LONDON IS ECLIPSED BY BUT ONE CITY IN THE NUMBER OF DRUNKS

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Toronto, April 14.—The annual report of the board of license commissioners for 1918, which is being tabled in the House today, shows that Toronto and Ottawa had the greatest decrease in the number of commitments for drunkenness during the period, as compared with 1917. In the former case, the decrease was 2,041, and in the latter 624. Even at that these two cities, together with London, share the record for having the largest number of commitments for drunkenness in 1918. In London there were 196 commitments, in Ottawa 187, and in Toronto 1,593. Hamilton had 109 commitments, a decrease of 20.

There is a net_decrease for the province of 1,312, as there were only 2,595 commitments last year.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY THE WORLD OVER IN PEACE PACT

No Child To Be Employed in Industry or Commerce Under 14 Years.

SCHOOLING FOR CHILDREN None To Be Employed in Work Harmful to Physique Up to 18 Years.

PARIS. April 13.—Recommendations embodied in the report of the committee on international labor legislation, which was adopted by the peace conference on Friday, include the fol-

conference on Friday, include the following:

Employers and workers should be allowed the right of association for all lawful purposes. No child should be permitted to be employed in industry or commerce before the age of fourteen, in order that every child be insured reasonable opportunities for mental and physical education. Between the ages of fourteen and eighteen young persons of either sex may be employed at work which is not harmful to their physical development on condition that their technical or general education is assured. Every worker has the right to a wage adquate to maintain a reasonable standard of life, having regard to the civilization of his time and his country.

ard of life, having regard to the civilization of his time and his country.

Equal pay should be given to women and men for work of equal value in quantity and quality. Limitation is recommended of the hours of work in industry on the basis of eight hours per day and 48 hours per week, subject to exception in countries in which climatic conditions, imperfect development of industrial organization or other special circumstances render the industrial efficiency of the workers substantially different.

In all matters concerning their status as workers and in social insurance, foreign workmen lawfully admitted to another country and their families, should be insured the same treatment as the nationals of that country. All states should institute a system of inspection in which women should take part, in order to insure the enforcement of the laws and regulations for the protection of the





LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT.

PARIS, April 12.—The following official summary of the covenant of the league of nations was issued this afternoon:

"1. The league of nations is founded in order to promote international co-operation and to secure peace. The league will include (a) the belligerent states named in a document annexed to the covenant; (b) all the neutral states so named, and (c) in the future any self-governing country whose admission is approved by two-thirds of the states already members of the league.
