THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY'S LETTER TO THE AMERICAN CHURCH.

The following cordial and gratifying letter is sent us for publication by the Secretary of the House of Bishops, to whom it is addressed. Our contemporaries of the Church press are respectfully requested to give it an insertion in their columns also:—Church Journal.

LAMBETH PALAGE, June 21st, 1866.

REV. AND DEAR SIR,—I have received, with very great satisfaction, the resolution of the Bishops, Clergy and Laity of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, declaring their hearty concurrence in the course pursued by the Right Rev. the Metropolitan and other Bishops of the Church in

South Africa, in dealing with the sad departure from Christian doctrine by which one of the Bishops of the said Province had become deterious.

It will doubtless be an encouragement to that Right Reverend Prelate to find that the expression on the part of the Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury of admiration of the courage, firmness, and devoted love of the truth of the Gospel which he has manifested, should have been endorsed in so decided a manner by the Protestant Episcopal Church in America; and it will he gratifying to the Bishops and clergy of this Province to receive such a letter of cordial sympathy in a manner so deeply affecting our common faith.

I will not fail to communicate that resolution to the two Houses of Convocation of the Province of Canterbury at the ensuing meeting.

The Hon. and Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Toronto held a special ordination in St. James' Cathedral on Wednesday, the 25th ult., being the Festival of St James, when Mr. John Francis, of St. Augustine's, Canterbury, was admitted to the order of Deacon. Mr. Francis has been appointed to assist in the Parish of St. Catharines during the absence of the Rector, the Rev. H. Holland.

CONFIRMATIONS.

We are happy to be able to report that the Venerable Bishop of this Dioceses now in his 89th year, is still zealously engaged in the discharge of his Episcopal functions.

On the 17th June last his Lordship attended the opening of St. Peter's Church, Carleton Street, in this City, when he preached to a large and highly respectable congregation, who had assembled on that interesting occasion.

On the following Sunday, he administered the rite of confirmation in St. Paul's Church, Bloor Street, when he preached and addressed the candidates at length.

On Sunday, the 1st July, he preached and confirmed in the Church of St. John the Evangelist: the following Sunday he visited St. Stephen's Church for the same purpose; and on Sunday, the 29th, his Lordship preached and administered the rite of confirmation in St. Ann's Church, Brockton.

The Bishop was also present at the interesting examination of the pupils of the Trinity College Grammar School, at Weston, on Monday, the 23rd inst., when he distributed the prizes to the prizemen, and expressed himself highly gratified with the proficiency of the scholars, and the admirable method which characterized every thing connected with this youthful but most promising institution.

Under the able management of the Rev. Mr. Johnston, and the devotion and shility of the Rev. Mr. Badgeley, this institution is sure to succeed.

The following Scholarships will be open to competition:-

Tenable for one year:

One Foundation Scholarship, of	£50 Currency
" of	45 "
One Bishop Strachan Scholarship of	30 "
One Dickson Scholarship of	30 "

Tenable for three years:

One Cameron Scholarship, of £25, restricted to the sons of Clergymen.

The holders of these Scholarships will be required to attend Lectures and Examinations in the Arts course.

All persons presenting themselves for Examination must produce testimonials of good conduct. Candidates for Matriculation must have entered on their sixteenth, and Candidates for Scholarships on their seventeenth year.

The subject of Examination may be learned by application to the Provost of Trinity College, who will furnish any information which may be required.

One Wellington Scholarship of £50 currency per annum, one Allan Scholarship of £45, and one Burnside and one Dickson Scholarship, each £30, will be awarded to Students commencing their College Course in October next, according to the result of the yearly Examination in the following June.

These Scholarships are tenable for one year, but will be open again for competition to the same candidates at the end of their second year.

One Jubilee Scholarship, of the annual value of £40 currency, and tenable for two years is open annually to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who, having graduated in honours, shall have expressed his intention of studying for Holy Orders.

The Corporation has provided that four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of £15 10s. per annum. Any Student who has passed the Matriculation Examination, and shall have satisfied the Corporation that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantage of a University education, shall be eligible for a bursary, provided, that he be not the holder of a Scholurship, ceteris paribus, the sons of clergymen will be preferred.

Provision has been made for admission to Degrees in Medicine. The particulars may be learned by application to the Provost.
