ONDON, May 27.—The effect of the continued coal strike upon the industries of the country is becoming so grave, and the general commercial outlook so black, that the greatest pressure is being brought to bear upon Premier Baldwin to ignore the attitude of both the mine owners and the leaders of the striking miners and take drastic action to enforce peace.

It is understood that the cabinet is now considering various plans submitted by leading industrialists and others for the settlement of the difficulty.

The crumpet is laid in a biscuit pan, browned side down, and upon the unbrowned side we place as many chunks of American cheese as it will hold. Over the top is laid a strip of thinly sliced bacon. Put in the oven with the top burner to broil the bacon and toast the cheese and crumpet. Usually requires about eight or ten minutes to cook.

Pineapple Salad—One-quarter pound endive, six slices pineapple, Mexican salad dressing. On individual plates place the endive, which has been allowed to stand in cold water for ten minutes. On each bed of endive put a slice of the pineapple, and over all a tablespoon of the salad dressing.




