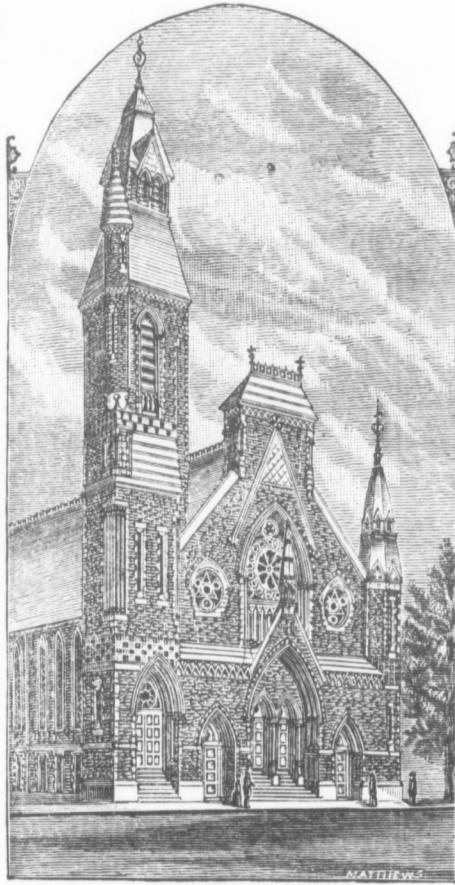
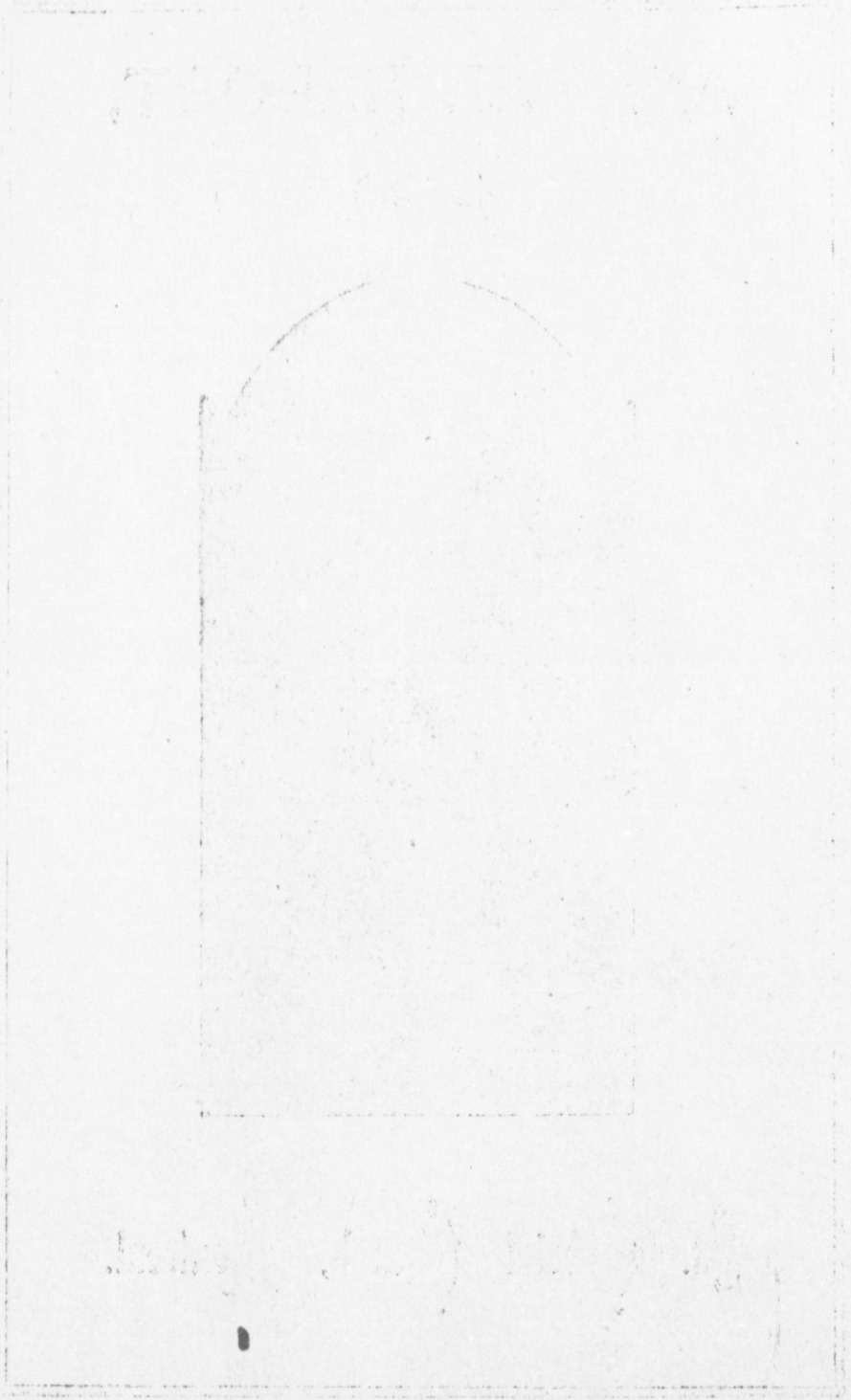

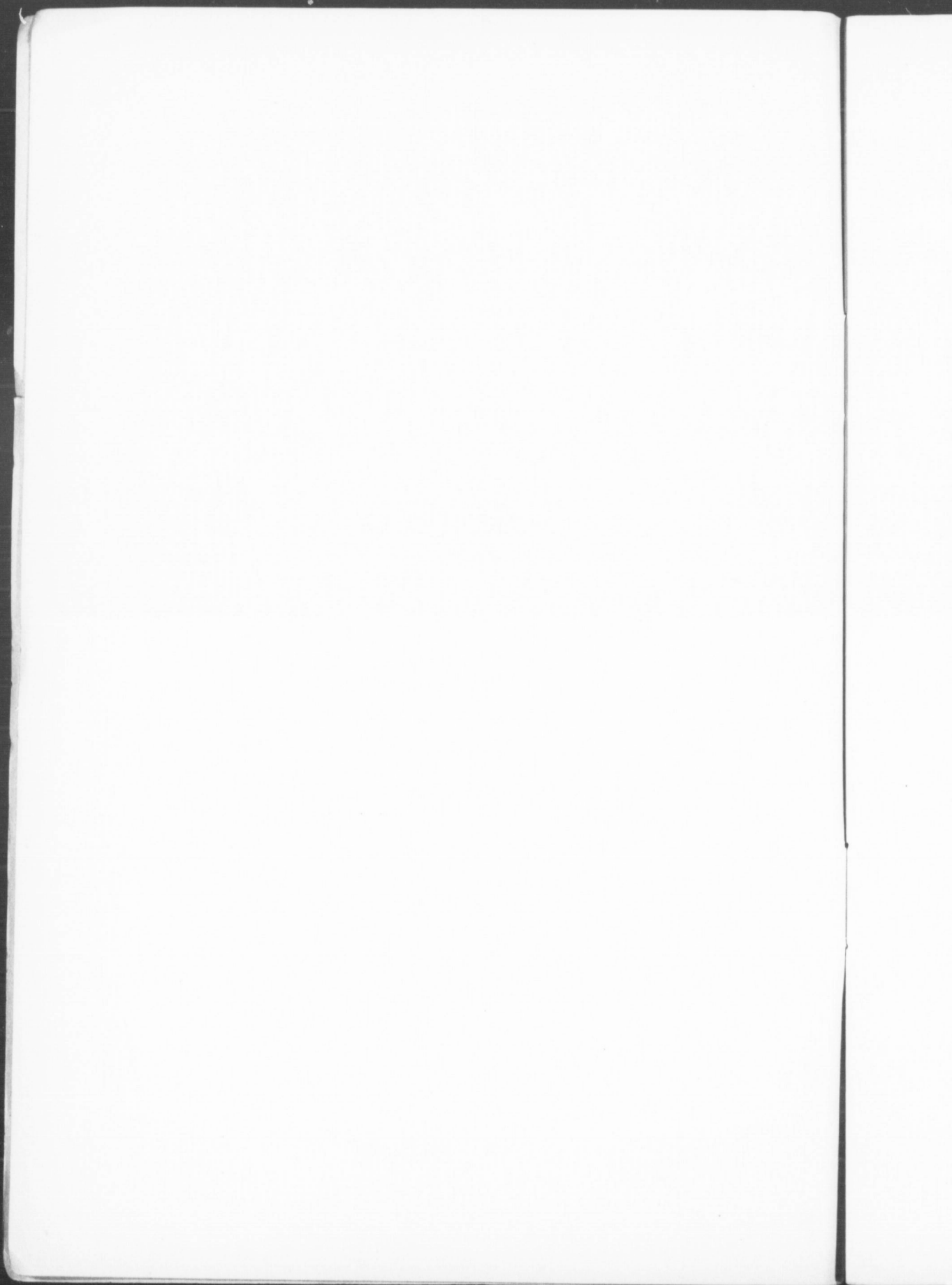

PASTORAL WORDS
TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. GABRIEL
CHURCH.

MY DEAR BRETHREN,

In preparing a word or two introductory to the Annual Report of our Church, I gladly avail myself of the opportunity of offering you a few exhortations and suggestions.

First, let us thank God for the mercies of the year 1890. It brought sorrow to many a home indeed, as the *In Memoriam* column strikingly shows ; but our Heavenly Father mingled much that was sweet in the bitterest cup any of us had to drink. In spite of the prevalence of sickness, and of the hard times accompanying financial stringency, as a community we enjoyed a large share of prosperity. Personally the year will be memorable to me because of the long and refreshing holiday it gave me, through your kindness, in affording me the opportunity, with some members of my family, of visiting the land of my fathers ; and this favour I should probably not have enjoyed, but for the previous somewhat prolonged indisposition which was the occasion of it.

The Financial Statement of the Trustees is suggestive. Four years have now elapsed since we took possession of our beautiful and comfortable new church, and the experience of that period affords a criterion of the probable future success of the venture made in the purchase of the property and removal to it in 1886. A review of those four years, it will be gratefully conceded on all hands, has nothing to teach us but what is encouraging. There has been steady growth and improvement all along the line. The Sabbath attendance, especially in the evening, has greatly increased,—the Sabbath School and Bible Class have been doubled, and, as they are the feeders of the church, they guarantee a strong future for the congregation,—the Young People's Association has proved itself an institution of great vigor and capacity, such as it did not dream of becoming in the old church, and now that it is supplemented by the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour, together they possess possibilities for good which, wisely employed, make failure in any cause that they enlist in, out of the question,—the several Ladies' Associations have added in our new sphere to even that reputation which they had made for themselves the previous twenty years, for zeal and efficiency, proving still the right arm of the service, in all work for the Lord among us,—yea, in every department of our congregation, whose organization is so thorough in its

completeness, a glance backwards for four years shows encouraging progress.

Some apprehension was felt in 1886 by the cautious and timid among us, lest the financial responsibilities to be met in the new church should prove too formidable for our people. But the results of the past four years have even in this respect been on the whole gratifying. Without any very great effort, such as most congregations throughout Canada have had to make in like circumstances, without demanding any considerable sacrifices on the part of our adherents, both the ordinary running expenses of the church and the interest of the debt have been provided for,—at least the shortage has not amounted to much. More revenue might easily have been raised, quite enough to satisfy every obligation from year to year, provided all our people had done their duty,—done what they could easily have done by a little forethought and management,—as many did theirs. Perhaps sufficient efforts were not used, or pressure brought to bear upon them, so that a larger number of families, obtaining religious privileges among us, are not known as contributors to ordinances in the Treasurer's books, than will be found probably in any Presbyterian church in the city. A distribution of the work among the Trustees, whose chief duty it is to devise ways and means of providing an adequate revenue, and take the necessary means to secure that end, would doubtless help to remedy this faulty state of matters. If each of them would take the oversight of a district of the congregation, and make it his business to confer with the adherents of the church within that district, as to the needs of the church, and as to what each could do towards providing for those needs, as well as to the best method of doing so effectually,—the few hundred dollars a year required, according to the showing of the accompanying financial statement, to meet all our obligations, I have no hesitation in saying, would be easily raised. When those that are not known as contributors have first been conferred with, and their cooperation secured,—then the balance needed, over and above, will be taken up and distributed readily among those who are doing their part in a praiseworthy manner, but who will increase their givings by the small advance required to put our finances on a satisfactory footing. Even then, we shall not be under the strain that nine out of every ten congregations in Canada are conscious of, from year to year.

Dear brethren, I anew invoke your hearty cooperation in the work of our church. Look upon it as God's chief agency for furthering the cause of truth and righteousness among us. You are copartners in the concern. You do not take in more than half of what is implied in church connection, when you think only of your own pleasure or even profit, as a reason for church attendance and support. Our church is a witness for the truth in the city. It is thereby the providence of God, as it has been for upwards of a century. Is it needed? Is it

doing good work now? Is it in a situation to continue to do good work in the near future? Has it not special claims on the loyalty and confidence and affection of all its families? These questions will all be answered in the affirmative. It is your church, and it is in connection with it you are able to do most good; and doing good should be your uppermost thought, in this connection,—taking precedence even of the thought of getting good, about which of course I have delicacy in speaking. There are many denominations in the city, and many congregations belonging to our own denomination to which you might be tempted to stray occasionally, perhaps often. If you remember that you are partners in St. Gabriel's, and that God will call you to account for the manner in which you have acquitted yourselves of your obligations as such,—this sense of duty will incline you to give up your whole heart to the work of promoting the interests of our church. Whereas, if you divide your interest with others, the same result will follow as would be seen, if you neglected the concern in which you are a partner, and spent much of your time and means in promoting the business, it may be of a rival house. Consider yourselves then as called of God to work for St. Gabriel's, as the channel through which your religious influence is to be exerted in the community.

The Lord bless you and keep you all,—the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious unto you,—the Lord lift up His countenance upon you, and give you peace.

From Amherst St. included, Eastwards, including Hochelaga, to Maisonneuve Village.

DISTRICT NO. III—MATTHEW HODGE, *Elder.*

From St. Lawrence St., east to Amherst St., north to Sherbrooke St.

DISTRICT NO. IV—P. M. MACTAVISH, *Elder.*

From Sherbrooke Street included, northwards to city limits, and from east side of St. Lawrence Street, included, eastwards to city limits.

DISTRICT, No. V—JAMES ROBERTSON, *Elder.*

From St. Lawrence Street, to Mance Street, included, and from Dorchester Street, northwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. VI—THOMAS GRAHAM, *Elder.*

From St. Lawrence Street to Bleury Street, both included, and from Craig Street to Dorchester Street, included.

DISTRICT NO. VII—WILLIAM DARLING, *Elder.*

From Mance Street, excluded, to University Street, and from Craig and St. Antoine Sts. northwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. VIII—ROBERT STEWART, *Elder.*

From St. Antoine Street, north to city limits, and from University Street, excluded, westwards to city limits.

DISTRICT NO. IX—J. M. FARQUHAR, *Elder.*

From Dalhousie Square, westwards, to city limits, and from Craig and St. Antoine Streets southwards to the River.

TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES
OF ST. GABRIEL CHURCH.

For the year ending 31st December 1890.

The Treasurer's Statement the details of which will be laid before the Congregation, shows that the receipts from ordinary sources of revenue have not varied much from those of the two previous years, the figures being as follows :

The arrears on Weekly Offerings for the year amount to \$124.00.

With respect to the arrears of about \$400.00 existing before that, your Trustees regret to have to report that, only a very small portion has come in.

Though the Weekly Offerings have kept about the same amount as before, there is a falling off in the Ordinary Collections, amounting to \$133.00 less than what was contributed under that head in the previous year. There was no doubt a good deal of inclement weather which at times had an effect on the attendance, and helped to account for this, but it is respectfully submitted that this might be remembered and remedied on the following Sundays.

That no increase should appear in the total of the Weekly Offerings for these three years is a matter of surprise and anxiety, as even with great care and economy, or even retrenchment the revenue had been made sufficient to meet all obligations, such a statement would only indicate that progress was not being made ; but as the expenses have been growing during the last year or two, and there are likely to be several demands on the finances during the year now entered upon, some special effort must be made to bring the receipts at least up to the weekly average as estimated to be necessary for the creditable maintenance of ordinances, when the Congregation took possession of this Church, which average has never yet been reached. This estimate which was on a very modest scale after all, was based on the supposition that all would contribute fairly and conscientiously, and if it had been reached and fully maintained from the first, there might not indeed be a large balance on hand, but the revenue would have met all ordinary expenses.

In addition to what is required to pay off what we have fallen behind on the year just closed something remains unpaid from the previous year which it was hoped would have been cleared off this year, and there is some expense connected with repairs seriously affecting the safety of the Church Building which your Trustees dared not neglect.

Your Trustees regret the necessity of calling attention at this time to the difficulty experienced by them in getting contributors to comply with the repeated requests of the Board to fill in the printed forms circulated in the Church, in order that their names might be enrolled in the Treasurer's books, as without such registration it is plain no estimate of probable revenue can be arrived at.

The amount needed for the year can generally be pretty accurately determined, and it must be admitted to be far from extravagant, the items when fairly considered bearing evidence of a rigid economy; but a voluntary system for raising the means of meeting these expenses, under which the management must wait until the close of the year to find out how much revenue they are to get is manifestly absurd, and would tend to discredit the voluntary method which has so much to recommend it, and be almost a confession that the weekly offering was a failure.

It is because your Trustees are not prepared to acknowledge this and recommend a return to the former plan of collecting pew rents, that they have continued to insist that the Treasurer should have on his books the name of every member or adherent with the amount he or she decides upon and promises to pay weekly for each current year. With that before them the Board would then be in an intelligent position as to revenue, should any desirable improvement present itself, or an appeal be made for help to increase the efficiency of any department of church work.

Any help that the congregation can give to their Treasurer in the task imposed upon him of keeping account of the finances, should be cheerfully afforded.

Your Trustees desire that the congregation should at this time advise with them on this matter.

Your Trustees do not pretend to dictate to the people as to the manner of their giving for the support of Ordinances, but the Weekly Offering system having been adopted by the Church with freedom of choice to such as preferred the old method, it became the duty of the management to use all diligence in carrying out the wishes of the people in a manner that would best promote the interests of the Church. Deplorable and unseemly disputes have arisen over arrears, and it is feared are likely to continue so long as full information of the intentions of contributors is withheld, as has been done in many instances.

It is intended to give another opportunity to comply with the regulations by again circulating the printed forms among the contributors who have not yet filled them up, though none need wait for that as the forms can be had at any time on application to the Treasurer.

Last year your Trustees were notified by letter dated 18th March, 1890, from the Executors of the last Will and Testament of Dame Sarah Jane Wilson, deceased, widow of the late William Faris, that on the death of a brother and two sisters the estate will be divided and one third of the same be a bequest to St. Gabriel Presbyterian Church, for missionary purposes.

Mr. McNaughton, with his usual liberality and thoughtfulness procured a copy of the will, which is now in the hands of the Board.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION
OF ST. GABRIEL CHURCH,
January 14th, 1891.

The Annual Meeting of the St. Gabriel Church in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws, was held in the Lecture Room, on the evening of Wednesday, January 14th, 1891.

On motion the Rev. Dr. Campbell, was called on to preside, and Robert Stewart, Jr., to act as Secretary.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by the chairman.

Minutes of last Annual Meeting were then read and confirmed.

The Report of the Trustees for the past year, the Treasurer's Statement of Accounts, Receipts and Disbursements, and the Report of the Purchase and Interest Fund, all duly audited, were presented and read.

Moved by Mr. Andrew Cunningham, seconded by Mr. John Loughhead.

"That the Reports now read be received, adopted and printed for the information of the Congregation." Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. A. Stuart, seconded by Mr. John Robb.

"That this Congregation recognizes with gratitude the many favors shown to it from Heaven during the year 1890; and while bowing before the Lord who has visited so many of our homes with sorrow during the year, we feel all the trials of life to be calls on us to increased zeal and faithfulness in our work for the year to come." Carried.

It was now moved by Mr. Andrew McAllister, seconded by Mr. R. Brophy.

"That the faithful and diligent services of the Ladies' Aid Society, both by ministrations towards those in need and by visiting the sick, merit the warm esteem of the congregation, and the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society and Lady Visitors." Carried.

Moved by Mr. P. M. MacTavish, seconded by Mr. John Hood.

"That the Congregation record their appreciation of the arduous duties devolving upon the Treasurer and the Secretary, and the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to the Treasurer, Mr. Wm. Foulis, and the Secretary, Mr. Wm. Reed, for the efficient and faithful manner in which they have performed the important duties of their respective offices." Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. R. Stewart, Jr., seconded by Mr. John Henderson.

"That the Congregation continues to view with much approbation the untiring zeal of the members of the Choir, in leading the services of praise in this Church, and the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to Mr. J. R. Bain and the other Members of the Choir, for the efficient manner in which they have performed their duties during the past year." Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. James Harper, seconded by Mr. Wm. Darling.

"That as the Sabbath School is a most important factor in instructing the children in knowledge and attachment to the Church, that the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to the staff of teachers, and also request the Board of Trustees to make provision for the proper maintainance of the Sabbath School during the year." Carried.

Moved by Mr. James Henry, seconded by Mr. H. Irwin.

"That in accordance with Article III of the Bye-Laws, the following be elected members of the Board of Trustees, to fill the vacancies occurring at the time, viz :— Messrs. Archibald Watt, Archibald McNaughton, Charles Byrd and Wm. Reed." Carried.

Moved by Mr. John Loughead, seconded by Mr. Andrew Cunningham.

"That as three years have now elapsed since the inauguration of the Building and Interest Fund, and as many persons wished to see how the plan of subscription would succeed, the Congregation renews its approval of the said Fund and hereby authorizes a vigorous and complete canvass, to be conducted as early as possible, and that the following be members of the Committee, viz :—Messrs. Archibald McNaughton, John MacTavish, Wm. Foulis, J. M. Farquhar, Charles Byrd, Wm. Darling, John A. Stuart, P. M. MacTavish, Robert Stewart, Jr., James Harper, James Henry, Andrew McAllister, Jr. and Wm. Clelland, Jr." Carried.

It was now moved by Mr. Andrew McAllister, seconded by Mr. J. C. S. Bennett.

"That Messrs. Robert McCulloch and John Loughead, be re-elected Auditors for the ensuing year." Carried.

Refreshments were served by the Ladies during an intermission the earlier part of the proceedings, which added in no small measure to the enjoyment of the evening. After a vote of thanks had been tendered the Rev. Dr. Campbell, for the efficient manner in which he had presided, the meeting closed with the Benediction.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT.

The Annual Festival was held on the usual day, the third Friday in January, and was the most successful in the history of the School.

The reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer, submitted to the meeting, were received and adopted. From them a few facts are culled.

The total number on the roll in 1890 was 321. The number on the roll 31st December was 289, an increase of 21 over the previous year. Average attendance during the year 167. The total staff in 1890 was 30,—average attendance 25. The Library contains 445 volumes, but new books need to be added to keep up the interest of the scholars. The school grew so that part of the Ladies' Parlor has had to be appropriated to provide sufficient room. Two deaths occurred among the scholars, that of Sarah Bickerstaff in January, and that of Peter McDowall in December. Miss Robertson and Miss Cunningham had resigned their classes during the year, and their places were taken by Messrs. West and Dewar. Mr. T. H. Blair also tendered his resignation, which the staff accepted, after assurance that it was final, with a recorded expression of their deep appreciation of the zeal and fidelity he had shown during the period of his tenure of the office. Mr. A. McNaughton's prize for constant attendance was awarded to the

following scholars : Susan Stuart, Lily Walker, Edward Bickerstaff, and William Walker.

The Mission Funds were distributed by a vote of the school, among the following objects :

To Pointe aux Trembles, for the education of a pupil, \$50,—to Home Mission Fund \$20,—to Foreign Mission Fund \$25,—to the Sustentation Fund \$18,—and to the Trustees to further City Mission work, the balance of \$55.70.
