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

Martinique and Morne Rouge.

(From the Tablet.)

A preliminary account of the catastrophe of Martinique is embodied in a report sent by Dr. Hill, chief of the expedition dispatched by the National Geographic Society of Washington, to the journal of the Society. The area of devastation he describes as an elongated oval of which about eight square miles were on land, the remainder extending over the adjacent ses. He distinguishes three well-marked zones in this area. In the first, including the northern part of St. Pierre, all life, animal and vegetable, were utterly generally understood. The third was a zone of ashes, in which vegetation was injured, but life was not necessarily destroyed.
