MEXICO'S AFFAIRS ARE LESS CLOUDED

Administration at Washington Is Taking Much More Cheerful View.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 .-- (Can. Press.)-The administration is taking much more hopeful view of the out look in Mexico. This was reflected in the cabinet meeting today when all the recent despatches from Ambassador Wilson and American consuls in varlous parts of Mexico were read and discussed. The concrusion was reached that nothing remains to be done at this time to safeguard American interests in Mexico, in view of the excellent disposition professed towards Americans by the Huerta Government.

THE FIRST COURSE

OUP is the prelude to the dinner. It is light, stimulating food that prepares the way for the meal to follow.

It is easy to make soup, for stripped of the technical terms that confuse the inexperienced, it is merely the juices of the meat, ex-

tracted by long simmering and seasoned to suit. The seasoning, "Aye, there's the rub," must be mixed with good judgmen and ingenuity, and these last many a would-be cook lacks.

There are but two kinds of soups—fat and lean—and these two

subdivided again and again into many headings. The rich brown soups are made from beef or beef and fowl, and these are seasoned with soup vegetables, a little paprika to give piquancy and REV. DR. SYMONDS color and as many different herbs as your family's taste admits. The amber-hued or clear soups are made with fowl or veal. Nothing s added to cloud their transparency, celery salt, a little onion and white

pepper giving all the seasoning necessary.

The proportions for all soups are the same; one quart of water to pound of meat; that is twice as much water as meat. Break the bones and cut the meat in small pieces, add salt enough to give a bright taste and sufficient pepper to give a warm tone. Simmer

gently until all the strength is extracted from the meat.

When the simmering is well under way, add the herbs. The good soup maker is a careful taster. The savory herbs should blend with the spices so that each one helps the other and hides itself. Some markets sell the pot-herbs made into soup bouquets, again a

meat man will send the soup vegetables with the meat. This bouquet, as Press.)—It is strange that a sensation made up on the famous Baltimore market, contains, for four pounds of soup meat, two sticks of celery, one carrot cut in strips, one onion cut in pieces, clergyman preaching the gospel of six pepper corns, one bay leaf, a sprig of thyme and marjoram. These are all tied in a few sprigs of parsley and are easy to remove It is hard to understand why there after they have done their work of seasoning.

For rich brown soups the vegetables are cut in cubes and browned in butter and added to the broth when it is almost done and after the meat has been removed.

The stock-pot, as used abroad, will never find favor in American kitchens, as we are taught that meat for every purpose must be absolutely fresh. The stock-pot, from our point of view, is not a saving. The real saving, we think, is to buy in the right quantity so that we will have no "left-overs." Stock is clarified to add to its appearance and not to its quality. It is a cullnary crime to serve bouillon or consomme at a course dinner that is not clear and free from every particle of fat.

Cream soups are made without stock. Their base is a vegetable, boiled and crushed to a puree and then seasoned and enriched with cream and seasoning. However, a cup of rich stock or a tablespoon of meat extract improves any cream soup.

Velvet cream soups are popular at ladies' luncheons, but are seldom that the elaborate dinner.

Strong Plea Made on Behalf of Widows by Montreal Woman.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—The old age bension committee heard evidence to-lay from Mrs. Henderson, probation officer of the juvenile court at Mon-real, and of Louis Guyon, Quebec fac-

Mrs. Henderson strongly supported the idea of a pension to widows, on the ground that family life should not be broken and children put in institutions. Dr. Mawson and six of his companhave been left for the winter on Adelie Land, a barren tract in the Antarctic, because they were unable to reach the expedition's ship Aurora be-fore she was compelled to leave.

This news is received here in a wireless despatch from Adelie Land via Macquaric Island to Prof. David, who Nares in an arctic expedition in 1875-6. was a member of Shackleton's expediion, which reached within 111 miles of the South Pole in 1909, saying: Missed Their Ship.

"Dr. Douglas Mawson and several of his men missed the Aurora, which had gone to fetch them under the command of Capt. J. K. Davis. This happened owing to unfortunate circumstances.
"Lieut. B. E. S. Ninnis of the City of London Regiment of Royal Fusiliers and Dr. Merz, who was ski champion of Switzerland in 1908, who were members of the expedition, are both dead. All the others are well.




