



The Table Mountain Ropeway. Oyster Recipe.

It is possible that an oyster soup served on two successive weeks might pail on some appetites, for there is nothing so conducive to might pail on some appetites. for there is nothing so conducive to appetite as variety, but as there are many different kinds of oyster soup it need not be served twice alike in the same month. Scald a dozen large oysters in their own juice; lift out with a skimmer, chop line and pound on a mortar; return to their liquor, and a quart of thin veal broth, a small sliced onion, a stalk of celery and some parsley, and simmer half an hour; rub an ownce of flour with one of butter, add it to the soup; boil up for a add it to the soup; boil up for a moment, strain and press through a sleve; return to the fire, dlute to the reight consistency with hot cream, and finish the seasoning with cayenne, white pepper and a dash of nutmeg.





THE END OF THE CENTURY. M. CAMILLE FLAMMARION TELLS WHEN AND WHERE THE NEW CENIURY WILL BEGIN.

An authoritative answer to the all absorbing question when the new century begins has just been given by M. Camile Flammarion, the dis-tinguished astronomer and author. distion we de to the grant of the distin-ing. "Francisque Sarcey, the distin-guished critic, says the year 1900 will be the dawn of the twentieth century. He is mistaken. The dawn of the twentieth century will not come in 1900, even though we constantly hear that the Exposition of 1900 will commemorate the hirth of the new century. On the contrary, it will commemorate the end of a century. The year 1300 will be the evening before the new century, and the dawn will not begin until after midnight

midnight. "The seemingly difficult problem is really. very easy of solution. A dozen consists of twelve units. The number 12 is a part of the dozen. One hundred consists of one hundred units, hundred consists of one hundred unlis, and the number 100 is a part thereof. Now, it is clear that there never was a year 0 in thristian chronology. BUREAU OF MINES REPORT. Deals With the Mineral Deposits of

the Province. The Eureau of Mines has issued the second part of its annual report, which deals largely with the copper regions of the upper lakes, the Alpis-sing, Algoma boundary, ioulals River to Daiton; corundam in Outarie, Michi-picoten, l'airy Sound district copper, gold in the Lower Selne, and a lot of other information concerning the min-eral wealth of the rovince. A table is given showing that for the first nine months of this year 20,-210 ounces of gold was taken out, be-ing valued at \$318,212, as against 7,154 ounces in 1896. The total value of metallic products in 1893 was \$602,852, and in 1896 \$963,288. For the nine months of the present year it has been \$1,637,100, and if the same rate of production be maintained to it has been \$1,637,100, and if the same rate of production be maintained to the end of the year, it will reach \$2,-200,00.1. The total value of the metals produced in the Province for the twelve months of last year was \$1,-655,965, made up of \$290,019 gold, \$51,960 silver, \$514,220 nickel, \$268,-080 copper and \$530,789 pig iron. The revenue from sales and leases of min-eral lands has been \$147,666 for the nine mouths of the present year, as compared with \$97,762 for the whole of 1898, \$40,588 for 1.96, and \$26,159 for 1893. Silver to the amount of 98,000 ounces was taken out this year, valued at \$58,c00. Nickel and copper brought \$566,633, as against \$487,660 for the whole of 1896.


