Hun Positions Penetrated For Three Miles by Allied Troops In Opening of Big Offensive

SIR GEORGE C. GIBBONS DIES IN MONTREAL HOSPITAL AFTER UNDERGOING TWO OPERATIONS

Noted Lawyer of This City Was Away On Vacation When He Became Ill—Has Been Exceedingly Active in Public Life For Many Years.

London lost one of its most prominent citizens, and Canada one of its foremost lawyers at noon today, when Sir George Christie Gibbons died at Rosemount Hospital, Montreal, after a double operation had been performed with every hope of recovery until the last few hours.

He had gone to St. Andrew's, N. B., to spend a summer vacation, when a serious internal complaint caused physicians to recommend his immediate removal to Montreal for an operation. The first operation was performed two weeks ago today, and a second several days later. Good hopes were entertained for a complete recovery, but weakness gradually came upon him, which culminated in a slow sinking Wednesday.

George S. Gibbons has been with his father for some time, and sent the message of death this morning to F. F. Harper of the firm of Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons.

While his local reputation as a barrister made him one of the best-known men in the city, he had won both national and international fame as chairman of the International Waterways Commission from 1905 until 1911. His services on the important work of deciding critical questions of boundaries and fisheries has been commended by most of the men of the governments concerned, and it was in recognition of his keen ability and broadminded attitude toward the problems that he was knighted in 1911 by King George.

FIVE MINERS KILLED IN GAS EXPLOSION

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 8.—Five miners were killed and five others seriously injured when a gas explosion wrecked a mine shaft and sections of the workings last night at Harnarville, near here. The mine, which was the property of the Consumers' Mining Company had not been operated for 18 years. Officials of the company and mine rescuers rushed from the Pittsburg bureau could not say how the accumulation of gas had been set off.

U. S. EXPORTED OVER 92,000,000 POUNDS OF BEEF TO THE ALLIES

Washington, Aug. 8.—The extent to which aid is being furnished the allied nations in foodstuffs is indicated in a statement issued today by the food administration, showing that during the month of June, exports of beef from the United States, 92,138,000 pounds, of which 95 per cent went to the United Kingdom, France, England and Belgium.

U. S. DRAFT SYSTEM NOT TO BE EXTENDED TO NAVY DEPARTMENT

Washington, Aug. 8.—Extension of the draft system to the United States navy is not regarded as necessary at this time, by the navy department here, Rear-Admiral Palmer, chief of the bureau of navigation, told the Senate committee today the navy has practically all the men it needs, and that enlistments would not be affected by changing the army draft ages.

DETROIT STREET RAILWAY FARES ARE INCREASED

Detroit, Aug. 8.—An increase in street car fares here was put into effect today by the Detroit United Railway. The new rates are 8 cents cash or ten tickets for 55 cents instead of a 5-cent charge. It was announced that the eight-for-a-quarter tickets, good during the rush hours of the morning and evening, will be withdrawn after Saturday of this week.

Washington, Aug. 8.—Government acquisition and control of all the principal stock yards, cold storage plants and warehouses and both refrigerator and cattle cars has been recommended to the president by the federal trade commission to destroy a monopoly which declares: "Swift & Co., Armour & Co., Morris & Co., Wilson & Co. and the Cudahy Packing Company exercise control not only over the meat of the country, but other necessary food supplies."

London, Aug. 8.—Several thousand prisoners have been taken by the Franco-British forces in their offensive in Picardy, the Evening Standard learns. According to reports received this afternoon the Allies have captured the towns of Moreuil, Demuin, Ablancourt and Morlancourt, the heights west of Cerisy and the heights south of Morlancourt.

FRENCH PEASANTS TOLD BY HUNS NOT TO COUNT ON U. S.

With the American Army in the Vesle, Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press)—French peasants found by American soldiers in a cave near Ville-Savoire, just south of the Vesle, had been told by the Germans that if the Americans discovered them the men would be killed and the women mistreated. The Germans gave the peasants a letter dated Flémes, August 2 addressed to "French army headquarters and purporting to be signed by 'The Artillery Commander.'"

COMBINED ATTACK OPENED AT DAWN ALONG 12-MILE FRONT

On the French Front in France, Aug. 8.—(By the Associated Press, 11 a.m.)—A combined attack by the French and British was begun at dawn today along the front between Albert and Montdidier. Satisfactory progress was made despite strong enemy resistance. The assault began exactly at dawn along a front of between 40 and 50 kilometres, and a success was scored immediately. The British advanced toward Cerisy-Gailly, on the south side of the Somme, east of Saily-Laurette and Marcelcave. The French advanced at the same time in the direction of Demuin and Auber-court.

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LEGION OF HONOR GIVES MAJOR REID BY PRES. POINCARÉ

London Boy Is Decorated in Paris July 14. General Court-Martial Adjourns for Few Hours. Will Fight Till Purpose is Firmly Established.

Members of Famous British Regiments Marched Through Paris Streets. Adjutant Says Something Drastic Needed to Stop Them.

Major Eric Reid, D.S.O., was decorated with the Legion of Honor by President Poincaré for his continuing gallantry in action in the cause of the Allies on July 14 in Paris. This information was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George M. Reid, 262 Central avenue. In command of a picked company of men, all colonials, from New Zealand, Australia and Canada, Major Reid led them through the streets of Paris as heroes of the great war. Every man was at least 5 feet 10 inches in height and possessed wound stripes or some other decoration. In this company were members of the Black Watch, the Grenadier Guards and the Surrey Regiment. The commander of the Black Watch was also decorated by President Poincaré. Seventy-five hours were spent in Paris in the Legion of Honor ceremony. Major Reid left Canada with McGill University Unit in 1915. Although severely wounded, he could not be persuaded from re-entering the front line, and his promotion and awards have been noteworthy.

SENSELESS OFFICIOUSNESS.

THERE IS a limit to all things and that placed on the action of military or "dominion" police officers ought to be narrowed to prevent them demanding exemption papers from a man in a bathing suit who is taking a rest on shore.

It is bad enough when a man changes his clothes and forgets to carry all his necessary documents out with him that he should be liable to a fine of \$50, but it is ridiculous to expect anyone to carry them with him while bathing.

There are few military police who would be guilty of taking such an advantage as the one who accosted this youth appears to have taken, and that fact makes the action look all the worse.

LEAVE FOR HARVESTERS.

IN SPITE of official declarations to the contrary, there are grounds for hope that leave of absence will be granted farmers' sons almost immediately to work in the harvest fields.

The Advertiser has had dozens of inquiries from anxious farmers as to the possibility of this leave being granted and has always agreed with the inquirers that, in cases of hardship, it was most desirable that a point should be stretched to help the producers of food-stuffs.

Crops in Canada today are not of the "bumper" variety. In some parts of the Dominion they are hardly average, while the most favorable reports from other points do not anticipate more than average yield.

CAN WE FIND MORE GAS?

WILLIAM WELSH of Kincaidine has been writing to The Advertiser during the last two months urging upon the Government the need for further development of the gas and oil fields of the Southern Ontario peninsula.

Premier Hearst would get into action were he urged to do so by a number of strong municipalities. While it might not be possible to develop a field in any event before the winter coal problem comes again, a great deal might be done to offset the present gas situation.

THE STEEL MAKER IN CANADA.

Engineering, a British publication, devotes a long article to the steel development, and sees a great future for Canada as a factor in supplying world markets.

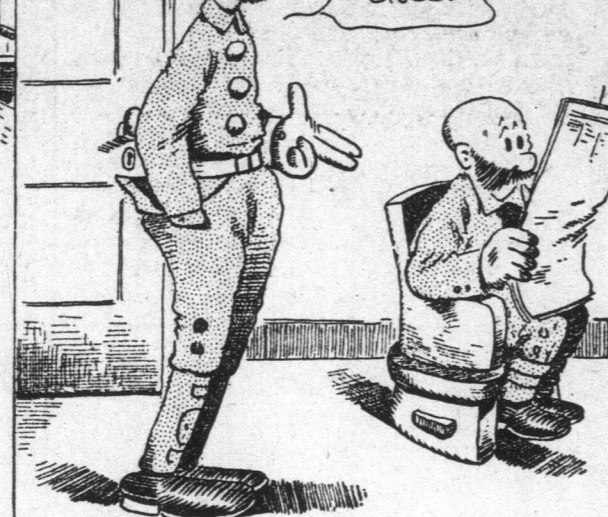

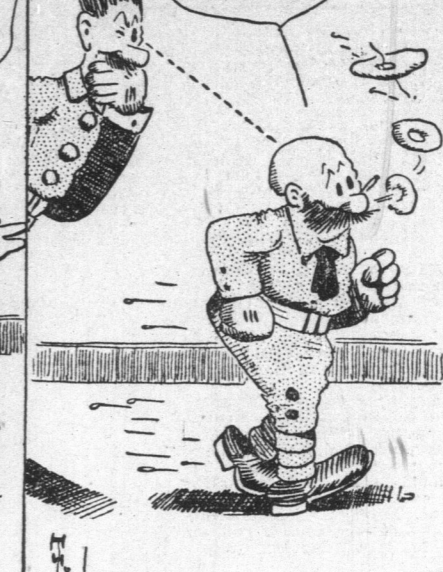

A.—After the feet have been soaked well in soap and hot water apply a few drops of the following to each foot: Sodium bicarbonate 15 grains Salicylic acid 1 dram Extract cannulae 1 ounce Colloidal iodine 1 ounce

S. H. Q.—Will you please tell me what to do for a noise in my ear and head?
A.—An examination must be made by a physician to determine whether it is middle ear disease, hardening of the ear bones, high blood pressure, wax or other things which cause the unpleasantness in your ears.

MRS. W. R. Q.—Will you please tell me how to remove tan?
A.—Apply a little of the following to your face before you venture into the sun, and then apply some just as soon as you return:
Quince seed, pour one ounce of it into a quart of water, kept boiling. Remove the boiling water, and quince seed and place this into another vessel and let it set for one hour. This mixture should be strained through a cloth and to each six ounces of this lotion add 10 drops of oil of the valley and one ounce of glycerine. If you keep this on ice it will last for quite a length of time.
