London, Eng., July 26 .- The death of Captain Webb has created much regret in England, particularly at Trowbridge, Shropshire, where his family reside and where he has two brothers, one a physician and the other a farmer. To the farmer, Capt. Webb said before his departure, that he intended to do "a big thing" in America, where he found more enthusiasm about athletic matters than at home. His English relations knowing his reckless daring, attempted to dissuade him, fearing some disaster, although he did not inform them what feat he intended to attempt.

The Times says concerning the death of Capt. Webb: "It is impossible not to admire Webb's daring, but the wasting of a valuable life is to be regretted." The News blames the death upon the men who tempted him to the teat and upon the authorities who permitted the attempt, saying that he macrificed his life for an American holides." The Telegraph says: "The mother commercy had good reason to be proud of Webb, but deeply mourns what can only be regarded as a toolish sacrifice."

Capt. Webb was a native of Colebrook date, Shropshire, Eugland, where he was born 35 years ago. His father was a physician. In early life he shipped on a coaster, and after becoming an able sea-men entered the merchant service, making several trips between New York and Liver-pool as chief mate of a packet. He subsequently became master of a vessel, and it is related of him that his sailors could never be induced to take a second voyage with him, because of his recklessness and absodute want of anything akin to fear. His esrliest swimming feat to attract attention was the saving of the life of one of his brothers. He was first brought to public notice in April, 1872. He was at that time a passenger on the Cunard steamer Russia, from L'verpool to New York. A serman named Wood fell overboaid and Capt. Webb sprang from the vessel to his rescue. The sailor was drowned. Capt. Webb was in the water 35 minutes before the vessel was turned back after him, and he was picked up some minutes later not at all exhaust-Liverpool and Royal Humane Life-saving societies. The first gold medal awarded by the latter society was presented to him, the duke of Edinburgh making the presentation speech. He made his first public appearance as a professional swimmer in July, 1875. Oa the 3rd of that month he swam a distance of 20 miles in the Thames river in
