



Morris's Blundering.

It is notorious how now Sir Edward Morris blundered over the financing of the Branch railways construction, and it is now becoming more and more evident that the blundered as badly in selecting the time he did for inaugurating a daily train service across the country.

Among the blunders of his railway financing, the gravest to our mind were three in number.

The first was the almost incomprehensible estimating the cost of the branch railway building so low.

The second was the promise to pay the contractor in cash instead of bonds.

The third related to the flotation of a second loan in 1912 when the market was unfavourable, instead of one flotation in 1910, when the market was favourable.

As we have already mentioned, it seems incomprehensible that a statesman or a business man could enter upon a scheme, involving extraordinarily large expenditure, without first making a close estimate of the cost of the project.

Sir Edward Morris, however, did commit the country to the obligation of paying millions more than he anticipated at the time he entered into the contracts.

He led the country to believe that the first loan of 1910 would completely cover the cost of the finished and completed railways.

But in 1912 he had to go into the money market again for another railway loan and go at a time that was most unfavourable to a country which was borrowing.

Had he been firm and insisted on paying in bonds as in former contracts, the country would not have been at the mercy of the risks of the money market. Sir Edward would not have had to raise any cash loan at all.

Had he also had a proper estimate made of the monetary obligation he had cast upon the country by entering into a Railway Extension Contract, he could have raised the whole sum required, when the market was favourable, rather than rushing to the market when matters monetary were unpropitious.

But Sir Edward's blundering in rail-

way matters as we mentioned in our first paragraph, was not confined to financing the construction of the branch railways.

For months past the trade has been suffering from freight congestion at Sydney, owing to the Government insisting on the inauguration of a daily cross country service before the Railway Company was ready with rolling stock and other facilities for handling the increased freight which a daily service naturally stimulated.

It is clear that Sir Edward was wrong headed in his insistence. He was insistent at the wrong place and time. Had he been insistent on a bond payment instead of a cash payment, the country would not have had to pay through the nose in 1912 on the second railway loan.

Had he not been insistent on starting the Daily Cross-country Service, at the time it was started, shippers of goods and the shipping company would not have been in the pickle they are to-day owing to the congestion of freight.

Is it any wonder then that the cry of the country that Morris must go and give place to Sir Robert Bond at the next Election grows daily louder and more insistent.

From the standpoint of the trader, Morris is a failure. From the standpoint of the consumer, the higher cost of living proves Morris a failure. From the standpoint of home comforts, Morris is a failure.

No wonder then that the fishermen are venting their dissatisfaction in their tens of thousands through the Fishermen's Protective Union. No wonder that the country is calling upon a tried and proved statesman of Sir Robert Bond's calibre to rescue it from the present day middle.

English Methods in Graft.

The municipal grafter is given short shift in England. There the law has a summary method of dealing with him. It does not appoint a commission to discover nice words with which to describe his ugly acts, or to find that he is a psychological freak not responsible for his actions. It puts him on his trial, and when he is found guilty, sentences him to imprisonment, for the ruffian that he is.

In a recent case at the Liverpool Assizes, an estate agent who was a member of the Wallasey Town Council was charged with an endeavour to use his position as councillor for grafting purposes. He seems to have been a man of considerable social and political influence before his trial, but this did not save him. Although he did not receive a penny of the graft he looked for, he was condemned to prison and to a forfeiture of some of his civic privileges. Lord Coleridge, who tried the case, evidently took a grave view of the offence. In passing sentence, he said: "The jury have found you guilty of corrupt solicitation in your capacity as town councillor. If you had gone further, and in fact had exercised a corrupt influence upon your fellow members of the council, or if you had voted for the proposal, I should have considered it my duty to have awarded a sterner punishment than that which it now falls on me to do. The purity of men in public life must be cherished and upheld. The sentence is that you be imprisoned for three months in the second division, and I further pronounce that you be adjudged to forfeit the public office of town councillor."

If the law really felt the spur of an outraged public conscience, graft either in its great or petty forms would soon disappear. Too many citizens regard the law and those who administer it as external things. As a matter of fact they are never for very long stronger or weaker than the public opinion from which their authority ultimately comes.—Montreal Star.

The Cape Breton Arrives

WITH LARGE CARGO.

The S. S. Cape Breton, Capt. Kemp, reached port at two o'clock this morning after a passage of two days and a half from Charlottetown. Moderate weather was had until last night when off the narrows a strong breeze of wind and tumble, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the steamer made port and anchored without mishap. At the hour mentioned above the storm was at its worst and there was a very heavy undertow in the harbor. The Cape Breton brought as cargo: 11000 sacks of oats, 2600 bags of turnips, 2800 bags of potatoes, 1700 bushels of hay, 300 cases of eggs and a general cargo as well. The steamer is awaiting the elements to abate to berth at Harvey's pier to discharge.

The Furness Liners Dunango and Florence are both due to arrive here to-day, the former from London and the latter from Liverpool.

The S. S. Morwanna, Madras, leaves Charlottetown to-night for here.

The S. S. Beatrice left port yesterday afternoon for Bell Island to load ore for Sydney and return here coal laden.

The S. S. Adventure has finished her charter with the Dominion Coal Co. and is now loading coal at Sydney for her owners.

The S. S. Bonaventure is due tomorrow from Fogo and will begin immediately loading fish for South American ports.

Stenographer Marked.

Indianapolis, Nov. 29.—Miss Mary C. Dye, a stenographer, who witnesses had said was marked for murder by James B. McNamara, the Los Angeles Times dynamiter, because she worked for the Iron Workers' Union and "knew too much," testified at the "Dynamite conspiracy trial" to-day. She asserted she had been followed by detectives, and on one occasion one of the McNamara brothers had forced an entrance to her room at a hotel to search for papers which he desired to destroy.

Miss Dye identified the hundreds of papers introduced by the Government to sustain its contention that Frank M. Ryan, President of the Union, and forty-four other defendants conspired to transport explosives illegally in furtherance of dynamite plots against non-union firms. The letters were written by John J. McNamara, Secretary of the Union. The witness testified she quit the employ of the Iron Workers before the Los Angeles explosion, but she had written many letters which the Government charges were in furtherance of earlier explosions.



Worst Governed Nation in The World

Montreal, Nov. 28.—"The American Government is the most antiquated and ineffective in the civilized world," was the sweeping condemnation by James R. McClure, of New York, brother of Samuel Sidney McClure, the great publisher, last night.

Mr. McClure is a red-hot Progressive, but thinks that the "referendum," the recall and the "initiative" do not go far enough. "To effect lasting reform we must alter the ground work of our social fabric," he said.

"If the United States is as well governed as Canada fifty years from now I shall be well satisfied. Inefficient government and corruption are preying upon the very life blood of the American nation.

Hardly a mayor or police chief in any of our large cities could get a job in Germany because they are amateurs in their departmental work, and professionals in taking bribes. A successful government must be 'neglect proof,' and this is far from what the States has now."

Mr. McClure issued a warning to Canada not to follow in American footsteps. "I am convinced that social revolution is the natural outcome of present day conditions in the United States," he asserted.

MANILA, Nov. 28.
 Many lives were lost during a typhoon to-day, causing immense damage to property.

BELGRADE, Nov. 28.
 It is officially announced that the Serbians have captured the town of Dibra, in Albania, 45 miles southwest of Pristrend.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.
 The fight to-day for the World's lightweight championship between Willie Ritchie and champion Alvin Karpis, was won by Ritchie in the 16th round, on a foul.

SOPIA, Nov. 28.
 Two meetings of the Peace delegates were held at Baghchets (five miles from Constantinople) to-day, and according to Premier's reports, the "four parlers" are progressing satisfactorily. In Government circles it is believed that unless unforeseen difficulties arise an armistice will be concluded in two days.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 28.
 Woodrow Wilson has written a letter to William Jennings Bryan, inviting him to a conference over Wilson's return from Bermuda. The President-elect wishes to consult Bryan, as one of the leaders of the Democratic Party, but he will also take counsel with a number of other democratic leaders on the future programme.

WELLINGTON, N.Z., Nov. 28.
 The Premier, speaking at Auckland, said that New Zealand's annual contribution to the Navy amounted to £250,000, inclusive of the battleship payments, but if these payments were completed to-morrow, the annual contribution would not be decreased. The Overseas Dominions, he said, should increase their contributions, and the ultimate control of the Pacific must be in the hands of Australia, New Zealand, and Canada.

LONDON, Nov. 28.
 Britain was in no way a party to the agreement by which Russia recognized the independence of Northern Mongolia, according to a statement by Sir Mark Grey to-day. The statement called forth by an intimation in the form of a question put by Mr. Ginnell, the Irish Nationalist, that a bid to bring up the subject of the Mongolian treaty, and that agreement was the first fruits of the recent visit to London of the Russian Foreign Minister.

LONDON, Nov. 28.
 The Turkish fleet, with the exception of the cruiser Pamidieh, is reported to be ready to go out and fight. It is still doubtful, however, whether the Ottoman military authorities will agree to allow of its use against the Greek fleet, in spite of the reported intention of the Greeks to transport a large force across the bay between the Dardanelles. This move would seem to give the Turks the chance for which their naval officers profess to long. Forat Paash is now in command of the garrison guarding the forts of the Dardanelles. The troops under his command have been strongly reinforced and are said to number at least four divisions.

LONDON, Nov. 28.
 According to the Daily Mail all the disputes between France and Britain over "gun-running" at Muscat (capital of the Mohammedan State of Oman, near the entrance of the Persian Gulf), has reached a troublesome stage. This dispute has embarrassed France and British harmony for a decade, and settlement is reported to be blocked because the French ministry seems not to be strong enough to overcome the interested opposition of a handful of deputies. France has taken a significant step in sending a cruiser to Muscat, and Britain has responded by sending a similar power from the Chinese coast. Britain has raised with the Sultan of Oman to stop gun-running, whereby the border tribes in the north western part of India got arms. France is seeking the Sultan to cancel the agreement, the circumstance French subjects in Muscat ply a lucrative trade in the running of guns.

LONDON, Nov. 28.
 Queen Mary has taken strong action with reference to the report of the Divorce Commission. The Queen is opposed to divorce, and any conditions and is greatly annoyed by the terms of the majority report. The majority report adds insanity, and habitual drunkenness to the present statutory causes, whilst the minority report, which was signed by the Archbishop of York, advises sex equality as the only alteration. The Queen is opposed to any extension, and has the Church on her side, which, despite a steady movement towards disestablishment, is still a great power in the land. The Archbishop of Canterbury vigorously condemned the majority report, every Bishop and Clergyman of the Church of England following the lead set by the two Archbishops. The Queen is endeavouring to win the press to her side, and has succeeded in getting the Times and other largely circulated papers to espouse the cause of the minority commissioners. This was done by letting Lord Northcliffe know her views, and as he is owner of the Daily Mail, and has a controlling interest in the Times he readily promised enthusiastic support, breaking down all precedent and tradition by printing the minority report verbatim, as a special supplement to both papers, with vigorous editorial support. Under the circumstances, it is likely the Government will not introduce any Bill framed on the majority report, as is the usual custom.

THANKSGIVING.—Sunday is Thanksgiving Day in Wesley Church. The offering on this occasion will be, as usual, devoted to the reduction of the debt on the church which is now about \$9,000. This congregation has responded well in all previous years, though not wealthy, the members belong to the most part to a class who stand well in our industrial life. This year's response is expected to be a record one.

The St. Thomas's Women's Association held a Sale of Work in Canon Wood Hall last evening in aid of St. Thomas's choir fund. It proved an immense success, the attendance was exceptionally large and the proceeds exceeded expectations. The Hall contained a number of booths which were well filled with goods of all sorts and descriptions. Mesdames Simmons, Austin, Sterling, and Miss Payne had charge of the Plain Work stalls; Mrs. F. Rendell presided over the Guild Table; Mrs. Hunt had charge of the Bag Table and Miss Wellman, the Candy Stall. There were also eight tea tables, and Mrs. Long, who was in charge, did an excellent trade. The affair, which opened yesterday afternoon and closed last night, was held to raise sufficient funds to build choir stalls in the chancel of St. Thomas's Church to serve as a fitting memorial to the late Rector, Rev. The Premier's Watered Stock.

Dear Sir,—St. George's Lumber Company owned some timber lands. Sir Edward Morris rendered legal services. He put in his little bill for \$500.00. The company did not pay in cash, but gave Sir Edward shares in the company, face value \$10,000. Afterwards the company increased its capital and every shareholder got an increase too, I suppose. 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
