

#### TRADE AND COMMERCE

COMMERCIAL JOURNAL OFFICE, Tuesday Morning, Nov. 20.

#### VICTORIA.

There are no features of special note. Advices from the interior state that everything is settling down for the winter. The railway work, which has been an important factor during the past summer, has been generally sus pended until spring opens. Merchants are stocked for the winter trade but a fair amount of sorting orders is assured, from the fact that buying has been confined to near by wants for the past two seasons. The sharp advance in Ogilvie's Hungarian flour is one of the strongest indications of returning confidence and a general but gradual revival of business. Money is reported tight and extreme caution is exercised in the giving of crodit.

#### FLOUR AND FRED.

The flour market has taken a sudden rise. Ogilvie's Manitoba Hungarian has been advanced 20c per bbl., and Portland Roller and Snowflake 10c per bbl. As was mentioned last week the millers have been threatening an advance but the dealers were not wholly prepared for a sharp advance of 20c. A well known dealer says: "It came like a thunder clap, there was nothing much to indicate such a firmness in values and the rise may be said to have come wholly unexpected to the trade here. The late fluctuations in the Manitoba flour market have unsettled dealers and they are dubious of threatened advances." It is said that wheat has reached the lowest values and the market cannot but rise. The Victoria Roller Flour and Rice Mills made their first shipment of flour to Japan by the Empress of Japan.

The Portland Commercial Review says of flour: "There is no material change in this market. Demand is good not only for local and domestic, but also for the trade in China and Japan shipments being retarded by lack of transportation facilities. Flour has as yet remained the same price quoted for some time back notwithstanding wheat has advanced. We look for an increase of prices ere long. Quote standard brands from \$2.20 to \$2.30 per bbl; though some mills are quoting flour at \$2.00 per barrel, they are only small millers who are in need of money to conduct their business; they have very little to sell."

#### SAN FRANCISCO COAL TRADE.

J. W. Hacrison, coal and motal broker, San Francisco, reports Nov. 15 as follows. "Since the last Australian mail, the following vessels have arrived from Noweastle, N. S. W., viz :-Glenlui, 2,790 tons, Buccleuch, 3,032 tons, Kenyon, 1,472 tons, Auchencairn, 3,072 tons, Marion Lightbody, 3,219 tons; total 13,855 tons. Business in this line has been unusually quiet; for the past thirty days very few cargoes have changed hands, hence quotations are merely nominal. It is singular the small margin of profit that exists between the actual cost landed here, i. e., original cost in Australia (8s per ton,) present freight rate (14s), duty (40 cts. per ton), insurance, 11 per cent., and the price the consumer purchases this coal for-with two suppositious profits intervening, viz: the importer and the jobber, through whose hands the cargo has passed. The Tacoma West Coast Trade says: "The week has brought a greatly improved tone to the general condition of affairs throughout the country. results of the recent elections have, temporarily, at least, caused the return of a feeling of confidence among the investor class, and the feeling is pretty general that money will be seeking fields for operation again. Even wheat has taken a slight turn for the better, and the week marks a le advance, the first that has occurred since the season opened. #### MR. RITHET, M.P.P.

The remarks of Mr. Rithet in moving the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne in the Provincial Legislature on Thursday, were an able presentment, such as might have been expected from a business man-not a mere partizan politician, but one who had considerable at stake in the country. He thought, and very properly expressed the opinion, that the responsibility of permanent works to floods as had taken place in the Fraser River valley lay upon the Dominion; nevertheless he intimated that the Province would not be behind in doing its part.

Mr. Ruhet, we are sure, did not say what he did because it was his mission to do so; but because he had facts before him on which to base his observations. He, moreover, expressed his deep interest in and cordial sympathy with the work of colonizing the country, as the Norwegians up at Bella Coola are now doing, and further signified his gratification that the subject of further railway extension for the development of the Province and its resources is one to which attention has been called. He added significantly. "As a firm believer in our country, and from an intimate knowledge of its varied resources, he did not hesitate to say that it is well worthy the investment of the capital necessary for its development, and can well afford to bear the outlay required without imnecessarily hard ning the people."

Mr. Rithet well explained that our country remained practically undeveloped for want of facilities, adding that we must be progressive; we must not remain stationary, or retrogression will follow. A max like Mr. Rithet would not have delivered himself as he did had he not been assured of his facts and had he not had confidence in the country. same sentiment was shown by the other speakers who spoke from the Government side of the House, while with Mr. Semlin, the Opposition leader, and his following, there was but little to warrant any hopefulness. Stul they remain in the country. the first results of that agitation which and healthful in every respect.

What for? Is it to endeavor to ruin the Province, to oust the Government, and fatten like vultures on the remains? We take it they will have to wait a long time before they reach the treasury benches by their present sinister route.

#### AN UNFORTUNATE OMISSION.

At a meeting of the British Columbia Board of Trade on Tuesday, a discussion took place on the omission from Bradstreet's report published in June last of the British Columbia ratings, the opinion being given that on this account an erroneous impression had been given that the entire business of the Province had been paralyzed by the recent floods. resolution was in consequence passed denouncing that report as "unfair and misleading," and the company was requested to take immediate steps to alter the same, the attention of the various Boards of Trade throughout the Dominion being specially drawn to the matter.

The omission was certainly a most unfortunate one; but it has since been ex preve at the possibility of such disastrous plained that Brodstreet's, with their headquarters in New York, and the means of communication with British Columbia being broken, could not be expected to know that the reports of "the great destruction " were exaggerations, and therefore they concluded not to print the names of the British Columbia merchants. Moreover, it is well to remember that towards the end of July a supplement revised to July 1, and containing the British Columbia rist was issued, while a still later edition was issued on September 1.

> We commend the members of the British Columbia Board of Trade for drawing attention to this matter, even though it may appear to have been somewhat late in the day, since there are many who make it their business to do all they can to injure the interests and destroy the business of this somewhat far-a-way Province. We have ne doubt that Bradstreet's acted in the best of faith; but unfortunately their omission of the British Columbia merchants was made use of to the disadvantage of the trade of this Province.

#### THE U. S. ELECTION.

That "the overwhelming defeat of the Democrats means that the people of the United States are not prepared to accept free trade" may be the interpretations put upon the outcome of the recent elections. But there is more in it than that. It means that there must be a big change in the general conditions of the country, before it will again settle down. The outcome of the elections was one of

has been going on for come time for changed conditions. No one is satisfied; the advent of the Cleveland administration and the adoption of the Wilson Bill have not accomplished what was expected. In fact they have not had time to do much. It was only recently that the Wilson Bill-which was not endorsed by President Cleveland-went into effect and partially because it had accomplished nothing those who were already dissatisfied followed in the wake of the Ropublicans and gave the Democrats the beating which they received. They were ready for any change and will continue to occupy the same position until matters either adjust themselves or are adjusted into more normal conditions.

We have previously said that a powerful cause of the Democratic defeat was the general dislike and distrust of Tammany, and until that element be removed from its commanding position in the party so long will it be a most serious cause of weakness, for which no policy, however good, can make up. At present the States have no policy on which to unite them. What suits capital is unpleasing to labor. The north and the south the east and the west require different methods of treatment; the railways, and the magnates who control them, want bringing to their bearings, and all these and numerous matters combine to divide and unsettle the voters who, at the next elections, will not improbably be found going off at as wide a tangent as they did when it was supposed they had abandoned the Republican party in the interests of free trade.

Mountime, interest centres in President Cleveland's forthcoming message to Congress, which, it is said, will be devoted to the financial system of the country, of which he will recommend a radical revision. He is understood to regard the existing condition of the national finances as a mere makeshift, a thing of shreds and patches, which does not represent the views of the leading men of the country. It is not, however, anticipated that his recommendations will lead to any immediate financial legislation in the direction indicated -- a prominent change recommended being the abolition of the system government banking, leaving that to private individuals. Meantime it is expected that what the President may say will lead to though ful consideration of the subject. It is said that the Canadian system commends itself to many financiers, and certain is it that it appears better able to stand the test of financial crises.

THE idea of the formation of a Citizens' Improvement Association is one which we heartily endorse, the fact being that the best advertisement which Victoria can possibly have is to make it attractive

#### THE RECENT STRIKES.

The U. S. Labor Commission has handed in its report after its investigation of the recent labor strikes. It says of the Pullman Company conditions created at Pullman enabled the management at all times to assert with great vigor its assumed right to fix wages and rents absolutely and to repress the sort of independence which leads to labor organizations and their attempts at mediation, arbitration, strikes, etc."

Of the General Managers' Association of Railway Companies, it says: "So long as railroads are thus permitted to combine and fix wages for their joint protection, it would be rank injustice to deny the right of all labor upon railroads to unite for similar purposes." The report recommends that there be a permanent United States strike commission of three members, with duties and powers of investigation and recommendation as to disputes between railways and their emplayes, similar to those vested in the interstate commerce commussion as to rates. It further suggests the appointment of Boards of Arbitration and Conciliation as in use in the commonwealth of Massachusetts.

#### THOSE DRAWBACKS!

It is worth noticing that in some quarters the Dominion authorities are being censured for having increased the drawback to 99 per cent of the duty paid, on matter which constitutes the raw materral of articles manufactured in Canada for export. This is an important move in the direction of true protection, since by the amount of the duty it increases the ability of the Canadian exporter to compete with foreign producers abroad. Mr. Laurier and the leading Liberals who are pronounced free traders, admit that, in the meantime, free trade is impossible, but still some of their friends and supporters object to a step which is a long way in the direction of enfranchising trade and of relieving it of some of its more oppressive burdens. With a duty on the raw material that they work up the Canadian manufacturer is by so much handicapped when he attempts to do business abroad.

Why this handicap should not be removed under the special circumstances we fail to see, and we believe that the great mass of the public will be in the same mosition. Countries which either produce or impose no duty on the raw materials referred to are, of course, in a far better position to compete for business than those from which high duties have been exacted, the result being that if outside business is to be done by the fact is that when all the debts of the latter, it must be at the cost of the work-

La the particular cases referred to, we agree with the principle of drawbacks, and, in addition, demand, as we have all along done, that it be further extended so as to meet the cases of consumers like ourselves on this coast upon whom the onus of the burden falls, who are not producers like those whose industries the existing tariff protects and who, moreover, are obliged under that tariff to pay a high price for articles that they cannot produce, which without that tariff they could obtain more cheaply elsewhere.

#### THE POSTMEN'S CHRISTMAS.

And still the Postmaster-General has given no sign of his intentions. It used to be said in connection with the tardiness of certain individuals "Christmas is coming." So it is for the postmen, whose Christmas rejoicings will, to all appearances, have to be made up in a very small amount of money. But that does not worry Sir Adolphe in his warm and comfortable office and mansion, or as he rolls along in his carriage encased in the most expensive furs, his stomach with fat capon lined and all the elaborate and costly accessories. He appears-or rather those who belong to his staff-to have forgotten the duties that are owing to the public. What do they care so long as the school keeps for themselves how much the Victoria postmen may suffer or the public may be inconvenienced?

Meantime, though it is no new proposition, we endorse the suggestion of a correspondent of one of the japers that householders benefitted by the letter delivery make a little present about Christmas to the postmen on their route--we don't say for equal division among the staff, for that is none of our business, and, besides, a man's Christmas gift is not, as a rule, for those he does not know; but for those with whom he is acquainted. Let the postmen have a Christmas box from all who are willing to contribute, and, inaddition for the needy cases which there are, let a subscription be taken up and handed for distribution to someone who knows the merits of each man.

### PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

We observe that the question of Provincial finances is one which is exercising politicians on both sides in the Legislalature as well as the papers which are supposed to be their mouthpieces. This, to say the least of it, is not good policy. #### THE TYPEWRITER IN WAR.

Miltary auth rities appear to be exhausting every resource that will add to the rapidity of communication between the field of battle and the commanding officer. For a long time the telegraph was mainly relied on for the instant transmission of intelligence, and then the telephone was brought into active

It has been recently seriously proposed that aides de camp and other carriers of information in time of war should be taught shorthand, in order to write down important communications with all possible speed, and the latest move in this direction is the introduction of the typewriter on the scene of military operations. One of the novel features of a recent military tournament in England was the use of the typewriter on the battlefield for the purpose of recording messages from signalers.

It is stated that the typewriter operator was also an expert cyclist, and had his Remington mounted on the handles of his machine. Riding in and out among the horses and gun carriages, which he did without the slightest mishap, whereever he came to a standstill he instantly braced up the cycle by a handy contrivance and pounded away at the typewriter while in the saddle. The message, when completed, was sent to the commanding officer in the rear by means of a trained dog.

Although business on spot is slow, some 15,000 to 20,000 boxes have been sold over the cable. Several large sales have also been made in the Ingersoll section within the past few days at 10c, and around that vicinity. As we stated last week, the bulk of the cheese has passed out of factorymen's hands east of Toronto, although probably 8,000 to 10,000 boxes could yet be picked up. Holders of finest September and October western goods could dispose of them at 10 c, but they are not sellers at that figure, believing in better values later on. We quote prices as follows.
