The Astronomical day is reckoned from Noon to Noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h. is 9h. A. of July 21st, and July 21st, 15h. is 3h. M. of July 22.

The Sun's Declination and Equation of Time are given for Noon at Halifax, Apparent Time, i.e. when the True Sun is on the meridian.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical Time for the Meridian Passage at Halifax; and her declination when on that meridian.

The rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the setting from New Moon to Full Moon.

#### THE TIDES.

The Tides in the Calendar given for the Ports mentioned, are the tides that occur during the day. In the Tide Table (page 53) will be found constants for finding the time of High Water at each of the places mentioned in the Table.

The Times of High Water given in the Calendar have been corrected for the varying distance of the Moon from the Earth, and also for her angular distance from the Sun. They can now be depended on as accurate to at least the same degree as the Admiralty Tide Tables.

It will sometimes be found that when a constant is added to the time of High Water at Halifax, the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum, and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required port on the following afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Halifax was a morning or afternoon Tide.

## FORCASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature, and prevent those losses to the Farmer and the Sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Vennor claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area, he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading: and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

In this Almanac all the times except for Moon's Southing are Mean Time at Halifax, i. e., Civil Time. The Moon's Southing is given for Astronomical Time at Halifax.

Standard Time is 15 minutes earlier than Halifax Mean Time, and the Railway Time one hour later than Halifax Standard Time.

JANUARY.—These Farmer's Foot Notes are intended as a monthly guide or reminder of the field work and farm matters that require attention during the several seasons of the year. They are not written for the purpose of furnishing new or original or theoretical information, but rather as practical hints to intelligent Agriculturists already familiar with the science and practice of the profession. A fact known to every farmer is that no two seasons are the exact counterparts of each other, and the farmer or gardener or fruit-grower will be most successful whose crops are selected and operations carried on in view of the season proving either good, bad or indifferent. Crops that ripen well one season may not do as well on the same farm the next, and hence a judicious choice should be made. The

same applies to modes of culture, and to times of preparing the ground and sowing. These two last operations should always, however, be performed as soon as the soil and weather are fit, with due regard to the temperature of the soil. It is at this comparatively idle season that a plan of the year's work may be carefully prepared, and we commend this as an exercise well adapted for occupying the leisure evenings of January, when the farmer is relieved from field operations. At this season, young cattle should receive special attention, all should be groomed, as well as fed and watered, regularly, and thus prepared for passing through the winter in robust healthy condition. Neglect at this season will show itself all through the winter, and affect the quantity and quality of the dairy produce during the ensuing Summer.

FEBRUARY is the trying month for cattle. We would repeat the advice given for their care in January ; we cannot in fact too strongly impress the necessity of care in their feeding, watering, and general treatment, at this season of the year. If once allowed to begin to fall off, it will be uphill work to attempt to stop it. Barns may be faulty, and the cold is severely felt, and yet this is one of the least evils in Nova Scotia, for horned cattle require plenty of fresh air, and the winter and spring rates of mortality in cows in the country barns is very low compared to that of the apparently comfortable, substantial, wind-tight stables of the City of Halifax. The root cellar may be troublesome to get at, and the animals may thus miss an occasional meal ; the wells may be frozen and the way to watering places may be so slippery that the cattle cannot reach them without discomfort or positive accident. In order to overcome these and many other difficulties that

appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal always mix them into out hay, moistened. In districts where an Agricultural Society does not already exist this is a good time to organize. Farmers have time to attend a meeting, and take steps for organization, notification of which has to be made to the Office of Agriculture before the end of June, in order to qualify for the grant for the year.

**MARCH.**—The nature of our climate necessitates the use of a hot-bed for raising seedling plants of those crops that require a long season to mature. A hot-bed is made by piling on successive layers of well chopped horse dung obtained from a stable where oats are freely fed. The manure may be raised to a height of two or three feet above the surface of the soil. On top, spread four or five inches of very fine and rich soil mixed with sand; this should have been prepared in the

Fall, and kept dry under cover all winter,—otherwise it is likely now to be in a hard frozen mass. The glass sashes are then to be put on and kept close till the hot-bed heats ; the steam and heat will start the seeds of weeds, which may be allowed to grow. Air is then given, and when the heat modifies, weed and rake the surface ; sow your spring seeds,—cauliflowers, cabbages, celery, tomatoes, &c., for the kitchen garden ; and stocks, verbenas, petunias, asters, balsams, and such like annuals for flower garden ornament. The seeds will bear a good deal of heat before they emerge from the soil, but, as soon as the first leaves begin to appear, the frame must be aired daily, taking care to avoid draughts and exposure to bright sunshine ; a newspaper laid over the seed bed forms a convenient shade.

**Plants by Mail, WILLOW PARK NURSERY, HALIFAX.**

APRIL.—Spring ploughing, seeding, and planting, all commence in April, and should be pushed on with as much expedition and vigor as the weather will allow. In 1886, ploughing commenced early in April, in dry soils in favourable situations as early as the first of the month, in 1887 it was not general till the early part of May; but the farmer should be ready to anticipate the advantages arising from early work. Early in the month, if the fields are not fit for ploughing or sowing, preliminary operations may be performed. Manure under cover may be carted out on the frozen soil to where it is to be used. In fields seeded down with timothy last fall, it will now be time to sow clover,—a mixture of red and alayke is the best for hay, as the white clover does not grow tall enough for cutting. Where early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm

place so as to start the eyes, and, whenever the ground is dry enough, they may be planted. This advice if not heeded will lead to potatoes coming up scantily, many rotting in the ground. If farmers, instead of planting inert seed potatoes, taken out of a cold cellar, would first allow the eyes to start, there would be fewer complaints of the seed perishing in the soil. Peas and Broadbeans may be sown at the very beginning of the month; onions, parsnips, and carrots as soon as the ground is fit to give them the more delicate seed-bed they require. Beets and mangel wurzel are usually sown at the end of the month or early in May. All gooseberry and currant bushes should be dressed, apple and pear trees gone over, and generally the whole kitchen garden and orchard thoroughly cared for. Remove the boughs from the strawberry plants gradually, and make

MAY.—The work of crop raising, commenced in April, has now to be carried on with increased vigour. The success of the farmer's year depends so much upon the month of May and the work that can be then accomplished, that every hour should be highly valued. If any ploughing has still to be done, let it be done at once; if manure has to be taken out for crops, don't wait for a more convenient season; if the weather is not all that can be desired, proceed nevertheless with your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and atmosphere. Men cannot fight successfully against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? Everything, except what has either already been committed to the soil, or is too

tender to withstand the coldness, or the probable frosts. Such exceptional crops are bush-beans, pole-beans, corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squash ; it is only in warm sandy soils that such things can be safely put out before the end of the month. Turnips also should not be sown in May. One of the principal marketable crops in Nova Scotia is the potato. It has been found advantageous of late years to plant as early as possible ; as soon, therefore, as the ground is in fit condition, commit the potato to it ; see however, that the eyes of the seed have started into growth, otherwise it will be apt to rot in the cold seed bed. In light soil, the manure (old and well rotted) may be ploughed in before planting. In heavy soils, put the manure in the drills, so that the warmth of the air may counteract the deadening effect of the cold wet clods. Superphosphate and other artificial fertilizers may also be used. Finish all top dressing of grass land if this

has been neglected in autumn, when it should have been done; keep down weeds in gardens, give more air to hot-bed frames, so that the plants may grow strong and hardy, see that all fences are secure before you let out any cattle into the pastures; bear out cellars and yards, whitewash buildings, and put the whole homestead in summer order.

JUNE.—Planting and sowing will still continue, and much of such work has, in favorable seasons, to be accomplished in June. Corn for ensilage, and Swedish and yellow turnips should now be sown. But, whilst these spring operations have been continued and finished this month, there are others appertaining more specially to the summer that have also to be attended to. Small fruit and garden crops will require hoeing and weeding, potatoes also, when sufficiently advanced. It should not be forgotten that we have not only to sow and cultivate, but also to

protect our crops, if we would gather in a profitable harvest. Last year (1887) June frosts made havoc in the potato fields and bean patches, especially on the night of 14th-15th June. It is easy to protect early crops by throwing some spruce or other brush over them on cold nights, or burning brush to windward so as to cover the field with a cloud of smoke. The Colorado bug is not likely to appear as early as June; if it should, be very careful to pick off by hand, or dust with Paris green before the dew has gone off the vines. As soon as the currant and gooseberry bushes have pushed out their first leaves and early blossoms, it will be found advantageous to give them a sprinkling of white hellebore powder in the early morning before the dew is off. Month as the weather will allow ; verbenas may be put out very early, and thrive better in the moist cool weather of early June, than later, when the soil is apt to be baked by the sun. Stocks are also very hardy. Balsams, Phloxes, Asternas, Geraniums, Heliotropes, and other tender things need not be put out early.

JULY.—Ploughing, sowing, and planting have been completed in the months of May and June,—this month is especially devoted to the cultivation of the various field crops. Cultivation, in this restricted sense, means the hoeing of crops, sowing by cultivators and harrows, and such like implements, between or over the drills, hilling up and moulding. The objects of these operations are to destroy weeds, to keep the soil open, and thus to promote the decomposition of the manure, enable the soil to obtain moisture, allow free access of air, and by these

means to ensure the growth of the crops. We are apt to have a good many rainy days in July, and, as most of the hoeing work has to be compressed between planting time and haying time, haying has occasionally to be begun before potato hoeing is completed; this occurs on many of the best regulated farms. In ordinary seasons it is sure to occur on a farm where foresight is not shown, hence the miserable root crops we so often see. Let our farming readers then be careful to forecast the weather probabilities in light of the July work to be done on the growing crops, and thus avoid the disastrous loss that comes from neglect. The sowing of turnips is usually recommended for the month of June, but, as the

ground has to be remarkable fine for this crop, and as turnips are often put in to till up land that was originally intended for the earlier sown roots, it frequently happens that turnips have to be sown in July. Some even prefer to sow their Swedes this month, and the soft turnips for immediate feeding need not necessarily be sown till the end of July, although, if they get warm genial weather to start with, they do much better earlier. The ground should have undergone a thorough pulverization. Light sandy soil is the best for turnips; They start best after the ground is warm, but the bulbs swell most rapidly during the cool dewy nights in Autumn. The soil cannot be worked too deep or made too fine for turnips. Town manures are valuable for this crop; and crushed bones have been applied with best effects, either when covered in the drills in the manner of ordinary dung, or, preferably, when sown by machine along with the seeds, so as

to be in immediate contact with the latter. Guano has been largely used, but not so much of late years. Superphosphate is very efficacious.

AUGUST.—Haymaking usually begins about the second or third week of July, sooner or later, according to locality, climate and season, but it is in most districts carried over into the month of August. Where suitable implements and appliances are used, there is now no difficulty in securing the crop. Of late years a pest has appeared in our potato fields, which requires looking after this month; we refer to the Colorado beetle or bug. There are two remedies: either pick the Colorados off the plants, or poison them by sprinkling. The most convenient method of picking is to walk along the rows, with a tin milk pail, striking the

Insects off the potato tops with a shingle, lath, or light stick. The substances used for poisoning are Paris green and London purple; the powder may be thrown upon the plants before the dew is off in the morning. A new and natural remedy suggested is the field Milkweed, which the potato bugs attack when growing in the fields, and, as it is a very poisonous plant, it kills them. We have in former years recommended our readers to note at this season how convenient it is to have a field of tares, or green oats, or barley, or Indian corn, or rape, or any other green eatable thing for the cattle to grow or fatten upon when the pastures are all burnt up. After haying there will be work in the garden, and especially in the orchard. Where the trees are in grass they will benefit by a rich top-dressing around their roots. Look after the ripening fruit, destroy caterpillars, if any still remain; pick the early August apples, and send them into a local market, or to the pie-nic. When

the rains come, beds of strawberries may be made up. See that the ground is well drained and enriched with old manure. Mushrooms now appear in the horse pastures, house flies become troublesome, and the swallows congregate in flocks and leave us. The calving of cows for the season will now be over. All thoroughbred calves should be at once registered in the Stock Register. For grade stock the farmer should keep himself a record for after reference. In the midst of haying work one important matter is apt to be neglected.

**SEPTEMBER**.—This month should be specially devoted to the gathering in of Crops. Haying has been finished in August, and probably all the grain has also been harvested. Orchard fruit requires special attention. Early in the month Indian Corn will have to be cut and put into the Silos; fortunately these are now on the increase in this Province. The ensilage forms an excellent supplement.

to the hay and roots upon which our cattle were fed too exclusively in former years. Later in the month Potatoes of the earlier kinds and early planted will be ready to be taken up; but, whilst the weather remains warm, they should be well dried and aired before being put into the cellar, and only in small quantities at a time. The farmer's year is a complete circle, and, before one year's annual harvest is taken in, it is needful to be preparing for the next. In fact it is already time, by the beginning of September, to sow Winter grains, and some early farmers will even have done that in August. Winter Wheat is not grown so much in Nova Scotia as formerly; but Winter Rye is a favourite crop with some of our farmers. Winter Oats were first introduced by the Government in the Autumn of 1887, and must still be considered an experimental crop. They should be sown about the end of August, or as soon as harvested and threshed, or early in September. It is thought that, if this oat can be successfully grown in Nova Scotia,

it, that no better advice can be given to our orchardists at this season than that which appeared in the London *Garden* from a prominent London firm of fruit dealers: New York State Apples a few years ago occupied the leading position in the trade, but have been steadily losing prestige, and goods packed in the Western and New England States and Canada have steadily gained in popularity and prices. These results have been caused by the style of packing: the New York barrel contains about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  bushels, has flat hoops, whilst the others hold fully three bushels and have round hoops. Baldwins in the former sell in London at 18s. per barrel, whilst in the latter they bring only 15s., 17 p. c. less, whilst the difference in quantity is only  $8\frac{1}{2}$  p. c. A large portion of the receipts last season were 'stuffed,' the middle of the barrel containing inferior fruit." The advice

following from all this is, use the right kind of barrel, pack it carefully with honest fruit, and Nova Scotia will maintain her reputation for apples, and her farmers acquire wealth. Of late years the increase of orchards in our two great fruit Counties, Kings and Annapolis, has increased very much, and other counties are coming to the front.

NOVEMBER.—The improvement of cattle has at length taken a secure hold upon the people of Nova Scotia, and is carried out to some extent through the agency of Agricultural Societies. Every Society keeps, or ought to keep, a sufficient number of male animals for the use of members. If the selection and purchase of these be deferred till Spring time, large prices have to be paid, and suitable animals are not always obtainable. For beef cattle the Short Horn Durham breed

is the best, their growth is more rapid than that of any other kind. For milk alone, Ayrshires are to be preferred, Devons make the best working oxen, are quick, active, and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wild pastures for beef. For domestic cows in the city the creamy Guernseys or Jerseys are the most suitable. The Jerseys are at present the greatest favourites, and their increase, whilst it will promote the manufacture of butter, threatens to lessen our capacity for beef production. Holsteins are also, however, becoming great favorites in a few localities, and the same may be said of Polled Angus. A few Herefords have been introduced. As soon as the root crops are cleared off the fields, and the weeds and potato vines are put into heaps to rot, the farmer should employ his whole strength of man and beast in fall ploughing. Whether on old or new land,

fall ploughing is a most important operation. Without it, a farm cannot be worked to advantage. After ploughing, do not forget to go carefully over the water furrows to make way for the exit of the rain and melting snows that are sure to flood your fields before seed time. A well ploughed, well drained, field may be sown in spring as soon as the frost is gone, whilst one that is irregularly ploughed, or has no water furrows, may long remain a puddle, defying every attempt to improve its condition. The best part of what is too often left to be "Spring work," can be done in the month of November. All land intended for the spring sowing of oats, peas and horse beans, should be effectively worked this month.

DECEMBER.—There are now nearly a hundred Agricultural Societies in this

Province, with a membership of about six thousand farmers; each Society is entitled to draw from the Provincial Treasury an annual grant in aid to promote its operations. The special purpose of a Society is to improve the live stock of its district, which is accomplished by obtaining and keeping for the use of members, superior male animals, such as bulls, rams and boars. Societies may also introduce seeds of new varieties of grain, roots, and also imported implements, and sell them to members at cost and charges. The whole of the Societies of the Province meet annually, on the first Tuesday of November (not December, as formerly) each in its own District, when the members receive the Directors' Report, and select officers for the ensuing year. Full information as to the method of organizing Societies may be obtained on application at the Office of Agriculture, Province Building, Halifax.

JANUARY.—During this month the day lengthens 56 minutes—18 in the morning and 38 in the evening. Venus, Mars and Jupiter are all morning stars.

FEBRUARY.—During this month the day lengthens 79 minutes—41 in the morning and 38 in the evening. Venus, Mars and Jupiter are all morning stars.

MARCH.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 33 minutes—55 minutes in the morning and 38 in the evening. Venus, Mars and Jupiter are still morning stars.

APRIL.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 22 minutes—49 minutes in the morning and 38 in the evening. Venus and Jupiter are morning stars; by the end of the month Mars may be seen as an evening star.

MAY.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 5 minutes—32 minutes in the morning and 38 in the evening. Venus is a morning star; Mars an evening star. Jupiter shines through the whole night.

JUNE.—To find the length of the day,—subtract the time of sunrise from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunset.

EXAMPLE.

	12 h. 0 m.
Sunrise, June 20th	4 h. 19 m.
Difference	7 h. 41 m.
Sunset, June 20th	7 h. 44 m.

Length of day, June 20th 14 h. 25 m. The longest day.

Venus is too near the Sun to be seen. Mars is a morning star. Jupiter still shines through the greater part of the night.

JULY.—To find the length of the night,—Subtract the time of sunset from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunrise next morning.

EXAMPLE.

	12 h. 0 m.
Sunset, July 1st	7 h. 43 m.
Difference	4 h. 17 m.
Sunrise, July 2nd	4 h. 26 m.

Length of night, July 1st 8 h. 43 m.

Venus is still hidden in the Sun's rays. Mars and Jupiter are evening stars.

AUGUST.—The difference of 12 minutes in the decrease of morning and afternoon during this month is caused by the Sun being six minutes slower than the clock at the beginning of the month, and agreeing with it at the end. Venus may be seen as an evening star towards the end of the month. Mars and Jupiter are evening stars.

SEPTEMBER.—The time of sunrise added to the time of sunset is equal to 12 hours, only when the time by the sun and clock is the same, as it nearly is on the 1st of this month. Mars, Venus and Jupiter are all evening stars.

OCTOBER.—In this month the day decreases in length 1 hour 30 minutes—39 minutes in the morning and 51 in the evening. Venus, Mars and Jupiter are still all evening stars.

NOVEMBER.—In this month the day decreases in length 1 hour 3 minutes—37 minutes in the morning and 28 in the evening. Venus and Mars are evening stars. Jupiter is by the middle of the month beginning to be lost in the Sun's rays.

DECEMBER.—The length of the shortest day—December 21st—is 8 hours 36 minutes. By the end of the month the day has lengthened 4 minutes. Venus and Mars are evening stars. By the end of the month Jupiter may be seen a short time before sunrise.

## SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.

The Supreme Court has both original and appellate jurisdiction—*Original*, as to (1) *habeas corpus* in criminal and extradition cases; (2) judicial opinions to the Crown; (3) private bills and petitions therefor referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (4) civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned. *Appellate*, in appeals (1) from the Exchequer Court; (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in *habeas corpus* cases; and (4) in election cases.

## THE EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.

The Exchequer Court has original jurisdiction (1) in revenue cases, (2) in civil suits when the Crown for the Dominion is plaintiff, (3) controversies between the Dominion and the Province, or between two Provinces. The Judges and officers are the same as the Supreme Court.

All goods not enumerated in this Act or any other Act as charged with any duty of Customs, and not declared free of duty by this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent. *ad valorem*, when imported into Canada, or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein.

The following articles, when the natural products, of the colony of Newfoundland, viz.: Animals of all kinds.

## Prohibited.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of 200 dollars together with the forfeiture of the parcel or packages of goods in which the same may be found, viz.:

Books, Printed Papers, Paintings, Drawings, Prints, Photographs or representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Reprints of Canadian Copyright Works, and reprints of British Copyright Works, which have been Copyrighted in Canada.

Goods manufactured or produced, wholly or in part, by prison labor, or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, goal or penitentiary, shall not be imported into Canada, under a penalty of two hundred dollars, and if imported such goods and the parcels or packages in which they are contained shall be forfeited.

No oleomargarine, butterine, or other similar substitute for butter, shall be imported into Canada under a penalty of not more than four hundred dollars and not less than two hundred dollars for each offence, and if imported, the same and the packages within which it is contained shall be forfeited.

The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock in the carcass or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited: and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for a breach of the Customs laws.

**Articles added to the free list under authority of Orders-in-Council.**

Any goods or packages being the growth, produce, or manufacture of Canada, and having been exported therefrom and intended to be returned, may be admitted free of duty on being re-imported to Canada, provided such goods or packages were entered for exportation and branded or marked by a Collector or proper officer at the post or place where they are so re-imported; and further, provided that the property in such goods or packages has continued in the same person or persons possession by whom they were exported, and that such re-importation takes place within one year of the exportation thereof, June 21st, 1884.

Lastings, mohair cloth, or other manufactures of cloth, imported by manufacturers of buttons for use in their own factories, and woven or made in patterns of such size, shape or form, or cut in such manner as to be fit for covering buttons exclusively, November 6th, 1885.

Crucible Sheet Steel 11 to 16 gauge,  $\frac{3}{4}$  to 18 inches wide, imported by manufacturers of mower and reaper knives, for manufacture of such knives in their own factories, November 5th, 1885.

Seed and Breeding Oysters, imported for the purpose of being planted in Canadian waters, May 3rd, 1886.

Fish Skins and Fish Offal, imported by manufacturers of glue for use in their own factories, December 12th, 1886.

Books printed in any of the languages or dialects of any of the Indian tribes of the Dominion of Canada, July 1st, 1886.

Hatters' Bands, Bindings, Tips, and Sides, and linings, both tips and sides, when imported by manufacturers only, for use in their own factories in the manufacture of hats, July 5th, 1886.

Hickory Billets, not further manufactured than sawn to shape, to be used in the manufacture of axe, hatchet, hammer, and other tool handles when imported for such use, July 15th, 1886.

Steel Strip, specially imported by manufacturers of buckthorns and plain strip fencing for use in the factories, July 17th, 1886.

Brass and Copper Wire, twisted, imported by manufacturers of boots and shoes, for use in their factories, July 20th, 1886.

Wood of the persimmon and dogwood tree imported in blocks for the manufacture of shuttles, July 20th, 1886.

Ultramarine Blue, August 18th, 1886.

Brass Cups, being rough blanks, for the manufacture of brass and paper shells or cartridges, when imported by manufacturers of brass or paper shells or cartridges, for use in their own factories, September 23, 1886.

Varn, spun from the hair of the Alpaca or Angora goat, when imported by manufacturers of braid for use exclusively in their factories in the manufacture of such braids only, November 18th, 1886.

Sweat Leathers, imported by hat manufacturers only, for use in their own factories in the manufacture of hats, July 1st, 1887.

Square Reeds and Raw Hide Centers, textile leather or rubber heads, thumbs, and tips, and steel, iron or nickel caps for whip ends, imported by whip manufacturers for use in the manufacture of whips in their own factories, July 2, 1887.

Noils, being the short wool which falls from the combs in worsted factories, July 2nd, 1887.

Home Spring Steel Wire, coppered or tinned, smaller than No. 9, and not smaller than No. 15 wire gauge, when imported by manufacturers of mattresses for use in their own factories, July 18, 1887.

The Delivery of Letters by Carriers is as follows: in the business portions of the city, *Three* deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, commencing at 8 a.m., 12.30 p.m. and 3 p.m.; in the northern portion of the city, beyond Proctor's Lane, and in western portion beyond North Park, *Two* deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, commencing at 8 a.m., and 3 p.m.; in the south-west portion of the city, *Two* deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, commencing at 8 a.m., and 3 p.m.; and in the Northern, Southern, and Western Suburbs, and Richmond, *One* delivery daily, Sundays excepted, commencing at 8 a.m.

Letters for these deliveries will be received at the General Office up to within 15 minutes of the commencement of each delivery.

Letters and Papers should be addressed to Street and Number at which to be delivered.

Change of Residence should be promptly notified to the Postmaster in writing.

The public are requested to adopt the house door letter-boxes, the use of which will result in greatly increased rapidity in the delivery of letters.

No person need call at the office for letters, for all may have mail matter left at their residences regularly, without risk or charge.

## Postage Stamps, Post Cards, etc., issued by the Canadian P. O. Department.

The stamps issued by the Canadian Post Office Department, are of the following denominations, viz.: postage stamps,  $\frac{1}{2}$  c., 1 c., 2 c., 3 c., 5 c., 6 c., 10 c., 12½ c. and 15 c.; registered letter stamps, 2 c. and 5 c.

Post Cards are issued at one cent each, and may be sent to any address in Canada or United States. Reply Post Cards (2 cts.) may be sent to any address in Canada. Post cards are also issued at two cents each for transmission to the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, St. Pierre et Miquelon, and certain foreign countries. Post Bands are for sale at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred.

## Rates of Postage within the Dominion.

### LETTERS.

To places within the Dominion of Canada, 3 cents per half oz. each. Letters paid less than one rate will not be forwarded. Other short paid letters will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as Local or "drop letters," the rate will be 1 cent per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by Postage Stamps affixed to such letter when posted.

Re-directed Letters will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they become subject to a new rate of postage, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

## NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by Post from the Office of publication to regular subscribers in Canada free.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, will be sent at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp. Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, prepaid by postage stamp, one half ct. each.

## MISCELLANEOUS MAIL MATTER.

Periodicals, Books, Pamphlets, and occasional Publications, Books and Newspaper Manuscript, Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Music, Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Roots, Scions, Grafts, Botanical Specimens, etc., and patterns or samples of merchandise.

On transient newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom the rate is one cent per two oz. or fraction of 2 oz., to be prepaid by postage stamps.

Newspapers if sent singly, must be prepaid at the newspaper rate, but they may be sent in packets paid collectively at book post rate, or by newspaper rate, but if at newspaper rate, each paper must be paid the same rate as if sent singly.

Full information in regard to the rates of postage to British Colonies and foreign countries, via England, or the United States, inland and foreign mail connections, the rules governing letters, newspapers, books, periodicals, samples and parcel post, and the transmission of post cards, ships letters, free matter, &c., may be obtained at any Post Office.

**Parcel Post between Canada and the United Kingdom.**

Closed Parcels may be posted in the United Kingdom, when addressed for delivery at certain Post Offices in Canada, and may in like manner be posted at those Canadian Post Offices for destinations in the United Kingdom.

As Parcels from the United Kingdom will be liable to Canadian Customs duties, and under existing regulations must be examined for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs in the presence of the persons addressed, the operation of this Parcel Post with the United Kingdom has been limited for the present in Canada to Parcels addressed to or posted at places where Officers of the Customs are stationed.

Parcels for the United Kingdom may be posted at the following Post Offices in Nova Scotia, and Parcels in like manner may be mailed in the United Kingdom addressed to any of these offices, viz.:

The Parcels exchanged with the United Kingdom will pass exclusively in the Weekly Mails conveyed by the Canadian steamers to and from the St. Lawrence in summer and Halifax in winter, and such parcels cannot be sent via New York.

The Parcel Post with the United Kingdom is governed by the following regulations:

1. A parcel must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight.
2. The dimensions of a parcel must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.
3. A parcel must not contain any explosive, combustible or dangerous articles, nor any article of a perishable or fragile character, nor liquors or matters likely to injure other parcels or mail transmissions.

**CRUISING REGULATIONS FOR PILOTS FOR THE PORT OF HALIFAX.**—All Pilot Boats to cruise on their respective stations for one week before shifting berths.

- 1st. Eastern boat not to cruise west or north of Sambro light house.
- 2nd. The western boat not to cruise east of Sambro light house.
- 3rd. The northern or inshore boat not to cruise south of Sambro light house. The inshore boat to take off all pilots from outward bound vessels, and to transfer them to their respective boats as soon as convenient.
- 4th. No Pilot Boats to leave their own cruising ground, unless from stress of weather or other unavoidable circumstances, and only under such circumstances will pilots be allowed to board any ship, in squids or small boats, from the shore.
- 5th. Every pilot, on boarding a ship, shall have his pilot flag hoisted under the ship's ensign, and remain so hoisted until inside the pilot's limits.

### LIGHT HOUSEES.

*On the Coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.*

**GEORGE'S ISLAND**, west side of Island, Halifax Harbor, lat  $44^{\circ} 38' 30''$  N., lon  $63^{\circ} 33' 20''$  W., two fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, 50 and 30 feet high, drab square building, 21 feet high. Lights show seaward on the S., and into harbor on N. side; on W. side the upper light only can be seen. Vessels going into Halifax Harbor, passing Meagher's Beach, will keep the light on starboard bow. The light is for the purpose of guiding vessels in and out of the Harbor, through the channel west of the Island. These lights open to westward of Meagher's Beach, clear the westward of Thrum Cap Shoal.

### EAST FROM HALIFAX.

**MEAGHER'S BEACH**, Sherbrook Tower, east side of entrance to Halifax Harbor, lat  $44^{\circ} 36'$  N., lon  $63^{\circ} 31' 50''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 58 feet high, building white with red roof, granite, height 48 feet. When Sambro light bears W. S. W., this light should not be brought to the westward of north, which clears the Thrum Cap Shoal. A fog bell here, strikes 7 times in each minute.

**DEVIL'S ISLAND**, on south point of Island, at the eastern entrance to Halifax harbor, two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontally, E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., and W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., 175 yards apart, visible 13 miles, the light E. 59 feet high, W. light 52 feet, both buildings white, octagonal, wood, height E. 53 feet, W. 45 feet, lat  $44^{\circ} 34' 50''$  N., lon  $63^{\circ} 27' 15''$  W. The eastern light opens to southward of western, clears to the southward of the Thrum Cap Shoal. Pilots are stationed here.

**JEDDORE ROCK**, on summit of rocks about 22 miles east of Halifax, lat  $44^{\circ} 39' 45''$ , lon  $63^{\circ} 0' 22''$  one fixed red light, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, dwelling attached, 86 feet high.

**EGG ISLAND**, centre of island, lat  $44^{\circ} 39' 50''$  N., lon  $62^{\circ} 51' 32''$  W. catoptric light, alternate red and white, revolving every minute, visible 15 miles, 80 feet high, octagonal building, black and white vertical stripes on seaward side, height 45 feet. Visible around horizon. An iron can buoy, painted red, about 200 yards south of the Brig Rock, W. by S. from the light house, about 2 miles.

**POPE'S HARBOR**, on west point of Harbour Island, lat  $44^{\circ} 47' 40''$  N., on  $62^{\circ} 38' 50''$  W., fixed red light, catoptric, visible 9 miles, 45 feet high, tower white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 37 feet.

**SHEET ROCK**, at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, lat  $44^{\circ} 49' 55''$  N., lon  $62^{\circ} 29' 40''$  W., revolving red light every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles. White, square, wood, with dwelling attached. 75 feet above high water mark. Automatic whistling buoy in 24 fathoms water S by W  $\frac{1}{2}$  W 5 and one-sixth miles from Sheet Rock light house.

SHEET HARBOUR PASSAGE, on mainland near eastern end of Sober Island, lat  $44^{\circ} 51' 30''$  N., lon  $62^{\circ} 26' 35''$  W., fixed red catoptric, visible 5 miles. Light shown from window in keeper's dwelling elevated 42 feet above high water. For benefit of vessels navigating Sheet Harbour Passage.

BEAVER ISLAND, S. E. part of East Beaver, or William Island, lat  $44^{\circ} 48' 10''$  N., lon  $62^{\circ} 20' 30''$  W., white catoptric light, revolving every 2 minutes, visible 12 miles, 70 feet high, white building with two black balls to seaward, S. S. W., 35 feet high.

BEAVER HARBOUR, on eastern end of Beaver Point, lat  $44^{\circ} 52' 23''$  N., lon  $62^{\circ} 23' 40''$  W. A pole light red, visible 6 miles.

LISCOMB, on island, lat  $44^{\circ} 59' 20''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 57' 50''$  W., red and white catoptric light, alternating every two minutes, visible 15 miles, 64 feet high, white square wooden tower, with dwelling attached.

WEDGE ISLAND, mouth of St. Mary's River, lat  $45^{\circ} 0' 35''$ , lon  $61^{\circ} 52' 35''$ , one revolving red light, shows 1 minute in 3 minutes, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, catoptric.

HOLY POINT, west side of entrance to Isaaoo's Harbor, lat  $45^{\circ} 10' 0''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 39' 12''$  W., two fixed white catoptric lights vertically, 20 feet apart, visible 9 miles, 80 feet high, square white building, 20 feet high, with dwelling attached.

COUNTRY HARBOUR, on Green Island, Guysboro' County, lat  $45^{\circ} 6' 15''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 32' 30''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 to 16 miles, 51 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 23 feet. Coast light, and to guide vessels frequenting Country and Fisherman's Harbors.

TOR BAY, on eastern point of Berry Head, W. side of entrance to Bay, Guysboro' County, lat  $45^{\circ} 11' 37''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 18' 35''$  W., fixed catoptric light, red to seaward, white northward into Bay and towards Molasses Harbor, visible 10 miles, square wooden building, with dwelling attached, white with vertical red stripes, top of lantern painted black. Height of lantern 51 feet, tower 36 feet.

THREE TOP ISLAND, on the south-east point of Three Top Island, Whitehaven, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, lat  $45^{\circ} 12' 40''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 9' 40''$  W. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 48 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles. The building is a wooden one painted white, and consists of a square tower 32 feet high from base of building to vane on lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels into Whitehaven, and in order to point out the dangers on the northern side of the Western Passage is obscured when bearing to the eastward of N. E. by E. It is visible from all other points of approach except when intercepted by the high land of Whitehead Island.

WHITEHEAD ISLAND, S. W. extremity of Island, Guysboro' County, lat  $45^{\circ} 12' N.$ , lon  $61^{\circ} 8' 15''$  W., white catoptric light, revolving every 20 seconds, visible 11 miles, 55 feet high, pyramidal wooden building, 35 feet high, with dwelling attached, octagonal lantern. Light not totally obscured during the eclipses; 10 seconds duration of flash, and 10 seconds eclipse.

CANSO CAFE, north part of Cranberry Island, lat  $45^{\circ} 19' 50''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 55' 25''$  W., two fixed white lights in one tower, vertically, 35 feet apart, upper visible 12, lower 5 miles, 89 and 54 feet respectively, high, octagonal wooden building, horizontally striped red and white, with

dwelling house attached. A steam fog whistle, near the light-house, in thick weather sounds a blast of 8 seconds in each minute.

An automatic signal buoy in 20 fathoms,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles E. S. E. of Grimes Rock, taken up about December.

CANSO HARBOR, on Hart or Cutler Island, lat  $45^{\circ} 21'$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 58' 30''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 42 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet.

CROW HARBOR, on Rock Island, Chedabucto Bay, lat  $45^{\circ} 21' 5''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 16'$  W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower with dwelling attached, painted white.

GUYSBORO' HARBOR, W. side of entrance, near Peart Point, Chedabucto Bay, lat  $45^{\circ} 22' 50''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 29' 10''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 30 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet.

SAND POINT, or Eddy Point, south entrance, lat  $45^{\circ} 31' 30''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 14' 40''$  W., two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 24 feet apart, visible 8 miles, each 25 feet high, white square wooden building, with a black diamond. Lights in window at each end of building.

A black can buoy is moored off the extreme end of Sand Spit.

POINT TUPPER, Ship Harbor or Port Hawkesbury, lat  $45^{\circ} 36' 40''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 22'$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 44 feet high, white square building, height 24 feet. In consequence of the intervention of the land on the south side, can only be seen three miles in that direction.

CREIGHTON'S HEAD, on the north extremity, lat  $45^{\circ} 30' 40''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 6'$  W., white catoptric light, revolving every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles, 29 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Little or West Arichat. Three buoys placed to mark the dangers off the harbor.

JERSEYMAN ISLAND, Arichat Harbor, lat  $45^{\circ} 30' 20''$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 3'$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 39 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels through Grid Passage, in and out of Arichat Harbor. There is also a Range Beacon on the S. E. Point of Jerseyman's Island, that marks Hautfond Shoal, off the entrance to Arichat Harbor. When the beacon and spire of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Arichat are in range, it leads over the West Part of the shoal in 10 feet of water. Vessels bound into Arichat, Cape Breton, should pass to the west of the shoal, or bring the beacon in range of the cupola on the Convent, which stands 130 yards east of the R. C. Church, which will lead in clear of the shoal. Only those well acquainted should pass to the eastward of the shoal, or bring the beacon to bear to the N. of N. E. An Iron Can Buoy painted red has been placed about one cable's length S. W. of the Hautford Shoal in six fathoms of water. The buoy will be placed on or about the 1st of May in each year, and taken up about the 10th December.

ARICHAT, Marache Point, south entrance to Madame Island, lat  $45^{\circ} 29'$  N., lon  $61^{\circ} 1' 50''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 34 feet high, square white wooden building, height 25 feet.

PETITDEGRAT, on Big Arrow Rock, south-east of Madame Island, lat  $44^{\circ} 29' 54''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 57' 30''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 38 feet high, white square tower, with dwelling attached, height 31 feet.

GREEN ISLAND, summit of Island, lat  $45^{\circ} 28' 50''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 53' 40''$

W., red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every 45 seconds, visible 14 miles, 70 feet high, white square wooden building, height 31 feet. Light, centre of keeper's dwelling. Visible around horizon.

CAPE LA RONDE, west side of entrance to St. Peter's Bay, lat  $45^{\circ} 34' 45''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 53''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 miles, 92 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into St. Peter's Bay.

OUETIQUE ISLAND, on south point, lat  $45^{\circ} 36' 40''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 57' 15''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 78 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels through Lennox Passage.

Three Pole Lights in Lennox Passage. One on Glasgow Point, one on Seal Island, or Dog Island, and one on Grand Digue. Red light shown from lantern hoisted on a mast 25 feet high, with shed painted white at its base. Visible 5 miles.

NOTE.—The Pole Lights in St. Peter's Inlet are the same as above.

JEROME POINT, east side of St. Peter's Bay, lat  $45^{\circ} 39' 5''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 52' W.$ , a fixed red light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower, with dwelling attached, painted white.

SAINT ESPRIT ISLAND, east end, lat  $45^{\circ} 37' 30''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 29' 20''$  W., one revolving white catoptric light, flash at intervals of 30 seconds' building white, with two red bands, square, wood, with dwelling attached. Height of building 55 feet, of light 78 feet. Bad Neighbor Shoal, S. W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W.  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mile from this light is not more than 12 feet below water.

#### A Bell Buoy off Fourchie Head.

GUION ISLAND, about 230 yards from west end of Island, lat  $45^{\circ} 46' 10''$  N., lon  $60^{\circ} 6' 20''$  W., red revolving light, catoptric, attains its greatest brilliancy every 30 seconds, visible 12 miles, 74 feet high, tower white, square, with dwelling attached, height 54 feet.

LOUISBURG, north side of entrance to harbor, 120 yards inshore of point, lat  $45^{\circ} 54' 30''$  N., lon  $59^{\circ} 57' 15''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 16 miles, 85 feet high, building white, with a black vertical stripe on dwelling, height 35 feet.

An Automatic Signal Buoy in 30 fathoms  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles S. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. from light-house.

From this buoy a course N. W. by W. will clear the Broad Shoal, and lead to the fairway of Louisburg Harbor. Taken up about December.

MAINADIEU, on south side of west point of Scatterie Island, lat  $46^{\circ} 0' 30''$  N., lon  $59^{\circ} 47' 30''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, 90 feet high, white square wooden building, height 40 feet.

**STODDART ISLAND**, on N. W. point of island, lat  $43^{\circ} 28' 30''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 43' 10''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 22 feet high, white small square tower. To guide vessels into the anchorage of Stoddart Harbor and Shag Harbor Sound.

**BON PORTAGE ISLAND**, on south point, lat  $43^{\circ} 27' 16''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 44' 39''$  W., red catoptric light, revolving every minute, visible 12 miles, 46 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into Barrington West Bay and Shag Harbor.

**PUBNICO HARBOR**, Beach Point, east side of entrance, 120 yards from low water mark, lat  $43^{\circ} 35' 45''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 46' 54''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 28 feet high, square white building, height 20 feet. E. before it can be steered for to avoid shoal spot off St. Ann's Point. Spar buoys mark the channel. Black left on port hand, red on starboard in approaching the harbor. A bell buoy has been placed near John's Ledge.

**PEASE'S ISLAND**, on the south point of Pease's Island, one of the Tusket Islands, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia, lat  $43^{\circ} 37' 35''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 1' 40''$  W. The main or sea light will be revolving catoptric, showing alternately red and white, each color visible for 15 seconds, with intervals of 45 seconds between the flashes. It is elevated 56 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 12 miles from all points of approach from the southward, and also through the Schooner and Ellenwood Passages. A fixed red catoptric light will also be shown from a window in the tower, 16 feet below the main light. It is intended to mark the channel between the two dangers known as the Old Man and Old Woman Rocks, and is, therefore, visible between the bearings W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., and N. W. by N., N. W. by W., and in no other directions. It should be visible 4 miles. The tower is a wooden building, painted white, and consists of a square tower 42 feet high from base to vane on lantern, with a keeper's dwelling attached.

**SEAL ISLAND**, south point,  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile inland, lat  $43^{\circ} 23' 34''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 0' 52''$  W., fixed white light, dioptric, 2nd order, visible 18 miles, 98 feet high, white octagonal building, height 60 feet. The Blonde Rock lies S. by W.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles from light house. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers, the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels ought not to attempt passing between them. A fog whistle near light house, during fogs and snow storms, sounds in each minute a blast of 5 seconds duration, and after an interval of 5 seconds gives another blast of 5 seconds, with an interval of 45 seconds.

**BLONDE ROCK**, an automatic buoy has been placed in 16 fathoms water about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile S  $\frac{1}{2}$  E from the Rock.

**YARMOUTH OR CAPE FORCHU**, east cape, south point, lat  $43^{\circ} 47' 28''$ , N., lon  $66^{\circ} 9' 20''$  W., white catoptric light, intermittent—light 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  minute, dark  $\frac{1}{2}$  minute, visible 18 miles, 117 feet high, octagonal tower, vertical stripes, red and white, height 59 feet. Fog whistle on west side, sounds in fogs and snow storms, 10 seconds in every minute.

An Automatic Buoy, painted red with letter L, has been placed in 18 fathoms of water, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile W. by N. from the Lurcher shoal, which lies 15 miles W. N. W. from this light.

**BUNKER'S ISLAND**, on end of reef, off S. W. point of Island, east side of entrance to Yarmouth Harbor, lat  $43^{\circ} 48' 30''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 8' 45''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 27 feet high, the lantern on a dwelling house, built on a wooden pier. A red beacon light for the purpose of guiding vessels into the harbor. Visible from the southward between the bearings of N. E. by N. and N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E. It can also be seen over Stanwood's Beech, when bearing from S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. to S. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., but cannot be run for on these bearings, the only entrance to the harbor being through Yarmouth Sound and round East Cape. Fog Bell sounds at intervals of 15 seconds.

**TRINITY LEDGE**, an Iron Bell Buoy, painted red, has been moored to the westward of Trinity Ledge, off Cape St. Mary.

**CAPE ST. MARY**, east side of Bay, lat  $44^{\circ} 5' 20''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 12' 40''$  W., red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every 30 seconds, visible 17 miles, 103 feet high, octagonal white building, height 43 feet.

**METEGHAN RIVER**, at entrance end of Breakwater, lat  $44^{\circ} 13' 43''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 8' 12''$  W., fixed green catoptric light, visible 6 miles, 23 feet high, building vertical, red stripes on seaward side, 21 feet high, lantern painted black. Beacon for guiding vessels into river. Must be left on starboard hand and passed close aboard. Tide leaves breakwater one hour before low water.

**CHURCH POINT**, east side of St. Mary's Bay, Digby County, lat  $44^{\circ} 19' 55''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 7' 35''$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible ten miles, 36 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding against dangers in vicinity of Church Point.

**SISSTOO**, south side of entrance to river, lat  $44^{\circ} 26' 30''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 1' 15''$  W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 8 miles, 36 feet high, white wooden building, pyramidal, height 33 feet.

**WESTPORT**, Peter's Island, entrance to Grand Passage, lat  $44^{\circ} 15' 30''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 20' 20''$  W., 2 fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 24 feet apart visible 10 miles, each 40 feet high, square white building, height 15 feet. Visible from the northward between the bearings of S. by W. and S. S. W., and from the southward between the bearings, of N. E., by E., and N. N. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.

DIGBY PIER, Red Pole Light on outer end of pier.

SHAFNER'S POINT, on N. side of Annapolis River, lat  $44^{\circ} 42' 40''$ , lon W.  $65^{\circ} 37' 8''$ . Fixed white dioptric, 55 feet high, visible 8 miles. Building white, square, wood. Indicates Goat Island Shoals.

MARSHALL COVE or PORT WILLIAMS, south shore, lat  $44^{\circ} 56' 52''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 16'$  W., 2 fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 22 feet apart, upper 92 feet high, visible 10 miles, white square building, height 22 feet. Lantern on top of dwelling; lower light in bow window, visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

MARGARETVILLE, on extremity of point, south shore, lat  $45^{\circ} 2' 57''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 4' W.$ , two fixed red catoptric lights, 30 and 27 feet high, visible 8 miles, square building, horizontal white and black stripes, height 22 feet. Visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

ISLE HAUTE, on highest point, lat  $45^{\circ} 14' 55''$  N., lon  $65^{\circ} 0' 45''$  W., white intermittent catoptric light, 365 feet high, shows 40 seconds in every minute, visible 20 miles, white square wooden building, dwelling attached, almost hidden by trees; height 53 feet.

BLACK ROCK, south shore, lat  $45^{\circ} 10' 10''$  N., lon  $64^{\circ} 46' W.$ , fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 45 feet high, square white building, height 35 feet. Light on top of dwelling, visible from all points of approach. A fog whistle on the extreme point of Cape d'Or, on the opposite side of the channel from Black Rock, sounds during thick weather, fogs and snow storms, twice in each minute, each blast being of six seconds duration, with intervals of 24 seconds between. The whistle will probably be heard in calm weather, or with the wind, at a distance of 20 miles, and in stormy weather, or against the wind, from 5 to 8 miles, according to the state of the atmosphere.

ADVOCATE HARBOR, north west side of entrance, lat  $45^{\circ} 19' 25''$  N., lon  $64^{\circ} 47' 30''$  W., fixed red dioptric light, 36 feet high, visible 7 miles, square white building, 27 feet high. DREW'S HEAD, on W. side of Beaver Harbor, Charlotte County, lat  $45^{\circ} 3' 45''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 44'$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 45 feet high, white, square, wooden building, height 36 feet. Seen at all points between eastern and western heads of harbor.

PEA POINT, lat  $45^{\circ} 2' 20''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 48' 40''$  W., east side of entrance to LeEtang Harbor, fixed green light, visible 10 miles, visible from east round by south to north. White, square, wood building, dwelling attached.

BLISS ISLAND, W. end of Island, S. side of western entrance to Bliss Harbor, lat  $45^{\circ} 1' 15''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 51'$  W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 45 feet high, white, square, wooden building, height 30 feet.

LATITE PASSAGE, on Mascatin Point, lat  $45^{\circ} 2' 20''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 53' 30''$  W. A fog trumpet has been erected on Mascatin Point, south entrance to Latite Passage, sounds blasts of 7 seconds, with an interval of 30 seconds between each.

ground is E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., distance 2 miles. From Spruce Point to Mark Point W. N. W., distance 2 miles. A vessel after leaving Doucet Island, to clear the reef, should steer N. until the Spruce Point light bears N. W. by W., and thence take a W. N. W. course.

MARK POINT, St Croix River, Charlotte County, lat  $45^{\circ} 10' 10''$  N., lon  $67^{\circ} 12' 30''$  W., fixed white catoptric light 32 feet high, square white building, height 28 feet.

CAMPOBELLO ISLAND, N. point of Head Harbor, lat  $44^{\circ} 57' 40''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 54' 10''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 15 miles, 64 feet high, white octagonal tower with red cross, height 34 feet. This light enables vessels to enter Head Harbor at all times. It is also a guide to vessels entering the main channel, to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner bay of Passamaquoddy. A fog trumpet sounds blasts of 7 seconds, with intervals of 30 seconds between.

SOUTH WEST WOLF ISLAND, on S. E. point of the island, lat  $44^{\circ} 56' 30''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 44' 10''$  W., white catoptric light, revolving every  $1\frac{1}{2}$  minute, visible 17 to 20 miles, 111 feet high, building white, square, wood, height 35 feet. Lantern on dwelling; visible from all points of approach.

SWALLOW TAIL, N. E. part of Grand Manan, lat  $44^{\circ} 45' 52''$  N., lon  $64^{\circ} 44'$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 17 miles, 148 feet high, white octagonal wooden building, height 50 feet. Visible between the bearings of S. W. round by S. to N. W.

A steam fog whistle on extreme N. W. head of Grand Manan, 80 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs and snow storms, 3 blasts of 4 seconds duration in each minute, with an interval of 16 seconds between each blast.

A spindle beacon, painted red, placed in 1876 on Old Proprietor Ledge on the S. E. of Grand Manan Island, in lat  $44^{\circ} 33' 10''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 40'$  W., has a cage elevated 31 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 or ten miles.

GRAND HARBOR, Grand Manan, lat  $44^{\circ} 40' 2''$  N.,  $66^{\circ} 45' 5''$  W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 40 feet high, white, square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 32 feet. Visible from all points seaward.

SOUTH-WEST HEAD, Grand Manan, lat  $44^{\circ} 36' 0''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 54' 16''$  W., revolving red and white catoptric light; three red flashes 40 seconds' eclipse 20 seconds, 3 white flashes 40 seconds, eclipse 20 seconds, 200 feet high; white, square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 43 feet.

GANNET ROCK, on rock, lat  $40^{\circ} 0' 38''$  N., lon  $66^{\circ} 47'$  W., fixed and flash white light, dioptric, 4th order, a flash every  $4\frac{1}{2}$  seconds, visible 12 miles, 66 feet high, octagonal tower, height 41 feet, vertical black and white stripes. A gun is fired to answer signals during fogs and snow storms. Dangerous rocks extend 4 miles eastward of the light house. Fixed light 45 seconds, eclipse  $5\frac{1}{2}$  seconds, flash  $4\frac{1}{2}$  seconds, eclipse  $5\frac{1}{4}$  seconds—making 60 seconds.

MACHIAS SEAL ISLAND, on island, lat  $44^{\circ} 30' 7''$  N., lon  $67^{\circ} 6' 13''$  W., 2 fixed white lights, W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., and E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., 57 yards apart, one light catoptric, the other dioptric of 2nd order, visible 15 miles, E. 58 feet, W. 54 feet high, buildings white, each 36 feet high. A fog whistle sounds in thick weather, fogs and snow storms, 5 seconds in each half minute.



### TEMPEBANCE DIRECTORY.

**SONS OF TEMPERANCE.**—The first Division was organized at Yarmouth, Nov. 17, 1847. The Grand Division was organized April 22, 1848, incorporated in 1851. There are now three hundred and seventeen (317) Subordinate Divisions with eighteen thousand (18,000) members,—50 Bands of Hope with 4000 members; and four Sections of Cadets with 140 members; *Grand Worthy Patriarch*, Robert L. Black, River Philip; *Grand Scribe*, Rev R. A. Temple, Halifax. *Agents and Lecturers of Grand Division*, Thomas M. Lewis and Rev Joseph Coffin. Geo. H. Mackinlay, Halifax, *Secretary of Juvenile Organizations*. Quarterly sessions of G. D. are held in different parts of the Province, in January, April and July. The annual session is held each Autumn in Halifax.

**INDEPENDENT ORDER OF GOOD TEMPLARS.**—The first Lodge in this province was organized at Economy, Colchester, July 4th, 1864. The Grand Lodge was formed February 5th, 1867. In 1876 the disruption occurred on the "colored membership" question, and the N. S. Grand Lodge went with the British and other Grand Bodies and were known as "I. O. G. T. of the World." In November, 1876, a new Grand Lodge was formed of "Loyal" members to the Original Order "American," and two Grand Lodges conducted the Templar movement for eleven years.

Union was constantly talked and worked for, and on 7th July, 1887, in New Glasgow, was consummated. The R. W. G. Lodges coalesced the same summer amid great rejoicing wherever Templarism exists.

The chief officers of the United Grand Lodge are *G. W. Chief Templar*, D. C. Fraser, New Glasgow; *Secretary*, I. J. Hingley, Oxford; *Sup. of Juvenile Templars*, B. D. Rogers, Stellarton. No. of Lodges, 190, with membership of 9500; No. Juvenile Templars 35, with 1500 members. The next Annual Session will be held in Halifax, commencing the second Tuesday in July, 1888.

**THE BLUE RIBBON CLUBS**, under various names, have footing in many towns, and keep up copies of local public meetings which, with the WOMEN'S TEMPERANCE UNIONS, are largely instrumental in advancing Temperance sentiment.

**THE WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION (WHITE RIBBON)**, has over 500,000 members throughout the world, and is rapidly increasing into every country. Miss Frances Willard of Chicago, is at head of this movement. Miss A. Johnstone of Dartmouth is President of the Halifax Union.

**THE N. S BRANCH OF DOMINION TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE** consists of delegates from all other Societies combining for united action to secure advanced legislation and to enforce existing laws. The officers are:—*President*, Rev. Joseph Coffin, Amherst. *Vice-Presidents*, R. L. Black, Pugwash; R. T. D. Hart, Kings Co.; P. A. McGregor, New Glasgow; Rev. J. Murray, Sydney; Austen Locke, Lockeport; W. C. Bill, Billtown; Rev Dr Burns, Halifax. *Secretary*, John H. Hickman, Amherst. *Treasurer*, W. C. Silver, Halifax.

At this date (Autumn of 1887) the enrolled membership of the various Temperance organizations in Nova Scotia is about 51,500.


