



### ON TRIAL FOR LIVES

Murder Cases of Henry C. Beattie and Paul Gerdel Opened.

Chesterfield Court House, Va., Aug. 2J—With the jury selected and the witnesses for both sides subpoenaed, the trial of Henry Clay Beattre, Jr., of Richmond, indicted for wife murder, began today with the opening of the prosecution's case.

The first witness for the commonwealth was Thomas Owen, uncle of the murdered young wife, summoned to testify that Beattie brought the body to the Owen home with a story of a man in the roadway firing into his automobile and killing Mrs. Beattie. The prosecution has a list of more than seventy other witnesses, most of whom will be used in sketching Beattie's life and in an effort to build a motive for the crime.

sects which have been known for many years as tent caterpillars.

The eggs are deposited during July in compact masses around the twigs. After they are laid the parent moth secretes a viscid liquid which hardens over the eggs as a protection—The insects remain in this state until the following spring, when they hatch into young caterpillars.

These insects feed on the foliage for about six weeks, until they become fully developed, when they leave the tree and seek some place to pupate in. Two or three weeks later the moths appear, and in a short time deposit the eggs, after which they soom die. Thus there is but one brood each season.


