



Ottawa, July 5. - Revenue and expenditure Ottawa, July 5. — Revenue and expenditure statement for the fiscal year just closed was issued to-day. The total revenue for the 12 months was \$33,119,455 and expenditure \$31,228,872, leaving a nominal surplus of \$1,890,612. It should be mentioned, how-ever, that this does not represent the actual surplus of the year, as the accounts will not be finally closed for about two months yet. The expenditure on capital account shows a reduction of over \$1,000,000 this year as compared with 1894. The decrease of debt last month was \$573,000.






