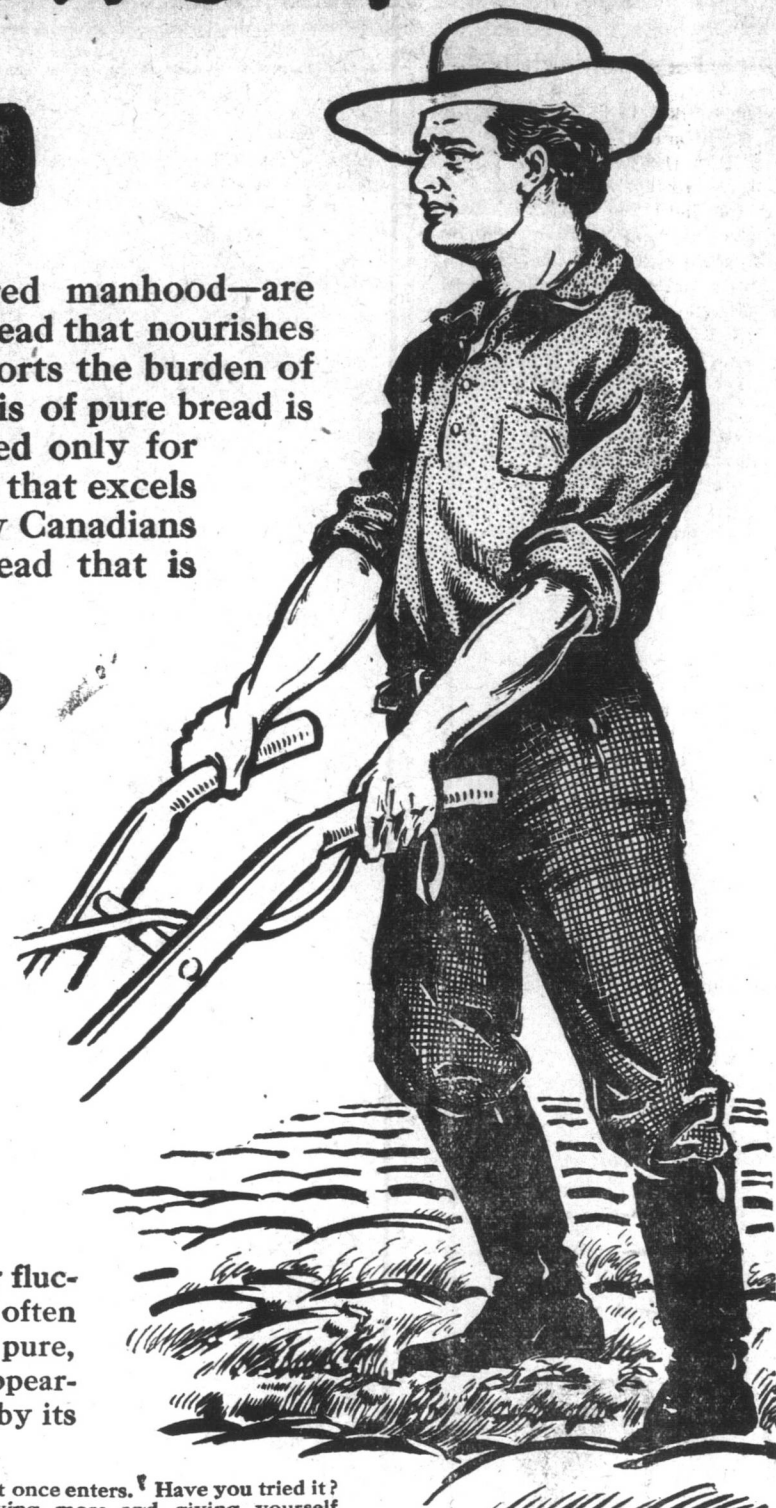

BOVRIL.

Report of the Feeding Experiments Made in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin:—

The preliminary announcement of the results of the experiments conducted at the request of the Local Government Board for Ireland during the past year, in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin, as to the nutritive value of Bovril, and communicated to the British Association at Sheffield ("Times" report, September 3), has created considerable interest amongst the Medical Profession.

In order to secure a decisive test, dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Bovril—from 2½ to 7½ grammes—was then added to the food, with the result that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or, in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given.

Afterwards Bovril was discontinued, and the animals fell back to the original weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white egg, it was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 2½ to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect.

In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen, and in all an increased utilisation of other foods.

It was therefore concluded that Bovril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter by causing a more complete digestion and absorption of the other food given.

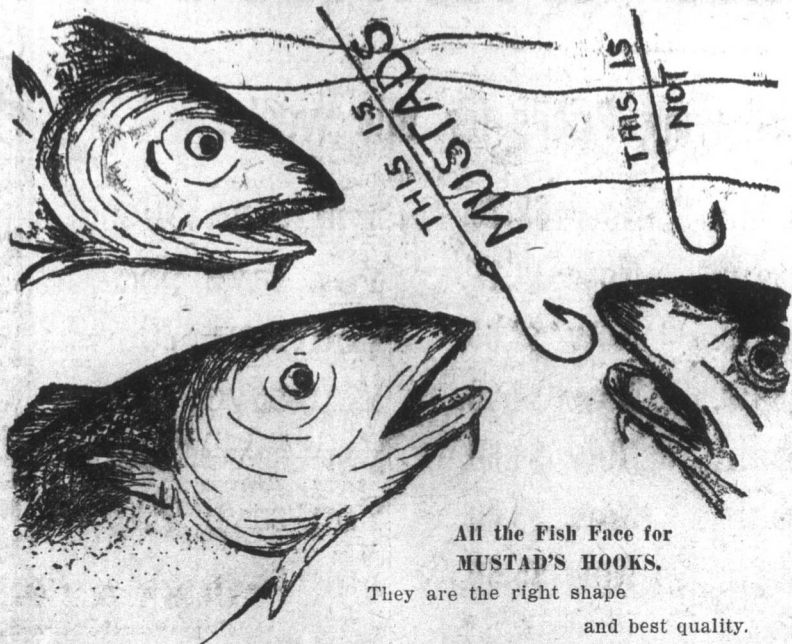

Household Notes.

A bicycle pump will clean a sewing machine when it seems clogged with dirt and it is impossible to reach the parts with a cloth. Blow out the crevices with the pump and follow with soft cloth.

Serve white dry wine, such as Sautern or Rhine, with fish; after the fish until the roast, claret; with the roast, Burgundy; with sweet dishes, champagne or Tokay, and with coffee, brandy or cordials.

Oranges dressed with oil and vinegar make an excellent salad. The oranges should be cut up into small pieces and divested of as much of their white fibre as possible. A little sugar may be used.

Any varnish-covered wall paper may be wiped with a damp cloth, but for other papers soft bread is the best cleaner. Very heavy solid-colored papers may be very lightly gone over with fine sandpaper to remove smudges.

After the usual cleaning of white kid gloves with gasoline put the gloves on and rub the hands in cornmeal. This will remove the odor and at the same time give the fresh, new look which cleaned gloves seldom have.

To keep fruit or vegetables longer

they should be removed from their wrapping as soon as received in the kitchen and spread out so that they will not touch each other. This should be done even with lima beans.

The tops of bureaus and tables will be kept longer in good condition if sheets of blotting paper are laid under the covers. This not only prevents liquids scarring the polished surface, but makes the linen cover look better.

A good carpet cleaner may be made by shaving a pure white soap in a gallon of water and letting it boil until dissolved. To this add an ounce of ether and scrub the carpets thoroughly with the mixture. Later rinse with fresh water.

An excellent stuffing for baked tomatoes is finely chopped sweet peppers. Put a lump of butter into the tomato, season well with salt and a little sugar and black pepper. Put lumps of butter on top, add a little water to pan and bake slowly for an hour and a half.

Instead of frying or broiling mutton chops, try panning them in the oven. Just as they are ready to serve pour over them a glassful of currant jelly melted by standing for a few minutes in hot water. Currant jelly prepared in the same way may be poured over the grilled breast of lamb.

Trinity Spur Line.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I am from Trinity, and with your permission would like to say a word or two re the much talked of Spur-Line from Gott's Cove near Trinity.

I was quite amused on reading that letter in your issue of the 22nd inst., signed "Elector." Looks to me as if his thoughts were inspired. Some of us have heard similar remarks before ever his letter became associated with printer's ink.

I am not of the opinion of "Voter" whose letter appeared in another issue of the Telegram, but on first reading "Elector's" letter and before seeing "Voter's" my suspicions centered on an individual residing not many miles from Trinity who seems to be using every possible means against the business interests of Trinity. Speculation is free and easy, and we know not what else are very apt to produce many thoughts which are not altogether favourable to centralizing Trinity.

"Elector" likes the idea of making us appear insignificant—"a village of 400." Gideon's army numbered only 300 but they were a noble 300. Other famous writes have said—Town of Trinity and I say it has been worthy of the name.

We are not objecting to what other places, and I do not see why any outsider should bother his head about what advantages we are likely to get. The line might have gone on the back of Trinity East and connected with the main road within about 10 or 15 minutes from where it has now gone. Look at the enormous rock cuts and crevice work in order to reach the front side of Trinity East. It has been said that the Contractor cannot be forced to build the Spur Line into Trinity. If such is the case why all the hub-bub? It looks as though the Government is anxious to have this Spur built, if what has been lately published is correct, and what does it matter to the Contractor if it says go ahead. It appears as if the Contractor may lose money by building this spur, and it's up to him and him alone to do all possible to avoid it. If I were placed in similar circumstances would it not pay me to act generously in some cases? Guess it would.

There are many things Mr. Editor, that could be said—many eyes could be opened and many wrong ideas sighted.

This I consider is not a matter of party politics as some are trying to make it. Let's be men for once and let all those who are not interested but only have petty jealousies hold their peace. The Village of Trinity is not fast asleep as perhaps a good many think. Its business men will wake up before very much freight is tumbled out at Gott's Cove. Of the 2,200 against the 400 who handles the most freight? The Village and "Elector" forgets the host of people to the South West of Trinity for whom this is the business centre. There is one (1) business firm at Trinity East and eleven (11) at Trinity proper—the village of 400. Do we not need the train right in to these people. By all means, yes.

The idea of suggesting an extra freight charge of 10 or 15 cts. for the people of Catalina or Bonavista if the train was to come into Trinity. Who prompted it? And does any sane man imagine that the people in those places would petition against the train coming into Trinity? We have a better opinion of them. They pretty well know the rate per mile.

Brainy Baby.

John Stuart Mill was a Genius at Three Years of Age.

At three years of age John Stuart Mill began the study of Greek, with "arithmetic as an evening relaxation." At eight he began Latin, Euclid and Algebra and had to act as tutor to the younger children. He was a stern and efficient tutor.

At twelve he began scholastic logic and political economy—the latter his main lifework.

At fourteen, while paying a long visit to Sir Samuel Bentham in southern France, he learned French as a relaxation from studying two or three hours before breakfast, five hours between breakfast and dinner and two or three in the evening. Being for the time master of his own hours and not subject to a stern father, he took lessons also in his spare hours in music, singing, dancing, fencing and riding, but never became proficient.

At sixteen Mill could speak in debate with adults with ease and freedom. At eighteen he contributed to the Westminster Review. At twenty-one he was made assistant in the India office and received a large salary for those days.

But Mill was bald at twenty-two. He did not marry until he was forty-five. He himself said: "I never was a boy. It is better to let nature have its own way."

Trepassey Charges.

No Diphtheria in General Hospital Since July—Dr. Brehm Goes to Trepassey to Investigate the origin of the Outbreak There.

I beg to draw your attention to the message from Trepassey, which appeared in the daily papers respecting the death at that place of a person who had been discharged a few days previously from the General Hospital in this city. It is alleged that the death was due to diphtheria and the insinuation was made that such was contracted at the Hospital. The Government desires that for their information, you will make inquiry into the matter and report fully concerning this case. Accompanying your report there should be a certificate, signed by all the doctors attached to the institution, stating the time at which the last case occurred in the hospital. It would be well, also, for you to go fully into the matter of the existence of diphtheria at the institution, setting

STATEMENT BY MEDICAL STAFF.

As the publication of a message in the Chronicle, Telegram and Herald, of December the 3rd, charges the General Hospital with causing the present outbreak of diphtheria at Trepassey and as we consider this message to be absolutely without foundation and calculated not only to injure the institution but to cause suffering amongst patient's relatives we beg to state that there has not been a case of diphtheria at the hospital since early in July, and moreover that when diphtheria or any infectious disease occurs, arrangements are made for the immediate removal to Infectious Disease Hospital, where a thorough disinfection is carried out before the patient is permitted to go home.

This evidence is conclusive so far as it goes and proves clearly that there has been no case of diphtheria in the General Hospital since July, last.

The origin of the diphtheria at Trepassey is yet to be investigated and the Government are acting wisely in sending Dr. Brehm, the Public Health Officer, to investigate on the spot. It is to be hoped he may be able to trace the origin of the disease which has so grievously afflicted the family of Molloy. If the evidence shows that the girl Hagerty was not afflicted with this disease, this breaks conclusively the chain of suspicion in the connection with old outbreaks in the General Hospital. Even if this line of investigation fails for want of positive evidence, it may be that Dr. Brehm will be able to show conclusively from facts he may discover at Trepassey that the outbreak had no connection with the girl Hagerty of the General Hospital. We hope he may be able to do so and thus clinch by testimony at Trepassey the testimony of the staff of the General Hospital. We repeat we are glad to find that the Government are taking steps to probe the matter to the bottom. The deaths which have followed the outbreak at Trepassey show the gravity of the outbreak. The circumstances surrounding the case have excited suspicion. The members of the staff of the General Hospital have offered testimony, which goes far to dispel doubt and suspicion; the investigations of Dr. Brehm on the spot should clear up any possible doubt and establish the true facts of the case.

Yesterday's Returns.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Dec. 8.

At the close to-night of the polling, in the general elections, the standing of the parties are as follows: Government coalition, Liberals, 147; Laborites, 28; Nationalists, 45; Independent Nationalists, 6. Total, 226. Opposition Unionists, 193. The fifth day of the elections ended with the parties running neck and neck and with the prospects that they will come under the wire in almost precisely the same relative position they held at the start. Returns had been received up to midnight from the voting for 419 members, and the result is a Unionist gain of two seats in that number on those held by that party in the last Parliament. This amazing result is unprecedented in English history, as it is embarrassing to politicians of all factions. Both parties predicted great gains, but are now convinced that the new House of Commons will be practically identical with the old. The Conservatives argue that Premier Asquith bid for a sweeping endorsement from the country and has not obtained it. Therefore he cannot be justified in fastening upon the nation such Radical changes as Home Rule and the disarming of the House of Lords. The coalitionists insist that the voters by returning them to power endorse the policies and direct them to carry out their programme in its entirety. Forty four seats were balloted for to-day. Returns were received from 21 of these, and from 44 which were balloted yesterday. In these 65 the Liberals gained Radnorshire and Bedford, while the Unionists gained Elksdale. The contests were close, nearly everywhere the Unionists continued to cut down the Liberal majority and make numerical gains, but insufficiently to turn out the Liberal members. Winston Spencer Churchill, the Home Secretary, was returned at Dundee by about 1,700 votes, shifted to the Unionist column. The indications are that the O'Brienites are cutting down the strength of the Redmondites in most sections of Ireland. Heavy rains to-night coupled with a delay in the reports decreased the general enthusiasm. At Belfast rioting followed the closing of the polls. There was much stone throwing and windows were broken. Police reinforcements were sent out and quelled the trouble.

Lecture on "The Maid of Orleans" by Rev. Dr. Kitchen.

Her deep religious temperament was noticed by her parents and companions, and when she declared that she had received angelic visits from St. Michael to go to the aid of the French who were then beset in Orleans, her friends did not doubt her but carried away by her persistency aided her in getting an interview with Generals and Captains of the French Army whose doubts were also overcome by "La Pucelle," and who finally agreed to conduct her to the Dauphin. To test the genuineness of her mission she was asked to select the Dauphin amongst a large number of courtiers. This she did successfully and nearly all were thus won over to believe that she was sent by Heaven to restore the falling destinies of France and drive the English invaders from her borders. She told the King that her mission was to relieve Orleans and crown him at Rheims. Her dauntless won all hearts, and at her urgent request she was given a suit of armour and a charger and allowed to lead the troops, bearing a banner of her own device symbolical of the heavenly aid under which she fought. Her first duty on being given command was to reform the lives of the soldiers and to put down the licentiousness that prevailed in the

Many Tourists Will Visit Us Next Year.

A gentleman well known in business and social circles had a letter from a friend, a prominent resident of New York, yesterday which should be of much interest to our people generally. The writer has visited the city and country in company with some friends for the past three seasons and is delighted with the scenic beauties of the country, its pleasant and invigorating climate, and its excellent sporting capabilities. He is particularly enamored of Bay of Islands and the West Coast generally, but also has a good word to say for other beautiful resorts which he visited while here. The general tone of the epistle is very complimentary to Newfoundland as a resort for the tourist, either for purposes of recreation or rest, and the gentleman's opinion is that the summer of 1911 will witness a large influx of travellers coming here from the Great Republic to escape the heat of the great cities and to visit our bays and streams for sport and pleasure. The natural attractions of Terra Nova have been of late years well advertised, and the many Americans who have visited it have reported so favorably to their friends that the gentleman who wrote the letter referred to above is of the opinion that the tide of travel has turned from Europe and other countries and will set strongly towards Newfoundland next summer. Heretofore he says, thousands have visited Europe where only one has gone to Newfoundland; but the wealthy classes are rapidly discovering that this island is not, as they were always led to believe, a land of fogs and icebergs, but one of the most charming, healthful and restful places in the world, either for tourist, invalid or sportsman, with unsurpassed scenery. The writer lays stress on the fact that the great drawback is the meagre hotel accommodation. He pays a meed of praise to the R. N. Co. for the running of the boats on the great bays, and says that they have made the country known as well as it is at present to the people abroad. To quote some interesting paragraphs. This gentleman says "St. John's should have, and must have, a large and comfortable hotel. Public spirited men in St. John's should throw off their 'blindness' and look every way instead of one way only, and supply the needed accommodation. If they do not, they will turn back the tide of tourist traffic from their doors and a setback will be given the country which it will take a long time to recover." "Your country's face," he further eloquently says, "is roscate with the bloom of expectancy, but if it gets a 'black eye' the news will spread like a first class scandal, and tourists will avoid you for some time to come. If there is ample accommodation to keep tourists for any length of time, most of them would remain all summer in the country." He points to the necessity there is also for a comfortable hotel at Torsail or some other equally attractive spot not far from the capital, where sea bathing can be enjoyed and where, after rural pleasures had been experienced daily, the other could 'hark' back to the city to renew urban associations and pastimes. He notes that there are a few small hotels on the line before the visitor reaches Bay of Islands, one at Gambo and three at Grand Falls, but they are generally crowded and too remote from the railway stations. He thinks it is a step in the right direction the building of a new boat to run in conjunction with the Floréal next summer, and thinks that there will be such a rush of tourists to our shores that it will take three daily expresses to bring them from Port aux Basques to their varied destinations. He also thinks that it will be

found that the Clyde will be utterly unable to cope with the number who will visit Notre Dame Bay, and that the Bruce will require an auxiliary. The assertions of this gentleman, who is no visionary but a practical common-sense man, should afford food for reflection to our business people and patriotic citizens. Six months ago there was much talk about the erection of a modern hotel in St. John's, as it was rightly conjectured that a large percentage of American tourists would soon come our way. Now that our surmises are about to come to pass, we find that the hotel project has not passed beyond the discussion point and that we will not be prepared to accept the financial good things which the gods prefer. As the New York gentleman hints, once people come here from the States and find we lack accommodation in the hotel line, no matter how pleased they are with the country, and people, they will be scared away from a place where proper creature comforts cannot be enjoyed by those who can afford to pay for them, and this will be a great setback to the country which has the goods to offer and should be able to boom a remunerative traffic.



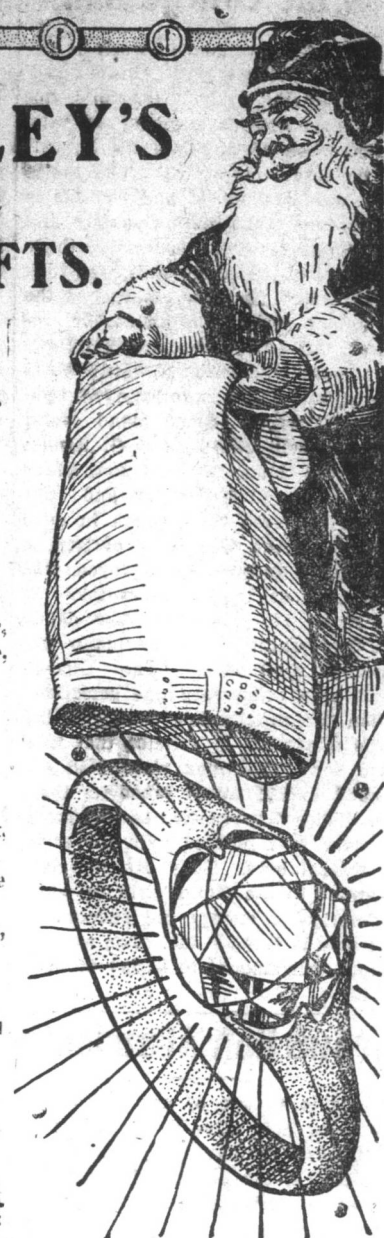
