Milch cows (such as they were) were numerous, and sold rather low—a natural consequence of the quality. Young cattle were plentiful, and so were working oxen, but very few of the latter were as good as we generally see brought to market. Mr. Dickieson, of Eramosa, had the best yoke on the ground; and he held them at \$1.20. Others were offered at from \$90 to \$100, and some went below the lowest of these figures. In short, business was dull and buyers were indifferent. Owners seemed anxious to sell, but farmers do not appear to have yet learned that they must accommodate their demand, to the requirements of the market.
