Fifty More U.S.S.B. Ships Being Made

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 .- With the addition of thirty-fie vessels just brought out of laid up fleets the Shipping Board has about fifty steamers in various stages of preparation for active service. These are mainly intended to replace on sailing schedule ships regularly engaged in trans-Atlantic services that have been delay ed or diverted by charters for coal shipments from Euro

Fifty-six coal charters in all have been made by the Board and about seventy-five by private interests, so that, taking 7,000 tens of coal a ship as an average, the total movement currently indicated is nearly 1,000,000 ns. The Board is now ready to charter tonnage for late August and September loading, and the idicated rate is 12 shillings 6 pence. Although the demand has fallen off heavily there is still said to be plenty of inquiry in

Of the fifty Shipping Board vessels referred to six are in the spot position, ready for instant allocation Nineteen are undergoing repairs and the remainder are being made ready for reconditioning. The average cost trouble s el d o m for reconditioning one of the laid up boats is \$10,000, so a total of \$350,000 is involved in the preparations for service. About 1400 men will be employed on board the vessels when



Details of a scheme of unemployment and insurance benefit, under which doles would be no longer necessary, and even the State contribution to insurance might be withdrawn were outlined by Mr. McCurdy at

By a simple system he had worked out there would be attained from this scheme-for the boot and shoe trade. for instance-1s. 3d. a week from 20. 000 women workers. That would equal £65,000. Two shillings a week from 100,000 men would produce ostrich.

£520,000, and a subsidy of 3d, a paid on 100 million pairs of boots would be £1.250.000.

That, with the State contribution gave a total of £2,035,000. From this fund they would be able o pay to workers 40s. a week in the case of men, and 25s, to women, for sickness accident disability pension: and an old age pension at the age of sixty-five in addition to the existing

medical benefits. It would also provide unemployment pay at the rate of 20s. a week for women and 35s, for men.





A NEW SHIP.

A very large ship of the light cruiser class, the Raleigh was completed in 1921 and was attached to the North American and West Indian Fleet as flagship. Her main armament consisted of seven point fives and she also carried several smalled guns, and six torpedo tubes. She was 600 feet long, drew 22 feet of water and was capable of a maximum speed of 30 knots. Her engines were oil turbines of the very latest type. The Raleigh's career was short, but it was useful, nor was there any limit to the furher service she might have rendered the Empire had she not met such a tragic end.





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## Letter Written

by Inmate

CHARLESTOWN STATE PRISON TO HIS BROTHER-IN-LAW.

Box 100, Charlestown, Mass. Sunday evening, Oct. 30. 1921, Friend Frank,-I received your letter and May's, on Wednesday, the 26th, inst. As May said she would be over to see me soon I thought I would wait until she did come, rather than write a letter. But an experience of this afternoon, has brought me the

point of writing a few lines. Since my boyhood days, I have read much; heard a great many public speakers, clerical and lay; have seen a few stirring dramas of the stage and screen; but my memory does not recall anything which so touched my heart as a photodrama which it was my privilege, and the privilege of the other inmates, as well as a large number of persons from the outside-to witness this afternoon.. It was William Fox's photoplay "Over the Hill." It is a photodrama from the poems of Will Carleton, in which a selfsacrificing mother's acts move one to tears. I did not catch the name of the woman who acts the part of the mother; but in my humble opinion, she is the most superb actress of the silent drama to-day.

I have read in print, in times gone by, of some religious speaker moving prisoners to tears; but out of all the years it has been my misfortune to be behind prison bars, I can count on the fingers of one hand the men I have seen crying because of something said or done. This afternoon is the one exception out of my long and unfortunate experiences. This afternoon I saw men on all sides of me shedding tears, myself among the number. And I say without any qualification that it was the most appealing sermon preached to a prison

audience since the time of Christ. Prison life is a hard life; it is a tough life; in spite of all and everything that has been said, or may be said, to the contrary. From daily association and forced contact with prisoners of every degree of educatien and intelligence, from the highest to the lowest; from the toughest to the most tender; I say it makes tough men tougher and the more tender, tough. So it is well that a picture of such tender appeal to the best that is in a man's heart should be shown to a prison audience, for such a picture as we were privileged to see thaws out frozen hearts: makes the tough, tender; and tender ones more so. I'll bet all that I ever hope to have that there was not a prisoner in the audience but what was made a better man by having those who have mothers still living will have a greater appreciation of a mother's all and ever sacrificing love; and if mother has departed this life, not let a day go as long as life on earth is premitted us, without a prayer to our Heavenly Father for the bit of Divine Love He gave us in-our

Mothers. No doubt those who were instrumental in securing this photoplay for us, fully grasped the appeal it would have to prisoners' hearts. It will be the talk of this place for many a day. I wish we had more of the meral appeal kind such as that of this afternoon. I say "moral appeal," because it appeals to the tenderest sentiments in a man. And when you can reach man's heart, the man so reached is deserving of a better fate than long years behind stone and steel.

I do hope May will see this picture. it is being shown at Trement Temple. The lady who takes the part of the mother looks and acts so much like our own long-suffering, self-sacrificing mother, that I am sure May will better understand the good, true loving mother we had, and will make a better mother of May.

Our mother is gone; father is still with us. Father had his faults, but he is our father just the same; he never was such a father, though, as the father in this picture. The father in the picture let his son do three years for him; while our father was never a thief. I know father has reached the years where labour is out of the question; and I also know it is asking too much of you to expect that you should look after your own family and keep him too. I know the law in regard to the obligation of children to support aged parents; I am also conscious of my moral duty to do so, and shall be only too glad to live up to my legal and moral duty to help support him if given a chance. Mother has died since I have been here; are they going to keep me till father dies too? Oh, May! Cannot you get someone to soften the hearts of the Parole Board?

Time forces me to close. I await your coming, May. I have addressed this to Frank, but it can be seen that it is for both,
