



#### A GARDEN SUBURB

An intersting experiment in develop-ing a garden suburb is being carried out that their counsel should heeded by the legislature. The withdrawal of Huerta from Mexton the Masachusetts Homestead Commission, its purpose being to provide workingmen's homes at moderate cost, with due regard to site planning, a limited number of house per acre, a limited dividend, and participation by the residents—or, in other words, co-operation. The site selected is at North Billerica, twenty-seven miles from Boston. Here the Boston & Maine Railiway established its repair shope this year, and will ultimately add ten thousand or more to the projuction of the town. Twenty-one thousand dollars has been raised in mortgages, and land valued at 86,000 has been turned over for stock, while several thousands of dollars of the co-operative banks of Masachusetts can be made of great assistance, as they will loan up to dighty per cent of the value of the property. Mr. Arthur C. Comey, who is a member of the Commission, has written the following description of the project which will be of special interest as an illustration of one of the methods adopted to provide workingmen's homes, adapting the English garden suburb idea to American conditions:—
