# The Royal British Colonial Society of Artists

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## Introduction.

In the year 1886, on the invitation of a number of residents in Melbourne, Victoria, an important collection of pictures, sent from England by Sir Coutts Lindsay, was exhibited in that city under the management of Lord Buckinghamshire.

The success attending this venture led to the formation of a new Association, under the name of the Anglo-Australian Society of Artists.

Early in 1889, H. R. H. Princess Louise, Marchioness of Lorne (now Duchess of Argyll), joined the Society as honorary member, and in the April of that year, its first exhibition was officially opened by His Excellency Earl Carrington, then Governor of New South Wales, in the National Gallery, Sydney.

As the Catalogue of that Exhibition states, this Society was formed "for the purpose of affording the Australian public the opportunity of becoming acquainted with contemporary English Art, and for the furtherance, culture and promotion of the Fine Arts in the Australian Colonies."

The desirability of continuing annually exhibitions of such educational value was realized, not only by the citizens of Sydney, but by those of Melbourne and Adelaide, and a substantial guarantee fund was raised, with the view of holding an exhibition in each of these cities in the immediate future.

At the close of the same year, Her Majesty the late Queen Victoria, gave the Society the title and style of Royal, and early in the ensuing year, Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, now Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, graciously associated herself with the Society as an honorary member.

The late Lord Leighton, P.R.A., and Mr. G. F. Watts, R.A., were among the first exhibiting members, and to the cordial help and encouragement of the former, the Society owes much of its initial success. The roll of members at this stage, moreover, headed by the names of Sir J. E. Millais, Bart., P.R.A., and Mr. J. McNeil Whistler, demonstrates that the Society, even in its infancy, was thoroughly representative in what was foremost and best in British Art of that period.

In the year 1904, the Society, in response to the sympathy and interest extended to it from other parts of the Empire, changed its title, by the authorization of the King, to that of the Royal British Colonial Society of Artists, in order to express the enlargement of its sphere of operations.

The Right Hon. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, G.C.M.G., LL.D., showed his sympathy with the movement by becoming at this time the Hon. President of the Society.

On the 31st of August, 1909, His Majesty the King was graciously pleased to grant to the Society a charter, with diploma to its members and associates. In this Royal Charter it is set forth that "the objects of the Society are the uniting in one body Artists of the Empire for the advancement of the Arts of Painting, Sculpture, Etching, Engraving, Decoration and Architecture, and generally the encouragement of those Arts throughout the Dominions

beyond the seas, and of bringing the Arts of the Dominions, States and Colonies under the notice of our subjects resident within the United Kingdom."


It will thus be seen that the mission of the Royal British Colonial Society of Artists is of Imperial importance.

It is intended that the Exhibitions held in the chief cities throughout the Empire shall afford an opportunity for the public to become acquainted personally with all the phases of modern British Art, and that the earnest endeavor of the student should find encouragement and a means of development by coming into direct contact with the various schools of thought and expression in Art.

It is hoped that in time the unbroken continuity of these Exhibitions may be secured by the promotion of a permanent maintenance fund, such as some of the great societies artistic and scientific already enjoy.

It is the desire of the Society that branches be established in each of the great art centres throughout the Empire, the members of which will hold the Society's diploma, and from time to time it is intended that important Exhibitions of the collective work of the Empire be held in the Mother Country. It will thus be seen that the establishment of these Exhibitions throughout His Majesty's dominions forges one link more in the great Imperial chain which binds together the Mother Country and her children beyond the seas.

In furtherance of their laudable object, this Society and the Council of the Art Association have together organized the present Exhibition, which, in their opinion, comprises examples of the latest work of representative artists of the English school, which they hope will give our citizens an excellent idea of the trend of Modern British Art.
