



HOW GOVERNMENT SALE WORKS IN MANITOBA

(One of a series of twenty articles following impartial investigation of government sale of liquor as practised in Manitoba, Alberta, British Columbia and Quebec.)

ADULT AND CHILD ALIKE BUY LIQUOR SUPPLY IN MANITOBA

Resident or Transient and Even Children Find Government Has Made It Easy To Secure Four Hundred Kinds of Spirituous Liquor by Bottle or Case.

DELIVERY TO HOME OR HOTEL IS PROMPT

ARTICLE NO. 2. Thrusting with information about government control, if for nothing stronger, I set out from the hotel in Winnipeg to find what I and other transients could get from the government control commission in the form of beer and spirituous liquors and the amount of the trouble involved. Also the extent of the choice of drinks offered to all and the cost price in coin of the realm.

Applying to No. 1 order office at the city's principal corner, Main and Portage, I was quickly supplied with "price list No. 5." I assume that it offers a richer and more varied choice than any previous list. It certainly overlooked nothing that a connoisseur could have desired.

400 Varieties of Liquor. Some 400 choices were offered to the public, ranging in price up to \$90.20 per case for "Dawson's Old Curio, 20-year-old." Here were brandies, imported Burgundies and champagnes, clarets, cocktails, Holland gins, liqueurs, ports, Jamaica rum, Demarara rum, sauterne, sherries, Muscatelle and Madeira and Irish and Scotch whiskeys, not to overlook Guinness' stout. More unusual was a line of Chinese whiskeys and wines, Palestine brandy and wines, Polish brandies and liqueurs and Swedish liquors.

A little bewildered by the many choices offered me by a government control board that is evidently out to please, I turned to the young man at the counter.

"I see you have made provision for your own residents," I observed. "But I am a transient staying at a hotel. You appear to have no provision for me." At that time I did not know better.

"Sure we have, all the provisions in the world," he replied. "Two choices are offered to you. You can pay 50 cents and get a single purchase of a bottle or a dozen bottles of spirits; or you can pay \$1 and have the right to buy the same quantity every day of the month."

A Further Stipulation. It seemed magically simple to a man from Ontario. Thinking it over, I felt sure that there was a catch to it. So I went to No. 4 order office, located at 965 Main street. Here the information was confirmed, and I was given an application form. The only stipulation added at this office was that the hotel clerk should sign a certificate, without oath or statutory declaration, stating that the applicant resided temporarily at the place named. The form was one of a general character for temporary residents, and only called for some resident of Manitoba to sign the certificate. The idea of having hotel clerks

even say one case per week. On the face of it, it only limits a person to one case at a time from one of the five government stores in Winnipeg, or from one of the two warehouses. The permit holder is not required to say that he has not bought a case the day before or that he has not ordered a case the same day from another store. Nor does the permit call for the amount of each order to be indorsed on the back of the permit as in Alberta. But every order of liquor must be written out and signed and carry the number of the permit. Whether that limits orders is doubtful.

What Commission Itself Says. The text of the information given by the commission itself is as follows:

"The only person entitled to purchase liquor under the government liquor control act is the holder of a permit issued by the government liquor control commission. The applicant for a permit must be twenty-one years of age or over. Application for a permit must be made to the commission in writing. A person who has resided in the province for one month may obtain a permit for 50 cents, which will entitle him to make a single purchase of liquor, or such person may obtain a general permit for \$1. A person who is temporarily resident or sojourning in the province may obtain a temporary permit for \$1, which will entitle him to purchase liquor for one month from the date of the permit or he may obtain a single purchase permit for 50 cents. A holder of a general permit may, while away from home and temporarily resident in another place, obtain a single purchase permit.

"Permits are not transferable. It is an offence under the act for a permit holder to allow any other person to use his permit. A permit, except a single purchase or a temporary permit, obtained in 1924 expires on April 30th, 1925, when a new permit must be taken out and for which a new fee must be paid.

Messenger or Mail O. K. "No spirits or wine can be delivered by the commission except on an order signed by the purchaser and the purchase price is paid in cash or by postal note, express order, bank draft or accepted and certified check. Checks which will not be accepted and certified in payment for liquor. A permit holder may send in a signed order, accompanied by the money, by mail or messenger.

"An order may be given at the same time as the application for permit is made out, provided the application is regular. The permit will be mailed to the address given and the order will be delivered without undue loss of time.

"Liquor purchased by any person pursuant to a permit held by him may be had, kept, given or consumed only in the residence in which he resides.

"An applicant for a permit or a permit holder when ordering must put on his application or order, as the case may be, his definite address, that is to say, if living in a city, town or village his street and number on such street, or if living in a rural district his section, township and range and his postoffice address.

The Matter of Delivery. "A permit holder living within the limits of a city or town in which there is a government depot: (1) Must have his wine, spirits and beer delivered at his residence only and the commission pays the delivery charges.

"A permit holder living outside the limits of a city or town in which there is a government liquor depot: (1) May have his liquor delivered to the railway station or express office nearest his residence or, selected for delivery by said purchaser, in which case the commission pays the express or freight charges to said station or express office.

(2) May request that his liquor, excepting beer, be delivered by parcel post, in which case the purchaser must pay to the commission twenty-five cents per bottle in addition to the commission as per price list.

(3) May, where there are no convenient facilities for delivery at the residence of such person and when permitted by the regulations of the commission, receive delivery in person, at any government liquor depot, of liquor lawfully purchased by him, and in the case of beer at such other places as may be fixed by the regulations.

"Any Manitoba brewer duly licensed by the government of Canada may sell beer to a permit holder and may deliver the beer manufactured by him to the permit holder at his residence."

Conditions That Exist. The next article will give some idea of actual conditions in Winnipeg under government control and what persons who see its operation at close range have to say about it. Unfortunately, many persons whose opinion was sought had social, business or political reasons for requesting that their views be anonymous. One of the names, however, is withheld out of a spirit of kindness rather than because the writer is honorably bound to treat the statements as confidential.

CRIME INCREASED SINCE LAW PASSED

President of B. C. Conference Speaks at Centennial Methodist Church.

RALLY DAY SERVICE

Successful Rally Day services were held in Centennial Methodist Church yesterday.

At the morning service the pastor chose as his subject, "Spiritual Radium." He pointed out that radium is self-replenishing giving out without diminishing in force or quantity; was able to impart its light to surrounding objects, and had the same kind of power in small quantities as in large. He showed that God was behind all nations and all spiritual light, that there was some good in all religions, and that God was the great un diminishing force in all spiritual life, available to all men in all nations, and the only possible salvation for the world, and that only as God was in any individual would that religion persist and live.

The feature of the Sunday school service was the splendid work of the Mills orchestra and a choral talk given in a very interesting way by Mr. Peter Glenn, who drew pictures to illustrate the old virtues of hope, faith and works, memory and the wisdom of temperance.

Rev. James P. Weston— president of the British Columbia conference, preached at night to a large congregation on "Paying the Price." He pointed out that Christians must pay the price of interest and service if they wanted anything.

The plebiscite on the O.T.A. was spoken of, and he called on the people to pay the price of service and victory would be won. He instanced the effect of government sale in Vancouver in relation to the cost of police, which has increased 70 per cent, the cost of administration of justice which has increased 90 per cent. Taxes, which have increased 49 per cent, the prison population, which has increased 200 per cent, and the sale of liquor in the province, which has increased over 5,000 per cent. He spoke of the opening of many clubs, and stated that while liquor was supposed to be sold in sealed packages the amount any one could get was limited only by the size of their pocketbook. He could get a dray load if he wanted it, he concluded.

LEAMINGTON GARAGE FIRE DAMAGES AUTOS

Ten New and Twelve Used Cars Affected—Broken Lamp Starts Blaze.

Special to The Advertiser. Leamington, Sept. 28.—In a fire which swept the Dalley garage this afternoon ten new autos and about twelve used cars were badly damaged. It is believed that the fire was started from the sparks resulting from the breaking of an electric lamp, which was being used while the tank of an automobile was being emptied. The tops and paint were burned off all the cars. Five of the used cars were privately owned and one was a big gasoline truck. The garage is built of cement blocks, and this confined the flames, doing much to prevent a spread of the fire. Although all the windows were broken out by fire the firemen prevented damage to the Anglican church, which was less than five feet from the burning structure. Loss on the automobiles is placed at \$5,000, and on the building at \$1,500.

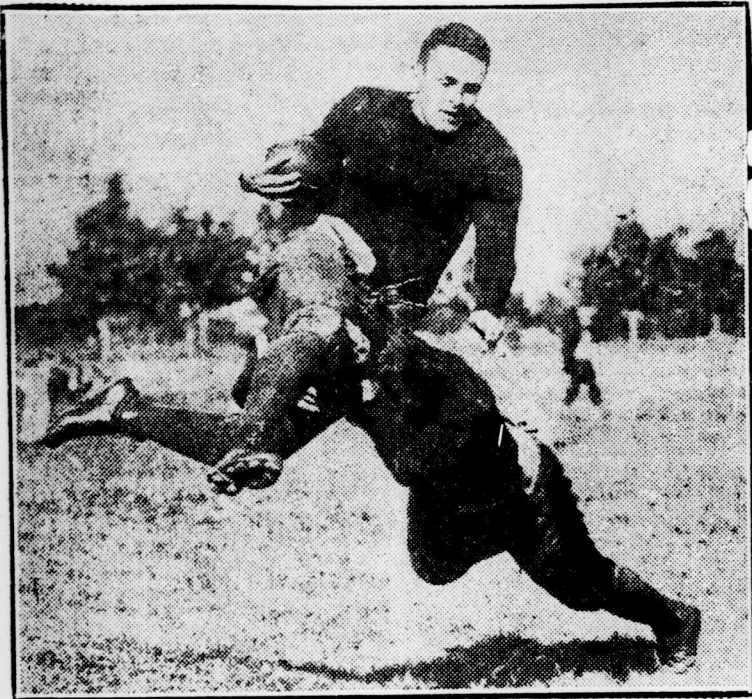

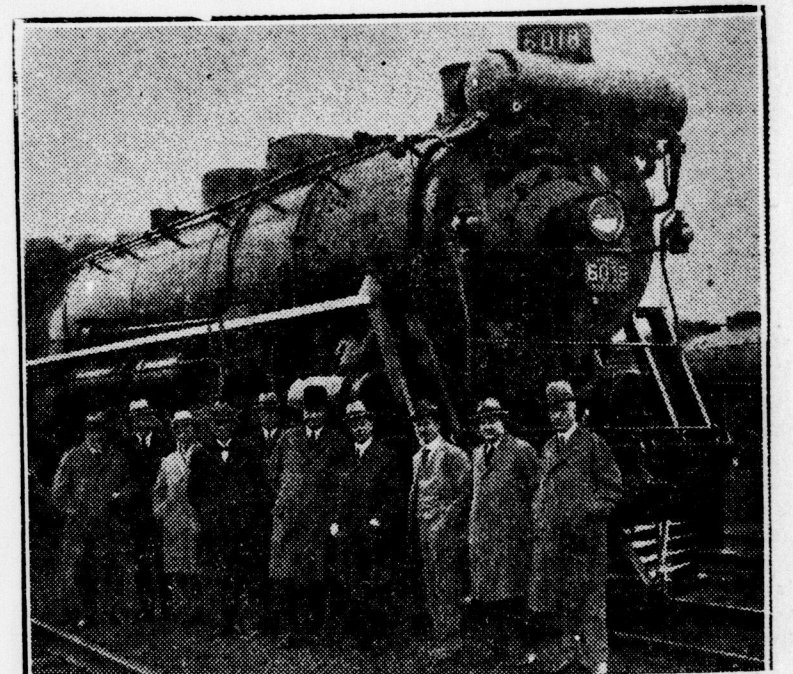
The first tackle of the season at Syracuse University shows Jim Foley, half-back, hit low by Vic Hanson in the pre-season practise on the college field



The extent to which the head is used in English soccer can be seen in this photograph taken during a game between the Tottenham Hotspurs and the Everton Football Club



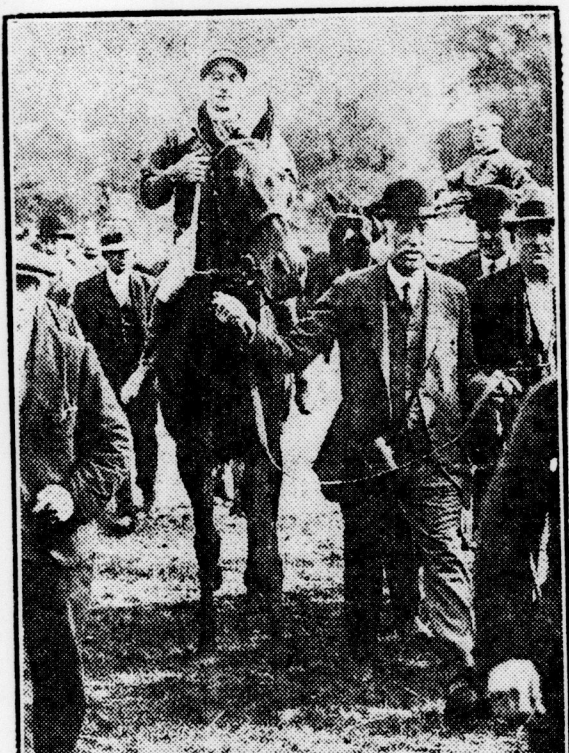

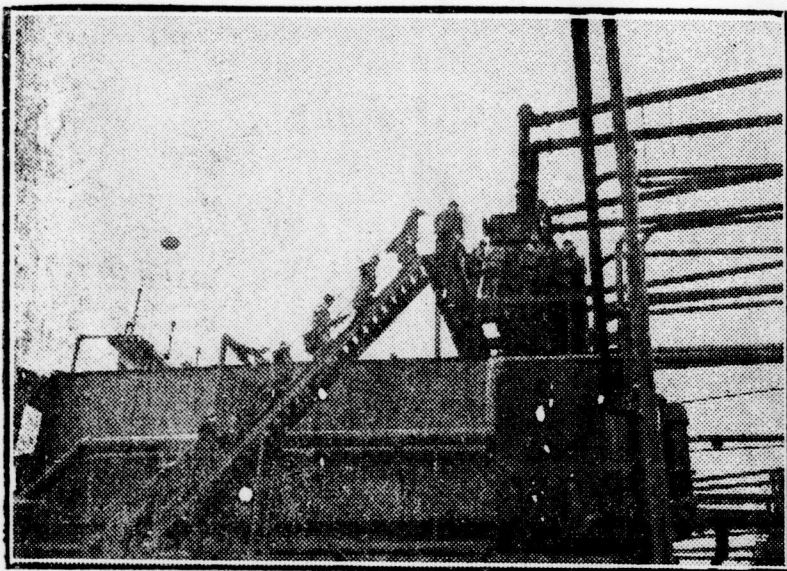

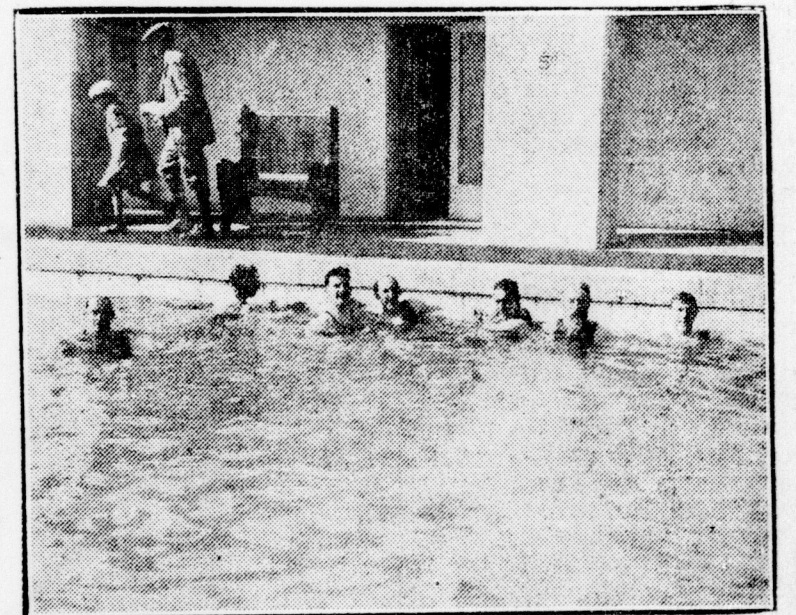

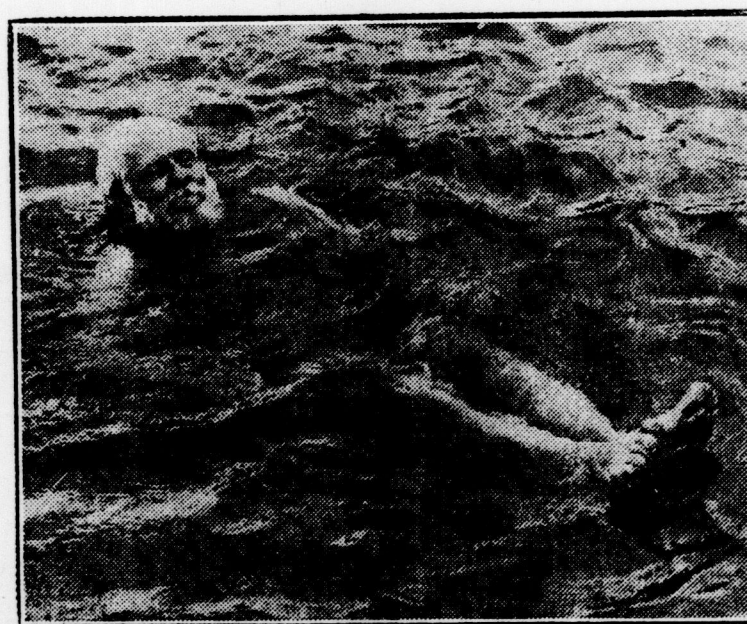

## LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS DEDICATION

Bishop of Gloucester, England, Delivers Inspiring Address On Education.

## MAKE OWN HISTORY

"The University of Western Ontario is situated in a rich and populous district. It should grow up with its own history, its own traditions of learning and student life. It will, I hope, make a great contribution to the service of mankind and to the promotion of learning."

Such were the words of the Right Rev. A. C. Headlam, lord bishop of the diocese of Gloucester, England, who preached the dedication sermon in the convocation hall at Western yesterday. Though continuous rain from early morning had cast a gloom over the city and made the road to the new buildings sloppy underfoot, a large number of people arrived at the new buildings long before the service began. The hall, in spite of the day, was nearly filled to capacity.

The lord bishop took for his text the ninth chapter of Proverbs, beginning verse 8, "The fear of God is the beginning of wisdom." Speaking of the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Solomon, his lordship showed that the books were written quite clearly after the code of the Lord had been established. He thought that they belonged to that period in the world's history when in the time of Alexander the Great an era of cosmopolitanism burst upon the universe; in the early days of the period, when services were more majestically rendered, when worldly prudence and worldly orthodoxy could win a fair measure of prosperity for men.

Religion was behind and in the centre of the great conception of wisdom. A new concept for a wider scheme of thought and wisdom began with skill and knowledge, and was passed on to prudence, and was associated with moral strength.

**Purpose of Education.**  
To sum up or to explain a university in one word, the lord bishop said that he would use the word "wisdom." The university's purpose was to build up a nation by sending out generation after generation of men inspired with wisdom. Wisdom was attained through four great elements: first the training of the mental equipment. The purpose of education was not only the acquisition of knowledge. That was only the beginning; the mind should be trained so that whatever the duty was to be fulfilled in after life the mind would be ready to cope with it. This was the reason that a classical education had a unique value.  
The mind should be disciplined. It should undergo a serious strain of

classical studies. Looking at the literature popular with the great masses of the people today, it might be wondered if the universities had been as effective as they might have been, for the general standard has gone down and a great body of the people seem to be content to read a short paragraph in a newspaper and little beyond.  
A rigorous discipline in Latin, followed by Greek, would produce a body of men with far more quickened minds to do a greater work in the world. To science students, the speaker said that they might have recourse to Greek literature to make science more than mechanics, a thing of truth.

### Knowledge Is Power.

The second element of wisdom was the learning of knowledge. Knowledge is power, but that gained at the university is only the beginning of what will come after. It is important that the student should acquire the right spirit and method rather than just a mass of knowledge.

The fundamental aim of the university is to have the one desire—truth. The general body of people do not want truth; they want what pleases them, what appeals to them, and they have newspapers giving them the things they like.  
The very essence of a scholar, before all things, is a seeking for truth in literature or science; get truth and you get all a university can give you. In a university a student may learn a desire to know what is true.

The third element of wisdom is a knowledge of mankind, not at his worst, but at his best. It is something that students would be acquiring all through life. The university is a little world where there are groups of a body of men with particular aims coming from many classes and dispositions. In the university they come across the first knowledge of men, often, and acquire a freedom and wisdom and prudence of the conduct of life.

### Men Spurned Altar.

The fourteen said the bishop. "If, as we all believe, there is a God

who made and rules the world rightly, then the world must be built on righteousness. The ancients noticed that often a man is carried away to a point of success where he spurns justice, revenge comes. Wisdom is not known merely from cleverness, knowledge, it is a disposition which makes people judge rightly in a crisis. We know that no learning, no cleverness, will save people from terrible judgment, if they do not possess the great attribute, the righteousness of God.

In the old days the university was the creation of the church. It grew up under the auspices of the church. The universities sought freedom and it is a great characteristic of the university and a harmonizing relationship of college and church had been worked out in recent years.

The faculties of theology, by affiliation with the schools, teach in accordance with the principles they believe right, and the students' aim should be to build up wisdom, experience of life and the fear of God.

**Civil Service Uses Students.**  
The university exists to send out year by year a great body of men duly qualified. Looking back in the history of England, one of the great elements that has made it able to face the great difficulties of the last 50 years has been the staffs of the civil service, almost entirely from universities.

The work of the university should inspire students with training to protect them from the temptations of a world where people are anxious for wealth. The bishop then spoke of the able men who had consecrated themselves to the church and religion, and he knew of no life more satisfactory, none more exhilarating than the study of theology.  
The lesson was read by J. Bruce Hunter, First Methodist church; the Right Rev. David Williams, bishop of Huron, led in prayer. On the platform were also: Dr. W. Sherwood Fox, dean of the college of arts; C. K. Somerville, Col. T. J. Murphy, Sir Adam Beck and E. J. Millar.

Stock Exchanges Affected by Conditions as Is General Business.
MAY LOOK AHEAD
By H. A. GOLDMAN, C.E.

Practically every businessman, and in fact every intelligent person must have observed that business conditions in this country are always changing.
At certain times we enjoy great prosperity, with nearly all industries producing to capacity, factories over-labored with orders, and all available labor employed at attractive wages. Merchants are busy and traders are active, extravagance is witnessed on every hand; in fact, every one appears to have plenty of money, which he is willing to spend quite freely. Suddenly, however, there comes a change, and gradually we enter a period of depression which presents an entirely different picture to us. The wheels of industry come to a standstill. Thousands of workmen are thrown out of employment; forced to walk the streets and become candidates for the bread line. Manufacturers find that orders on hand are being cancelled, and new ones do not appear. Merchants see their shelves overstocked with goods, which no purchasers can be found. Retailers must liquidate their merchandise below cost in order to meet obligations assumed in days of prosperity, and many business houses established after years of effort and untiring labor are forced into bankruptcy on account of commitments made at a time when prices were at their peak, or because of inability to realize on their stocks of goods.

These changes in business conditions have been known to go on continuously with almost mathematical regularity, and they usually occur in the following order:
1. Depression.
2. Increasing activity and business recovery.
3. Prosperity.
4. Decreasing activity, decline in business, leading again to depression.
