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





Only the birth from above, only the personal reliance of the soul on Christ, will give admittance into the Christian life.

In the second part of his address the preacher proceeded to point out from the Bible the steps into that life. They were six. 1. "All have sinned." 2. God loves all mankind good and bad alike-"God so loved the world, that He gave His only be gotten Son." 3. God invites all to come to Him. Many passages of in vitation were quoted here. 4. God receives all who come to Him. "Him that cometh unto Me I will in no wise cast out." 5. God forgives all who come seeking pardon, 6. God gives eternal life to all who believe in Jesus Christ. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life: but the wrath of God abideth on him?



Dear Sir.—I notice of the state ussing the advantages of the Fish Regulations, and also against them our cargo by "Edith Caveil" was men toned. If the members knew the full history of this cargo and aired it just as it really is, I doubt if many would believe it. The general public nodoubt are under the impression that the cargo is disposed of ere this and that we have been paid the money. I wish to state to the public that we have not received one cent for this cargo up to date. When the vestel was loaded in July last, Messrs. Lind L Couto offered us \$55,440.00 if we would consign it to them, and we make a draft on them. This was at 60|- per quintal for 4,200 quintals, and the balance over 60 - would be paid us when the cargo would be sold. We sent the Minister of Marine and Fisheries copies of our cables, proving to him our offer from Messrs. Lind & Couto, and we asked him to reconsider and let us consign, or we would sell it to him outright at 65|-, and we would get the cargo to Oporto or elsewhere as quickly as possible; and if he did not comply with our request we held the Government responsible for at least 60 -, which was Messrs. Lind & Couto's offer. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries replied, "No. we will not do it; 'Cavell's' cargo must be consigned to our agent at Oporto under Advisory Board's full control and on no other condition." After keeping "Cavell" here one month, she was permitted to sail only under control of the Minister of Mar-

Trees Planted by Insects.

Chaining Up Books.

A very curious example of the an-

cient custom of chaining up books to

the reading-desk is to be seen in the



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
