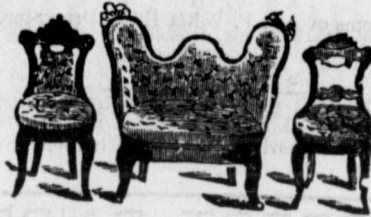

THE QUEEN AND ROYAL FAMILY.

THE QUEEN.—VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace, May 24, 1819; succeeded to the throne June 20, 1837, on the death of her uncle, King William IV.; was crowned June 28, 1838, and married, Feb. 10, 1840, to his Royal Highness Prince Albert. Her Majesty is the only child of his late Royal Highness Edward, Duke of Kent, son of King George III. The children of Her Majesty are—

Her Royal Highness Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa, Princess Royal of England and Prussia, born Nov. 24, 1840, and married to his Royal Highness William, the Crown Prince of Germany, Jan. 25, 1858, and has had issue four sons and four daughters.

His Royal Highness Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, born Nov. 9, 1841; married, March 10, 1863, Alexandra of Denmark (Princess of Wales), born Dec. 1, 1844, and has issue, Prince Albert Victor, born Jan. 8, 1864, George Frederick Ernest Albert, born June 3, 1865; Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagma, born Feb. 20, 1867; Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6, 1868; and Maude Charlotte Mary Victoria, born Nov. 26, 1869.

Her Royal Highness Alice Maud Mary, born April 25, 1843; married to H. R. H. Prince Frederick Louis of Hesse, July 1, 1862; and has issue five daughters and one son: second son killed by accident, May, 1873.

His Royal Highness Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Edinburgh, born Aug. 6, 1844; married Her Imperial Highness the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, Jan. 23, 1874, and has issue one son.

Her Royal Highness Helena Augusta Victoria, born May 25, 1846; married to H. R. H. Prince Frederick Christian Charles Augustus of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg, July 5, 1866, and has issue two sons and two daughters.

Her Royal Highness Louisa Carolina Alberta, born March 18, 1848; married to the Marquis of Lorne, eldest son of the Duke of Argyll, March, 1871.

His Royal Highness Arthur William Patrick Albert, born May 1, 1850.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert, born April 7, 1853.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodore, born April 14, 1857.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK, CANADA.

Post Office Savings Banks at the principal Cities and Towns in Ontario and Quebec are open daily for the receipt and payment of deposits, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business.

The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

Any persons may have a deposit account, and may deposit yearly any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, or more, with the permission of the Postmaster General.

Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such women.

As respects children under ten years of age, money may be deposited—

Firstly—By a parent or friend as trustee for the child, in which case the deposits can be withdrawn by the trustee until the child shall attain the age of ten years, after which time repayment will be made only on the joint receipts of both trustee and child.

Secondly—In the child's own name—and, if so deposited, repayment will not be made until the child shall attain the age of ten years.

A depositor in any of the Savings Bank Post Offices may continue his deposits at any other of such offices, without notice or change of Pass Book, and can withdraw money at that Savings Bank Office which is most convenient to him. For instance, if he makes his first deposit at the Savings Bank of Cobourg, he may make further deposit at, or withdraw his money through, the Post Office Bank at Collingwood or Quebec, Sarnia, Brockville, or any place which may be convenient to him, whether he continues to reside at Cobourg or remove to some other place.

Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, which is to be produced to the Postmaster every time the depositor pays in or withdraws money, and the sums paid in or withdrawn are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same.

Each depositor's account is kept in the Postmaster General's Office, in Ottawa, and in addition to the Postmaster's receipt in the Pass Book, *a direct acknowledgment from the Postmaster General for each sum paid in* is sent to the depositor. If this acknowledgment does not reach the depositor within ten days from the date of his deposit, he should apply immediately to the Postmaster General, by letter, being careful to give his address, and, if necessary, renew his application until he receives a satisfactory reply.

When a depositor wishes to withdraw money, he can do so by applying to the Postmaster General, who will send him by return of mail a cheque for the amount, payable at whatever Savings Bank Post Office the depositor may have named in his application.

Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits, and the interest is added to the principal on the 30th of June in each year.

Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

No charge is made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for Pass Books, nor for postage or communications with the Postmaster General in relation to their deposits.

The Postmaster General is always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank business.

A full statement of the Regulations of the Post Office Savings Bank may be seen at any of the Post Offices appointed for that purpose.

POSTAL RATES AND STAMP DUTIES.

POSTAGE ON LETTERS.

The rate of Postage on letters to all parts of the Dominion of Canada is 3 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and 3 cents for every fraction of $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be prepaid. Postal Cards are issued at 1 cent each; which can also be posted to any part of the United States. The rate of Postage to Newfoundland is 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be prepaid.

The postage on letters between Canada and the United States is 3 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be prepaid in full, otherwise the letter will not be forwarded, but be sent to the Dead Letter office to be returned to the writer.

The rate for letters between any place in Canada and any part of the United Kingdom is, by the Canadian Steamship Line, sailing on Saturdays, 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and by State Steamer from New York on Wednesdays, 8 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. These letters must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 3d. sterling on delivery.

Letters for British Colonies and possessions beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

NEWSPAPERS.

Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication and American or transient British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent per 4 oz. each, by stamp, or they cannot be forwarded.

BOOK POST.

One cent per 4 oz. is the rate for Books (bound or unbound), Handbills, Pamphlets, Circulars when in parcels, and occasional Publications, also Book and Newspaper Manuscript, Printers' Proof, Printed Matter of the same character as Circulars, Handbills, &c., all of which must be prepaid by stamps.

Circulars sent singly, $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each, if under 1 oz., must be open and prepaid—if sealed, they are liable to letter rates.

On Newspapers and Periodicals under 1 oz. in weight the charge is $\frac{1}{2}$ cent.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels may be forwarded betwixt any offices in Canada at $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents for every 8 oz.; weight not to exceed 4 lbs., and the Postage must be prepaid by stamp. The parcel should have the words "By Parcel Post" plainly written on the address.

REGISTRATION.

The following are the fees which, as well as the ordinary postage, must be prepaid at the office at which posted :

On letters to Canada, Newfoundland or Prince Edward Island, 2 cents ; on letters to any place in the United States, 5 cents ; on letters to any place in the United Kingdom, 8 cents ; on parcels, packets, &c., to any part of Canada, 5 cents ; on books, packets and newspapers to the United Kingdom, 8 cents.

When letters are registered, for whatever destination, both postage and registration fee should be prepaid by Stamps. The postage and registration fee on letters addressed to the United Kingdom, the United States, and places abroad, must be paid wholly in Stamps or money.

A registered letter can only be delivered to the party addressed or to his or her order. The registration does not make the Post Office responsible for its safe delivery, it simply makes its transmission more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it when passing from one place to another in Canada, and at least to the frontier or port of despatch.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money orders, payable in the Dominion, may be obtained at any Money Order Office (of which a list can be seen at any Post Office), at the following rates :—

Under and up to \$4, 2 cents ; over \$4 and not exceeding \$10, 5 cents ; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 10 cents, and 10 cents for every additional \$20, up to \$100, above which sum no single order can issue.

Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained in any Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in Sterling, the commission chargeable being for £2 and under, 25 cents ; from £2 to £5, 50 cents ; from £5 to £7, 75 cents ; from £7 to £10, \$1. No order can be drawn for more than £10, but any number of orders for £10 each may be procured.

STAMP DUTIES.

The stamps required by the Act, and which may be affixed to any Note, Draft, or Bill at the time of drawing the same, are as follows:—

On every Promissory Note, Draft, or Bill of Exchange, not less than \$25, 1 cent; over \$25 and not exceeding \$50, 2 cents; over \$50 and not exceeding \$100, 3 cents; and for every additional \$100, or fraction of \$100, 3 cents. On every Draft or Bill of Exchange executed in duplicate, for the first \$100, 2 cents on each part thereof; for every additional \$100, or fraction thereof, 2 cents. On every Draft or Bill of Exchange executed in more than two parts; for each part for the first \$100, 1 cent; for every additional \$100, or fraction thereof, 1 cent. Interest payable at maturity, to be counted in all cases as part of the principal sum.

Each stamp must be cancelled by the party using it, either by writing or stamping his name or initials on the same, with the date of the Note, Draft, or Bill on which it has been affixed.

The penalty imposed for making, drawing, accepting, endorsing, signing, becoming a party to, or paying an improperly stamped instrument, or putting a wrong date on any stamp, is \$100; and for affixing stamps already used, is \$500.

The fourth clause of the Stamp Act enacts that any cheque upon a chartered Bank or licensed Banker, or on any Savings Bank, if the same shall be payable on demand, also any Post Office money order and any municipal debenture, or coupon of such debenture, shall be free of duty under the Act.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.—What was formerly known as the "Department of Public Instruction," with the Revs. Egerton Ryerson, D. D., LL.D., as Chief Superintendent of Education, was, at the last Session of the Ontario Legislature, done away with, and all the powers and duties now devolve upon the Educational Department, which consists of the Executive Council, or the committee thereof appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor ; and all the functions and duties of the Chief Superintendent of Education are now vested in one of the said committees, nominated by the Lieut.-Governor, and designated "Minister of Education." Hon. Adam Crooks, who is Treasurer of Ontario, is also Minister of Education.

LEGAL AND JUDICIARY.

SUPREME COURT OF THE DOMINION AND COURT OF EXCHEQUER.

The Supreme Court, as a high Court of Appeal, constituted by Dominion Statute, 38 Vic. cap. 2, assented to 8th April, 1875, is

composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, and has appellate civil and criminal Jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The Judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually two sessions, beginning respectively on the third Monday in January and June. The Exchequer Court, presided over by the same Judges, possesses concurrent original jurisdiction in the Dominion in all cases in which it is sought to enforce any law relating to the revenue, and exclusive original jurisdiction in all cases in which demand is made or relief sought in respect of any matter which might in England be the subject of a suit or action in the Court of Exchequer on its revenue side against the Crown, or any officer of the Crown.

THE LAW SOCIETY OF ONTARIO.

The Law Society was first established in 1797, by the act 37 Geo. III., c. 13, which enabled the then practitioners of the law to form themselves into a society and make rules for its government. By the act of 1822, 2 Geo. IV., c. 5, "the Treasurer and Benchers of the Law Society" were formally incorporated; and under these and other statutes the Society has continued to be governed by a Board of Benchers, in the same manner as the various Law Societies of England. By the act 34 Vic., c. 15, the Benchers, theretofore appointed from time to time by their own body, are made, exclusive of *ex officio* members, elective by the Bar, the *ex officio* consisting of the Attorney General for the time being, and all members of the Bar of Ontario who have at any time held the office of Attorney or Solicitor General of the former Province of Upper Canada, and any retired Judge of the Superior Courts of Law or Equity of Ontario; the elective, thirty in number, being chosen by ballot, for a term of five years, by the members of the Bar, in manner prescribed by the Act. Vacancies during the term to be filled up by the remaining Benchers. The Judges of the Superior Courts are Visitors of the Society, and, on the first day of Easter Term, annually, the Benchers appoint one of their body to be Treasurer, who is also President of the Society. The Benchers sit in convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the admission of Attorneys and Solicitors to practise, and of Students to enter the Society, the fees paid by whom form the revenue of the Society. Osgoode Hall, appropriately named after the first Chief

Justice, is the Ontario "Inn of Court," or head-quarters of the Society, in which is provided accomodation for the Courts of Equity, and for the sittings in term of the Superior Courts; with a valuable and extensive library.

COURTS OF LAW AND EQUITY.

COURT OF ERROR AND APPEAL.—Constituted for the hearing of appeals in civil cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench, Chancery and Common Pleas ; and appeals in criminal cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas. From the judgment of this court, an appeal lies to Her Majesty in Privy Council; in cases over £1,000, or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. The Judges of this Court, in addition to their appellate duties proper, take part in presiding over Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius, and of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, and holding Chancery Sittings, and may be placed on the rota for the trial of Election petitions with the Judges of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity, who, as *ex-officio* Judges of this Court, choose from their number a Judge or Judges to sit in Appeal in case of there being a vacancy in this Court; or if, from illness or some other cause, one of the Judges of the Court is unable to be present, or is under any legal disqualification to hear an appeal. COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Ontario, and it may be proceeded in such by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same ; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. COURT OF CHANCERY.—This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may decree the issue, repeal, or avoidance, of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. By a recent statute, issues of fact depending in the Supreme Courts of Law for trial without a jury, may be entered for trial at any sitting of this Court held for the hearing of causes at the county town where the venue is laid. PRACTICE COURT AND CHAMBERS.—One of the Common Law Judges holds a Court during each Term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to the adding or justifying bail, discharging insolvent debtors, administering oaths, hearing and determining matters on motion, and making rules and orders in causes and business depending in either of said law courts. Chambers are held each day in Common Law and Chancery by one of the judges of the said courts, and under recent statutes by the clerk of the Crown and Pleas in common law, and by the referee in chambers in chancery, for such business relating to suits therein as may be transacted by a single Judge out of court. Clerk, Common Law Chambers—W B Heward.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—Commissioners, the Judge of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favor of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. Clerk of Commissioners, W B Heward.

COURTS FOR THE TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.—The nature of these Courts is sufficiently indicated in their title. The Judges of the Court of Appeal and of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity meet annually in Michaelmas Term, and severally select, by a majority of votes, a Judge of their respective Courts to be placed on the rota for the trial of election petitions. The Judges so selected preside singly at such trials. In the case of death or illness of a Judge so chosen, the Court of which he is a member meet and elect another Judge. In cases referring to the Dominion Parliament, appeals lie to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. In those relating to the Legislature of Ontario, to the Court of Error and Appeal of that Province.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county, assisted in some counties by a Deputy or Junior Judge. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to

any amount ; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law.

COUNTY COURT SITTINGS AND COURTS OF GENERAL SESSIONS.—The County Judge in each county holds a sitting of his Court and a Court of General Sessions in his county semi-annually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the county of York, in which county said court is held four times, commencing on the second Tuesday in March, May, September and December, the latter Courts for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempted from their jurisdiction. The Judge may also, in his discretion, hold additional sittings at such times as may be deemed expedient to expedite business, but only for the trial of issues of fact without a jury.

COUNTY JUDGES' CRIMINAL COURT.—Persons committed to jail for trial, on charge of being guilty of any offence for which they may be tried at a Court of General Sessions, may, with their own consent, and subject to the provisions of the Act in that behalf, be forthwith tried by the Judge of the County Court and General Sessions without a jury, and if convicted be sentenced by the said Judge, and the Judge sitting on any such trial for all the purposes thereof, is constituted a Court of Record, and the record in any such case shall be filed among the records of the Court of General Sessions last mentioned.

COURTS OF REVISION.—The County Judges hold annually Courts of final revision of the Assessment Rolls of each Municipality, being in the light of Courts of Appeal from the first Court of Revision held by the Municipality; and also Courts for the Revision of the Voters' Lists, being equivalent to the Courts held by Revising Barristers in England.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURTS.—These Courts, which have reference to traders only, are regulated by the Act known as "The Insolvent Act of 1875," which consolidated and assimilated the practice in Bankruptcy and Insolvency in the several Provinces of the Dominion. The County Judges in the several counties preside, and official assignees are nominated by the Governor in Council, and are officers of the Court having jurisdiction in the County or District for which they are appointed.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of

Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. Chief Surrogate Clerk at Toronto—Sir J L Robinson, Bart.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by the presiding Judge, being the County Judge or his Deputy, or any Barrister appointed to hold the same ; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. The jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25 ; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10 ; and personal actions to that amount, if not excepted from their jurisdiction ; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Each judicial district is divided into court divisions, and courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of General Sessions, and in certain cases by the Judges.

The Deputy Clerks of the Crown in the several Counties are supplied with writs from Toronto, and re-issue same in their respective counties.

TERMS OF THE COURTS.

COURT OF ERROR AND APPEAL.—This Court holds its sittings at such times and for such periods as the Judges shall, from time to time, deem necessary or convenient for the speedy despatch of business, the times now fixed being the 15th of March, June, September and December, notice of the holding of such sittings being given according to the usual practice.

LAW TERMS.—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter. Trinity Term begins on the Monday after the 21st August, and ends on Saturday of the following week. The Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas have power also, at their discretion, to hold sittings in banc in time of vacation (except long vacation), by virtue of a rule or order of the court, respectively to be made in or out of term, for the hearing of such special cases or rules for new trials as shall be named in a list to be attached to any such rule or order, and for giving of judgments in cases previously argued, and for disposing of such other business as the Court in its discretion shall see fit; and one of the Judges of either of the Superior Courts sits in open Court on Tuesday and Friday of every week, as well in as out of Term, except during vacation, for the purpose of disposing of all Court business which may be transacted by a single Judge, subject to an appeal to the full Court, which for that purpose may be constituted of two Judges.

CHANCERY TERMS.—Terms for hearing of causes, including examination of witnesses, are held twice in each year, at Toronto and on Circuit, the places and dates being previously arranged by the Judges (see Circuits). Terms for the rehearing of causes are held on the 3rd Thursday in February, the last Thursday in August, and the first Thursday in December. The Court sits every week, except during vacation, for the despatch of business, in the following order: Monday, chamber business; Tuesday, motions; Wednesday, hearings pro confesso and on bill and answer, motions for decree, further directions, petitions, and demurrer; Thursday, appeals from Master's reports.

LONG VACATION extends from the 1st of July to the 21st August. In Chancery, there is also a vacation from the 24th December to 6th January.

COUNTY COURT TERMS.—The several County Courts in Ontario hold four terms in each year, commencing respectively on the first Monday in the months of January, April, July and October, and ending on the Saturday of the same week.

 CIRCUITS OF THE COURTS.

LAW CIRCUITS.—Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius and of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery shall be held twice a year in each County or union of Counties, in the vacation between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between that period of the vacation after the 21st of August and Michaelmas Term, except the Counties of York and Wentworth, in each of which Counties there shall be a third such Court in every year, in the vacation between Michaelmas and Hilary Terms; and in the County of York there shall be a fourth such Court, between Easter Term and the first day of July. The Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius may, in the discretion of the Judges, be held separate as apart from the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, and the Assizes for any County are not put an end to by the commencement of Term, but may continue and be holden during Term, subject to special rules in such case for moving against the verdict or for new trials. There are eight Circuits, as follows, viz:—

Eastern: Pembroke, Perth, Cornwall, L'Orignal, Ottawa. Midland: Napanee, Picton, Belleville, Brockville, Kingston. Victoria: Brampton, Whitby, Cobourg, Lindsay, Peterboro'. Broek: Owen Sound, Stratford, Woodstock, Walkerton, Goderich. Niagara: Milton, St. Catharines, Welland, Cayuga, Hamilton. Waterloo: Barrie, Berlin, Guelph, Brantford, Simcoe. Western: St. Thomas, Sarnia, Sandwich, Chatham, London. Home: Toronto.

The Courts in each Circuit shall be presided over by one of the Chief Justices or Judges of the Superior Courts, or of the Courts of Appeal or Chancery, or, in their absence, by a Judge of a County Court, or some one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by any one of the Chief Justices or Judges of the Superior Courts to act in that behalf.

CHANCERY CIRCUITS, for the Examination of Witnesses and Hearing Causes, are held in the Spring and Fall of each year, as follows:—

The Courts in each Circuit are presided over by the Chancellor or one of the Vice-Chancellors, or by a retired or present Judge of the Superior Courts of Law or of the Court of Appeal, or by a Judge of a County Court, or by some one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by the Chancellor or one of the Vice-Chancellors to act in that behalf.

THE COUNTY OF BRUCE.

The periodical publication of the statistics of a county is the only true index of its prosperity and growth. By it we learn what progress is being made from time to time in agriculture, commerce and trade. Comparing date with date, fact with fact, we are enabled to decide whether a county is progressing or retrograding, and oftentimes these statistics—dry though they may seem to the superficial observer—by showing, not only in what ratio a county advances, but in how much greater ratio it might advance, are an incentive to action, and are important aids in the still further development of a county's resources.

The County of Bruce is shaped like a scalene triangle, and is situated between 44 and $45\frac{1}{3}$ degrees north latitude and between 81 and $81\frac{7}{8}$ degrees west longitude. It is bounded on the north by the union waters of Lake Huron and the Géorgian Bay, on the east by the County of Grey, on the south by the county of Huron, and on the west by Lake Huron.

The settlement of the county by the whites dates from the year 1848, since which date the influx of population augmented the actual number of settlers from between three and four thousand in 1848 to 35,000 in 1866, and about 59,468 in 1875. This rapid increase of population is without a parallel in the history of any county in the Dominion. The plan of giving free grants of land, consisting of 50 acres in each grant, to each of such as became immediate actual settlers adopted by the Liberal Government, at the head of which has Governor was Lord Elgin (whose family name was Bruce), together with the fertility of the soil, led to the sudden influx of parties in search of land. The County of Bruce, including the Peninsula, comprises 15 townships, viz: Arran, Amabel, Bruce, Brant, Culross, Carrick, Elderslie, Grennock, Huron, Kincardine, Kinloss, Saugeen and Albemarle, Eastnor and Lindsay. The three latter being united for municipal purposes and forming what is called the Peninsula, which extends northward about 40 miles, and separates the waters of Georgian Bay on the east from Lake Huron on the west. The scenery on the east shore of the Peninsula is particularly wild and picturesque. On the west side, about 25 miles northward from Southampton and near the mainland, are situated the Fishing Islands, very important for fall fishing by seines and nets—herring white fish and trout—of which from eight ten thousand barrels are taken to market annually, and adds not a

little to the trade of Bruce, the trade in fish alone at the port of Kincardine last year amounting to over \$23,000.

The distance across the county from east to west is 35 miles, and from north to south about 90 miles. Its climate is usually vigorously cold in winter, variable in spring, moderately warm in summer, and boisterously windy, intermixed with spells of fine weather, in fall. Along its shores are natural facilities for harbor accommodations, and in most places what nature has begun art is improving, the Government from time to time having granted large sums to Kincardine, Port Elgin and Southampton for the purpose of improving their harbor accommodations.

No county of the same age can boast of better roads, the county having spent vast sums of money to improve and facilitate inland travelling. The Goderich and Saugeen road extends nearly in the direction of north and south in a line parallel to the general margin of the lake; from Goderich to Kincardine it is known as the Goderich and Kincardine gravel road, while its extension northward from the latter place is known as the Saugeen and Owen Sound road. This road is the mail route between Kincardine and Southampton, and forms a direct means of access to the various villages between these two places. The best travelled road in the county is the Durham, on which, at its western terminus, is situated Kincardine. It extends nearly in the direction of east and west from Kincardine to Walkerton, a distance of 28 miles, and thence eastward to Durham. The Saugeen and Elora road connects Southampton and Walkerton, which are 30 miles distant from each other. The connection of this road south-eastward from Walkerton effects a communication with Elora, thence with Guelph, where myriads of roads converge. The north gravel road, as it is called, extends north-west from Southampton through Allenford, and thence to Owen Sound, distant from Southampton 22 miles.

The side lines of roads are parallel to each other, at a distance apart of one mile and a quarter; similar lines of roads are laid out at right angles to the former; the direction of the roads are nearly north and south, and east and west; thus the entire county is laid out into squares containing ten lots; each lot consists of one hundred acres; each side of each of these squares being one mile and a quarter long.

The inhabitants of Bruce are made up of several nationalities, viz., Irish, Germans, Scotch, English, and a few Lower Canadians. The Scotch are the most numerous, and are scattered all through the county, but more particularly through the southern and western parts; the Germans come next, and are settled principally in the townships of Carrick and Greenock. Amongst such a variety of nationalities

there is of course a variety of religious denominations. The Presbyterian, Methodist and Episcopal persuasions claim the largest number of adherents. The Baptist and Roman Catholic denominations come next, the latter of which finds a large number of adherents amongst the German part of the population. There are a large number of churches scattered throughout the county, almost every congregation and denomination worshipping "under its own vine and fig tree."

The County of Bruce for the most part presents a level appearance, although in the centre portions it is somewhat diversified by hills and valleys, which, however, present no serious difficulties to the cultivation of the soil. No better land for agricultural purposes can be found in Canada than that of the County of Bruce. The soil throughout the southern parts is a heavy clay loam, interspersed with tracts of rich bottom land. The central portion of the county, and that lying along the shores of the lake, is of a lighter character, and is the best grain producing land in the county. The northern part is not as well adapted for agricultural purposes, as the land is of a very rocky character, the soil being of no great depth and consisting principally of decayed vegetable matter.

The county throughout is well watered, although no very large streams flow through it. The Saugeen is the principal river and flows through the county in a north-westerly direction, and empties into Lake Huron at Southampton. This river, with its tributaries, drain the southern, central and eastern portions of the county, while the western portion is drained by numerous smaller streams emptying into Lake Huron.

The vegetation of Bruce comprises such grasses, roots and plants as usually grow in the temperate zone, and cedar, tamarack, balsam, black ash, soft elm and soft maple in swampy lands; Norway, black and white pine, white ash, hard maple, bass wood, beech, rock elm, cherry and ironwood on dry land, and hemlock and birch about the margin of swamps. Considerable quantities of pine and hemlock lumber have been manufactured in the county, but at present its manufacture is confined principally to the northern portions of the county, as the rapid settlement and extensive clearing of the other portions are causing its disappearance.

The exports of the county embrace wheat, oats, peas, barley, timothy seed, pearlshes, leather, tan-bark, wood, wool, pork, butter, eggs, live stock, large quantities of flour, earthenware, bricks, tiles, fish and salt. The discovery of salt in the County of Bruce is of comparatively recent date, but its manufacture has rapidly increased, until now it forms one of the most important branches of business in the county. The wells are situated at Kincardine.

The railway facilities of the county are of a very satisfactory

character, three railways finding their termini in the county. The Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway, which was completed in 1873, enters the south-eastern part of the county a few miles from the village of Mildmay, and extends in a north-westerly direction through Walkerton, Paisley and Port Elgin, and terminates at Southampton. The southern extension of the Wellington Grey & Bruce Railway, opened for traffic in the fall of 1873, enters the county near Lucknow, extends in a north-westerly direction and terminates at Kincardine.

The Toronto Grey & Bruce Railway terminates at Teeswater, and but a small portion of this line is in Bruce. These three lines form outlets for the produce of the county to Hamilton, Toronto, and other eastern markets, while the London Huron & Bruce Railway, opened in January, 1876, connecting with the Wellington, Grey & Bruce at Wingham, which forms a direct line of rail from Lake Huron to Lake Erie, and a direct means of communication with London and the western and southern markets. Considering, also, the numerous good harbors and ports along the lake shore, and the competition which must necessarily exist between the railways and the lake transportation companies, it will be seen that the County of Bruce enjoys unusual advantages in regard to its means of communication and transportation with outside markets.

The subjoined table for 1876 affords information from which the reader, on examination, may be enabled to understand correctly the comparative area of the various sections, denominated townships, comprising the county, and their respective values.

The townships adjoining the lake were appraised by Government at \$2.00 per acre, and those of the interior and of the rear of the county at \$1.50 per acre. To prevent speculation, the land was open for actual settlers only, who, to keep valid their tenure, were required to clear and put under fences and cultivation five acres during four consecutive years from the date of settlement, erect a house 18x24 and a barn on each lot of 100 acres, except in the case of a family, the male members of which were allowed to hold land, irrespective of a house and barn, whilst they lived with their father. The period fixed by the Government for payment of the land was ten years; a tenth of the whole amount of the purchase money, with 6 per cent., was required to be paid annually during the period of ten years from the date of the lands being brought into market, after which, when complied with, Government patents were issued to the purchasers who had paid for and improved their respective lots according to Government regulation.

No one taking within his mind's grasp the position of the County of Bruce for the past twenty years, and marking yearly its advancement in agriculture, in education, in trade and commerce, but must acknowledge that it has kept pace with the progressive spirit of the age. No one can look upon the well cultivated fields, the handsome dwellings and commodious outbuildings, where twenty years ago the forest stood in all its grandeur and wildness, but must confess that real and substantial progress has marked our course. No one can look upon the thriving and prosperous villages which have sprung up as if by magic all over the country, where twenty years ago a solitary husbandman may have been the only settler, but must be satisfied that our progress has been as rapid as it has been real and substantial. Follow up the comparison. Compare the few and scattered log school-houses of twenty years ago with the numerous neat and substantial frame and brick buildings of to-day—the pedagogue, whose stock-in-trade was a birchen switch and a smattering of the common English branches, with the well educated and accomplished teacher of to-day. Compare the system of our common schools of that date with the system now in operation. Then there was little to encourage either parent or child, while the poorer classes were to a great extent unable to obtain a knowledge of the common rudiments of a common English education. Now, with liberal grants from Government, and with the free school system which universally prevails, no parent need allow his child to grow up to manhood without a thorough knowledge, not only of the common English branches, but can, through High School provision, give him a good commercial and classical education. Compare still further the excellent gravel roads which now form, as it were, a network through the whole county with the old corduroy and mud roads of a

score of years ago. To proceed still further in our comparison, look at our numerous mills, factories and workshops where the busy hum of machinery is heard from morn till night, our elegant homes, comfortably and luxuriously furnished, our railways traversing the county from end to end, and our numerous telegraph lines which thread the entire county bringing the most distant places within easy reach of us; look at our improved harbors and extensive trade, and contrast to-day with twenty years ago, or even ten years ago, and mark our rapid progress. And may we not safely predict that the improvement and progress of Bruce for the future will be as rapid and substantial as it has been in the past.

It is of frame, five stories high, with nine run of wheat stones and one barley stone; the whole is driven by improved turbine water-wheels, and as the machinery is new and of the most improved description their facilities for doing a large business are unequalled. There are two hotels, the "Commercial" being a first-class house, and is kept by Brockie & McDonald. Quite a number of grocery and general stores, an agency of the Montreal Telegraph Company, drug store, harness and carriage shops, blacksmith, planing, sash and blind factory, carding mill, saw mill, and chair factory. A Baptist, Methodist, and Presbyterian church. Orange lodge No. 818 meets the 19th of each month in Adam's Hall. Daily mail received from Paisley. Chesley is surrounded by a fine farming country and from its position and advantages will no doubt become an important business centre of this section of the country. Paisley nearest railway station. Population at present about 550.

FORMOSA.

The little village of Formosa is rather romantically situated in a rocky valley, through which a small stream flows, furnishing water power for a few mills and factories. The village is on the boundary line between the townships of Carrick and Culross, eight miles from Walkerton, 24 from Kincardine and six and a-half from Mildmay, the nearest railway station. The first house in the village was built in 1855, and in 1860 the land was surveyed into lots, from which time the history of the village dates. It received its present

name in 1861, at which time a Post Office was established. The village contains two fine free schools, besides a boarding school under the care of the Sisters De Notre Dame, who have a Convent established here, one Roman Catholic Church (presided over by Fathers Elena and Foerster), two general stores, three blacksmith shops, five hotels, two harness shops, one brewery, one grist mill, one saw mill, one carding mill, one cigar manufactory, two wagon shops, two cooper shops, two cabinet shops, one tin shop and hardware store, five shoe shops, and one butcher shop. The Montreal Telegraph Co have an agency here. A daily stage runs from Walkerton, and a daily mail is also received from that place. The population at present is about 550, consisting entirely of Roman Catholic Germans, and we think any attempt of an Englishman to establish himself in business here would result in failure. Germans, however, in search of a quiet locality, undisturbed by the bustle, turmoil and push of our modern business life, will here find a delightful retreat, a place after their own hearts, having all the characteristic features of the old-fashioned villages of "Faderland."

HANOVER.

This is a thriving village on the boundary line between the counties of Grey and Bruce, and in the Townships of Brant and Bentinck. It is situated on the Durham road, six miles east of Walkerton and eleven from Durham. The Saugeen River runs near the village, and affords excellent water power for a number of mills. The place was laid out as a village in 1857 by A Z Gotwals, H P Adams and others. The village contains a fine new brick school house, three brick and five frame churches, one grist and saw mill, a woollen factory and two cabinet factories.

The large steam factory of D & P Knechtel employs about thirty hands, and turns out large quantities of first-class furniture and different kinds of wood work.

There is also an establishment for the manufactory of Planished and Britannia metal ware—the only establishment of the kind in Canada. It employs from 15 to 20 hands, and is doing an extensive business. At present it is carried on by E A Goodeve & Co. Besides the above establishment, the village also contains four hotels, the "Hanover House" being the principal one, three wagon shops, three blacksmith shops, two harness shops, three tailor shops, one foundry, a pottery and ashery, two brick yards, in one of which tiles are manufactured, one cigar manufactory, tannery, stave factory, two shingle factories and eight stores of different kinds. There is also an agency of the Montreal and Dominion Telegraph Companies. A daily stage runs through Hanover from Walkerton to Durham, and daily mails are received from each of these places. No lawyer is to be found in this happy village, and the services of only two doctors are required. The cheerful and elevating influence of a printing office is unfelt in Hanover, and we think there is a good opening here for a job and newspaper office, where both English and German printing could be done. The population of Hanover is 780.

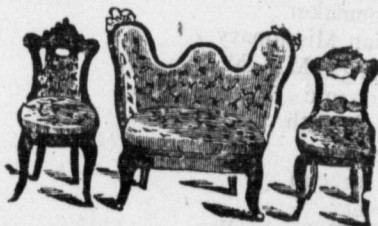

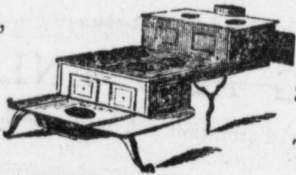

TOWN OF KINCARDINE.

The town of Kincardine—the largest and most active commercial town in the County—is situated on the east shore of Lake Huron, 6 miles north of Goderich, and at the terminus of the southern extension of the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway. The original town plot was surveyed by Government in 1850, and is one and a quarter miles square, in addition to which Wm. Sutton, Esq., surveyed that part of the north east portion of the town known as Williamsburg. The town is beautifully located on the inner portion of the bay formed by Point Douglas on the north and Point Clark on the south. The ground rises gradually from the Lake for about a quarter of a mile to a level plateau, which extends to the banks of the river. It presents a fine appearance from the water, and commands a beautiful lake view, its brilliant sunsets adding beauty to the scene. It is also noted for the salubrity of its climate, and is a favorite summer resort for tourists and parties in quest of health. The beach at Kincardine is the finest on the shores of Lake Huron, and numerous small fresh water lakes, accessible to a drive of a few miles, give every opportunity for healthful amusement. The River Penetangore (an Indian word, signifying *water on both sides*; formerly the name of the village) enters the town by four branches, which unite about half a mile from the lake, and flows between high banks through the centre of the town into the harbor. The Harbor Reserve is a low flat comprising six acres, surrounded on all sides by high banks. A considerable amount of money has been expended in the improvement of the harbor, and when the present works under contract (and which are expected to be completed during the coming summer) are finished, Kincardine will possess the best Canadian harbor of Lake Huron.

The place was incorporated as a village in 1857, and as a town in 1874, and from its first incorporation has made rapid strides in population, improvements and commercial prosperity; faster, perhaps, than any other town in the Dominion. It is the best market in the county; the exports of last year amounting to over \$100,000. The principal exports being salt, wheat, barley, peas, grass seed, flour, butter, pork, wool, pearlsh and tan bark; all of which command market at ready remunerative prices.

In 1873, the southern extension of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway was completed to Kincardine, and in January, 1876, the London, Huron and Bruce Railway was opened to Wingham, forming a connection with the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, this bringing the town into direct railway communication with Hamilton, Toronto, London, &c., &c., and giving the residents increased facilities for doing business. These outlets, together with the

water communication, place the town in a position to advance more rapidly than it has in the past.

Instead of numbering its stores and manufacturing establishments by twos and threes, it can now count them by the score. Chief among its manufactories are the Salt Works—of which there are three—the brine from which is stronger than that obtained from any other of the wells in Canada, and there were no less than 137,000 barrels of salt manufactured here last year, of which 90,000 barrels were exported. The largest amount, we believe, manufactured in or exported from any one place in the Dominion. Besides numerous first-class stores, Kincardine possesses machine shops, cabinet shops, grist mills, steam planing mills, steam chair factory, foundry, soap factories, wagon shops, boot and shoe establishments, telegraph offices, and, in fact, every thing that would make a complete and first-class business and manufacturing town. There are, also, at the southern outskirts of the town, numerous brickyards, from which millions of A1 bricks are annually turned out; and in addition to the possession of the only clay found in Canada suitable for the manufacture of bath brick, the town also possess a manufactory for the supply of Jefferson's Patent Artificial Stone, which takes the place of the genuine article, and is from 40 to 75 per cent. cheaper. As a proof that this town is rapidly advancing, we might mention that during the spring of 1876 there has been a large addition to population and numerous new business firms have established themselves here.

There are to be found the usual number of religious denominations in Kincardine—the Presbyterian being the largest in point of numbers. The latter body have under way and fast approaching completion a magnificent brick church, and which, when completed, will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000. The Methodists are also engaged in erecting a splendid new church at a cost of about \$15,000. Besides these new buildings, a large number of dwellings will be put up during the coming summer.

This town may also boast of the best hotels outside any city in Ontario—the "Royal" and "Queen's" being first. The "Royal" is a fine, new brick building, with cut stone front, conducted by Mr. Alex. McLean, and is magnificently furnished. The "Queen's" is managed by Mr. Charles Kenny. Under the new Liquor Act of the Provincial Parliament, the number of hotels in Kincardine are limited to seven, and the places for the sale of liquors exclusively to two, the license fee being \$200 for each license granted.

The Town Council at present have under consideration the advisability of establishing the Waterous System of Water Works, and also the establishment of a first-class market, and no doubt before another year passes the town will be in possession of both these very necessary requisites.

Kincardine is not behind in her educational advantages, having three Common and one High School, under the efficient superintendence of Mr. J. E. Burgess, M. A. The school buildings are comman ling in appearance and commodious, and every opportunity is given the youth of town and country to advance to the front rank of education.

Kincardine was, until last fall, an outport of Goderich, at which time it was duly constituted an independent port, with Mr. R. McIntosh, an old servant of the Customs' Department, chief officer. Population 3,500.

KINLOSS.

This is a small post village on the Walkerton and Kincardine gravel road and is sometimes known as Black Horse. It is ten miles from Lucknow, 16 from Walkerton, and 12 from Kincardine. Its population is about 130. Daily Stages run through here from Kincardine, Walkerton, and Lucknow, and a daily mail is received from each of these places. It contains an Orange Lodge known as Kinloss Lodge No 898, which meets the first Thursday in each month on or before the full of the moon. It also supports a society of Good Templars. It has a neat brick church in which service is held by the Presbyterian and Methodist Episcopal denominations, the former of which is under the care of the Rev. A. J. Forbes. It also contains two hotels, the principal one of which, the Black Horse,

has been established since 1855. There is one steam shingle mill, and one woollen factory, owned by Mr. Alex. Cameron, who intends adding more machinery the coming summer. There are also two steam saw mills, one wagon shop, one blacksmith shop, two stores, and a shoemaker's shop

connection, cutting yearly nearly two million feet of lumber, about the same number of lath, and nine thousand bunches of shingles. The mills are owned by Mr. E. Mountcastle. A Lodge of Good Templars meet every Wednesday evening in their own hall; the Orangemen also have a hall where they meet once a month. A daily mail received from Lucknow and Kinloss. Population about 75.

LION'S HEAD.

Is a Post Office in the Township of Eastnor, on the Georgian Bay, 21 miles north of Wiarton. It is surrounded by the best farming land in the Peninsula, and has a good, though small harbor. One store and a post office comprise the place. A weekly mail is received from Colpoy's Bay; F. Stuart, postmaster.

LUCKNOW.

The village of Lucknow is pleasantly situated on the Kincardine extension of the W. G. & B. Railway. The first settler of the place was Mr. Stofford, who, about the year 1858, obtained 200 acres of land from Government, upon condition of erecting a mill. He was unable to run the mill, and the land next came into possession of Mr. James Somerville, who, in 1861, surveyed it into village lots and disposed of the most of them by auction sale, thus forming the nucleus of a new settlement. In 1862 the Lake Road was opened between the counties of Huron and Bruce, running through Lucknow in a straight line to Listowel, and in 1865 the Bruce gravel road was completed from Goderich, through Lucknow, to Walkerton and Kincardine, thus opening up the now flourishing village to the surrounding country. A severe fire devastated the village in 1864, destroying a considerable portion of the business part, and retarding its progress for a hort time. In the year 1873-74 the W., G. & B. Railway was built, which brought an influx to its population and increased its facilities for doing business, both for the merchant and manufacturer. In 1873 it was incorporated as a village, and as it was situated on the boundary line between the counties of Huron and Bruce, it was set apart as belonging to the latter county. The years 1873, '74 and '75 were of marked progress for the village. It is situated almost upon the boundary line of the four townships of Kinloss, Huron, Ashfield and Wawanosh and the roads which establish a communication with these townships are of a very good character. The village contains 2 Presbyterian and 1 Methodist churches, a schoolhouse, Temperance Hall, a woollen factory and one planing mill; another large planing mill is in course of erection by Hamilton & Henderson. There is also one saw-mill, two flouring mills, one of which, owned by W. Treleven is a first-class mill, 4 wagon shops, 5 blacksmith shops, a tannery, cooper shop, and the usual number of stores and shops. It supports a printing office and weekly newspaper, the "Sentinel," published by D. B. Boyd. Agencies of the Montreal and Dominion

Telegraph Companies, and an office of the American Express Company are established here. Daily mails received via the railway. Population, about 1,200.

The village now contains two churches, one school of two departments, one woollen mill, one saw mill, three grist mills, the principal one of which is owned by Eidt & Moecker. It is a fine new mill, fitted up with improved machinery, and is situated near the railroad. There are also four hotels, a pottery, three wagon shops, three blacksmith shops, three cabinet shops, and twelve stores and shops of different kinds; also an agency of the Dominion and Montreal Telegraph Companies. Two mails received daily. Population 400.

OLIPHANT.

This is a post office established in 1874, and is situated on Lake Huron at the Fishing Islands—the best fishing grounds on Lake Huron, or the Georgian Bay, and which are becoming quite a place of resort for fishing parties, tourists and others. It lies 22 miles north of Southampton, and contains a school house, a new saw mill, owned by Thomas Field, and has about 50 inhabitants. Weekly mails received from Warton ; John Hutchinson, postmaster.

PAISLEY.

A village with a population of a little over 1,200 inhabitants, situated at the confluence of the Teeswater and Saugeen Rivers, in the Township of Elderslie, and on the W G & B R. It is 15 miles distant from Walkerton, the same distance from Southampton, and about 28 from Kincardine. Paisley has the finest water privileges of any place in the country, and is, no doubt, destined to become an important manufacturing town. It was incorporated as a village in 1873, and contains a number of fine buildings. It possesses two woollen mills, two sash factories, two saw mills, one foundry, two grist mills, three cabinet factories, a stave and shingle factory, two schools and five churches, the new Presbyterian Church of brick, now almost completed, being a very fine edifice. At present there are eight hotels. The "Cosmopolitan" (brick), kept by D D Hanna, is in the centre of the village, and is a new and well kept house. "Johnson's Anglo-American" is an old and well-established hotel. The *Advocate* is published every Thursday by Mr John Murdoch. Three daily mails are received, and the Post Office is a Money Order and Savings Bank Office as well. Agencies of the Dominion and Montreal Telegraph Companies, American Express Co and Canadian Bank of Commerce are established here. Paisley supports three doctors, two attorneys, and one barrister, and more than the usual number of dry goods, grocery and general stores, competition among the latter being very keen.

PORT ELGIN.

Port Elgin is a prosperous little village in the township of Saudeen, enjoying a pleasant situation on the shore of Lake Huron, and is surrounded by a good and well-cultivated agricultural country. It has an extensive trade with the adjoining townships and is quite an important grain market. The place was first surveyed in 1853, and the streets are broad and well laid out, and the village contains a number of fine buildings. It is also situated upon the W, G & B railway, and has a wharf and number of warehouses on the bay, but owing to the shallowness of the water the harbor cannot be safely entered by boats in bad weather, although the Lake Superior and Windsor steamers call here when the weather permits.

Port Elgin is 5 miles from Southampton, 27 from Walkerton, and 25 from Kincardine, and contains a grist mill, 2 sash and door factories, a large brush factory, woollen factory, a foundry, 3 wagon shops, an extensive tannery engaged in manufacturing for the wholesale trade, and a smaller one, owned by Mr W H Robinson, and manufacturing for the retail trade, 2 school houses, a town hall, 5 churches—a Presbyterian, United Brethren, Evangelical, Mennonite, Methodist and Baptist. Both the Montreal and Dominion Telegraph

Companies have offices located here, and the Bank of Hamilton has an agency established in the village. The village also contains the usual number of stores and shops of various kinds, 4 hotels, and a weekly newspaper, the *Free Press*, published by Mr H J Brenner. Population of the village, 1,100.

porated as a village in 1858 by special Act of Parliament, and the founders of the village must have had very ambitious hopes of its future importance as the corporation includes an area of about five square miles. It possesses one of the best harbors on the coast and is a Government harbor of refuge; a large amount of money has been expended upon it by Government, and when entirely completed the harbor will cost not less than a quarter of a million; a branch of the railway runs from the station to the wharf, so that freights can be unloaded directly into the cars from the boats. Southampton is quite a fishing station and during the summer months a considerable trade is done in the exportation of fresh fish. The village contains two saw mills, one shingle factory, grist mill, woollen factory, two blacksmith shops, and one wagon shop, owned by David Robertson; there are four churches, a Presbyterian, Methodist, English, and Catholic, a School-house, Town Hall, six hotels, a shoe shop, drug store, and about ten stores and shops of various kinds. There is also an agency of the Montreal and Dominion Telegraph Companies, and of the American Express Company. The county of Bruce Crown Lands Agency is located here, A. McNabb being the Commissioner. A lodge of Masons is also established here, St. Lawrence, No. 131, A. Lindsay being W Master and John Eastwood, Secretary. Daily mails are received from the south by rail, and from Owen Sound and Kincardine by daily stages. Population, 1,040.

TARA.

This is a thriving little village in the Township of Arran on the new gravel road, 16 miles from Owen Sound, and the same distance from Southampton. It is also upon the Sable river, which affords excellent water-privileges. The settlement of the village was begun in 1855, since which time it has steadily increased in size and population, and to-day it presents a thriving and improved appearance, and contains a number of fine buildings, prominent amongst which are the new stores of W & J. Vandusen, the residence of W Vandu-

sen, occupying a conspicuous situation, and the Presbyterian church, all built of brick.

The village also contains a Methodist church of brick, and a brick school house, both new buildings; also a new grist mill, a woollen factory, steam saw mill, fanning mill and agricultural implement manufactory, sash and door factory, cradle factory, two cabinet factories, a pottery, a large brick yard, four general stores, one hardware store, a good photographic gallery, one blacksmith and wagon shop, two town halls, and two hotels. An Orange Lodge meets regularly once a month; and the Montreal Telegraph Co have an office located here. Daily stages from Owen Sound and Southampton pass through Tara, and from each of these places daily mails are received.

As the village is located in a good agricultural district, possesses good water power, and is some distance from the larger towns and villages, there is no reason why it should not increase in size and importance.

The boundaries of the two villages of Tara and Invermay join, and quite a rivalry has existed between them, but the former village is fast leaving its contemporary behind.

The population of Tara at present is about 500.

TIVERTON.

This is a thriving little village on the boundary line between the townships of Kincardine and Bruce, on the Kincardine and Southampton gravel road. It is 9 miles from Kincardine, 26 from Walkerton, 15 from Port Elgin, and $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles from Inverhuron, the nearest lake port. A post office was established in 1860. The village is pleasantly laid out and appearances indicate a prosperous condition. It contains 2 saw mills, 1 grist mill, a carding mill, 2 tanneries, 1 sash factory, 1 foundry, 2 cabinet shops, 4 blacksmith shops, 2 wagon shops, 2 tin shops, 1 drug store, a bakery, 2 harness shops, a millinery shop, 2 tailor shops and four hotels, the "Mansion House," a fine new brick building, being the principal one. There are also a large new brick schoolhouse, Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist churches, an agency of the Montreal Telegraph Company, a printing office and a weekly newspaper, the *Watchman*, published by Mr A Robinson. As it is a fine farming country around Tiverton considerable quantities of wheat and other grain are bought here during the winter months and stored at Inverhuron for shipment upon the opening of navigation. A daily stage runs from Kincardine and Southampton, and daily mails are received from each of these places. The population of Tiverton is 550.

TEESWATER.

A large and flourishing village beautifully situated on the banks of the Teeswater river, from which it bears its name. It is the terminus of the extension of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce railroad from Orangeville. The history of the village dates back to about 1856, although settlers had moved here as early as '52 and '54. The first store was owned by Mr M Hadwen. The 6th and 7th concessions here intersect the 16th side line, thus Teeswater is about the centre of the Township of Culross. In 1856 Messrs Peter B Brown, Alex Gibson, M Hadwen, and Ira Fulford, who respectively owned the corner farms, each had a certain portion of land surveyed into lots, thus really forming the foundation of the present prosperous village. Possessing splendid water privileges, the pioneers at once determined to erect a mill, and Mr Peter B Brown laid out the plan of a mill, and with the aid of the people, who entered the woods and hewed out planks to build the dam, erected a grist mill, which for seven years was the only mill within a radius of 17 miles. At this time the people labored under great disadvantages, being obliged to team all their produce to Seaforth and get their goods in the same manner from Guelph. The village has always had to fight hard for any important improvements, such as gravel roads, railroads, &c., Lucknow being on one side and Walkerton on the other, and being defeated in securing the western terminus of the W G & B R, they gave the large bonus of \$43,000 to secure a railway of their own, only 3½ miles, via the terminus of the narrow gauge, or T G & B R (that being the distance of the road in the township of Culross). The village slowly increased in size until 1873, when Mr Alex Gibson surveyed a number of village lots and disposed of them by auction sale. This caused a rush, and the village has grown fully two-thirds since then, mills and manufacturing being put up in a short time after, and in 1874 the village was incorporated and now presents an appearance of prosperity.

The village contains five churches, a Methodist, Methodist Episcopal, English, a United Presbyterian Church, in which Gaelic is preached, and a splendid brick church of the same denomination for the English speaking people. The latter is a very fine edifice and will compare favorably with similar buildings in larger places. There is a large stone school house, town hall, drill shed, three grist mills, one having oat meal mill in connection, two saw mills, one planing mill and sash factory, one butter factory, and a large foundry owned by Messrs, Fraser & Gillies, doing an extensive business, four carriage shops—Weir & Gibson's with blacksmith shop in connection, and Mr. A Neilson's are both doing a large business; four blacksmith shops—Mr Alex McKenzie's being the longest established and is still doing a good business, while Messrs Howe & Mutch are also reaping the reward of good work; three cabinet factories, prominent amongst which is the shop of Mr R Hodgson; three harness shops, and one tannery. There are also about 14 or 15 general and grocery stores, two drug stores, two photograph galleries, and two pump factories. Mr J King has lately erected a cooper shop with every facility for doing a large business. Mr Thompson also has a large cooper shop. There are six hotels, the Dominion House, owned by Mr Wm Farquharson, being centrally located and largely patronized. The Queen's is also a good hotel.

The Montreal and Dominion Telegraph Companies each have an agency here, and there is also an agency of the Canadian Express Company. A weekly newspaper, the *Teeswater News*, is published by G T Hegyard, The Masonic and Orange Lodges each have a hall of their own and meet once a month. The Good Templars have a lodge established here which is called the "Lilly of Teeswater," which meets every Tuesday evening in the Town Hall. Population of the village 1,100

WIARTON.

This is a small but thriving village at the head of Colpoy's Bay,
 in the Township of Amabel, and on the boundary line between Grey
 and Bruce. The land was surveyed and set apart for village pur-
 poses as early as 1856, but about the first settlement of the village
 was in 1868, at which time a Post Office was established.

Colpoy's Bay is one of the best natural harbors on the upper lakes, the mouth of it being well protected by islands, and its depth is such that the largest vessels can come to the wharves at Wiarton.

The village is 20 miles from Owen Sound by land, and 34 by water, also 30 to Southampton, and about 60 miles by water from Collingwood. In summer a daily boat runs between Owen Sound and Wiarton, and the Lake Superior boats call here occasionally. A tri-weekly stage also runs from Owen Sound, carrying the mails; but after the first of May there will be a daily stage and mail.

The village at present contains one new grist mill, the property of W H Heberden, two steam saw mills, one of which, owned by John Ashcroft, is doing an extensive business; there is also a clothes-pin manufactory, the second one in Ontario, two tanneries, two blacksmith shops, two wagon shops, a harness shop, cabinet shop, tin shop, and about seven stores and shops of different kinds. There are four hotels, the Rush House, and the Victoria Hotel, kept by Thomas Bradford, being the principal ones. There are four churches, a Methodist, Congregational, Bible Christian, and Church of England; also a school and an agency of the Montreal Telegraph Co.

WALKERTON.

Walkerton, the county town of Bruce, is situated on the Durham road, 28 miles east of Kincardine, and six miles from the eastern boundary line of the county. It is beautifully situated in the valley of the Saugeen river, and surrounded by some of the best farming land in the county. Walkerton was founded in 1852 by Mr Joseph Walker, and since its erection into the county town has increased in wealth and population until now it is the second town in the county. It has ample water power and contains a number of mills and manufacturing factories.

In 1874 the W G & B railway was built through Walkerton, increasing the value of property, causing an influx to its population, and making it one of the best grain markets of the northwest. The

business part of the town lies principally along the banks of the river while the rising ground to the south is taken up by the county buildings, churches, school buildings, and private residences.

The county buildings comprise a Jail (stone), a Court House and Registry Office (brick). They were erected in 1866, at a cost of about \$40,000. The Court House, however, does not afford sufficient accommodation for the business of the county and the various county officials, and plans for an addition have been accepted. The new building is to be 36x50 feet, and will contain offices and vaults for the Treasurer and Clerk, and offices for the Engineer and Master in Chancery. The second story will be finished off in committee rooms and a council chamber. The whole is to be finished by November 1st, 1876, and will cost \$5,400. Nearly opposite the Court House is the new Presbyterian Church, a fine brick building, only recently completed. The Catholic Church is also a fine large edifice. The school building, situated on the rising ground to the south of the business portion of the town, also deserves notice. It is a large two story building of brick, and is divided into two departments, a High School and a Common School. The High School employs two teachers, and has an average attendance of 55 pupils; the Common School has five teachers, with an average attendance of 310 pupils. The building occupies a pleasant and commanding situation, and has large and pleasant school grounds attached. There are also a number of fine business establishments and private residences. John McLay's residence, on the east side of the river, occupies a conspicuous position, and is a fine large building. Harris's Hotel, John Bunce's store and residence, W A Green's drug store, and McGregor's brick block, are all fine buildings.

Prominent amongst the manufactories of the town is the large saw mill, planing mill, and sash and door factory, owned by Noxen Brothers. It is driven by water power, turns out a large quantity of lumber and building material, and employs about 50 hands. The same firm also own a large grist mill, the only one in the place, which is also driven by water power.

Bunston & Kennedy's steam woollen factory is a new establishment, and thoroughly equipped with improved machinery. Adamson & Co have a large brickyard, and are manufacturing large quantities of first-class brick.

The town contains a number of other mills and manufacturing establishments, and during the coming summer a number of new mills, stores, residences, and business establishments are to be erected, and the indications are that Walkerton is destined to become a large and flourishing town.

Walkerton boasts of three printing offices and weekly news-

papers, the *Telescope*, published by Joseph Craig, the *Bruce Herald*, by Mr Brown, and the *Glocke*, a German paper, published by Eby & Rettinger. The Montreal and Dominion Telegraph Companies, and the American Express Company, each have an Agency here, and there is also an agency of the Merchants' Bank, which is under the able management of Mr Alexander Sproat.

The population of Walkerton is 2,150.

THE NEW LICENSE ACT.

Rules and Regulations of the Board for the South Riding of Bruce.

Resolutions passed, and Rules and Regulations prescribed by the Board of License Commissioners of the License District composed of the South Riding of the County of Bruce, under and by virtue of the several Acts of the Parliament of Ontario respecting the sale of fermented or spirituous liquors within the said District, and for the Government and orderly keeping of Inns, Taverns and Houses of Public Entertainment.

1. It is resolved and ordered by the said Board that these Resolutions, Rules and Regulations be printed, and a signed copy delivered by the Inspectors and Issuers of Licenses to each person to whom a license is issued; that the said copy be preserved by the holder of the license and kept exposed in the most public place of his or her Shop, Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment, where the same may be most conveniently read by all persons who resort to such Shop, Inn, Tavern or House.
2. It is resolved and declared that Inns, Taverns and Houses of Entertainment are licensed by law for the accommodation of travellers only, and not for the purpose of promoting drunkenness, or encouraging or engendering habits of dissipation and idleness, or of tippling and vice.
3. It is resolved, ordered and declared that every Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment shall be closed from the hour of eleven of the clock at night until seven of the clock in the morning thereafter, save and except on Saturday night, when said houses will be closed at seven o'clock, and remain closed until seven o'clock on Monday morning, and the bar room or bar rooms thereof and all other places where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale or in stock therein shall be closed up and kept closed, and no sale of any such liquors shall take place, or be given away, or bartered, or otherwise disposed of, nor shall the drinking of intoxicating liquor be allowed therein, or on, or near the premises during such hours, or during any other hours or days which by any statute in force in this Province the same are to be or ought to be kept closed, save or except as follows, viz :—
 - 1st. Unless it be exclusively for medicinal or sacramental purposes; or
 - 2nd. Unless the holder of the License keeps a well-appointed and sufficient eating-house with the appliances for serving meals at

any of the Railway Stations, to travellers by Railway, by night as well as by day, and then to *bona fide* travellers ; or

3rd. Where a requisition for medicinal purposes signed by a duly registered medical practitioner, or by a duly qualified justice of the peace of this County, living in the immediate neighborhood of such Inn, or Tavern, or House, be produced by the vendee or his agent, authorizing such sale, setting forth why it is granted, and left with and kept by the vendor for the information of all concerned ; or

4th. Unless it be to *bona fide* travellers who are guests at such Inn, Tavern or House taking meals, or arriving at such Inn or Tavern or House after ten of the clock at night, or leaving before seven of the clock in the morning, and then to such *bona fide* travellers only.

5. It is resolved, ordered and declared that no gambling, throwing or playing of or with dice, cards, billiards, rackets, draughts, chequers, faro-table, rouge-et-noir, raffle, dominoes, bagatelle, roulette, wheel of fortune, whether for gain or amusement, or any device for gambling ; and no selling or auction of pools for any purpose ; or any game of chance, raffle, or lottery, or skittles, or bowls, or bowling green, or bowling alley shall be allowed in or about any Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment ; and all such are forbidden.

6. It is resolved, ordered and declared that no keeper of a Tavern, Inn, or House of Entertainment shall give, or sell, or barter, or otherwise dispose of to any child, or to any minor or apprentice under the age of eighteen years, any intoxicating liquor whatever, without a written order from his or her parents, guardian or master ; nor shall the keeper or landlord of any such Inn, Tavern, or House, or the holder of a license suffer or permit any such child, minor or apprentice to frequent, stay in, or loiter about his or her Inn, Tavern, or House, or premises unless such child, minor or apprentice, shall be a *bona fide* traveller or boarder therein.

7. It is resolved, ordered and declared that the keeper or landlord of an Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment, and no holder of a license shall on any pretence whatever sell, or give, or barter, or otherwise dispose of any intoxicating liquor to any person or persons in a state of intoxication, or to any person known as an habitual drunkard, or to any member of the family or household, or to any wife or husband, apprentice or child or employee or agent of any habitual drunkard, or to any person concerning whom notice either verbal or written from the husband, wife, or son, or daughter, minister, master or guardian, or from a justice of the peace, or other credible person, that such person is an habitual drunkard, or after receiving a request in writing not to do so ; nor shall such keeper or landlord of an Inn, or Tavern, or House of Entertainment, or the holder of a license suffer any tippling, treating or improper or unnecessary drinking in or about his or her house or premises ; nor shall he or she sell, or barter,

tor give to any person or persons who may, whilst in a state of intoxication, enter or be on his or her premises, any intoxicating liquor or drink whatsoever.

8. It is resolved, ordered and declared that every Inn, Tavern, and House of Entertainment shall form no part of, and shall not communicate by any entrance with any shop or store wherein goods or merchandise known as groceries or provisions are kept for sale.

9. It is resolved, ordered and declared that every Inn, Tavern, and House of Entertainment within this License District, without any exception whatever, must and shall be a well-appointed and sufficient eating house, with the appliances requisite for daily serving meals to travellers continuously for the whole period of the license.

10. It is resolved, ordered and declared that every Inn, Tavern and House of Entertainment duly licensed shall contain, and during the continuance of the license shall continue to contain, in addition to what may be needed for the use of the family of the landlord or keeper thereof, at least one decently furnished room with fire-place or stove, kept properly warmed in cold weather, apart from the bar-room or place where intoxicating liquors are sold, for the comfort and convenience of, and which shall be exclusively devoted as a sitting room for travellers, and shall not be used for any other purpose whatever; and also not less than four bed-rooms, together with in every case a suitable compliment of clean beds, bedding and furniture; and there shall be also attached to the said Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment, proper stabling for at least eight horses, and at all times to have sufficient provender, in hay and oats, besides that required by the innkeeper or landlord for the stabling of his own horses or cattle, and the horses or cattle of any person or persons not travellers which may be usually kept in his stable.

11. It is resolved, ordered and declared, that no Innkeeper, Tavernkeeper, or Keeper of a House of Entertainment within this License District shall harbor, shelter, or give comfort or afford any assistance or encouragement to any drunkards, gamblers, idlers, blacklegs, loafers, loungers, pickpockets, burglars, thieves, vagabonds, or suspicious characters, nor shall the keeper of any Inn, Tavern, or House, or the holder of a License, permit any such person or persons to enter or occupy or remain in his or her bar-room, or house, or premises or be in his or her employ; nor shall he or she suffer any person or persons whomsoever to wrestle, fight, or quarrel, or wrangle or to disturb, or annoy guests or travellers putting up at, or staying at his or her Inn, Tavern, or House or whereby their persons or property may be endangered, or their comfort and quietude disturbed or curtailed; nor shall he or she permit or suffer improper disturbances, or noises of singing of loud or profane songs, or profane talking or

swearing or profane oaths or filthy or profane jesting in his or her Inn, Tavern, or House, or in or near the premises thereof; nor shall thieves, three-card monte men, fortune tellers, conjurors, gipsies, or mountebanks, or confidence men, or mock auction men, or gift lottery men, or other rogues and improper persons, or harlots, or men or women of loose or doubtful character or reputation be permitted to resort to or enter into, or remain in or at any Inn, Tavern or House of Entertainment, or the premises thereof; and every keeper of such Inn, Tavern or House shall be bound to dismiss and expel all such persons and all others who are not *bona fide* travellers or guests of his or her Inn, Tavern or House, from and out of his or her house and premises.

12 It is resolved and ordered that the Inspectors and Issuers of Licenses shall, and they are required to inspect and report to this Board upon the House, Shop and premises of every applicant for a License, and make a return of all persons convicted from time to time, of any breach of the foregoing Regulations, or any offence, or who shall not in every respect conduct his or her Shop, Inn, Tavern, House in a proper and orderly manner, or shall for any reason have otherwise rendered himself unfit to be the holder of a License.

SHOPS.

The holders of licenses for selling liquor in shops, besides the regulations and restrictions prescribed by law, shall be subject to the following local restrictions as provided by By-law of the several municipalities viz:—

1. In the Town of Kincardine: The keeper or owner of the shops shall continue the business of said shops or stores solely and exclusively to the keeping and selling of liquors, and no sale or other disposal of the said liquors shall take place therein or on the premises thereof after the hour of seven of the o'clock in the afternoon till seven of the clock in the forenoon at any season of the year.
2. The business of the shops to which license shall be granted, must be confined solely and exclusively to the keeping and selling of liquor, and it is not lawful for the holder of any shop license to give or sell to any child under the age of fifteen years any spirituous or intoxicating liquors under any pretence whatever.
3. The Board have determined upon granting only a limited number of Shop Licenses in municipalities which have no By-law in force fixing or limiting the number to be granted; and they will give the preference in all such cases to those persons who are otherwise fit to hold a license and who intend to fit up a shop immediately and confine the business of his or her shop solely and exclusi-

vely to the keeping and selling of liquor, provided the Inspector certifies to all the necessary facts.

The foregoing Resolutions, Rules and Regulations were passed and made at Kincardine, in the said Council, this twenty-first day of April, A. D. 1876.

BILL.

An Act to amend the Law respecting the sale of Fermented or Spirituous Liquors.

[Assented to 10th February, 1876.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Act passed in the thirty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and consolidate the law for the sale of Fermented or Spirituous Liquors :"

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows :—

1. All powers and duties conferred and imposed upon the commissioners of police and municipal councils respectively, by virtue of the said recited Act, shall hereafter exclusively belong to and be exercised and performed by a board of license commissioners, except where express provision is otherwise made in this Act ; and such board shall be composed of three persons to be appointed from time to time by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for each city, county, union of counties, or electoral riding or division as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may think fit ; and each of the commissioners shall cease to hold office on the thirty-first day of December in each year, but he may be reappointed ; and the said office shall be honorary and without any remuneration.

2. The number of tavern licenses to be granted in the respective municipalities shall not in each year be in excess of the following limitations : In cities, towns and incorporated villages respectively, according to the following scale, that is to say, one for each full two hundred and fifty of the first one thousand of the population, and one for each full four hundred over one thousand of the population : but in no case shall this limit authorize any increase in any municipality in excess of the number of licenses therein issued for the year ending the first day of March next, unless from the future increase of the population the license commissioners shall think a larger number has become necessary, but not in any case exceeding the limit imposed by this Act ;

(2.) And for the license year ending on the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in cities the reduction need not be more than one-fourth of the number now under license for the year ending the first day of March next ;

(3.) The council of every city, town, village or township municipality may, by by-law to be passed before the first day of March in any year, limit the number of tavern licenses to be issued therein for

the then ensuing year, or for any future year until such by-law is altered or repealed : Provided such limit is under the limit imposed by this Act. The council shall have a certified copy of such by-law to be sent immediately after the passing thereof to the license commissioners ;

(4.) In incorporated villages, being county towns, the limit may be five in number, and in the town of Clifton three hotels, near the Falls of Niagara, which may be licensed, may be excluded from the number which would otherwise be the maximum limit under this Act.

3. The number of the population which is to determine the number of licenses under this Act shall be according to the then last preceding census taken under the authority of the Dominion of Canada, except where the commissioners shall be of opinion that owing to a large increase of the population since such census, an increased number of licensed taverns is needed for the convenience and accommodation of travellers ; and in that case, if the commissioners so certify, and the council of the municipality memorialise the Lieutenant-Governor for such increase, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may authorize a new census to be taken under the authority of a by-law of the municipality and at the expense of the municipality, and the limit for the number of licenses shall then be, one for each full two hundred and fifty of the population under one thousand, and one for each five hundred over one thousand of the population ;

(2.) In case of the alteration or formation of any municipality subsequent to such census of the Dominion of Canada, the population of such municipality, for the purposes of this Act, may be ascertained by the said commissioners by reference to the enumeration on which such census took place, or by a new census taken under the provisions of this section.

(3.) Where, since the said Dominion census, a census has been taken in any municipality under the authority of the council having jurisdiction, the limit may be the same as in the case of a census taken under this section for the purposes of this Act.

4. The license commissioners may by resolution regulate and determine the several matters provided for in the ninth section of the said recited Act, at any time before the first day of May in each year, but where special grounds are shown, may issue one or more licenses (within the authorised limit) after such day.

5. In addition to the accommodation required by the said recited Act, each tavern or house of entertainment, shall be shown, to the satisfaction of the license commissioners, to be a well-appointed and sufficient eating house, with the appliances requisite for daily serving meals to travellers ; and these requirements shall apply to all taverns

or houses of entertainments, without any exception whatever, and continuously, for the whole period of the license.

6. The council of any city or town may, by by-law to be passed before the first day of March in any year, prescribe any requirements in addition to those under the said recited Act or this Act, as to accommodation to be possessed by taverns or houses of entertainment, as the council shall see fit; and the license commissioners upon receiving a copy of such by-law shall be bound to observe the provisions thereof; and such by-law shall continue in full force for such year and any future year until repealed.

7. Before any tavern license shall be granted, the person applying for the same shall enter into a bond to Her Majesty in the sum of two hundred dollars, with two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the inspector, in the sum of one hundred dollars each, conditioned for the payment of all fines and penalties such person may be condemned to pay for any offence against any Act, by-law or provision in the nature of law, relative to taverns and houses of public entertainment then and thereafter to be in force, and to do, perform and observe all the requirements thereof, and to conform to all by-laws and regulations that may be established by competent authority in such behalf, and such bond shall be in the form expressed in Schedule A to this Act; and when executed shall be filed in the office of the inspector of licenses, to be by him transmitted to the office of the Provincial Treasurer.

8. The inspector of licenses under the said recited act shall be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council from time to time for each city, county, union of counties, electoral riding or division as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may think fit; and such inspector shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of the inspector for each township, town, incorporated village or city, under the provisions of the said recited Act, and each inspector so to be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, shall also be and discharge the duties of issuer of licenses, and each inspector shall before entering upon his duties, give such security as the Treasurer of the Province may require for the due performance of his said duties, and for the payment over of all sums of money received by him according to the provisions of this Act; and the salary of such inspector shall be fixed by the Order in Council under which he is appointed.

9. The report of the inspector, under the thirteenth section of the said recited Act, shall further state that the applicant is known to the inspector to be of good character and repute.

10. A shop license shall only be granted to such person as shall have filed his application with the inspector on or before the first day of April in each year, and who shall have been reported by the inspector to the license commissioners to be a person of good

character, and that his shop and premises are suitable for carrying on a reputable business, and who shall execute with sureties the bond in the form expressed in Schedule B to this Act.

11. The report of the inspector shall only be for the information of the license commissioners, who shall exercise their own discretion on each application, and should there be no report to the effect aforesaid, then as the commissioners may think fit to determine.

12. The council of every city, town, village or township municipality may, by by-law to be passed before the first day of March, in any year, limit the number of shop licenses to be granted therein for the then ensuing year, and in such by-law or by any other by-law passed before the said day, may require the shopkeeper to confine the business of his shop solely and exclusively to the keeping and selling of liquor, or may impose any restriction upon the mode of carrying on such traffic as the council may think fit, and such by-law shall be binding upon the license commissioners, and any shop license to be issued shall conform to the provisions thereof; and such by-law shall remain in force for any future year until repealed.

13. Where the applicant for a tavern or shop license resides in a remote part of the county, or where for any other reason the license commissioners see fit, they may dispense with the report of the inspector, and act upon such information as may satisfy them in the premises.

14. A wholesale license shall be strictly limited to persons who carry on the business of selling by wholesale or in unbroken packages.

15. Manufacturers of native wines from grapes grown and produced in Ontario, and who sell such wines in quantities of not less than three gallons, or one dozen bottles of not less than three half-pints each at one time, are exempted from any duty under this Act, and are not required to obtain any license for so selling wines so manufactured.

16. The following duties shall hereafter be payable, and shall be in lieu of all others, provincial or municipal, that is to say:

(1.) For each wholesale license the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. For each shop license in cities, one hundred dollars; in towns, eighty dollars; and in other municipalities, sixty dollars. For each tavern license in cities one hundred dollars; in towns, eighty dollars; and in other municipalities, sixty dollars;

(2.) The council of any municipality may by by-law require a larger duty to be paid for tavern or shop licenses therein, but not in excess of two hundred dollars in the whole, unless the by-law has been approved by the electors under the twenty-third section of the said recited Act;

(3.) In any municipality where, under the provisions of sections

twenty-two and twenty-three of the said recited Act, and of any by-law in that behalf, a larger sum or duty in the whole than the foregoing is now payable for any shop or tavern license, such sum or duty shall be the lowest duty payable under this Act for any such license until altered by by-law of the municipality to be passed for the purpose, but in no case shall the duty be under the amount in this section specially prescribed.

17. The duty in all cases shall be paid to the inspector, and upon payment he shall issue the respective licenses authorized by the license commissioners, and it shall no longer be necessary that the treasurer of the municipality shall endorse or sign any receipt thereon; and the inspector shall daily, on receipt of any duty, pay the same into one of the chartered banks designated by the Treasurer of the Province to the credit of an account to be entitled "License Fund Account for the City [or County or Riding] of _____," and all sums shall be drawn therefrom by cheque of the inspector, countersigned by two of the license commissioners.

18. Any penalty in money which, under the said recited Act, may be recovered in cases where any inspector is the prosecutor or complainant, shall be paid by the convicting justice or justices to the inspector, and paid in by him to the credit of the License Fund Account;"

(2.) In case the whole amount of the penalty and costs be not recovered, the amount recovered shall be applied, first, to the payment of the costs, and the balance shall be appropriated as hereinafter mentioned;

(3.) In any case where the inspector has prosecuted and obtained a conviction, and has been unable to recover the amount of costs, the same shall be made good out of the said License Fund;

(4.) In any case where the inspector has prosecuted and failed to obtain a conviction, he shall be indemnified against all costs out of the License Fund, should the justice or justices before whom the complaint is made certify that such officer had reasonable and probable cause for preferring such prosecution or complaint.

19. All sums received from duties on tavern, shop and wholesale licenses, and for fines and penalties, shall form the license fund of the city, county, union of counties, electoral riding or division respectively for which the board of license commissioners has been appointed, and the same shall be applied, under regulations of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, for the payment of the salary and expenses of the inspector, and for the expenses of the office of the board and of officers, and otherwise in carrying the provisions of the law into effect, and the residue on the thirtieth day of June, in each year and at such other times as may be prescribed by the regulations of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, shall be paid over,—one-

third to the Treasurer of the Province, to and for the use of the Province, and the other two-thirds to the treasurer of the city, town, village, or township municipality in which the licensed premises are respectively situate; but in cases where any municipality by by-law requires a larger duty to be paid than the specific sum mentioned in the sixteenth section for an license, the whole of such excess shall be paid over to the Treasurer of such municipality.

20. Section thirty-five of the said Act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "required" in the third line of the said section, the words "or who shall otherwise violate any other provision of this Act, in respect of which violation no other punishment is prescribed."

21. In proving the sale or disposal, gratuitous or otherwise, or consumption of liquor for the purpose of any proceeding relative to any offence under this Act, it shall not be necessary to shew that any money actually passed, or any liquor was actually consumed, if the justice or justices or court hearing the case be satisfied that a transaction in the nature of a sale or other disposal actually took place, or that any consumption of liquor was about to take place, and proof of consumption or intended consumption of liquor on premises under license or in respect to which a license is required under this Act, by some person, other than the occupier of said premises, shall be evidence that such liquor was sold to the person consuming or being about to consume or carrying away the same, as against the holder of the license or the occupant of the said premises.

22. Section fifty of the said Act is hereby amended by striking out the words "are sold," in the seventh line and substituting therefor "are kept or had for the purpose of being sold, bartered or traded in."

23. The license commissioners may with the sanction of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council appoint one or more officers to enforce the provisions of this Act, and especially for the prevention of traffic in liquor by unlicensed houses, and such officer or officers shall possess and discharge all the powers and duties of Provincial officers as if appointed under the fifty-fourth section of the said recited Act.

24. The year during which licenses are to be in force shall begin on the 1st day of May in each year, and end on the thirtieth day of April, in the year following; and all licenses heretofore duly issued and expiring on the first day of March next shall be deemed to continue in effect till the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six: Provided always, that such licenses are duly renewed for that period by payment being made to the treasurer of the municipality, and to the issuer respectively, of additional duty equal to one-sixth of the duty provincial and municipal, payable for

the now current year of such licenses, and that from and after the passing of this Act no by-law or certificate of police commissioners in cities or of municipal councils in other municipalities for the granting of any license, shall have any force or effect in granting any other or future licenses, and except for the purpose of renewing the said licenses under this proviso, the powers, and duties of all inspectors and issuers appointed under the said recited Act shall cease; and such renewal may be made by the endorsement of the issuer upon the license.

25. In such portion of judicial or territorial districts as are not within the jurisdiction of any municipal county, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may appoint one or more persons for the issue of such number of tavern and shop licenses to such persons, for such places and periods, and upon such conditions as may be prescribed by order in Council, to take effect from the first of June in each year;

(2.) For any such tavern or shop license, the duty payable shall be the sum of sixty dollars;

(3.) Any municipal corporation within any such district shall have the like authority in respect of taverns and shops therein, and the licenses therefor, as the like corporations in municipal counties possess under the provisions of this Act or the said recited Acts;

(4.) The provisions of this Act and of the said recited Act shall be in force and apply to all portion of such judicial or territorial districts.

26. For vessels navigating the waters of this Province, the duty shall be one hundred dollars, and shall be payable to the inspector granting the license on behalf of Her Majesty for the public uses of the Province.

27. Nothing in the said recited Act or this Act shall be construed to affect or impair any of the provisions of "The Temperance Act of 1864" of the late Province of Canada, all of which, so far as the same are within the jurisdiction of this Legislature, are declared to be in full force and effect; and no tavern or shop license shall be issued or take effect within any county, city, town, incorporated village, or township in Ontario within which any by-law for prohibiting the sale of liquor under the said Act is in force.

(2.) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may, notwithstanding any such by-law affects the whole of any county, nominate a board of commissioners of the number, and for the period mentioned in the first section of this Act, and also an inspector; and the said board and inspector shall have, discharge and exercise all such powers and duties respectively for preventing the sale, traffic or disposal of liquor contrary to said Act or this Act as they respectively have or should perform under this Act;

(3.) The board of license commissioners and the inspector appointed under this Act shall exercise and discharge all their respective powers and duties for the enforcement of the provisions of the Temperance Act of 1864 (as well as of this Act, so far as the same shall apply), within the limits of any county, city, incorporated village or township in which any by-law under the said Temperance Act is in force;

(4.) All expenses which may be incurred in carrying the provisions of this section into effect shall be borne and paid in the proportion of one-third by the Province out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and two-thirds by the municipality within which any such by-law is in force, in cases where there is no license fund under this Act.

28. This Act shall take effect immediately on the passing thereof.

BILL.

An Act to consolidate and amend the law respecting Voters' Lists.

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows :

1. The Clerk of each municipality shall, immediately after the final revision and correction of the assessment rolls in every year, make a correct alphabetical list of all persons appearing by the assessment roll to be entitled to vote in the municipality, prefixing to the name of each person his number upon the roll. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7.
- (2.) Where a municipality is divided into polling subdivisions, said list shall be made out according to such subdivisions, and under each subdivision shall be arranged alphabetically the names of all the persons appearing to be entitled to vote in such subdivision. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7.
- (3.) If the qualification of any such person is in respect of real property, the Clerk shall, opposite the name of the person, insert the number of the lot or other proper description of the real property in respect of which each person is so qualified. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7.
- (4.) If the qualification is in respect to income, the Clerk shall, state that fact, and the place at which the voter resides in the municipality. 32 V. c. 4, s. 2.
- (5.) Whenever it appears by the assessment roll that any person is assessed for property within the municipality sufficient to entitle him to vote, but that it lies partly within the limits of one of such subdivisions and partly within another or others, the Clerk shall enter his name on the list of voters in each or every subdivision in which any part of such property is situate, with the following words added: "See subdivision No. . ." 32 V. c. 21, s. 27, *first clause*.
- (6.) Any assessment roll shall be understood to be finally revised and corrected, when it has been so revised and corrected by the Court of Revision for the municipality, or by the Judge of the County Court, in case of an appeal, as provided in the *Act respecting the Assessment of Property in Ontario*, or when the time during which such appeal may be made has elapsed, and not before. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (11).
2. Immediately after the Clerk has made the said alphabetical list, and within thirty days after the final revision and correction of the assessment roll, the Clerk shall cause at least two hundred copies of said list to be printed, (in pamphlet form where practicable), and forthwith shall cause one of such printed copies to be posted up,

and to be kept posted up in some conspicuous place in his own office, and deliver, or transmit by post, by registered letter, or by parcel or book post, registered, three of such copies to each Judge of the County Court of the County to which for judicial purposes the municipality belongs; and two copies to each of the following persons, that is to say:

- a.* Every member of the municipal council of the municipality except the Reeve;
- b.* The Treasurer thereof;
- c.* The Sheriff of the County;
- d.* The Clerk of the Peace;
- e.* Every Postmaster in the municipality;
- f.* Every Head Master or Mistress of a Public or Separate School in the municipality;

(2.) And the clerk of the municipality shall forthwith also deliver or transmit by post, by registered letter, or by parcel or book post, registered, ten of such copies to each of the following persons, that is to say:

The Member of the House of Commons, and the Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District, respectively, in which the municipality or any part thereof lies;

Every candidate for whom votes were given at the then last election of a member for the House of Commons, and for the Legislative Assembly respectively; and

The Reeve of the municipality.

(3.) Upon each of the copies so sent to each person shall be a printed or written certificate, over the name of the Clerk, stating that such list is a correct list of all persons appearing by the assessment rolls of the municipality to be entitled to vote at elections for members of the Legislative Assembly; and also stating the date upon which a copy of such list was first posted in the Clerk's office; and further calling upon all electors to examine the said list, and, if any omissions or other errors are perceived therein, to take immediate proceedings to have the said errors corrected according to law.

(4.) The Sheriff shall immediately upon the receipt of his copies cause one of them to be posted up in a conspicuous place in the court house; the Clerk of the Peace, upon receipt of his copies, shall cause one of them to be posted in a conspicuous place in his office; every Public or Separate School Head Master or Mistress shall in like manner post up one of his or her copies on the door of the school house; and every Postmaster shall post up one of his copies in his post office. 37 V. c. 4, s. 3.

(5.) Any person who wilfully defaces, tears down, or removes any list so posted up, within _____ days from the time when the same was first posted, shall, upon conviction thereof before a

Justice of the Peace, incur a penalty of not less than dollars, nor more than dollars.

3. The Clerk shall also forthwith cause to be inserted in some newspaper, published in the municipality, or in case no newspaper is published in the municipality, then in some newspaper published in the municipality next thereto, or in the county town, a notice, signed by him, stating the date of the first posting up of the said list in his office. One insertion of such notice shall be sufficient. 37 V. c. 4, s. 4.

4. The said list of voters shall be subject to revision by the County Judge, at the instance of any voter or person entitled to be a voter in the municipality for which the list is made, or in the Electoral District in which the municipality is situate, on the ground of the names of voters being omitted from the list, or being wrongly stated therein, or of names of persons being inserted on the list who are not entitled to vote; and upon such revision, the assessment roll shall not be conclusive evidence in regard to any particular, whether the matter on which the right to vote depends had or had not been brought before the Court of Revision, or had or had not been determined by that court; and the decision of the Judge under this Act, in regard to the right of any person to vote, shall be final so far as regards such persons. 37 V. c. 4, s. 5.

(2.) A complaint or appeal may be made on the ground of any person whose name is entered on the list being one of those who are disqualified or incompetent to vote under the second, third or fourth sections of *The Election Law of 1868*.

(3.) If any person named as a voter in the said list has, before the final revision and correction of the Assessment Roll, parted with the property in respect of which his name was entered in the voters' list, the person to whom he has transferred the property, or who is in possession of the same, shall be entitled to apply to the Judge to be entered on the list instead of the person originally named therein; and the proceedings to be taken in such case shall be the same as in cases of appeals under this Act.

5. Any voter or person entitled to be a voter making any complaint of any error or omission in the said list shall, within thirty days after the Clerk has posted up the said list in his office, give to the Clerk of the municipality, or leave for him at his residence or place of business, notice in writing of his complaint and intention to apply to the Judge in respect thereof; and if the office of Clerk be vacant by reason of death, resignation or from any other cause, such notice may be given in like manner to the Head of the Council of the municipality, and the proceedings thereafter by the Clerk, Judge and parties respectively, and the respective powers and duties of the Judge, Clerk, and other persons, shall be the same, or as nearly as may be

the same, as in the case of an appeal from the Court of Revision; but no deposit shall be required to be made before any such complaint is heard or disposed of. 37 V. c. 4, s. 6.

(2.) If the notice be given to or left for the Head of the Council, he shall perform or cause to be performed such necessary acts as should be performed by the Clerk if there were one.

6. In case no complaint respecting such list is received by the Clerk of the municipality, within thirty days after the Clerk has posted up the said list in his office, the Clerk shall forthwith apply, either in person or by letter, to the Judge to certify three copies of such list as being the revised list of voters for the municipality; and the Judge shall retain one of such certified copies of the list, and deliver or transmit by post, registered, one of such certified copies to the Clerk of the Peace for the County or union of Counties within which the municipality lies, and one of such certified copies to the Clerk of the municipality, to be kept by him among the records of his office. *Vide* 37 V. c. 4, s. 7.

7. Any party may obtain from the County Court a subpoena, or from the County Judge an order requiring the attendance at the Court for hearing complaints as aforesaid, at the time mentioned in such subpoena or order, of a witness residing or served with such subpoena or order in any part of this Province; and requiring any such witness to bring with him and produce at the Court any papers or documents mentioned in the subpoena or order; and every witness served with such subpoena or order shall obey the same, provided the allowance for his expenses, according to the scale allowed in Division Courts, is tendered to him at the time of his service; and any person complaining, or any person in respect of the insertion or omission of whose name a complaint is made, shall, if resident within the municipality, the list of which is the subject of complaint, or within the municipality in which the Court is held, upon being served with a subpoena or order therein, obey the same without being tendered or paid any allowance for his expenses; if any person, whose right to be a voter is the subject of inquiry do not attend in obedience to such subpoena or order, the Judge, if he think fit, in the absence of satisfactory evidence as to the ground of such non-attendance, or as to the right of such person to be a voter, may, on the ground of the non-attendance of such person, strike his name off the list of voters, or refuse to place his name on the list of voters, as the case may require, or impose a reasonable fine on such person according to his discretion, or do both. *Vide* 37 V. c. 4, s. 8.

(2.) Any number of names may be inserted in one subpoena or Judge's order, in any case of complaint; and the subpoena may be in the form set forth in the Schedule to this Act.

8. Immediately after the list has been finally revised and cor-

rected as aforesaid, the Judge shall make or cause to be made and shall sign, a statement in triplicate, setting forth the changes, if any, which he has made in the list ; and shall certify in triplicate a corrected copy of the list.

(2.) The Judge shall retain one of such certified copies and one statement, and shall deliver or transmit by post, registered, one of such certified copies and one statement to the Clerk of the Peace for the County or Union of Counties within which the municipality lies, and one of such certified copies and one statement to the Clerk of the municipality, to be kept by him among the records of his office.

9. No person shall be admitted to vote unless his name appears on the last list of voters made, certified, and delivered or transmitted as aforesaid to the Clerk of the Peace at least one month before the date of the writ to hold the election ; and no question of qualification shall be raised at any such election, except to ascertain whether the person tendering his vote is the same person intended to be designated in the alphabetical list as aforesaid.

10. The times appointed for the performance, by the clerk of the municipality, of the duties required of him by this Act, shall be directory only to the said clerk ; and the non-performance, by him, of any of the said duties within the times appointed, shall not render null, void, or inoperative any of the lists in this Act mentioned. *Vide* 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (3).

11. In case the Clerk of any municipality fails to perform any of the duties aforesaid, the Clerk of the Peace shall forthwith apply summarily to the County Judge or acting Judge of the County Court for the County within which such municipality is situate, to enforce the performance of the same. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (5).

(2.) The application may also be made by any person entitled to be named as an elector on the list in respect of which the application is made. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (6).

(3.) The Judge shall, on such application, require the Clerk of the municipality, and any other person he sees fit, to appear before him and produce the assessment roll, and any documents relating thereto, or to the list in respect to which the application is made, and to submit to such examination on oath as may be required of him or them, and the Judge shall thereupon make such orders and give such directions as he may deem necessary or proper for the purposes aforesaid. *Vide* 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (7).

(4.) The Clerk of the municipality shall be personally liable for and shall pay the costs of the proceedings, unless on some special grounds the Judge shall see fit to order otherwise, and in such special case the costs shall be in the discretion of the Judge. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (8).

(5.) Such proceedings and such order of the Judge shall not in

anywise exonerate or release the Clerk from liability to the penalty hereinbefore imposed. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (9).

12. If any appellant or complainant, before the sitting of the Court, die or abandon his appeal or complaint, the Judge may if he think proper allow any other person who might have been an appellant or complainant to intervene and prosecute such appeal or complaint, upon such terms as the Judge shall think just.

13. In case of errors being found in the said voters' list on the said revision thereof, whether such errors are in the omission of names, the inaccurate entry of names, or the entry of names of persons not entitled to vote, if it appear to the Judge that the Assessor was blameable for any of the said errors, the Judge shall order the assessor, either alone or jointly with any other to pay all costs occasioned by the same; and in case of errors for which the Clerk was to blame, the Clerk, either alone or jointly with any other person, shall be charged with the costs; and in case of errors of the Court of Revision, the municipality shall, either alone or jointly with any person, pay the costs, subject to any claim which the municipality may justly have against the guilty parties; or the Judge may order the Assessor, Clerk or Municipality, in any such case, to pay the costs, if any party fail to recover the same from any other party named and ordered to pay the same; and, in all cases not herein provided for, the costs shall be in the discretion of the Judge. 37 V. c. 4, s. 10.

(2.) No costs shall be allowed on any proceeding under this Act, other or higher than would be allowed in the Division Court under the lowest scale of costs in actions therein.

(3.) The only costs to which an appellant shall be liable shall be the witness fees, unless in a case of bad faith on his part.

14. The payment of any costs ordered to be paid by the Judge may be enforced by an execution against goods and chattels, to be issued from any County Court upon filing therein the order of the Judge, and an affidavit showing the amount at which such costs were taxed and the non-payment thereof.

15. If a person not assessed, or not sufficiently assessed, shall be found entitled to vote, the municipality shall be entitled to recover taxes from him, and to enforce payment thereof by the same means and in the same manner as if he had been assessed on the roll for the amount found by the Judge; and the Judge shall make an order, setting forth the names of the persons so liable and the sum for which each person should have been assessed, and the land or other property in respect of which the liability exists; and such order shall be transmitted to the Clerk of the municipality, and shall have the same effect as if the said particulars had been inserted on the roll. 37 V. c. 4, s. 11.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

16. It shall be the duty of the municipality within which a Court is holden, to provide some suitable and convenient place, properly furnished, heated and lighted, for the holding of such Court, and in case such is not done the Judge may hold said Court at such other place in the County as he may deem proper ; and if the same is held elsewhere than in the County Court house, the proprietor or proprietors of the building in which it is held may recover from the municipality which should have made such provision the sum of dollars per diem for each and every day during which such building is used for the purposes of such Court. Any Court held in the County Town shall be held in the County Court-house or in such other place in said County Town as the Judge shall deem proper.

17. In all proceedings before the Judge under this Act, the Judge shall have with reference to the matters herein contained, all the powers which belong to or might be exercised by him in the County Court.

18. The Judge shall have power to appoint some proper person to attend at the sitting of the Court as a Constable or Bailiff, and the duties and powers of such person thereat shall be as nearly as may be the same as those of the Bailiff of a Division Court at a sitting of a Division Court and in reference thereto : and the expenses of the person so appointed and attending shall be borne by the municipality the list for which is the subject of investigation, and shall include such allowance for loss of time, trouble and travelling fees as shall be certified by the Judge to be reasonable; and the amount certified by the Judge shall be paid to such person by the Treasurer of the municipality upon the production and deposit with him of the Judge's certificate.

19. The Clerk of every municipality shall be subject to the summary jurisdiction and control of the County Judge in respect to the performance of his duty under this Act, and in respect to every act required to be performed by such Clerk touching the voters' list, in the same manner as officers of the County Court are to the Court.

20. If the Judge who holds a Court believes or has good reason to believe that any person or persons have contravened the *twenty-sixth* or *twenty-ninth* sections of this Act, or that frauds in respect to the assessment or the voters' lists have prevailed extensively in the municipality it shall be his duty to report the same to the Provincial Secretary, with such particulars as to names and facts as he may think proper.

21. The Judge shall have power to amend any notice or other proceeding upon such terms as he shall think proper.

22. The Board of County Judges may, if requested so to do by

the Lieutenant-Governor, frame rules and form of procedure for the purpose of better carrying this Act into effect, and such rules and forms shall, after being approved of by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, have the same effect and force as if they formed part of this Act.

23. The Clerk of the Peace and the Clerk of any municipality having the custody of the list of voters of any municipality or part of any municipality or place, shall furnish a certified copy of such list then last revised and corrected to any person who shall require such copy, on being paid for the same by such person at the rate of four cents for every ten voters whose names are on such list; the said officers may furnish printed copies, for each of which they shall be entitled to receive six cents instead of the fee aforesaid, and the officers shall verify any alterations made therein, by writing their initials in close proximity thereto; if the alterations or interlineations exceed one hundred, it shall be the duty of the said officer to furnish written copies. 38 V. c. 3, s. 12.

(2.) For each copy of the voters' list furnished to the Returning Officer, in the form of Schedule K to the Ballot Act of 1874, the Clerk of the Peace shall be entitled to receive the sum of six cents for every ten voters whose names are on the list.

24. If any Clerk omits, neglects or refuses to complete the voters' lists, or to perform any of the duties hereinbefore required of him for his municipality, such Clerk, for each such omission, neglect or refusal, shall incur a penalty of two hundred dollars. 32 V. c. 21, s. 7 (4.)

25. If any Clerk of a municipality, or Clerk of the Peace, or any other person wilfully makes any alteration, omission or insertion, or in any way wilfully falsifies any such certified list or copy, or permits the same to be done, every such person shall incur a penalty of two thousand dollars. 32 V. c. 21, s. 11.

26. No person shall make, execute, accept or become a party to any lease, deed, or other instrument, or become a party to any verbal arrangement, whereby a colorable interest in any land, house or tenement is conferred, in order to qualify any person to vote at an election; and any person violating the provisions of this section, besides being liable to any other penalty prescribed in that behalf, shall incur a penalty of one hundred dollars and any person who induces, or attempts to induce another to commit an offence under this section, shall incur a like penalty. 37 V. c. 4, s. 14.

27. The penalties mentioned in the three next preceding sections, may be recovered with costs of suit by any person suing for the same in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

28. To prevent the creation of false votes, where any person claims to be assessed, or claim that any other person should be as-

sessed, as owner or occupant of any parcel of land, or as possessing the income which may entitle him to vote in the municipality at an election for the Legislative Assembly, and the assessor has reason to suspect that the person so claiming, or for whom the claim is made, has not a just right to be so assessed, it shall be the duty of the assessor to make reasonable enquiries before assessing such person. 37 V. c. 4, s. 1.

29. Any Assessor who wilfully and improperly inserts any name in the assessment roll, or assesses any person at too high an amount, with intent in either case to give to any person not entitled thereto an apparent right of voting at any election, or who wilfully inserts any fictitious name in the assessment roll, or who wilfully and improperly omits any name from the assessment roll, or assesses any person at too low an amount, with intent in either case to deprive any person of his right to vote, shall, upon conviction thereof before a court of competent jurisdiction, be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, and to imprisonment until the fine be paid, or to imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or city, for a period not exceeding six months, or to both such fine or imprisonment, in the discretion of the court. 37 V. c. 4, s. 13.

30. The Act respecting Voters' Lists passed in the Session of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, held in the thirty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign is hereby repealed; the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth sections of the Election Law of 1868, and the twelfth section of the Act, chapter three, of the Acts passed in the thirty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign, are hereby repealed.

31. This Act may be cited as "*The Voters' List Act of 1875.*"

32. This Act shall come into force on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.
