His petition was granted.

CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION.—The attention of the Conservatives of North Perth is directed to the announcement which appears in our advertising columns calling meetings in Listowel and Stratford on Monday next for the purpose of appointing delegates to represent the party in this district at the Convention to be held at Toronto on Tuesday, 22nd inst. It is intended that the Convention will include representatives from every constituency in the province. The business of the Convention will be followed by a banquet to Sir John Macdonald, Premier of the Province, at the residence of the Hon. J. M. Macdonald, in North Perth will heartily respond and attend the meetings on Monday next in good numbers.

CHANGE OF TIME.—The opening of the Durham branch has caused a change of time in the running of trains on the G. & L. E. division of the Grand Trunk. A mixed train now arrives in Listowel from Stratford at 9.45 a. m., and the evening express arrives here at 12 p. m., and the evening express at 9 p. m., as formerly. For the south trains now leave at 8 a. m., 1.05 p. m., and 4.45 p. m. By the new arrangement parties from either north or south can have the greater part of the day in Listowel, and return by evening trains. The day express now connects with the mail train from Toronto at Stratford, which enables the Toronto papers to reach Listowel an hour earlier than formerly. We trust that the post office authorities will not delay in establishing a mail route on this line. The advantage which it would afford at Listowel, and along the line, which are now very inefficiently supplied with postal facilities, would be very great; it is to be hoped therefore, that the interests and convenience of these places will engage the immediate attention of the Post Office Department.

OPENING OF THE DURHAM BRANCH.—On Monday the Durham branch of the Grand Trunk, Georgian Bay & Lake Erie Railway was formally opened. An excursion train was run up from Stratford conveying a large number of the leading citizens of Stratford, Listowel, Palmerston and other places along the line, to the station at Durham. The branch, which extends from Palmerston to Durham, is a little over 25 miles in length. It was originally projected by the Wallingford & Georgian Bay Railway Co., but when partly built was handed over to the Grand Trunk on condition that the latter company should finish the road and operate it. The first part of the agreement has been carried out most satisfactorily, a splendid road being having been made and furnished with steel rails. The road is now open for regular traffic, two daily trains each way having been placed upon this branch, which connect with trains running north and south on the Warton division. The opening of this branch must prove a great boon to the people of Durham and Mt. Forest, and the adjacent municipalities, and will also do much to benefit the country generally. It affords direct communication with districts hitherto cut off so far as railway connection is concerned.

SEEDBREAD.—George Donnelly, foreman and occasional traveller for Messrs. Hess Bros., furniture dealers of this town, is missing, and from the developments of the past few days it is pretty evident that he has been playing the rogue and has departed for the other shore of the lakes. From information received by the firm early this week, it appears that he got the manager of the Bank of Commerce at Durham to honor his draft upon Messrs. Hess Bros. for 100.00, under the pretence that he intended to buy cherry lumber for the firm in that neighborhood. He also appears to have obtained cash to the amount of 40.00 or 50.00 from Halsted's Banking House in Mt. Forest through a similar pretext. Information has also reached here that in London Donnelly got one of Hess Bros. customers, Mr. T. Brown, to endorse a bill upon his employers for 150.00. After this transaction Donnelly appears to have "skipped," as nothing has been heard of him since. The firm, however, are not discouraged, and has caused no little surprise here, as he has been a leading employee in Hess Bros. establishment for a number of years, and has departed for the other shore as a person of trust. We understand that Messrs. Hess Bros. are losers to the amount of sixty or seventy dollars of cash and have reported the matter to the police. As the bogus drafts were not accepted, the bank where they were negotiated and Mr. Brown will likely be the losers by those amounts. It is to be hoped that Donnelly will yet be overtaken and made to disgorge.

HIGH SCHOOL BOARD.—Board met on the 3rd, the following members being present: Geo. Draper, chairman, R. Ferguson, A. Austin, W. McKinney, D. D. Campbell, secretary. The head master, Mr. McCall, was in attendance, showing the attendance to be 72 pupils—35 girls and 37 boys, and showing the classification and progress of the school highly satisfactory report, received and adopted. A Committee was appointed to arrange a basis of settlement with Mr. Perry re the painting of the High School, and report to the chairman. Accounts were received from A. B. McCullum, \$12.50, for conducting entrance examination; from Ferguson & Elliott, for printing, \$6.75; Hess Bros. for sundries, \$23.25. On motion the above accounts were ordered to be paid. The president of the teachers' association was engaged for the ensuing year, as follows: A. B. McCullum, head master, salary \$300; W. F. Morphy, first assistant, salary \$200; Miss Charles, second assistant, salary \$450. Board then adjourned. Board met again on the 8th inst., when the account of Mr. Perry for painting the High School fence was again considered. It was moved by D. D. Campbell, seconded by R. Ferguson, that the believing that the report of the Committee offering Theo. Perry the sum of \$70 in full of his account for painting High School fence, still in order to effect a quiet and amicable settlement, the Sec. Treasurer be authorized to pay Mr. Perry the sum of \$75, if accepted in full of his claim.—closed.
