Pittsburg, Pa.. Aug. 8.—Five miners were killed and five others seriously injured when a gas explosion wrecked a mine shaft and sections of the workings last night at Harmarville, near here. The mine, which was the property of the Consumers' Mining Company had not been operated for 18 years. Officials of the company and mine rescuers rushed from the Pittsburg bureau could not say how the accumulation of gas had been set off.

# **REIGN OF THE BOLSHEVIKI IN NORTH RUSSIA COMES TO END**

The Government at Archangel Issues Proclamation to

Kandalaska, Aug. 7.—The Govern-ment of the "country of the north" re-cently established at Archangel after a revolution against the Bolsheviki, has ddressed a proclamation to the people the district, declaring the Bolshevik me at an end and announcing that new Government had taken up the the new Government had taken up the duty of governing the region.

"The power of the Boisheviki is ended," the proclamation begins. "Because of the treason to the country committed at Brest-Litovsk; because of famine, the failure to recognize the rights and liberties of the country; because of pillaging, illegal shootings and constant arrests, the power of the so-called soviet, of traitors and criminals, is past. The representatives of the so-called people's Government have fled.

"At the present moment, in the interests of all Russia, we take upon ourselves the duty of governing the country of the north."

London, Aug. 8.—Several thousand prisoners have been taken by the Franco-British forces in their offensive in Picardy, the Evening Standard learns, According to reports received this afternoon the Allies have captured the owns of Moreuli, Demuin, Ablancourt and Morlancourt, the heights west of Cerisy and the heights south of Moriancourt.

British Army Headquarters in France, Aug. 8.-Noon.-A very considerable number of villages have been captured in the Franco-British offensive, and substantial progress has been made, according to news received here this afternoon. The greatest secrecy surrounded plans for the attacke During the night the Germans heavily bombarded the British lines, but their shells were ineffective.



# ZEPPELIN CREW KILLED German Dirigible Navigators Death on British Coast.

Amsterdam, Aug. 7.—Capt. Strasser, one of Germany's most successful squadron commanders in zeppelin attacks and the entire crew of the zeppelin which led the attack toward the British east coast Monday night perished when the dirigible was shot down over the North Sea. An official communication from Berlin, dealing with the attempted raid on the east English coast was received here today. It said the raiders caused heavy damage in bombing attacks, but that Strasser and his crew probably met with a heroic death.



A. Finn, the agriculture representative for Middlesex County. Mr. Finn, who spent Wednesday touring about the northwest part of the county, reports that the warm weather up to the present time has done nothing toward ruining the crops. He states that the heat, in fact, is doing much good to the grain that has already been cut and is still in the fields. The sun is rapidly drying this grain, so that the farmers can almost immediately go on with their threshing, which not only saves them a considerable amount of time, but makes the grain thresh much more easily than it does when it is damp, for when it is damp it winds around the cylinders in the threshing machine and causes a great amount of trouble and inconvenience.

Late last week the Germans withdrew to the east of the Avre in the region west and northwest of Montdidier. Since then the French have been gaining ground on the same front.

'A line from the Somme to the Avre, and thence south along the river, faces fairly open country, and the region of Picardy in front of it is part of the region devastated by the Germans in their retreat from the Somme in March, 1917. A break through in the Montdidier region would have a menacing effect on the German lines from Rheims to Ypres."

His Knighthood.

When Sir George was knighted for his service on the waterways commission he was the first lawyer in London to receive the honor of knighthood. Sir William R. Meredith received knighthood after he became chief justice.

After the honor had been conferred on Sir George, and after the scope of the commission's powers had been enlarged and defined, and Sir George again appointed chairman, the voters, on September 21, 1911, voted against the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Sir George resigned office. He had become known to many prominent Americans like Taft and members of the American division of the commission. The commission had done many important works before its abolition.

Married in 1876.

In 1876 Sir George married Elizabeth Campbell, daughter of Hugh Craig. Lady Gibbons died some two years ago.

He was active in many phases of business and financial life, having organized the London and Western Trusts Company. He was created a K. C. in 1891, became a bencher of the Law Society in 1894, being re-elected in 1906. He was president of the Middlesex Law Society for a long period, and also served as president of the Canadian Law Association, having made a notable speech before that body two or three years ago.

# **AGREEMENT MADE** WHICH OBVIATES STRIKES ON RYS.

Railway Labor Board of Canada Is Duly Constituted.

MONTREAL, Aug. 7.-Not one car wheel in the two million which might one day carry Canada's goods to market over the Canadian railways, is likely hereafter to be stopped on account of railway labor troubles, ac-cording to a statement issued tonight from the offices of the Canadian Railway War Board. By an agreement signed this afternoon between the six great railway brotherhoods and the Canadian Railway War Board all railway labor disputes which cannot be settled between the men and the officers of the individual roads, whether regarding wages or working conditions, will be finally referred to the railway labor board of Canada.

This board consists now of six labor leaders, one for each of the brotherhoods, and six railway executives. Their decision on any matter referred to them will bind, on the one hand, the labor thus represented, and on the other hand the Canadian railways. In case of disagreement, the board will choose a referree, and if, a referee cannot be agreed upon the governor-general-in-council, through the minister of railways and canals, will be asked to make the appointment. Justice Holds That Parliament Cannot Suspend Habeas Corpus.

OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—The judgment given out by Mr. Justice Monet of Montreal yesterday in the case of two habeas corpus applications taken on behalf of two individuals disfranchised at the last election. but. nevertheless, recently drafted for military service, has raised a new question. Not only does Judge Monet hold that even Parliament cannot suspend habeas corpus, but he holds that under the war-times election act the principle has been laid down that those to whom the franchise was specifically denied last election by reason of nationality shall not be called upon to fight. For this reason writs were ordered by him to issue for the release of the two men.
