CONSERVATIVE MEETING AT FERGUS.

NO NOMINATION MADE.

From our Special Correspondent.

A meeting was held at the North American Hotel, Fergus, on Saturday last, in accordance with announcement made, at which were present a number of Conservatives and a few Reformers, who went there believing that the whole proceeding were to be of a public character.

Dr. Orton explained that the idea of this meeting originated at a meeting held during the recent session of the County Council, in Guelph, was the re-organization of the Conservative party in Centre Wellington.

After considerable discussion and cross-firing, and a persistent attempt to secure the Reformers from the room, it was resolved that no attempt at present would be made to select a candidate in the Conservative interest, but that a Liberal Conservative Association for Centre Wellington would be organized; that J. M. Fraser, Esq., of Elora, would be its President; Patrick Heffernan, Esq., as Vice-President; and Wm. Riddell, Esq., as Sec.-Treas.; and that its first meeting should be held on Saturday next, at Fergus.

Some of the gentlemen present were in favour of retaining the old name Conservative—while others—and they were the majority—inclined to baptize the party "Liberal Conservative." Mr. John Beattie favoured this, if it was understood that a Liberal Conservative was a man who would stick to Sir John A. Macdonald, and others coincided in his opinion.

In total, 226 indigents were admitted who otherwise would have been a burden upon the public; of these 165 were restored to society in reconstituted health; 32 died with the consolations of religion and were buried with few exceptions, at the Sisters' expense; 38 Protestants were comfortably cared for. The report does not include the charity daily bestowed on wayfarers, in the shape of meals, and lodging, clothes and money. His widow, who is labouring under the same disease, is recovering. There are now two children left in the family. There is no other case of small pox in the township at present.

Local and Other Items.

HAMILTON AND NORTH-WESTERS RAILWAY.

The deputations from Hamilton in connection with this new enterprise have been holding meetings in the Townships of Eggs, Toomsch and Adjala, and have met with the most gratifying success.

CREDIT VALLEY RAILWAY.—The following is the state of the vote on the bonus by-law, submitted a few days ago to the ratepayers of Caledon, Toronto Township and Chingacoony, in aid of the Credit Valley Railway: Caledon, for 248, against 256; Toronto Township for 195, against 306; Chingacoony for 126, against 396—total for 569, against 898, majority against the by-law 329.

DEATH OF A MINISTER.—Rev. Edward Whyte, Wesleyan minister and pioneer missionary to British Columbia, died on Saturday morning in Montreal.

The reverend gentleman had only recently returned from England, where he had been for his health. On Tuesday signs of small-pox developed themselves, supposed to have been contracted on ship-board.

BROWNED.—A son of the Rev. John Brown, Presbyterian minister, Newmarket was drowned on Saturday while bathing. The other son sank also, but was taken ashore, and as several members of the medical profession were present, by constant friction and stimulants, he was resuscitated in about two hours.

DISASTROUS FIRECASE.—The damage by the hurricane in the States on Saturday was considerable. Many persons, both in New York and Brooklyn, were injured; and in the latter city, three persons were killed. Al. Wingfield, Long Island, fell on a train of cars, being struck by a portion of them. Some of the passengers were injured. In Jersey City the grain storehouse of the Pennsylvania Central Railway were blown down, causing a loss of several thousand dollars.

SHOCKING CALAMITY.—While the Spanish steamship Guadalupe was lying at Marselles on Saturday, crowded with passengers, her boiler exploded. The entire upper portion of the ship was torn to pieces. Of these on board few escaped death or injury. Forty-four passengers and eleven of the officers and crew were killed. Immediately after the explosion the steamer took fire, and the flames communicated to the dock. A serious conflagration was threatened, and several hundred bales of cotton were consumed. Ultimately the flames were subdued.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

DR. CLARKE has declined the nomination tendered him by the Reform Convention for the North Riding of Norfolk.

The nomination of Mr. McKeough, of Chatham, has proved a cruel blow to the fond hopes and aspirations of poor Mr. Stephenson, who, for a few months past, has been endeavouring to persuade himself that he might by chance be re-elected.

The House of Lords, in England, have waived their objections to the Ballot Bill, which passed the Lower House some time since, and assented to its second reading by a large majority. The ballot is, therefore, soon to become a part and parcel of the British Constitution.

There is a disposition among the Tory press to harp in this Dominion contest chiefly on Ontario local politics, carefully avoiding discussion as far as possible on the deeds and misdeeds of the Ottawa Government.—There is no doubt that they are seeking to hide their own acts in the dust raised by stirring up Ontario matters.

Mr. DALY's canvass does not commence under favourable circumstances. The Listowel Banner, a Conservative paper under its new management, and therefore friendly to the party with whom Mr. Daly is identified, sees inevitable defeat to that party in the event of Mr. Daly deciding to accept the nomination.

The action of the Government in forcing the Mansard swindle through the House on Thursday, when less than a quarter of the members were present, meets with the severest censure, even from warm Government supporters. The motion would not have been carried in a full house. It is regarded as an attempt to remunerate an old Government hack out of the public funds.

STRIKES IN NEW YORK.—The New Tribune says, with reference to the strikes which have for some time prevailed through every department of industry in that city, that confusion seems to have fallen alike on the counsels of employers and employed concerned in the present "strike for eight hours' work. Compromises effected here and there have demoralized some of the organizations, and others are likely to be disturbed eventually by the drafts made on them by the necessity of keeping up their defiant attitude. Meanwhile thousands of men are idle, and the only money drawn is by their officers and vigilance committees. This is wasteful and distressing, for the workmen cannot afford to pay it, and many of them are suffering severely for the want of the necessities of life.
