



The Scandal.

Sir John A. Macdonald commenced his evidence with a carefully prepared statement, historical and descriptive, of the Canada Pacific Railway schemes. It recapitulates the patriotic horror of American capital and influence displayed by the Government; the failure of attempts to amalgamate competing Canadian schemes, and the ultimate award of the contract to the Government's "rich friend," Sir Hugh Allan.

When Sir George Cartier went to Montreal from Ottawa, and I went to Toronto, I asked him to get what help he could—pecuniary help—from our rich friends in Montreal. When I was in Kingston, at the time of my own election, I got a letter from Sir Hugh Allan, stating that he would contribute of the fund \$25,000 for the election of friends to the Administration, a communication I was very glad to get.

The Chairman—That was in addition to the \$25,000.—Yes. I see that in one of Mr. Macmillen's letters, his letter of the 4th of August, in the Montreal Herald, he says that over \$100,000 were sent to Sir John from Montreal, besides a large amount paid to the Central Committee. As to the fund I got from Montreal, there were exactly the sums I have mentioned. There was a contribution of \$25,000 without my previously having asked for it.

Sir John read the statement in the Chicago Times of Macmillen, that Sir John telegraphed to Hugh to shell out, and that he (witness) knew of an endorsed agreement between Sir George and Sir Hugh. The statement was absolutely false. There never was an agreement or understanding of any kind between the Government and Sir Hugh by which the latter was to receive any advantage for aiding the elections.

In reply to Mr. Campbell, Sir John said the money was always spent in elections. A great part of it to pay canvassers, printers, coach hire, etc. The late election was one of the fiercest he ever saw. The Opposition spent unusually large sums of money, and had to be fought with their own weapons.

Judge Ramsay here claimed the right to appear for Sir Hugh, as his private letters were now before the Commission and he was in a position similar to the Government. Judge Day did not take the same view as Ramsay. Sir Hugh was a witness; and if one witness had counsel, any other witness could claim the same right.

The Hon. Mr. Langevin deposed that he knew nothing of the alleged agreement between Sir Hugh and the Americans till he saw it in the papers. The Government never had any arrangement or understanding with Sir Hugh or any one else respecting the disposal of the Pacific Railway charter. The charge was absolutely false. Respecting the election funds, the witness knew nothing.

Mr. W. E. Blumhart, of Quebec, was called. Had been on the Ministerial election committee, but knew nothing of the source from which the money came, nor of the alleged business before the Commission. The Commission met at noon. The Chairman announced that all the witnesses named by Mr. Huntington, as far as possible, had been examined.

The Commission will then close its labors. Sandford Fleming was next called and testified that he knew nothing of the matter mentioned in Huntington's charges, and was not connected with the Canada Pacific Company; was nominated by Sir John; all Directors were on equal footing; Sir Hugh's election to the Presidency was not a matter of course.

THIRTEENTH DAY. Identified the letters and telegrams in the Starnes packet, but said they were not intended for public use. He also gave a simple statement concerning the arrangement with Mr. McMullen, who was to have \$20,000 for delivering them to Mr. Starnes as trustee, to be delivered to Sir Hugh Allan after the session of Parliament was over.

**Credit Valley Railway.**  
**SYNOPSIS OF THE BY-LAW.**  
 The by-law rejected by the County Council, on Saturday, embraced within the group of municipalities the same villages and townships as were in the former by-law, but the southerly portions of Pilkington, Nichol, and Erin were not included in the present group, namely:—In Pilkington, Lots 8 to 18, in Concessions 1 to 5 inclusive; in Nichol the whole of concessions 4 to 10 inclusive; and in Erin, Lots 1 to 10, in Concessions 1 to 5, with lots 1 to 5 in Concessions 7 to 11, inclusive. The by-law provides for the issue of debentures by the Warden, and the levying of rates upon the grouped territory at the rate of three mills and a fraction, for twenty years; also that the debentures shall be delivered by the Warden to trustees appointed in accordance with Sec. 28 of the C. V. R. Co's Act, upon the trustees executing an acknowledgment that they had received the same in trust for the County Council of Wellington as well as for the Company, and agreeing to pay out the proceeds on work done in constructing the Railway as follows:—From the junction point near Bellfontain, or the forks of the River Credit, and Elora or Salem, and between Alton and Orangeville, pro rata per mile over the whole mileage of the said line between the said respective points, on the certificates of the Chief Engineer to be given in the manner provided by the Act of Incorporation of the said Company. And no portion of the proceeds of the said debentures shall be paid out by the Trustees for or in respect of any other portion of the said Railway, or in any other purpose whatsoever." The by-law concludes with details of the voting machinery.
