

### A TORNADO SWEPT TEXAS

Willispoint, Texas, May 27.—A tornado struck the eastern portion of Willispoint on Saturday, cutting a swath 200 yards wide, killing three persons and injuring many others. Everything is confusion and everybody is engaged in aiding the injured and clearing the debris.

The storm came from the southwest. Dead horses, cattle and fowls are scattered along its path.

The reason so few were killed is attributed to the timely use of storm cellars. In many cases houses were torn to kindling wood, while the owners escaped harm in cellars.

Fort Worth, Texas, May 27.—A severe rain and electrical storm swept over northern Texas Saturday night, causing much damage to property and some loss of life.

Near Denton, eight members of the Wardlaw family were injured, one fatally, when the home was overturned by the wind. Scores of barns and other small buildings were destroyed.



#### FREIGHT IS PILING UP

Railways in Montreal Cannot Keep Docks Clear.

fards and Wharves Are Full-Several Vessels Sent to Hochelaga to Find Room to Unload-Shippers At Their Wit's Ends-Situation Is Assuming Serious Aspect-Is Almost a Blockade.

Montreal, May 25.—Congestion of freight is a condition of serious aspect in Montreal at the present time. The congestion is in the yards of the railway companies and along its wharves affecting ocean and local goods. While the strike had some effect upon the situation the condition of congestion is largely due to the rapid increase of business, present facilities being inadequate to clear things.

Meanwhile the freight is accumulating and shippers are at their wits' ends to keep some movement and prevent the matter from assuming the proportions of a blockade.

The congestion is a result of the troubles that existed lest autumn when the companies found themselves without sufficient rolling stock to handle all that was offered. Now there is so much offering that the railway companies are wary of accepting perishable freight and there has been a noticeable decrease in produce received in Montreal although the canal carriers have gained through this, receipts from this cource being heavier than usual.

#### PRISONER'S ORDEAL.

Breaks Down When Confronted With the Body of Murdered Girl.

New York, May 25.—On being con-fronted last night with the corpse of Amelia Staffeldt, Henry Brecker, who Amelia Staffeldt, Henry Brecker, who was arrested Thursday on suspicion, broke down, according to the police, and confessed that he had witnessed the assault that preceded the murder of the 15-year-old Elmhurst girl.

The crime was done by a companion, the prisoner said. He asserted his own innocence.

Brecker's admission followed a "third degree" examination that proved his undoing. He had been taken to the undertaker's, where the body has lain since it was found in a little-frequented field adjoining the farm of the girl's father. There he was ordered first to look at the girl's dead body and then to place his right hand upon the cold forehead. Brecker shudderingly obeyed and the next moment collapsed.

Dragged to his feet and supported on either side by a detective, he was asked, "Did you kill the girl?" His reply, according to his captors, was: "Oh, my God, I did not do it, but the man who was with me did it. He killed the girl, and I ran down to the woods."

OUR GLOBE'S CAPACITY.

The Time When the Earth Will Be

Fully Peopled. Professor Ravenstein of the Royal Geographical society estimates that the fertile lands of the globe amount to 14,000,000 and the deserts to 1,000,-

Fixing 207 persons to the square mik for fertile lands, ten for steppes and one for deserts as the greatest population that the earth could properly nourish, the professor arrives at the conclusion that when the number of inhabitants reaches about 6,000,000,000 the earth will be peopled to its full capacity. At present it contains some what more than one-quarter of that

If the rate of increase shown by the latest census statistics should be uni-formly maintained, Professor Ravenstein shows that the globe would be fully peopled about the year 2072.

The Father of West Point. George Washington must be given the credit of causing the first steps to be taken toward the founding of a national military academy. In 1794, while serving his second term as president, Washington succeeded in having congress create the grade of cadet in the army. West Point was chosen as the best army post at which cadets could be trained, for the reason that it was then the most important station of the artillerists and engineers. The cadets of those days did not pass entrance examinations, and the standard of pro ficiency in studies did not amount to the tenth part of what is exacted now adays. A smattering of engineering mathematics and artillery practice was all that was deemed necessary. - St.

Lucknow's Great Hall.

Connected with the Mohammedan mosque at Luckwow, India, is the largest room in the world without col-umns, being 162 feet long, 54 feet wide and 53 feet high. It was built during the great famine in 1784 to supply work for a starving people. It is a solid mass of concrete of simple form and still simpler construction. In its erection a mold or framework of timber and brick several feet in thickness was first made, which was then filled with concrete. The concrete was allowed about a year to set and dry, when the mold was removed. Al-though the building has been standing so long, it is said to show no signs of decay or deterioration.
