

WHEN THE GREAT **GUNS THUNDERED**

Magnificent Spectacle During the Artillery Duel Before Liao Yang.

General Kuroki's Headquarters in the Field, Aug. 30, via Fusan, Korea, Sept 8.—The artillery battle which thundered before Liao Yang today from early morning until darkness, hiding foe from foe, was one of the most stupendous and spectacular in history. combined armies of Japan, with the exception of a part of a force under General Kuroki, concentrated their batteries against the Russian lines under General Kuropatkin, and probably not less than three hundred guns up on each side were worked incessantly for twelve hours. Even after nightfall and in the driving storm of wind and rain that swept over the field of battle, the conflict did not cease entirely, for Russian shells are tonight bursting over the hills before the Japanese position. Not alone the number of guns in action, but their unceasing and rapid fire made the conflict of today remarkable. For several hours the cannonading averaged 60 shots a minute, and the rate seldom fell below 20 shots a minute. From a high mountain nearest the Russian battery, the foreign attaches and newspaper attaches with General Kuroki's army had a view of fighting which probably never will be surpassed. Liao Yang, a small walled Chinese city, with a gray pagoda towering from its center, stands on the southern bank of the Taitse River. From the city the river sweeps in a broad curve to the southeast road, and then takes a turn to the north. INDIA'S CENSUS


Calcutta, British India, Sept. 8. -That the census of India for 1901 has been published only lately gives an idea of the enormity of the task. The superintendent of the census says: "The greater part of the enumeration was done without recompense by an army of private individuals numbering more than a million and a quarter who brought to their troublesome task a spirit of painstaking and occasionally grotesque accuracy which is unequaled anywhere in the world. In one province it was very difficult to number a certain assemblage of ascetics because they were under vows of silence.

Of these latter two-fifths are Roman Catholics. In 1872 the Christians numbered 1.506.098, of whom 1.248.288 were natives. So the growth of Christianity is far mare rapid than that of the general population,
