

THE disgraceful lynching at Corunna, Mich., will hasten the day when capital punishment will be re-established in Michigan.

THERE is a discussion as to how the name of the Spanish Infanta, now on a visit to this continent, should be spelt. The authorities seem to have settled on this— Ay-yu-lah-lee-ah.

AN ILLUSTRATION of how the manipulat-"cable" news are biased is seen in the fact that when Salisbury goes to Belfast to further inflame the Ulster Tories against home rule the press is furnished with several pages of a report. But when 250,000 people meet in Hyde Park, London, to express their approval of the principle, the matter is dismissed in half a dozen lines. The cable correspondents should be brought up short. What the public want is the news, plain and unvarnished, but not partisan reports.

A CORRESPONDENT points out that the chief promoter of the St. John (N. E.) banquet to the Minister of Finance was Senator Boyd, and it is remarked that the Hon. John Costigan, who is opposed to Mr. Boyd's claims for the Lieutenant-Governorship, was not present, and, it is surmised, was not invited. The absence of Mr. Foster's only colleague from New Bruns-wick and the presence of Ministers from Manitoba and Quebec is taken as indicative of want of harmony in the Cabinet. There really is no cohesion, except the love of effice, and the emoluments thereof, existing among the seventeen members of the rful and wonderful aggregation known as the Government of Canada.

From all over the Dominion come reports of arrangements being made for a full representation of delegates at the Dominion Liberal Convention in Ottawa on June 20 and 21. London Liberals (old and young) meet to morrow night, when delegates will be chosen, and no doubt similar action will soon be taken in all other constituencies in the west, if representatives have not already been selected. The coming convention is the first party conference embracing the whole country ever held in the Dominion. Its deliberations will doubtless be fraught with much importance, for on the platform agreed upon, on the principles laid down, will this great historic party of freedom and progress fight the next Dominion election.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK. The wholesale markets have been quiet this week, as they always are in the neighborhood of a holiday. London merchants, have, however, been cheered by a somewhat better outlook in regard to the crops, owing to the improvement in the weather. This especially holds good of the Manitoba and Northwest trade.

In this part of Canada, the growing crops look well. The recent rain has made a vast improvement in the grass fields, and the prospects are that there will be an ample crop. By the way, a recent report by the Minister of Finance orings forth the intelligence that the shipment of hay to Britain met with indifferent success last year, and the business methods of the shippers are blamed for the tailure, as was also the business methods of the shippers of eggs. How far this arraignment is warranted must be left to the dealers to settle. At the same time the intelligence regarding hay, sent from Buffalo, is instructive. Last week hay was selling in that city for \$20 a ton, or I cent a pound. The News, in chroniciling the fact, says: "The Canadians are supplying the Buffalo market with nearly all the hay it gets. The duty is \$4 per ton, but the Canadian gladly pays that and is willing to bank his hay 30 or 40 miles, and thinks he is getting rich at that. It is said by dealers that the price will advance very close to the \$30 mark before new hay somes." The near market seems to be the best, if it can be got at without the payment of heavy taxes.

send wheat on this continent away up. We learn by a late cablegram that the two months' drought in France is estimated to have destroyed 32,000,000 francs' worth of crops. The greatest damage was done to the green crops. A dispatch from Rome says that rain in Northern Italy has saved the people from much of the enormous loss threatened by the drought. The crops on the Roman Campagna, however, have been ruined. In Germany the drought remains unbroken. Official statistics concerning the Prussian crops show that the kingdom has suffered heavy losses. The hay crop is a complete failure.

Such reports as these can have little effect on prices, however, so long as the available stocks of last season's wheat yet unmarketed are known to be at least 215, 000,000 bushels, not counting a consider able quantity held by farmers. This in itself is enough to supply the importers of the world for four months after feeding North America. We must also take into account the fact that India has just harvested a larger crop than last year, and that Australasia and Argentine will have their usual crop to export. This, with the harvest in the United States and Canada only three or months distant, does not afford much cheer for the holders of grain. Considerable interest has developed in a report from the Western States to the effect that the cereal area has been much curtailed this year. The report is not well founded. The wheat acreage, it is true, is not so large, but more oats, barley, corn and flax have been sown. In Manitoba and the Northwest the wheat area has been very considerably extended.

BLOODSHED AVERTED.

Even nations hitherto regarded as semisavage are now endeavoring to settle their quarrels by arbitration and conciliation in tead of by bloody combat. Through the mediation of the United States Japan and Corea have abandoned the blood-letting methods of settling disputes, and have amicably adjusted their differences in a business way. Corea will pay Japan \$110,000 for the injuries complained of. That settles the ugly question at a mere tithe of what a battle would have cost even the successful combatant, and there will be no widows and orphans to bemoan the butchery of their husbands and fathers. This result will give pleasure to all but the professional warrior. He will view it in the light of the Toronto colonel, who has placed himself on record as holding that Canada will never amount to anything until she indulges in a first-rate war.





Ten delegations, numbering in all 39 people, interviewed the Ministers. even for this democratic age and country; but, in the old days, in the forties and the early fitties, it was very different. We then had the auld kirk, the free church and the secession church, which this First Presbyterian Church represents. In those days there was great conflict of opinion, even among Presbyterians, on the great question of the clergy reserves. This is not the time or place to go into a history of the great struggle, which ultimately culminated in their entire secularization—further than to say that in 1791 one-seventh of the lands held by the Crown were set apart for the maintenance of one denomination, and special instructions were given the Lieutenant-Governor for the erection of parsonages or rectories, one or more in each townshipor parish, according to the establishment of the Church of England. As the country became settled this injustice was so apparent and the agitation became so fierce, that together with an executive irresponsible to Parliament or people, this and other grievances at last culminated in the rebellion of 1837. Still the struggle went on, retarded for a short time by the union of Upper and Lower Canada in 1841, and was not finally settled till the year 1854. In the course of these long years the reserves had become enormously valuable, but were at last secularized and their proceeds applied to educational and municipal purposes. It was a long and bitter struggle, but LAST,

RIGHTEOUSNESS AND RIGHT TRIUMPHED AT AND RIGHT TRIUMPHED AT LAST, and I am proud to say that this branch of the Presbyterian Church was one of the foremost in the field in defense of the voluntary principle. The late Dr. Proudfoot, the first paster of the first Presbyterian church in London, contributed by his pen through the press, as well as by his counsel with the leading statesmen of his day, to educate the people up to

And in locking back at thi great struggle one cannot but believe that an all wise God was guiding it all FOR A WISE PURPOSE, for I am sure that the denomination that believed they were being robbed of their vested rights have, since, left to their voluntary efforts, grown from being the church of mere officialdom to be a vigorous, progressive and evangelical denomination—(vociferous applause)—reaching and administering spiritual comfort to the masses, who, under the old regime were almost entirely neglected; and thus was forever destroyed the possibility of a state church, dominating over the other churches, ever being established on the free soil of Canada. (Cheers.) All honor then to such men as the late Robert Baldwin and the late Chancellor Blake, the Hon. Geo. Brown and the late Dr. Proudfoot for their valuable labors in placing all religious denominations on an equality in the eyes of the law, thus securing equal rights to all and granting to every one the right to worship God according to their own conscience, none daring to make them afraid. science, none daring to make them afraid.
I am pleased to say that this is, I believe,

which the First Presbyterin Church hopes to occupy, which makes another step in the progress of those grand principles of civil and religious liberty which always follow wherever the blue banner of Presbyterianism is unfurled. And while we are glad to see all other branches of the Christian church advance in every good work, we claim for the Presbyterian form as true an apostolic descent as any other, and I believe with the broadening and tolerant spirit of the last decade of the 19th century that the simple creed of a belief in a risen Saviour, the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man is broad enough for all branches of the Christian church to stand upon; and while each denomination may carry on its work in its own way without making minor differences a barrier against Christian fellowship, the time may, and I have no doubt will come, when all those who name the name of Christ may again heat the old cry "See how these Christians love one another" and the fierce hate which often FOURTH BUILDING ry "See now these Christians love one nother" and the fierce hate which often me church manifests against another will ie out, and they will come to understand



Undoubtedly the single tax is not the only thing required to remedy social ills, but it is the fundamental reform upon which

Taxes on the products of industry make dearer the things that the farmer exchanges his labor for and thereby lessens the pur-chasing value of his labor.

Some people profess to take very little stock in the Bible, but that is mighty good dootrine where it tells us that the earth was given to the children of men.

Taxing the rich is only an indirect way of taxing labor, for labor pays every tax in the world to the last cent, for nothing but labor creates wealth with which to pay taxes.

The farmer would be greatly benefited by the single tax, because it is a tax that helps the user of land at the expense of the mere owner. Farmers are the great users of land, whether they happen to own it or not. Taxing land values makes land cheaper. As the farmer wants to use land and not to sell it, that is the kind of tax for him. He wants no tax on his buildings and improvements, for that discourages improvement and progress.

A tax on any monopoly cannot be shifted to the consumer, but must be borne by the monopolist on whom it is assessed, because he gets all he can in any event and the tax gives him no power to exact more. If he had the power to take more he would do it without waiting to be taxed.


