



Here is a company that is given the right to operate a valuable franchise for thirty years and without paying a dollar for the privilege actually claiming, on the strength of opinions from "the most eminent counsel in the City of Toronto," that it is entitled to receive the full value of the franchise, irrespective of its expiry, and in addition "good-will" and in addition the value of its "assets" on the basis of its earning power. One wenders how many "good-wills" Sir Henry Pellatt expects the city to pay for. The World has shown repeatedly what the British practice is, and that under it no electric company gets more at the expiry of its franchise than the value of that portion of its tangible assets which is suitable for the purposes of the undertaking and without any allowance for "good-will" or compulsory purchase or profits which might have been made. 
