

Household Hints.

Booze water is a peculiar flavor for a sponge cake, but it is highly recommended, especially if the cake is to be served with cream.

Wet the top of a dish of washed potatoes with milk and set in the oven to brown. Let it stay there until there is a brown crust over it.

A handsome low screen is made by painting a large board a sky-blue, then fastening a spray of daisies and clover blossoms on it. Then set this in a frame of plait about an inch and a half wide, and this to be placed in a light ebony frame with a standard.

The night before a picnic, boil some eggs until they are very hard; then drop them into a can or jar in which you have some pickled beets. In the morning the eggs will be pink and will be delicately flavored. If possible carry them in a can with the vinegar still on them.

A lovely cover for a baby's parasol or its carriage is made by setting squares of antique lace together. It will be necessary to cut some of the squares into halves to fill in the space. Trim the edge with deep lace of the same kind. This is a most serviceable cover, for it is durable and bears washing well.

A very pretty lambrequin for a shelf is made of pink felt, with squares of plush or velvet put on at regular intervals. On the edge which is straight brass crests are placed with small tassels tied into them. This shelf can be still further ornamented by placing on it three Japanese mats with half of the round mat on the shelf and half hanging over. Put one mat on each end and one in the centre.

A good relish to take with a lunch is made of ham. Pound some pieces of ham in a mortar, just as fine as you can. Season it with pepper and spice, and moisten it with clarified butter. Put this into a mould, or earthen bowl, and press it in very tightly. Put it into the oven for half an hour. Let it get perfectly cold. It can then be cut into thin slices. It is nice if used for a filling for sandwiches.

For some uses, and in some places in a room, a square shelf—that is, one that is almost as wide as it is long—can be admirably adapted. Cover it with felt and put a band of velvet around the edge of the lambrequin, which should not be more than a quarter of a yard deep. Fancy stitches of silk above the velvet are very pretty. The edge may have fringe at present.

Baked cucumbers are a novelty on most tables. Take large ones, pare them, and with a pointed spoon scoop out the seeds. Mix the seed with a little cold ham, either boiled or fried, and a few bread crumbs; season with salt, pepper, and Worcester sauce. Fill the cucumber with this, put them in an earthen pudding dish, and bake them, basting them with gravy, or with butter and water.

This receipt for ginger-cake comes from the English cook noted for the excellence of her work: Put one pound of butter into one pound of flour; add half a pound of finely powdered sugar, the rind of a lemon grated, two tablespoonfuls of ground ginger, and one grated nutmeg. Mix them together; then heat one gill of sweet milk, or warm it rather, stir in to it half a teaspoonful of bicarbonate of soda. Roll out, cut in square cakes, and bake in a moderate oven.

Batter or string beans, if cooked and pickled according to these directions, are delicious: Wash them and steam them until they are tender but not soft; put them into a jar and pour hot vinegar over them; sweeten the vinegar and season highly with cinnamon. Another way equally excellent, but which gives a different flavor to the pickles, is to boil them in salted water until tender; then pour over them the hot vinegar which has been sweetened, and in addition to the cinnamon have a liberal allowance of pepper: cayenne or black may be used.

One of the novelties and luxuries of the period is banana cake. Take one cup of water or of sweet milk, three eggs, four cups of flour, three small teaspoons of baking powder. Mix lightly and bake in layers. Make an icing of the whites of two eggs, and one cup and a half of powdered sugar. Spread this on the layers, and then cover thickly and entirely with bananas sliced thin. The cake may be flavored with vanilla. The top should be simply frosted.

To preserve the large plums that have tough skins, it is necessary first of all to remove the skins. This may be done very easily by dropping a few of the plums at a time into hot water, then with a very sharp knife removing the skins. Cut the plums in halves, drop them into a syrup made of sugar and water. The plums should be weighed, and an equal quantity of sugar should be set aside for the syrup. Let them cook so gently that they will keep their shape. Take them from the syrup with a skimmer, put them into the cans, and pour the syrup over them, having first removed the scum from it.

Huron sends more Reform members to the parliamentary halls of Canada than any other country, and what her people turn out so nobly on the day of political battle and score so successfully when the battle is fought, they should now look to it that in the day of rejoicing for the Reform cause their presence should be largely felt.

We have reason to rejoice over the success of the "little Premier,"—let us do so, and do it with a will.

South Huron—the Grit hive—will be well represented; Gibson's standbys from the East will turn out in force; and the Ross men from the West will hang their banner on the outer wall, and raise aloft the chorus, "Ontario, Ontario!"

More unpatriotic of the Ontario press, led by the London Free Press, are now doing the contemptible work of running down the territory recently awarded the Province. The task is a wretched one, and in the face of high Tory opinion, is as foolish as it is mean and unfair.

The great authority on the disputed territory on the Tory side has always been S. J. Dawson, the member for Algoma. His opinion of the disputed territory three years ago was as follows:

"I am afraid that by the Bill before the House (that extended the boundaries of Manitoba eastward) our friends of the plucky little Province of Manitoba will be thrown off their balance. They are not only to have a vast and fertile region in the west, but by this bill we dangle before their eyes the gold of the Lake of the Woods, and the forests of the Rainy River region. If the line at the entrance of Lake Superior is to hold good as the western boundary of Ontario, and it has much to sustain it as the legal boundary, our friends of the Prairie Province will have their way extended over the clear waters of Lake Superior. The shores of that inland sea, with their rich ores of silver, copper and iron, will be theirs. The silver islets which are coming to light every day will be theirs. There are thirty thousand square miles of forest lands on the waters of Rainy River. Nature has planted pines there for the freeness practice of lumber. The market will be unending and prices will rule high, and if Ontario could obtain control of these forests, the cost of constructing her new Parliament Buildings would be a mere bagatelle. By this bill we (the Dominion Government) say in effect to Manitoba: Fight Ontario for the vast forests of Rainy river, for the gold of the Lake of the Woods, and the silver of Lake Superior."—[S. J. Dawson, M.P., 1881.]

The Stratford Dispatch says Hon. G. W. Ross "saved himself from being unseated by his own evidence." If the statement of the Dispatch is correct then the people of West Middlesex have great reason to feel proud that they have in their representative a man whose personal evidence can carry more weight than the hundred and odd witnesses who were subpoenaed by "Jumbo" Johnston to prove that Ross had been guilty of corrupt practices. We hope G. W. Ross will live long to bear the same character for unimpeachable integrity that the Stratford Dispatch gives him credit for.

The Tory organ didn't mean to put in a good word for Ross when it published that sentence, but it did it all the same. Even Balsam's ass spoke wisely on one occasion.

SCOTT ACT PETITION.

This document was placed in the Sheriff's hands on Saturday, and will remain there until the latter part of next week. 5,000 names are attached. Geo. Jackson, of Egmondville, on behalf of the anti-Scott party, examined the list a few days ago. His leading objection, we understand, is that a large number of the voters signed the petition with their initial instead of their full Christian name. "John Smith" for instance, signed himself "J. Smith." The objection is not a serious one.

The Middlesex Tories have been again treated to a bitter dose. The petition against the return of D. M. Cameron was flung out of court on Tuesday by Judge Oker, and Dr. Rooms, the Tory candidate and petitioner, has to pay the cost. It is said that the election and the cost of the trial have nearly ruined the doctor financially. The Tory candidate for the Local Legislature became bankrupt after his first election, and was defeated on being unseated. The Middlesex Tories are now in doleful dumps.

For the information of the farming community, we would state that the "farmers' day" at the Toronto Exhibition, has been fixed for Wednesday, Sept. 17th. As the Mowat reception will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 16th, a fine opportunity will be afforded all who go down on the 16th, to see both of these interesting events. Let Huron be represented by a solid phalanx.

Mr. Meredith stated at Selby on Friday that he had repeatedly challenged the members of the Ontario Government to meet him on the public platform, and that they were all afraid. 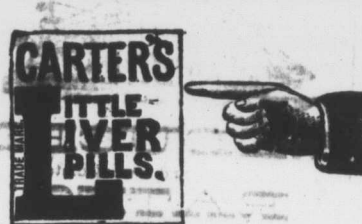
