A voice shouted 'shoot the soldiers.' A Good Banking Law. WASHINGTON, Nov. 25-The report of the comptroller of currency shows that only three national banks were placed in the hands of receivers during the year ending November 1—the Mechanics' national bank, Newark, N. J., the Pacific national bank, Boston, and the First national bank, Buffalo. The affairs of ten national banks have been finally closed within the year. Since the commencement of the national banking system eighty-seven banks were placed in the hands of receivers and four hundred the hands of receivers and four hundred and twenty voluntarily closed business. Mr. Carpmael said that through a pressure of ousiness he had been unable to prepare a written paper, but he had made a few notes on which he would briefly speak. In the first place he explained what was meant by the transit of Venus, using drawings and plan to illustrate his remarks.

Although Venus often passes between the earth and sun, it is only at stated periods that it may be seen. Kinkel, the author of "Otto der Schutz." a romance of the Rhine, was an idealistic German professon, who gave lectures on christian art and used to preach, but under-took to write and fight against feudal roy alty, when he was sent to prison in Span-dau but was liberated by no other man than Carl Schurz, at that time a university student. This was in November, 1850. Schurz came to this country to carve for himself fame, but Kinkel retired into literary seclusion at Zurich. ANSUAL SERMON TO ST. ANDREWS

Dr. King, in an Excellent Sermon,

The annual sermon of the St. Andrew's society was delivered last night in St. James' square presbyterian church by Rev county clerk of Peel stating that the county clerk of Peel stating tha discourse on the 48th psalm, 11-14 verse : "Let Mount Zion rejoice, let the daughters of Judah be glad, because of the judgments. Walk about Zion and go round about her; tell the towers thereof. Mark ye well her bulwarks, consider her palaces; that ye may tell it to the generation following. For this God is our God for ever and ever, he will be our suide even unto death.

He said that on the last occasion he had spoken to them he had called their attention to the three most prominent features of the Scottish life, intelligence, strength and undemonstrativeness. Assuming these to be the prevailing features of the Scottish

and undemonstrativeness. Assuming these to be the prevailing features of the Scottish religion, he purposed to answer to-night the question, "How are we to account for these?" They are found in whatever part of the world the Scots have settled, and it is a subject which will not only be of interest to the society, but to presbyterians generally.

In the first of all, he said, something was due to the race. There had been many additions from other countries to the northern as well as to the southern parts of Scotland in its early history and the people took a character peculiar to themselves. Compare for instance the pulpit oratory with that of England; the one is grand and eloquent while the other is loud, vehement and passionate. In the second place, something is due to the land itself. In support of this he described in graphical language the leading physical features of the country, which caused the depth, reverence and other prominent characteristics of the religion. Thirdly, a more important factor than either race, or land, that is, its system of religions truth, which it was led to adopt at the time of the reformation, namely, calvinism. There is no system of religion like it to produce a purity of character. It is reverent, tender, fearless, and contains all that is calculated to make life noble and great. Fourthly, much is due to its history—the history of the long, bitter and severe struggles which it had with English prelacy. This did a great deal to unite the masses of the people and strengthen the moral first gles which it had with his the mass. This did a great deal to unite the mora This did a great deal to unite the masses of the people and strengthen the moral fibre of the nation. It also tended no doubt to the self-assertion and pugnacity, more easily observed than described. For want of time he was unable to speak at greater length of the parish school, with its religious instruction; the shorter catechism, with its unrivalled defiuitions which are repeated every Sabbath day in the Scottish homes; their manner of keeping the Sabbath day; its psalms which are studied at the schools and firesides.

But he saked "what possible use can be made of these references?" It is impossible to retain them in their purity. The opening up of telegraph lines and railways are doing much to obliterate them. In Canada the same influences are brought to bear against them, besides which, there is also a mixed population, preventing the study of the scriptures in the schools and causing other avils. Though we may not study the of the scriptures in the schools and causing other evils. Though we may not study the bible in the schools we can see that the catechism is taught in our houses; unite with other denominations in keeping the Sabbath day holy by preventing the opening of places of public amusement and the running of steamboats and trains; see that the psalms continue to have their place in the public worship—though he said he did not object to hymns as many of them were excellent, and he could not agree with those who declined to use them at all.
