HER MAJESTY'S SPEECH, At the Opening of Parliament, February 7.

"My Lords and Gentlemen, I rejoice that I am enabled on again meeting you in Parliament to congratulate you on the improved condition of the country...

"I continue to receive from all Foreign Powers and States assurances of their friendly disposition. I have had much satisfaction in receiving at my court the Sovereigns who, in the course of the last year, have visited Great Britain...

"I regard the maintenance of this good understanding as essential to the best interests of both, and I am anxious to see the sentiments so cordially expressed by all classes of my subjects on the occasion of His Majesty's visit were entirely in unison with my own...

"I have carried into effect, in the spirit in which I was desirous to do so, a more effectual application of charitable Donations and Bequests. I recommend to your favourable consideration the policy of improving and extending the opportunities for aculeated education in Ireland...

"The act which was passed at that time for imposing a tax upon income will shortly expire. It will be for you in your wisdom to determine whether it may not be expedient to continue its operation for a further period, and thus to obtain the benefit of a more equitably proceeding for the public service, and at the same time of making a reduction in other taxation...

"Whenever may be the result of your deliberations in this respect, I am assured that you will be fully determined to maintain an amount of revenue amply sufficient to meet the necessary expenditure of the country, and finally to uphold a credit which is indispensable to the national welfare...

"I never recollect an opening of Parliament, either by our present gracious Sovereign, or by any of her royal predecessors, marked by so much popularity as that which distinguished the proceedings of Tuesday, All London literally out of doors, and the Queen was loudly and frequently cheered in her progress to the House...

"I have never encountered such a sweet smiling as yours in all my life. The English ladies surely use perfume to an extent beyond all others. To give me a description of the House of Peers, as the presence of the Queen might do very well for it, therefore I will enter upon old descriptions on the present occasion...

The solemn address to the Supreme Being, in the presence of His Majesty, was read with a simplicity and grandeur, as a customary, was pronounced with deep fervour.
