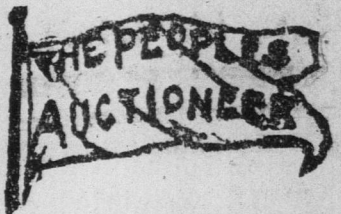

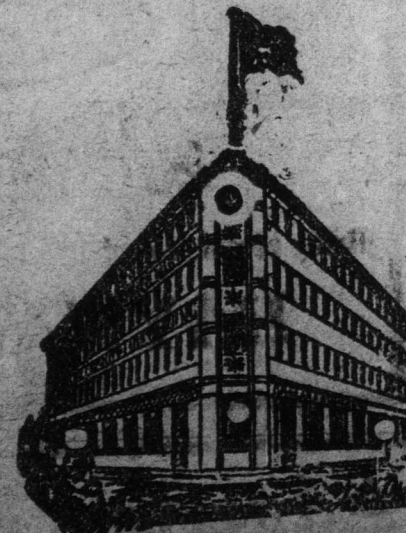

There are fools who kiss and tell, and they are equally great fools who are likely to tell, or at least have no special motive not to tell. There came to my ears the other day a miserable bit of gossip about a young girl I used to know. She has been married scarcely a year, and she is carrying on a miserable flirtation with a young man who is supposed to be one of her husband's friends—save the mark!

Incidentally the explanation included a statement on the man's part, that the woman insisted on being in touch with him every day and would call him up or write him by special messenger if she didn't hear from him daily. It is most emphatically one of those games that are not worth the candle. I advise any woman who is drifting into such folly to pause, weigh and consider before she places her reputation at the mercy of one who so plainly shows his unfitness for that dangerous power.

four years ago, when he retired, the electors of his constituency have never failed to return him.

A movement is on foot to have the records of the ancient borough of Farnham, Surrey, translated. Some of the enactments by the old Corporation are entertaining. It was decreed that no townsman should beat his wife after nine o'clock at night, and the penalty for depositing a dead cat in a thoroughfare known as Bear Lane was 1s.

It is stated that the German Emperor, with the approval of his physicians, has been trying a manual labour cure in the garden of the new palace at Potsdam. His majesty has worked with a gardener every morning, sawing wood and chopping it with an axe into suitable sizes for burning in stoves. A good quantity has been cut up each morning, when the Emperor has plied himself, the gardener getting the wood in payment for his help.

The completed record of work for last year issued by the Royal Humane Society shows that the huge total of 867 cases of gallant action in saving or attempting to save life have been dealt with, and that 984 persons have received recognition in the form of a medal, testimonial, or pecuniary award. As a result, 885 persons have been rescued, but in 126 cases help came too late and life was lost; while in nineteen cases would-be rescuers also lost their lives.

Mr. B. E. Holloway, secretary of the Mexican Railway Company, in a lecture to the members of the Chartered Institute of Secretaries, said that Mexicans had a special weakness for hats of the cartwheel type. It was nothing to see a man wearing a hat worth £6 or £7 while his suit of clothes was not worth 6d. In one part of the country it has been considered necessary to pass a law which imposed a fine on every man having a hat more than 29 in. wide.

London, Feb. 28.—Prince Erik of Denmark, a nephew of King Christian X., after working unobtrusively on an English farm at Fairford, in Gloucestershire, for some months, will shortly go to Holland and Belgium to continue his agricultural education.

It is said that the stay of the Prince in England is due to the advice of Minister of Agriculture Pederson, who encouraged his own daughter to study domestic life as a maid servant here. It is well known that Denmark is facile princeps in dairy farming, but M. Pederson, while visiting England some time ago, was impressed with the profitable English method of using waste lands in hog rearing, which he is alleged to have described as the best he has ever seen. Accordingly he urged Prince Valdemar, father of Prince Erik, to send the latter here.

The Prince lives in a farmer's family on an equal status with its members. He works hard and for long hours. Occasionally he pays a visit to his aunt, Queen-Mother Alexandra at Sandringham.

CABLE NEWS.

Special to the Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
News has reached here of two exciting serimmages by British troops and tribesmen in Africa. In the first of the Major Lionel Conroy, of the Comanught Rangers, who was awarded a Distinguished Service medal in South Africa in 1900, was killed in a fight with outlaws near Wadai Hatli in the Sudan. Major Conroy was in charge of a contingent of an Arab battalion of the Egyptian army. In the second affair Lieut. Jones was shot through both legs during an attack on a stockade by Abyssinian raiders in British East Africa. When Jones was wounded all his soldiers except three orderlies fled. These men at Jones' command retook the stockade by assault.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
High officials of the administration believe the fortunes of the constitutional movement in Mexico hang largely in the balance, that only a clear explanation of the Benton incident and a satisfactory reparation will gain for them the prestige they had acquired as persons desiring the restoration of Constitutional Government in their country. Should the Benton case remain unsettled, in the event of the cause of the constitutionalists being triumphant, there are strong intimations heard in official circles that Great Britain would refuse to recognize Carranza if he was elected, and it is also taken for granted by officials that British might influence other European nations to withhold recognition until reparation is made for injury done foreigners. Administration officials here in discussing that phase of the situation pointed out that on the Benton case seemed to depend the political future of Carranza. The expected discussion in open Senate of the Mexican situation began yesterday with a speech by Senator Works, California Republican, who arraigned the Government's Mexican policy. His words brought no reply from the Administration or Senate.

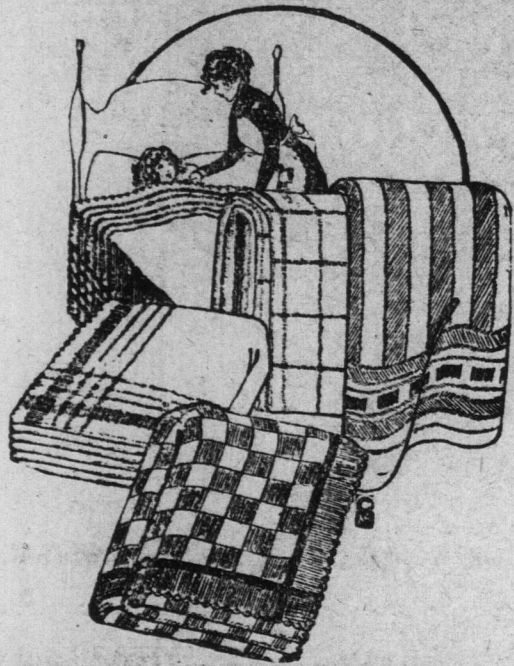

The Sealing Bill.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—Since the Sealing Bill has come before the Legislature, I have been much interested in the speeches of the various members, and one thing that shows up very clearly in the debate is the paucity of the information we possess relating to this fishery.

The clause that most interests the sealer who has the future of the fishery at heart, is that which relates to the use of rifles on the steel ships. In Sec. G.

"The use of rifles by the crew or any member thereof for the purpose of killing seals, shall be prohibited."

In relation to the shooting of old seals, the Hon. John Harvey says as follows:

"I have no intention of making an assertion that of every 4 seals shot 3 died without being secured. There is indeed a wide difference of opinion as to the wastage, but I much doubt if it is at all as large as this."

The Hon. member need have no hesitation in making the assertion that out of every 4 seals shot 3 are lost. Alas the proportion is even greater.

During three springs in the Diana with A. Barbour, mnster, we shot the greater part of our trip of seals each year. We had twenty-five of the best gunners in Bonavista Bay, and the best average we would make was 1 seal out of every 4 stopped, what I mean by stopped is with the bullet in some part of his body, in other words or hit; "if the seal is not struck in the head he will go off," and this was considered good shooting.

It is not easy to shoot old seals with the rifle, the running and jumping, especially if the ice is loose, makes it difficult to shoot accurately.

In the Neptune for several springs the average was even lower than 1 for several shots, for various reasons, one of which was Capt. Blantford was too impatient for old fat and did not give his gunners much time, consequently we had to run and fire, and that made it very hard to shoot straight. Capt. W. Winsor and myself shot away four hundred and fifty cartridges in one day for 90 seals, in this way, running and firing.

I have seen thousands of old seals go off before a company of gunners armed with the modern rifle with blood streaming out of the bullet holes in their bodies, some with as many as three spurts of blood from parts of the body, and still with enough life left to crawl to the edge of the pan and so get away, only to die of their wounds and be eaten by the sharks.

The awful cruelty of indiscriminate shooting of old seals at a time when every animal is supposed to need protection most, is to my mind a very serious proposition and one that needs to be looked after if we would save the sealfishery for the next generation.

Sealers Quarrel.

Yesterday evening two sealers of the S. S. Newfoundland had a heated discussion which eventually led to a fist encounter. The dispute arose as to which of them was the first to tread the frozen pans. As is usual in such cases of dispute, both had been there first, and to convince each other of the fact a few fierce blows were exchanged. They were separated shortly afterwards by some of their fellow seamen.

Sealers' Service.

That the body of Benton may not be exhumed by the Mexican commission is not at all unlikely, as it is believed that the commission will be able to learn just what are the facts as to his death from eye-witnesses.

Curling Bonspiel 1914-

The greatest gathering of curlers ever held in the Maritime Provinces was that of last week in Halifax, when the 1914 Bonspiel took place. Forty-eight rinks were entered in the four contests, a total of 192 men.

In addition to the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick players the occasion was made the more interesting by the presence of three rinks from the St. John's Curling Association, of Newfoundland. It was the first visit of these gentlemen to the Mainland in a Curling capacity, and the privilege of meeting them, both on and off the ice, was much appreciated by the Nova Scotians. Besides being devoted curlers and well skilled in the art they were a particularly fine body of gentlemen, representing the flower of the Ancient Colony. Among the pumber was Mr. A. H. Salter, Secretary of the St. John's Club, who visited New Glasgow a few years ago and made many friends here, and Mr. W. J. Herder of the leading St. John's daily paper and the oldest member of the Fourth Estate in St. John's. Unfortunately, the visitors from Newfoundland were not fortunate enough to carry off with them any of the trophies, but they made a splendid showing in the initial stages of the competitions, and only dropped from the running when the pace became strenuous and the play narrowed down among the most skilled players of the Bonspiel.

A Curling Bonspiel, especially where the players enter in all the contests, as happened in Halifax, is one that exacts a heavy physical tribute from the rinks that are at all successful rinks. Added to this, the severe cold weather tended to make more difficult the trials. As many as four games a day were called for, and this meant beginning play at 9 a.m., 2.30 p.m., 7 p.m., and 9.30 p.m. The only relief came in losing games, and this is not a consideration that is permitted, no matter the penalty, for Scotchmen try to the end.—Eastern Chronicle, 27th Feb'y.

Sawdust Sugar.

In the course of a paper read before the Royal Society of Arts, Dr. Zimmerman described a process by which sugar might be manufactured from sawdust.

In its natural state, he pointed out, wood contains no sugar, but when sawdust has been subjected in closed retorts to digestion with a weak sulphuric acid solution under pressure of six to seven atmospheres, a very remarkable transmutation takes place, as much as twenty-five per cent. of the material being converted into sugar. In this Dr. Zimmerman claims that we have a valuable feeding stuff for horses, cattle, and sheep. Draught horses, in whose daily ration 4 lb. of "calciferous molasses" were substituted for 4 lb. of oats were kept under observation for seven months and were all found to have increased in weight, while a colt which was in so weak a condition that veterinary surgeons advised his destruction, put on 200 lb. in six months, and he is now in excellent condition.

The food has also been tried in a large Durham colliery, with the result that it kept the pit ponies and horses in good and hard condition. Many other uses, it was suggested, would be found for this converted wood—for example, in the manufacture of explosives, of margarine, of synthetic rubber, and, in virtue of its characteristics as a non-conductor of heat, as packing for refrigerators, incubators, ice chambers, and so on.

A Deadly Gas Will Keep Food Fresh in Future.

Ice and refrigerating rooms are soon to be superseded as a means of bringing us food supplies from the ends of the earth in good condition. Scientists have been for many years looking for a perfect method of keeping fruit, fish, milk, bottled beer, and so on, good and fresh for as long as is wanted.

The solution has, curious as it may seem, been found in that most poisonous of all gases, carbonic acid gas.

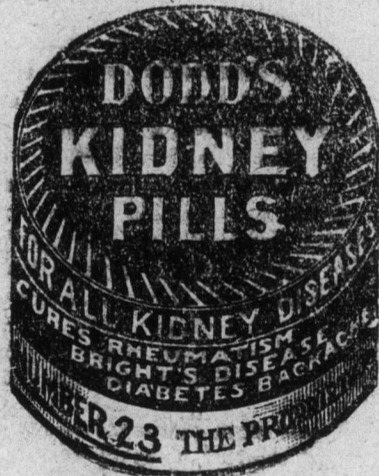

young radishes and French dressing. A good dish mop is made of a spring clothes-pin spliced to one side. Remove the dish cloth by means of the spring) after each using and wash it. Stains on mahogany may be removed by rubbing with a cloth dipped in a little oxalic acid and water. Rinse with cold water, dry and polish directly. Keep a table with two shelves in the upper hall, and keep on the top shelf all magazines, glasses, etc., that are to go upstairs and on the lower shelf all that are to go downstairs. To make coffee butter icing, stir six ounces of butter with fourteen ounces of fine icing sugar until it is the consistency of cream, add by degrees strong coffee to taste; spread between cakes like jam. To remove paint stains on cotton or woolen material rub with oil or turpentine, and then wash with soap-suds. For old paint stains, cover the marks with olive oil and then rub with commercial chloroform. Delicious raisin bread is made by saving part of a white bread dough made with milk. Mix into it a beaten egg, one cup chopped raisins and two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Form into a loaf, let rise and bake.

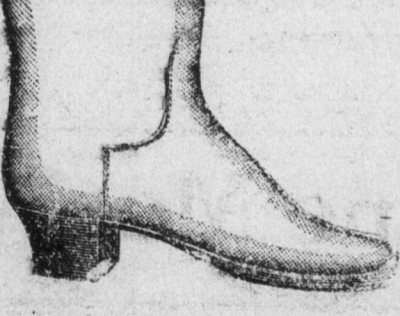

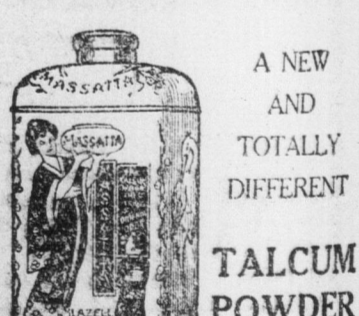

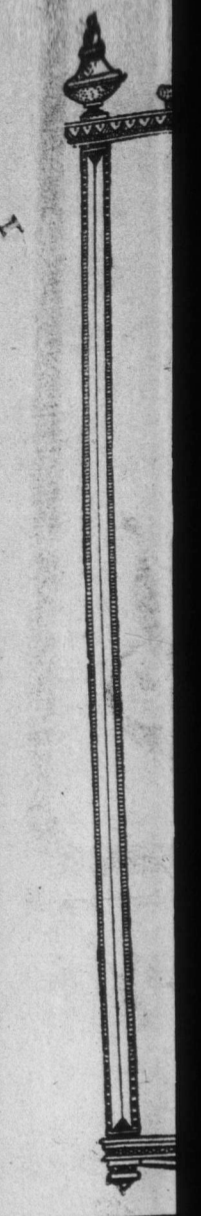

... false promise of giving something for nothing, now find that the mandate is going to cut every man, woman and child in the island \$1.00 a year. The people were told twelve months ago that after reducing taxation \$350,000 there would be a surplus of \$350,000. But the facts are that the Government was \$300,000 to the back, or \$450,000 out in their reckoning. He elucidated how the poorer class of people were taxed heavier than the well-to-do, that more thought was given to the "champagne charlies" in the imposition of the extra taxation than to the little luxuries of the fishermen. He then grappled with the question of balance in trade and the difficulty the Government would have floating a loan on their debentures, owing to the stringency of the money market.

The Prime Minister congratulated the previous speaker on his speech, because he knew, he said, that the hon. member for Trinity spoke from principle and from conviction, and congratulated him upon his far-seeing political abilities, as he said the Government would have had 33 members returned but for Mr. Lloyd. Continuing, the Prime Minister got off the same honey-combed speech about railways and doses of medicine as was heard from him twice already this season, but as was pointed out to him by the hon. member for Trinity, he convinced nobody.

Mr. Coaker followed, pointing out to the Premier, who boasted so much of his majority, that whilst they had more members, that the Opposition party had over three thousand votes or the majority of the people. He then referred to some of the telegraph extension work. He knew of poles not being delivered and that drunkenness was very evident among those engaged at the work. Regarding the Loggers' Bill, he said that although it passed unanimously in the House, not a man in the Upper House had the courage to introduce it. The reason, he said, was that one company did not favor the Bill, and he graphically described how the logging men were treated by that company. He read letters that came from the men themselves telling of the hardships they had to undergo and all the winter had to sleep on burlap bags and boughs. In conclusion, he emphasized that his members and the fishermen would agitate for the abolition of the Legislative Council.

The Colonial Secretary got off a lengthy eulogy of the Prime Minister telling mainly of his humane principles. He made a brief reference to the Budget and believed that the fishermen were anxious to take their share of increased taxation.

Messrs. Jennings, Winsor, Targett and Stone made very practical speeches of how the increased taxation, particularly the iniquitous ten per-cent. on all dutiable goods, is going to affect the fishermen.

The clock had just reached midnight, and much more business was to be done on with, when Mr. Devereaux took the floor. He made an attack on Mr. Coaker, but the attack was permeated with eulogiums—that he should not have the right to speak of fishermen from the standpoint of the F.P.U., while in the House.

Owing to the lateness of the hour, Mr. Kent reserved his remarks and the Bill passed the Committee stage.

The Public Service Bill was read a second time and then the Prime Minister gave notice of suspension of the rules.

The House adjourned at 2 a.m. to meet again Monday afternoon.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Devereaux from Haystack, P.E., on Temperance Reform; by Mr. Woodford, from Colliers, on the subject of fishery rules; by Mr. Abbott, from Bonavista, protesting against the use of cod-traps; by Mr. Stone, from Catalina, for a road, and from several places dealing with public matters; by Mr. Currie, on behalf of the Speaker, from Victoria, in the District of Carbonear, on Temperance and road matters; and from Lamaline for water service, and Allan's Island for a breakwater.

The Bills respecting Municipal affairs, Salaries and Train Ferry Service, were read a third time.

The Bills relating to Conception Bay and United Towns Electrical Companies, were deferred while in Committee, and the Pilotage Bill passed with slight amendments.

The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the Revenue Bill.

Mr. Lloyd rose and gave an able, concise and telling criticism of the Budget. That the overflowing prosperity referred to by the Minister of Finance was beyond conception, in view of what the Budget Speech and Revenue Bill contained, and that even if there was any prosperity evident it was an extraordinary feature that with the revenues such as the country never saw before, that the Minister of Finance should be asking for over a quarter of a million dollars a year more for taxation. In fact the present Minister had the unprecedented record of asking for more than any predecessor. He was surprised that the Minister of Finance, abetted by the Leader of the Government, should have the unmitigated gall to tell the House and the country of the remarkable prosperity and in the one breath ask for such an extraordinary increase in the revenue. The situation was so illuminating, he said, that it brought back the whole policy of the Government. He dealt effectively with the much talked-of mandate given the Government to do all they had done. He said that the conditions under which that mandate was given by the people, were not stated and he pointed out clearly that the Premier, in his manifesto promised to build branch railways without one cent of extra taxation. The people who were deluded by the

BY CABLE

LONDON, To-day.

An air of confidence marked the gathering of delegates at the tariff reform league yesterday, when the report showed substantial progress all along the line. Joseph Chamberlain, who is now in retirement, sent a message reiterating his confidence in the ultimate success of the policy of the League. In regard to the policy, the general consensus of opinion is expressed by resolution, which were carried into effect, was that tariff reformers should co-operate with the Unionists in an altered method of dealing with the policy, but should not slacken their efforts to push fully the policy of the League. Sir Gilbert Parker, in proposing the re-election of the Treasurer, attacked the Government for its bribery and corruption; while the masses paid innuence for fourpence in every department of national life, the policy of the tariff reformers was to check wastage, defend workmen and enlarge workshops. He believed before long a Government would be elected which would be enabled to carry out these ideals.

LONDON, To-day.

After declaring that there was much to be said from an American point of view that American shipping is entitled to favourable treatment in the matter of Panama Canal tolls, the Chronicle concludes its editorial as follows, in dealing with President Wilson's message to Congress on "Thursday": President Wilson's actions "required immense moral courage and also will require great courage for American people to give up the advantage which they feel themselves entitled in order to meet moral obligation of this kind. There can be no doubt they will follow the lead President has given so that when the Canal is opened next year it may be opened without any reservation marring the good will with which we ourselves and other countries will receive the finishing work. The Post characterizes President Wilson's message as being in accordance with best traditions of his office. The paper adds that it is a noble appeal and will live in history.

WASH TUB "TIPS."
Status and Marks.
Different people may have different ways of removing stains from clothing, but the hints following have been proved to be good.
Melted tallow will remove ink stains; the ink and the grease will come out together. Garments stained by machine oil must be treated with ammonia.
Ammonia is the magician of the home, and should be kept by every housewife.
Mildew can be removed by soaking the garment in buttermilk, and anything stained by fruit should be washed in kerosene before washing with soap and water. Acid stains can be removed by salt or wormwood. Wet the stained parts and rub the salts in; then rinse the articles before washing.

Should Starch Be Used.
Of course starch should be used for the ordinary garment needing stiffening, but there are such things as chintz covers and curtains where a substitute should be found.

ESSENTIALS IN BREAD MAKING.
Liquid must be lukewarm when added to the yeast cake.
Bread must be thoroughly kneaded. The dough should double in size before cut down or kneaded again.
Best flavor of bread is produced by long, slow rising. The temperature of the room at about sixty or sixty-five degrees produces such bread.
Quicker bread is made by the addition of more yeast and a higher temperature for rising.
Too high a temperature kills the yeast plants and sours the bread.
Medium-sized loaves should bake one hour in a moderate oven. This length of time is necessary to bake the bread to the centre and produce a thick nutty crust. The temperature of the oven should be kept low enough to permit the bread to remain in the oven for this length of time without becoming too brown or burned in spots.—Woman's World for September.

How She Lessened Her Coal Bill.
"What—windows open with the thermometer at zero?" exclaimed a friend one cold winter day as she stepped into my sitting-room, through which the air from two windows was freshly blowing. "You must have an exceptionally good furnace," she continued. "We keep ours running at full speed this cold weather, and yet we cannot keep warm. But I never think of opening windows."
Here she gave such a decided shiver that I thought it advisable to close mine before explaining my reason for the cool atmosphere.
"And do you never open your windows in winter?" I asked.
"Never, except on sweeping days, and then I caution Kate to close them as soon as possible."
"I don't wonder you cannot keep warm," I said.
"You don't mean to say that you open your windows to heat your house?" she exclaimed.
"That is one of my reasons," I replied, smiling at her astonishment.
"Let she should think I had suddenly taken leave of my senses I hastened to explain.
"Do you not know that it is impossible to heat dead air?" I asked.
"Dead—air?"
"Exactly I was not making things any more intelligible. Hygiene had not been introduced into her brain.

Earth, Only Inhabited Planet
Lecturing at the Victoria Institute in London, Walter E. Maunders, superintendent of the solar department at Greenwich, declared that there could be no life on Mars. The earth, he said, is the only planet where man or any other part of animal or plant creation can live.
He took the planets one by one, and condemned each in turn. He even considered some of the moons; but each had some disability which could only spell death. He hesitated for a while in discussing Venus. There was just a possibility that the sheath of clouds that covered her from the fierce heat of the sun might have beneath it some kind of life. If the Italian astronomers are right, Venus always turns one face to the sun and one-half of the planet is too hot for any life, and the half that turns its face eternally from the sun is chilled to the realms of death. Mercury is in much the same predicament.
As to Mars, we can watch it very closely and we can see or imagine all sorts of strange things, but its deadly cold makes life impossible. The mean temperature of the earth as a whole is 60 degrees Fahrenheit, and even by the simplest method of computation, leaving many considerations out of account, the temperature of Mars is 10 degrees (22 degrees of frost). When such conditions as the water and air coverings of the earth are considered the difference between the temperature of the earth and that of Mars must be at least 100 degrees. Mr. Maunders believes that in some parts of Mars the temperature at times creeps down close to the absolute zero.
Mr. Maunders has no belief in the gigantic canals seen by Prof. Lowell. He believes them to be an outcome of a desire to see them, not exactly optical illusions, but something very much of the sort. Mr. Maunders concluded:

The reason of this is that the pleasure of conversation consists not in what you learn from the one with whom you converse, but in what you discover about yourself.

DAMS.

By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "At Good Old Swash."

A dam is a sort of holding company constructed for the purpose of collecting water.

Dams are not financial, however. They are built of stone and other materials. A dam can collect as much water as a real holding company, but it cannot convert it into diamond dog collars and limousines so easily.

Dams are built across rivers to their great annoyance and interfere extremely with their progress. After a dam has stopped a river, it allows it to flow through a set of turbines or water wheels, thus making it work. If there was only some way of throwing a dam across our leisure class we might make them work too.

Building dams is a very difficult and dangerous operation, but not so dangerous as living below them. Living below a dam is as uncertain a proposition as holding office under a hostile administration. This is because dams sometimes break. After a dam has held back billions of tons of water for a good many years, it sometimes gets tired and lets go. Nothing is harder on a town's prospects than to get in the way of a river which has just gotten away from a large high dam and is going down a valley in solid formation, forty feet deep. The companies which operate the dams which let go always express the deepest regret afterward and use more concrete in building. We would hate to be a man who has skimped a little in building a dam. It must be annoying to dream in the night that it had broken and put about a dozen census enumerators out of a job.

The biggest dam in the world is on the Nile. It is a mile long and so high that the river spends most of the flood season filling the space behind it. Later on, when water is worth a penny a drop, the Assuan dam lets a few million gallons per day trickle down the valley and crop reports of Egypt are taking a big brace.

The next biggest dam is at Keokuk, Iowa. It is a mile long, too, and holds the proud and haughty Mississippi river down to the job of running street cars all over the surrounding states.

The man who owns a large dam does not have to work any more. He has a river working for him and it is more faithful than a horse.

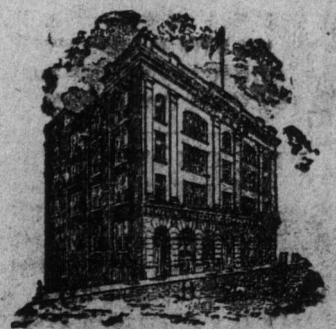
