Togo Talks to Admiral Doubleyou.

"Yes," said Admiral Togo when Mr. P. Doublevou called upon him recently at the Hyde Park Hotel, "I have enjoyed my visit to very much indeed.

"The kindness shown me by British Government and the British people has been extraordinary.

since my training days on board the Worcester, and I was therefore ver ship the other day, to find everything going on in the same way as when I was on board. It brought back the old life to me.

"Have the English people change since my days in your country? Well, my stay here is, unfortunately, to be but a short one, so I think that perhaps it would be improper for me to say anything about that; but, as you methods of life struck me very much. The London of to-day, for instance, is so very different from the London that I remember nearly forty years

"Yes. I have heard people say that the English are decaying, and that your Empire is doomed, but this is too serious a question for me to speak about with any authority, after only few weeks' stay in your country can only say that the ever-increasing prosperity of the English people does not point to decay at all, and that I personally have seen no signs of the decay about which some people talk and write so much.

"One of the sights that interested me very much was the procession of Suffragettes which passed the win dows of my hotel the other day. and never seen anything like it before as we do not boast any Suffragettes Japan-at least, not yet!

"There are a number of things vould like to see before leaving England, but my time is short, and I shall time in the future, I would very much like to revisit the country; but I am very busy all the year round in Japan, so do not know when I will be able to get back again. I am leaving your shores at once, travelling on the Lusitania, and returning to Japan by way of America.

"You ask about flying and its prob able effect on naval warfare. can say yet just what that will be In Japan we have begun to experiment, but our country being very mountainous, the wind is very changeable, and flying is, I more difficult there than in this country.

"I think it will be some time before the aeroplane become a practical weapon in naval warfare, as it is necessary to master the treacherous air-currents completely before one can rely upon aeronauts being able to fulfill the orders issued by a commander during action. At present this would be impossible."-P. W.
