new rule if persisted in would do a great deal of harm to the fruit business of the district. Rousing Meeting at Rossland Last Night at Which Socialist Leader's Record in Legislature is Criticised

Rossland, July 18 .- At the miners celebration here on Monday last, J. Rossland, July 16.—The first day of

President Stewart, of the Miners' union, introduced the speakers, and in his opening remarks referred to the two-fold object of the celebration, viz., to fold object the 11th anniversary of fold object of the celebration, vlz., to commemorate the 11th anniversary of the founding of the local miners' union, and to bring into closer relationship the working men and the business men and citizens of the community generally. His worship, mayor McDonald, was then called upon, and he expressed his pleasure at seeing such a large turn out and so many visitors from neighboring towns. His worship stated that hartowns. His worship stated that harmony and honesty of purpose were absolute necessities in the upbuilding of our city, the hub of Golden Kootenay. In his conclusion, he extended to the visitors a hearty welcome and the free-

visitors a hearty welcome and the freedom of the city.

J. A. Macdonald, M.P.P., was next introduced and expressed his thanks for the opportunity of addressing such a large audience on this, the greatest celebration ever held by the Rossland Miners' union. SEVEN PASSENGERS KILLED ANI MANY WOUNDED

Spokane. July 24-At least seven live were lost, seven persons were seriously injured and a score of others sustained cuts and bruises in a wreck of the fast mail train on the Great Northern about a mile east of Camden, Wash., 35 miles east of Spokane, late yesterday afternoon, when the locomotive, mail baggage and smoking cars left the rails on emerging from a tunnel, and plunging over the 70 foot en pankment, were submerged in the waters of Diamond lake. It is said that the podies of two unknown men are under the reckage at the bottom of Diamond lake. The bodies of George H. Curtis and T. Dolbow, both of Spokane, have been covered. The engine is believed to be 6 eet under water and the remains of the engineer may not be recovered for two lays. effervesces with acid; it is limestone.

Color white/greenish-white or reddish; effervesces with hot acid only; it Color white; does not effervesce; it is

either gypsum or anhydrite.

(b) The rock is not easily scratched with a knife or file. It is almost certain to be silicate. Color distinct green ish tints; it is heavy, S.G. 3.4; H. to 6; appears to be composed of only one mineral; it is probably some form of imphibole.

Color greenish; apparently composed

of a white mineral (feldspar) and a green mineral, making the whole green-ish; may be either diorite or diabase. If it is graular and of a grey color with felspar, augite and magnetite cry-stals showing; has a yellowish or brownish weathered crust; it is probably doi-erite or andesite. Should distinct cry-stals of quartz be seen in the fresh fracture or weathered face, the rock will probably belong to either the granites, uartz porhyrys, gneisses or schists.

Table No. 4.—The fresh fracture shows the rock to have a foliated structure. Usually rocks in this class can easily be distinguished by the prominence of their different minerals. Frequently however, the minerals are so intimately mixed that they are with difficulty sep arated by the aid of a powerful lens. In that case the following notes will be

(d) The rock has a hardness of and splits with some difficulty along the mica-schist, quarty-schist; or gneiss. (e) The rock shows on its weathered surface small crystals of quartz and mica. Probably a fine grained variety

of mica-schist or gneiss. With some practice and the use of the foregoing tables, the prospector will frequently be able to determine the true nature and name of the rock. Victoria six of her crew were dead and the rest were helpless, owing to the ray his wife started from England on the Mindoro, which was wrecked before she got out of the English channel, and the passengers who escaped were landed at Dover, with scarcely clothing enough to cover them. Mr. Townsend then took passage on the Ann Adamson, which was eight months in making the voyage. For weeks she fought the elements of

the Horn, and when she finally rounded that point and scurvy had broken out and the male and remale passengers had practically to man the vessel for the rest of the voyage. Prior to this Mr. Townsend had served with the Baltic fleet in the Crimean war under admiral Dundas and had twice voyaged to the Columbia river and Fort Victoria on the Princess Royal, the pioneer Hudson's Bay ship. After finally settling in British Columbia, Mr. Townsend became tively associated with the advance

ment and enterprises of the young colony.
