

SOUTH WELLINGTON AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

FIRST DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The annual Show of the South Wellington and Guelph Township Agricultural Societies began to-day (Wednesday). The day opened bright and clear, and though a strong wind prevailed and the dust blew in clouds, still the weather was far from unfavourable. As far as the entries go, the Show promises to be fully up to that held last year, while as regards the quality of the articles on exhibition it bids fair to rival any Show yet held. The Drill Shed affords ample accommodation for the goods. Three long tables stretch about the entire length of the building, on which are displayed fruits and vegetables, dairy produce, woolen and manufactured goods of all kinds &c. Ladies fancy work and other miscellaneous articles adorn the platform and are hung to good advantage on the side walls. Vegetables and field roots are spread out in great profusion along the floor, while on the opposite side the grain is displayed. Carriages, buggies, harness and other goods fill up the vacant space at the north end of the hall. As we write the Directors and officers are busy getting the articles properly arranged and into their right places. We regret to learn that the Secretary, Mr Geo. Murton, is confined to the house by illness, but Mr Swinford, and Mr. Baker have well filled his place. A very large number of people are in town, and the Show promises to be one of the best ever held under the auspices of the two Societies. We must defer a more extended notice of it till to-morrow. Meantime we would state that it will be open this afternoon immediately after the Judges are through with their labours. It will also be open in the evening at 7 o'clock when the 30th Battalion Band will be in attendance.

Minto Agricultural Show.

The Township of Minto, although one of the newest in the County of Wellington, may well feel proud of the justly celebrated notoriety she enjoys of being the "banner township" of the North Riding. Her annual agricultural exhibition was held in the village of Harrison on Tuesday and was a perfect success in every respect. The day was exceedingly fine, the roads in good condition and the turn out of the industrious farmers of Minto, as well as those from neighbouring townships, with their thrifty wives and daughters was immense. The whole village presented an appearance of lively animation, every one bent upon enjoying a day's pleasure. Harrison itself is a smart go-ahead village, and is making rapid progress. New buildings are towering up in every direction, lots are being fenced in, and other improvements going on which indicate that Harrison is destined ere long to rank amongst our most important towns. Property, since the railway agitation, has increased in value at a fearful rate, "corner lots" being held at fabulous figures. The stores, of which there are four or five, did a rushing trade on Tuesday, and goods appeared to be sold as cheap in Harrison as they are in Guelph, the quality being the same. Around Mr A. Meiklejohn's there was a perfect jam from early morn till noon with parties making entries for the show and ladies buying goods. Although the taverns did a thriving trade yet there was not a row or disturbance of any kind whatever, a matter much to the credit of our Minto friends; neither were many tipsy people to be seen. But to the Show. Not having grounds large enough to accommodate the live stock, the Directors chose a field to the west of the village in which to hold the horse and cattle sale, while the sheep and pigs were shown in the fair ground, and the inside department and poultry occupied the wagon shop of Mr Montgomery, near the river. In horses we have never seen a better exhibition than that which was made on Tuesday. The entries in entire horses being 2, and noble animals they were; team horses 11; the foals as well as the team horses were very superior animals, this may also be said of the brood mares and back horses, the entries in these classes being 45; the fillies and geldings promise well, there being 33 entries in these classes. The cattle were not so good as is to be seen at many of the shows in the old townships in this section. Some animals, especially the aged bulls of Messrs. Moore, Laing and Savery, and the younger bulls were fine animals and much admired. Mr George Preston exhibited a splendid milch cow, and although she did not take the first prize (in consequence of the wording of the prize list) she was the best beast on the ground as a milker. Many of the other animals in this class were worthy of mention, but the prize list will speak for their merits. Mr James Moore exhibited a capital fat Durham heifer, as good a beast as can be seen in the county, and that is saying much. We also noticed some very fine sheep. The entries in this class were 73 and the competition was keen. In a few years Minto will have as good a sheep as is to be found in the County, a strong spirit of emulation exists as to who shall produce the best flock, and many are determined to spare neither expense nor trouble in attaining that end. The porcine race is capable of improvement in this township, as many are securing pairs of the Berkshire wherewith to improve their breeds. Those shown were, however, very good, and in capital condition. The display of implements was not so large as might be expected. We observed a highly polished wooden plough exhibited by Mr. Kilgour, of Mount Forest. It was the best finished plough we have ever seen; it also possessed some points of great merit. The same gentleman exhibited his patent cultivator, which is meeting with an immense sale. Mr. Kilpatrick was also an exhibitor in ploughs and got a ribbon. Messrs. Montgomery and Patmore exhibited a drill harrow and turnip drill, as well as a wooden harrow. Mr. James Bailey was the only competitor in harness, but competition would be almost useless against such a capital workman. His harness were superb in appearance and very strongly made. The poultry shown by Messrs. McDougall, Harrison, Laing, Haig, Colquhoun and Preston were of capital breed and attracted a crowd of spectators who were eagerly discussing the merits of each kind. The inside department was the most attractive feature of the show. The articles exhibited here were, it can be said with truth, an honor both to the sive husbandry and the domestic industry of the "good people" who inhabit Minto. Pumpkins, turnips, beet, potatoes, Cabbages and apples were exhibited by various parties, which were duly commended by the crowd of spectators who thronged the hall. The samples of grain were full and plump, and the judges had considerable difficulty in

giving their awards. As will be observed Mr. Peter Fyfe was a very successful exhibitor. Amongst the handicraft of the ladies who had kept their tiny fingers industriously employed to add to the exhibition specimens of their art, was the collection of Mrs. Stewart, of Clifford, who unfortunately was precluded from exhibiting as competitor, not being a member of the society. Although all the other articles were very tasty and the designs well executed, the collection we have alluded to was as good as any seen at Hamilton. To enumerate the whole of the articles shown in the domestic department would require at least a column of the closely printed Mercury, and we must close by saying that a better display we have never seen at any township show, and that is saying more than we almost dare, considering the many that we have been at this season. Every department over which our fair readers have any control was fully represented on Tuesday, and creditably to the exhibitors. In our rough notes, if we have omitted to notice anything of a glance at the prize list will enlighten the anxious. The following gentlemen acted as judges: Inside—ladies' work, Mrs. Wm. Murray, Mildmay, Mrs. Nicklin, Pilkington; grain, roots, &c., Messrs. Duncan Saunders, Luthar, William Murray, Mildmay, and William Watson, Peel; horses, cattle, &c., Messrs. William White, Robt. Clelland and James Simpson, Elma.—We cannot close our brief account of the show without acknowledging our feelings of gratitude to the President and Directors of the society and especially to the obliging and gentlemanly Secretary, Mr. A. Meiklejohn for the uniform kindness and courtesy bestowed upon us.

THE DINNER.
Took place in Mr. Allan's Hotel in the evening. Like the show was more than a success, for every possible inch of room was occupied by an intelligent and well to do farming class. To speak of dinners in terms of praise is very common and whether good or not they are said to be so. But the one in question was good, as good as Mr. Dick of the "Queens" Toronto, could get up. Here we had all the viands of the season as well as the sparkling wine in all the brands. Undoubtedly we never saw such a capital dinner for an agricultural show. The whole spread reflected the greatest credit on Mr. Allan's capabilities as a caterer for the wants of the travelling public. After the tables had been got through with, the President, Mr. John Laing, took the chair, supported on his right by Robert McKim, Esq., M. P. P., and many other leading gentlemen in the neighbourhood. After the usual loyal and patriotic toasts had been proposed and responded to, the toast of our "worthy member" brought Mr. McKim to his feet, who thanked the audience for the manner in which they had drunk his health, and then gave a very interesting account of his trip to Fort William, which varied but slightly from that published by the writer in the columns of the Mercury a few months since. He said that on being elected as his member, at no matter what sacrifice, he had determined to discharge his duties faithfully, and look after the interests of the constituency. He was ready and willing at all times to transact any business for them they might have to do in connection with the Crown Lands, or any other Department, and advised them to consult him before spending their money in employing agents, who had no right to make any charge. He would see that all their grievances were remedied without the cost of one cent. He extended this invitation to all parties, irrespective of politics, or creed. The policy of Mr. Richards, as regards the mineral lands, he condemned, and promised that a new bill should be introduced at next session more liberal in all its parts in regard to the miners. In speaking of the qualities of the land he pretty much endorsed what we said, but said that at Parry Sound the land, so far as he could see was of very little use, and the Commissioner had determined to grant 200 acres instead of 100, as he found he could get no market for the stones on the ground. He would not recommend Parry Sound to the land, but the land at the Saint St. Marie was tempting, the price being only from 25c to 50c per acre. "The Judges" was the next toast, which was responded to by Mr. Nicklin, of Pilkington, and Mr. Moore. In Minto, above all other places the services of the Press are highly esteemed as was evinced by the early stage at which the toast of the "Press" was proposed, which was responded to by the representatives of the Minto Express, Observer, Elora, Mercury, Guelph; Banner, Listowel, and Spectator, Hamilton. At this stage, the hour being late, 10 p. m., and having a journey of 42 miles before us ere the break of day, we were compelled to take our leave of the happy com; any No doubt they had a pleasant time of it during the rest of the evening, while they remained together. Elora Items.

Our Elora correspondent sends us the following items of news: On Saturday a child of six years of age, son of Mr. Maw, clothier, Elora, while climbing a fence fell backwards breaking its right arm about half way between the wrist and elbow. The little sufferer is progressing favourably under Dr. Savage. It is the second time this summer that this child has had the same arm broken.

There are a great many cattle on the fair ground ground this morning. But as regards quality I think they fall below the average. Buyers do not seem very anxious. The fairs held in the aspiring little towns and villages north of us are already showing their effects by lessening our attendance both in quality and quantity.

Active preparations are already being made for the Pilkington Township show to be held in this village on Thursday the 8th.

The adjourned annual meeting of the old N. R. Wellington Teachers' Association is to be held on Saturday 10th in Mr. Tait's school house, when the appointment of officers for the ensuing year takes place, and when some interesting discussions will come up.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

Madrid, Oct. 5.—The Provisional Junta has requested Marshal Serrano to take charge of affairs until the meeting of the Cortez; and he has consented so to act with Gen. Prim and Olozaga as his colleagues. The formation of the new Cabinet has not yet been completed. General Espartero, a democrat, has been placed in command of the National Guard. It is daily becoming more and more evident that the great majority of the people are in favor of a republican form of government for Spain. The Duke of Victoria and the Count of Chestre have declared that they will support the existing Provisional Junta.

Copenhagen, Oct. 5.—The King delivered a speech yesterday at the opening of the sessions of Rigdag, in which he said that the negotiation with the Prussian Government in matters of Schleswig Holstein had been thus far without result. It was the desire of the Denmark Government to preserve peaceful relations with Prussia. The ratification of the sale of St. Thomas and other islands in the West Indies to the United States has been postponed by the Rigdag for one year.

Madrid, Oct. 6.—Gen Prim arrived here yesterday. He was greeted with enthusiasm.


