

London, Nov. 11—James Gilchrist, superintendent of immigration in New Brunswick, arrived last week and proceeded at once to Cambridge, one of the best districts in England from the viewpoint of his special work.

He is now in Scotland, and will in turn visit the principal agricultural counties in England. He will return to St. John in December and will take a party of settlers with him. Great efforts have been made recently by the representative of New Brunswick to extend a knowledge of the opportunities in his province, and these efforts have been made with a considerable measure of success, largely due to the fact that the reports from British people settled within the province during the last few years have been most satisfactory.
