


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

The Diary of Nathaniel Knap.

ONDAY March ye 27 1758 Set out for Portsmouth Newhampshire from Newbury by water on board Will Gerrish Scooner & Got in at one a clock afternoon Lodged at Mr hoiets

teusday 28 Work on bord of the Snow & Lodged on board

Wednesday 29 walked about streets went over to Kittery and got Straw

thirsday 30 - Walk'd about went to an Evening meeting at Mr haven

friday 31 Walk about -

Saterday April 1 Walk about

Sunday 2 Went to Mr Langden meeting all day

Monday 3 day Saild from portsmoth 2 th Clock in ye Snow Hallifax Capt wells Comander with ye wind at NW teusday 4 day we met with a Snow from Lisband bound to marblehead Capt John Lee Comander he gave an accompt that ye King of Prussia had a fight & took 50000 Prisoners —

Wednesday 5 we made the land at 4 th clock Cap Sables & ye Sile Islands was Sea Sick a crossing the Bay Cape bottle

thirsday heavy & foggy Rany weather after noon thick of Snow & very Squally Saw an English transport which left the fleet—

fryday 7d calm & thick of fog in the after part of the day ye wind Breas'd we lay two all night

Saturday

Saturday 8th made Lehave the wind at NNW about 8 o Clock Saw a Ship 4 Leagues to Leward at 12 Clock She came up with us & proved to be the province Ship Capt hollaway commandar they veard a boay a Stern to take our Cable on board them for to tow us in to hallifax & she toed us Between 7 & 8 nots & yt is 2 or 3 more than Ever She went before thick of Snow & Squally —

Sunday 9 the wind was Right a head the Ship toed us till noon to day then they Saw a a topsail Scooner so they Cast us of & made Sail for the Scooner then the transport

which we was in Company with took us in tow

Monday 10 the transport Ship. kept us in tow till 12 oth Clock to Day then She Cast us of then we made the Best of our way our Selves we made Cape Sambrow this Morning we got in at 9 oClock this Evening and Came two at ye mouth of ye harbor

Teusday 11 we have up this Morning & Came up to Dartmouth and Came to an anchor about noon in ye afternoon we went a Shore & Vieud the place & houses—

Wednesday 12 we went a Shore & Carried our Tools on Shore & fixt helves into axes adses & other tools then we built a wharfe about Seventy foot Long we built it in about 3 hours—

Thirsday 13 a party of our Company was Sent in to the woods to get wood in ye afternoon ye Sentrys yt was our guard was fir'd on by the Indians —

friday 14 workt a fitting up a house to Live in -

Saturday 15 mov'd in to the house that we had fitted in ye afternoon there was a building Burnt at ye City it was a Blacksmiths Shop and ye King Boatbuilders Shead

Sunday 16 a Ship brought in a Snow which Capt Rouse took of of Louisburgh She Carried 16 Guns at night there Came one frigate & 2 more prizes one was a Dutchman & one a private brig—

Monday 17 was foggy & wet weather — kept house teusday 18 built out the wharfe further it was Snowey weather & verry Squally

Wednesday

Wednesday 19 Knoted yarns to make Ropes to Rigg the Longboat at night went to See a Soldier wipt he had 200 Lashes —

thirsday 20th was a making Ropes -

friday 21 did but little work fix'd our Axes to go in to ye woods

Saturday 22 there was 44 of us went over to Hallifax Side to Cut timber for a block houses we cut ye timber 16 & 20 feet Long & 10 Inches thick —

Sunday 23 Staid at Home Did no work at night there was a prize Came in it was a Snow from Martoneco —

Monday 24 went up to hall the timber into the River which we cut a Saturday — at night there was a prize Came in a large Scooner —

teusday 25 went a cutting timber on Dartmouth Side —

Wednesday 26 the forenoon was Rainy the afternoon we hawl'd up ye timber that was cut up the Bason 42 Sticks —

thirsday 27 was out a hauling timber Down to ye River on Dartmouth Side hawls 25 sticks 32 of us

friday 28 was a hauling timber on Dartm 20 sticks Mohards Sloop Came in in the Evening Receiv'd 4 Letters one from my father one Sister Sarah one my Wife one

Saterday 29 Workt a Cutting timber on Dartmouth (soft wood) & Saterday the Boston fleet came in about 20 Sail of Ships Snows & brigs & Scooners in ye Evening went a board Mchards Sloop to get ye things one bag of potatoes one Cag of Ditto 10 Dozen of Eggs & some turnips & one Barel of Syder & 7 foul there was one prize Came in a privateer Scooner

Sunday 30 Was very Stormey Did no work -

Monday May ye 1 1758 Was a Hawling timber on Dartmth there was a prize came in a large Ship Laden with Stores & money She Carried 24 Guns—

teusday ye 2 was a hauling timber on Dartmouth there

was a frigat came in that left Boscowins fleet 10 days of Bermudas —

Wednesday 3 Was a hauling timber on Dartmouth thirday 4 Was a hauling timber on Dartmouth friday 5 was a cutting timber on Dartmouth

Saterday 6 was a cutting timber & the Soldiers haul'd it Sunday 7 went in to ye wood to cut timber it is ye first of our working a Sunday afternoon it thundered & litened and Raind—

Monday 8 — was a cutting timber there was a 64 Gun Ship Came in one of Boscowins fleet the Rest Came in Sight

teusday 9 was a cutting timber Admiral Boscowin came in there was 20 Sail of ye line & near 20 Sail of other vessels 3 of (?)

Wednesday 10 was a cutting timber on Dartmouth thirsday 11 was a hewing timber at home Admiral Boscowin came ashore

friday 12 was a hewing timber at home

Saterday 13 was a laying a platform of a block house Sunday 14 was at work at home there was a hiland minister ashore preacht & we all went to here the Sermen

Monday 15 was to work in the woods afternoon there was a hilander whipt 500 lashes & Jest at night the man of war men set old blackdens house on fire & it burnt down by ye Admirals Order for Selling of Rum—

teusday 16 was a hewing timber in the woods in ye afternoon it rain'd did no work

Wednesday 17 was a hewing timber at home ye new york fleet Came in about 60 sail

thirsday 18 was up ye Bason after a Raft of timber friday 19 was a hewing timber at home in ye forenoon in ye afternoon went up ye Bason after a Raft—

Saterday 20 was a helping call ye Boat that Studly built

Sunday 21 was a Calking on ye Boat ye hiland Minis-

ter preach't ashore we all went to hear him text Mathew 5 & 29 Vrs

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Monday 22 it Rain'd & Stormed Rafted a block house & toed it of to a brig to Carry to Louisburg —

teusday 23 Mr howard & I went a board Capt Sinkler to Calk his Quarter deack

Wednesday 24 went on Board of Sinkers Ship to work but it Rain'd that We could not work

thirsday 25 the land army Came out of ye transports & got in to Boats a Gun Shot from ye Shore & then a Gun was fir'd & they pulled in to ye Shore & Got a Shore & Draw'd up in 5 minutes from ye Gun firing

friday 26 Calk'd ye Snows lumberport in ye afternoon went to Carry 2 waleboats on board ye Admiral & we went a board ye Ship & View'd her from stem to stern I Receiv'd a months pay 19 Dollars allowed 1 for ye Doctor there was 2 prizes Came in a Ship & a Scooner—

Saterday 27 was a making of Oars 30 feet long for ye Admiral left 10 Dollars to ye widow McClures to send home

Sunday 28 Sot sail at 10th Clock & went out with ye whole fleet the wind at NW I was very sea Sick

Monday 29 fair wether was Seasick kept with ye fleet teusday 30 was Seasick & to leward of all ye fleet

Wednesday 31 Large sea fair Weather we ware Still to Leward of the fleet one Eliot of hallifax came with us & was taken with ye Smalpox —

thirsday June ye 1 1758 Spied a ship to windward & heard some Guns we made ye land & they said twas St peters

friday ye 2 fell in with some o the fleet thick & foggy we Espied under ye land a brig & ye bumb Catch Gave Chase & Drove her ashore She was a french brig —

Saterday 3d Saw ye brig in ye morning on fire Ketcht fish I lost one line —

Sunday 4th was verry foggy Mond 5 was foggy & wet

teusday

teusday 6 was foggy & wet Saw none of ye fleet — Wednesday 7 Clear weather Spoke with a frigat & she said ye fleet had got in & we was 15 Leags Distance & Dam'd us & then he Left us

thirsday 8 Made the land & was to leward of Cape

briton the wind was against us & pretty thick

friday 9 it was verry thick & foggy Lye too ye night Saterday 10 made ye land & took it to be to leward of Cape briton then we spied Some Ships 2 men of war & a three or four Scooners & Sloops & they bore away & we followed them & went in to Gabiroose the wind blew verry hard they told us ye Soldiers was landed a thirsday but we

did not know ye Particulars till we Landed

Sunday 11 is fair weather I left 6 dollars with paul Gerrishes & he 8 with Capt wells we all went ashore in ye forenoon when the army Landed the Boats Got within 3 or 4 Rods of the Shore before they Saw any & then they Rise up & fird a Vally on them with Cannon & Small arms ve Cannon Loden with Small Shot the Regulars & Hilanders landed in ye front & the Rangers Landed on the left up ve Bay & they kild & wounded a bout a hundred there was 2 or 3 boats Sunk by the mens being so eager & filling ye Boats so full ye Rangers Started them first they Ran & hollow'd & fird on behind them & they left their Brest work | they had 10 or 12 Cannon 1: 24 pounder which was one of the tilburys Guns their Brest work was from one End to the other was 4 mile they had 2 Morters fix'd & did heave Some Shell X in ve afternoon we built some Camps to Lye in & then we went almost over to ye City & Saw Some Men without they had burnt all ye out houses then the Soldiers took 5 horses & brout them in

Monday 12 is very foggy weather & made a bride & the fog Clear'd away about noon & their was a Great number Sally'd out the City in ye fog ye fog Clear'd & they were Discoved & took in to ye City agin their is one

Diserter Came in to day —

Teusday 13 we went & made 2 bridges the french

Came out ye City & ye Rangers & hilander went after them & they fought 2 hours they brought 1 in that was wounded in ye afternoon verry Stormy Several boats drove a Shore we took ye Lite house Last night

Wednesday 14 Was a building a Large Store house there was Admiral hardy hawl'd Close in to ye island Batery & fird hot & ye french fir'd at us ware we was En-

trenching on ye hill & Killed 1 Man

thirsday 15 was a Cutting pickets for to put Round the Entrenchments at night went 27 of us went to put them up 9 to a battery

friday 16 finish'd pickiting the batterys they handed

Morters & provision & Cannon —

Saterday 17 Was to work on the battery Some of our people was was took sick

Sunday 18 was a building a house for our Sick to live in that was taken their is Many more took Sick to day

Monday 19 I was taken in the morning with a Violent pain in my head and held all Day & Night

teusday 20 My pain held Extreem bad Lye very cold Wedndy 21 I took a Vomit in Morning & workt well I broke out verry thick with the small pox It is verry thick & foggy & I Lay in an open tent in ye afternoon Mov'd in to a house that was built for ye sick had a Cradle for Will Knap & My Self 3 feet wide full of pain

thirsday 22 Brake out more & more very Restless &

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friday 23 kept breaking out was not so full of pain Lye Esey

Saterday 24 the pock fill'd out gite full & was verry

Sunday 25 the pock was fill'd well I was Eysey but very Sore

Monday 26 ye pock began to turn & I was verry Sore & Restles

teusday 27 the pock kept turning & I grew verry Sore ye pock began to Dry

Wednesd

Wednesd 28 the pock was full & Dry'd away Quite fast I felt well & very hungary took Some Salts —

thirsday 29 felt very weil & got up & Sot all day in house

friday 30 felt well I got up & went out Doors & walk about went to see Uncle paul Gerrish

Saterday July 1 I took Phissick and it work't very well

Sunday 2 walk'd abroad felt very well -

Monday 3 a Cold wind Kept house most of ye day felt well

teusday 4 a fine day walkd abroad all day felt well

Wednesday 5 wet & Rainey kept house forenoon afternoon went out

thirsday 6 fair weather took Phisick workt well talkt with James Lenix

friday 7 fair weather felt verry well Grew better

Saterday & fine weather was verry well a Man of war Came in a 70 Gun Ship at night the french Came out upon on our working party that was a trenching and they fought they kil'd took & wounded Near a hundred but we Got the better of them we took one Officer he was wounded

Sunday 9 there was 2 Prizes Came in both brigs the french beat a Parly to bury there Dead

Monday 10 they were a Landing of Cannon out of ye Men of War

teusday 11 Capt folinsbury Came in Receiv'd a Letter Capt took Physick to day Huesa Sail'd

Wednesday 12 is very foul Weather our house was verry Leaky was very uncumfortable Last Monday there was a Carter a going to ye Lite house & jist before night there was an Indian took him & Carried him away & kept him till Wednesday towards night one of them went to a brook with him to drink & he Gave them the Slip & Got of Clear he was with a Party of 200 french & Indians & they said there was a Large party of french Indians further

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back he said he understood by them that they would have kild him In About 2 hours —

thirsday 13 there was five frenchmen Deserted from the Island Battery In a boat & they Said we had Dismounted 4 of there Cannon at ye Island battery & that they would Deliver up ye City as soon as our Ships does go in

friday 14 is fair Weather the french are very Eyse fir'd & but a little

Saterday 15 there was a french Sargent Came out for a Spy & our people took him & brought him in in ye afternoon went up to ye Cove Were folinburys Scooner Lye & Receiv'd one pot of Butter W: Knap 2 Cheese J: Rolfe 2 fowl J: Noyes there is 7 Ships Came in to day from Hallifax

Sunday 16 Our Rangers Brought one Indian a prisoner that they took Last night there was a french frigate Stole out of ye harbour & got out by all our Ships it was thought she had much Riches on board Early in ye Morning Admiral hardy with all his Ships that lye a Crost ye harbour Come to Sail & went after her before night there was six of Boscowins fleet went Down were hardy Lye

Monday 17 Last night our People took a trench Close to ye Wall with ye Loss of five men & several wounded

teusday 18 there was an Officer of the train kil'd with a Shell at his tent Door his name was Childs

Wednesday 19 there was an Officer & 8 men kil'd at wolfs battery

thirsday 20 in the afternoon went to Lye a Platform for a battery of 8 guns & there was kil'd 2 men & 4 wounded wilst we was there at Night there was Several more kil'd & wouned a Large Number

friday 21 General Wolf hove a Shell on board one of ye Men of war & blew her up & Ketcht on fire & she Ketcht 2 more on fire & they were burnt Down by night there was but 2 ships Left in ye harbour & there was 12 or 14 when we Came in

Saterday

Saterday 22 the Citydel & Mass house were ketcht on fire by a Shell & burnt to ye Ground

Sunday 23 was a very hot & Constant fire from us the french Kill several of our men to day Last night we hove near 200 Shells

Monday 24 there was in the Morning the Other Barack Ketcht on fire & burnt down there was several Deserters Came in to day the City Looks very Naked there was a number of Catriges Ketcht on fire in the trench which blew up & wounded a number of men in ye afternoon I went to work at ye Hospital

teusday 25 this day went to work at ye Hospital there was a Deserter Came in to day & Gave an Account that ye wemen & Children are Come out into the trench & Some gone to ye Black Rock there is Several Came in to ye hospital that is wounded to day

Wednesday 26 Last night there was a number of men of war men got boats and went and boarded the 2 Ships that Lye in ye harbour one Ship they toed up ye harbour & ye other Ship which was ye Commodores Ketcht a ground so that they Could not get her of & they Ketcht her on fire & she burnt down in ye forenoon there was a flag of truce Came out & Sot with our Officers & About Eight at night they agreed to Our terms & at nine a Clock our people went in & took possession of ye town—

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thirsday 27 this morning there was three Companys of Granideers Draw'd up & went Close to ye town & about Eleven of ye Clock they marcht in ye first Comp that went in is ye Royal Scots ye 2 is hopsons ye 3 was General Amihust at twelve a Clock ye English Coulers were hoisted the Wagons Came down to Carry away ye the baggage and all ye afternoon they were a hauling away Guns & other Stuff the Centrys were Sot all around ye City that there Should Nothing be Caried out but what was Caried into the Kings Store

friday 28 this day we were Opening more Stores The french

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per of men ne 2 Ships ye harbour Ketcht a ney Ketcht oon there ur Officers terms & at ssion of ye

ompanys of on & about that went as General ulers were vay ye the dling away around ye t but what

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french were Cleaning & packing up their things that was allow'd them to Carry of —

Saterday 29 this Day we Buried John Meserve the Coll Son he died Last night Admiral Hardy Came to Sail & went in with his Squadren in to the harbur of Capebriton in ye afternoon Boscowins Squadren Came down to ye harber & Some Ships went in —

Sunday 30 Went to work at ye City a getting down ye west Gate & a building a bridge at ye west gate—yesterday I put a gun on board of one Mohard Sloop to carry home & I went round in ye City to View it & there was hardly a house but what had a shot

Monday 31 was to work on the bridge our Soldiers are at work a mending of ye Rodes & mending of the walls were our Cannon had broke them

teusday August ye 1 General wolf went in to ye City & he was Saluted with about 20 Canon no work to do to Day walk about ye City Nothing more New to day

Wednesday August ye 2 this Day is to work in ye City

thirsday August 3 this Day is to work in ye City in ye Evening John Alcock Cloths & things were sold at Vandue I bought a book gave 1s / 6d for it it was Mr Vincents Explanation of the Catichism

Friday 4 Was to Work in ye City

Saterday 5 this day one Johnson of the Royal Americans was Ketcht in ye Camps after he had Stole a watch & money & other things & after he saw that he was Ketcht he wanted to Clear himself & so Came to Were we Liv'd with a file of Men & took Humphra Atkison & Benja Sweatt & swore they were Confederate with him & they were Carried & tried by a Court Martial & found Innocent & was Kept till Sunday & then was Clear & Johnson had sentance past for to be hanged till he was Dead Dead

Sunday 6 this day our Canon were hawld in to ye City the General Sent Orders for 13 of our Compns Should be Ready Ready to morow Morning to go to Spanish River to Get timber & Plank

Monday 7 August 1758 13 of us went on bord Capt Wadleys Brig we had 100 Soldiers on bord there was 3 brigs

& one Ship went

Teusday 8 this day we Sot Sail in ye Morning for Spanish River is very Squally and Rainy all Day about 2 oth Clock we Came up with a Sloop that was taken from Capt Carril of Boston Last March & kept him prisoner till we took ye place & the Admiral Gave him Orders to take her were ever he found her he came with us to find her & as soon as we came up with her he went on board & took Possesion of her & Steer'd away for Louisburg this day Johnson was the thief was hanged—

Wednesday august 9th 1758 it being Calm Last night we got but Little a head at 5 oth Clock this Morning the wind Break'd we got to ye mouth of the River at 9 a Clock the River Lye NEBN & SW & by S the wind was Right a head it took all day to beat up att Sun Set we got up &

Come to anchor

thirsday 10 this day we went up the River four Miles to find timber & there is much timber & a Vast Quantity of Cordwood—

friday 11th this day we were up & fetcht Down two or three Rafts of timber & plank & Carried it along Side of the Catt

Saterday ye 12 this day went about 8 miles up the River for timber & brought Down two Rafts of timber & Some thousands of Boards & Plank—

Sunday 13 this day went we went & put the Stuff into a Ship that Came us for the timber —

Munday 14th this day we Rafted more plank & put them on board the Ship —

teusday 15th this Day the troops were on board we Sot Sail & Came Down the River & went up another Branch & got 1600 more pine Blank at one place

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Wednesday

Wednesday 16th this Day we Sot Sail for Louisburgh the wind to ye Eastward all Day —

thirsday 17th August 1758 Last Night about 9 th Clock the wind blew heard & Rain'd So we Stood of to Sea the Rest of the Night in the morning we put about & Stood in for the Land & at Sunsett we got into Spanish River again & came to anker Sam Barnet had a Sham fitt

friday 18 this Day wether Being good we Sail'd again we got down to the mouth of the Harber then it Came Calm and we came to an Anker & Lay till Evening then Come to Sail again

Saterday 19th we Run About Eight Leagus Last Night this Morning the wind Dy'd away & we Came to Anchor again. Lye till Noon then Came to Sail again with a good Breze of wind—

Sunday 20th this Morning we got in to Louisburg & Came too about Seven of the Clock in ye Morning & at noon we were Landed & our people were mov'd in to the City

Monday August 21 this Day we all went to work a Mending houses

Teusday 22 this Day is to work on ye houses Wednesday 23 this Day to work mending houses

Thisday 24 this Day to work on houses friday 25 this day to work on ye houses

Saterday August ye 26 1758 this day to work on ye hospital

Sunday 27 This day to work on ye hospital -

Wedndy 30 this Day to work Mending houses Receiv'd 4 Letters to Day & the things that was Mention'd in the Letter that my father Sent there was Some men of war Sail'd today with transports & General Ammihurst Receiv'd 20 Dollars for wages—

teusday ye 5 our men was Divided in to 5 parts to work in 5 parts of the town

Wednesday 6 this day to work mending houses thisisday September ye 7th 1758 this day to work on ye houses

friday ye 8 This Day to work on a Sloop of ye Comisarys thomas Parsons went on bord to go home & our Docter Cutter & Mr King went on board ye Same Ship Capt Appilton—

Saterday yo 9 this day to work on ye Commisary Sloop Sunday September ye 10 this Day a Graving ye Sloop Monday ye 11 foul Weather Nothing Remarkable teusday ye 12 Work on ye Sloop Col Kingsbury Made a Present of one barril of apples to our men of newbury

Wednesday 13 this Day to work on ye houses there is Some Men of war Sail'd for hallifax

thirsday 14 this Day there is the Sail of men of war & transports Sail'd for Saint Jons

friday 15 this Day to work a Mending houses & we mov'd into another house Close up to the west Gate yesterday Benja Labre Join'd our Compny & to Day he went to work with us—

Saterday 16 this Day to work on the Barrucks Sunday 17 this Day to work on the Barrucks

Monday September 18 1758 this Day to work mending the Barrucks

Teusday 19 this Day a Mending the french hospital & the frenchmen Dyed very fast they Dye 8 or 10 in a day —

thirsday 21 this Day to work on the Barrucks friday 22 this Day to work on ye Barrucks

Saturday 23 this Day Part of ye fleet that went with Admiral Hardy Came in & Said they had Destroy'd at ye Island of Gasby all their Churches & Mass houses & they Said their was a Great Quanty of fish & they brought home what they Could & they burnt & Destroyed all ye Rest there was some quantity of Bever the french Pilot Deserted & they were afraid to Stay there Long —

Sunday 24 fair Weather Nothing More Remarkable moses Rolfe Came in along with Capt write had 3 letters one cheese

Monday 25 this Day Work on a house for ye Kings Cooper

Teusday 26 this Day to work ye Coopers house

Wednesd September 27 1758 this Day four of us went to mend a Store for ye Admiral

thirsday 28 this day to work on Said Store it is very Squawlly & Cold Mornings & Evenings -

friday 29 this day to work on Said Store Admiral Hardy with his flleet Came up to ye harbours mouth

Satiday 30 this Day to work on ye Store

Sunday October 1st 1758 this Day Admiral Boscowin & Admiral Hardy with 5 Sail of ye Line Sail'd for England

Monday October ye 2 this Day to work on Stores tewsday ye 3 to Day to work on Admiral Stores

Wednesday ye 4 — thirsday 5 friday ye 6 & Saterday ye 7 have been to work on a Store for ye Admirals Stores Jacob Rolf Sail'd with Capt furlong for home & Caried 10 Dollars for me

Sunday ye 8 this day we were ordered not to work there was a Lieutenant of ye Rangers was a fireing at a mark & Shot a young man that belonged to Lunenburg

Monday October ye 9 1758 — this Day to work on ye Stores & there was a Master Carpenter Came to me for ye Navy —

Tewsday ye 10 Nothing Remarkable we all went to

get Monay
