## ST. MICHAEL'S COLLEGE, TORONTO, ONT.

$\lesssim$ T. MICHAEL'S COLLEGE was established in 1852 by

- P) the Basilian Fathers from Annonay, France, at the request and under the patronage of the late Most Rev. Dr. De Charbonnel, then Bishop of Toronto. For four years the College occupied the wing of St. Michael's Palace on Church street. In 1856 a more suitable edifice was erected on the present site, which was partly the gift of the late Hon. John Elmsley. Since that time the building has been more than doubled in size ; and the chapel attached to the College has been also enlarged and improved. The location is one of the most beautiful and healthy in the City of Toronto.

The object of the Institution is to impart a thorough Catholic training, moral and intellectual, so as to fit young men for any position in life which they may wish to occupy.

The studies advancing steadily with the educational progress of the country, it was deemed to be to the advantage of those studying for the liberal professions to have the College affiliated with the Provincial University. In 1881 this affiliation was effected upon a basis similar to that of several of the Catholic Colleges of England and Ireland with the London University. An Act was passed in 1887 by the Local Kegislature, according to which the
same relations were maintained with the University, and provision for the teaching of certain departments in the curriculum was made by the Government. A confederating college may avail itself of this teaching or not, according to its own convenience. An examination before the University examiners is required in order that students may matriculate. The examinations of the second and third years are passed before the College authorities, whose certificates are received by the-University Senate. At the end of the first and the fourth year the University Board examines. Throughout the course all the lectures in Mental and Moral Philosophy and History are given at St. Michael's College, so that the education is purely Catholic. The following University statute was lately passed providing for the fourth year examinations in Mental and Moral Science :-"In the honor department of Mental and Moral Philosophy of the fourth year the Senate shall institute two distinct examinations on the two systems of Philosophy taught in the confederating arts colleges." Thus all the examinations in Mental and Moral Science are upon the matters taught in St. Michael's College, upon the successful passing of which, a student may obtain a degree from the Provincial University of Toronto.

## STUDIES.

The course of study comprises, besides an Elementary Department, three Departments, viz. : the Commercial, the Classical, and the Philosophical.

Since it is most important that every Catholic of education should possess a thorough knowledge of our religion, all possible care is taken to make this branch complete, and students have every opportunity of learning well the grand moral and dogmatic principles of our Holy Church. Christian Doctrine forms an essential subject in all the Departments. Besides a special class each week, some time is devoted to it every day.

Lessons in elocution are given by a professor to the advanced students of the various Departments.

Studente-are required to pass a satisfactory examination before a certificate is given.

## SCHOLARSHIPS AND MEDALS.

The following are the scholarships and medals open, for competition for the year 1893 in the various subjects and years to which they are assigned.

The Archbishoy scholarship of $\$ 50$, the gift of His Grace Archbishop Walsh. It is awarded to the three candidates who shall have passed the best examinations in the natural sciences of the Philosophical Department. The most successful candidate receives $\$ 25$; the second, $\$ 15$; the third, $\$ 10$.

The Rooney scholarship of $\$ 20$, the gift of the Rt. Rev. Monsignore Rooney, V.G. It is a warded to the most successful candidate in special examinations upon Christian Doctrine.

The McEvay scholarship of $\$ 20$, the gift of the Rt. Rev. Monsignore McEvay. It is awarded for the subject of Mental Philosophy.

The Alumnus scholarship of $\$ 25$, the gift of an old student of the College. This scholarship is for general proficiency in all the subjects of the Fourth Year of the -Classical Department.

The relative value of the various subjects will be :announced in October, 1893.

The Campbell silver medal, the gitt of the Very Rev. Father Campbell, is awarded for success in the Classics of the Fifth Year.

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The 0'Connor silver medal, the gift of the Rt. Rev. Dr. O'Connor, Bishop of Peterborough, is awarded for success in Mathematics.

The Dowling silver medal, the gift of the Rt. Rev. Dr. Dowling, Bishop of Hamilton, is offered for the best essay apon some subject connected with the American Church, and is open to members of St. Michael's Literary Society.

The Maddigan silver medal, the gift of the Rev. P. J.

With the exception of the Dowling medal all these scholarships and medals are awarded upon the merit of special examinations.

Before being eligible for holding any scholarship or medal, a candidate must have obtained an ayerage of 66 per cent. upon such examination.

## THE KIELY BURSARY.

Through the generosity of G. W. Kiely, Esq., of Coronto, a bursary of $\$ 150$ is placed at the disposal of the ollege authorities to be spent every year for the education f one or more deserving candidates for the holy priestood. These scholarships are not open to examination but e the reward of deserving conduct.

## EXAMINATIONS AND REPORTS.

Competitions are held every week upon one of the bjects of class matter.

A general examination in all classes is held at Christas, Easter, and at the close of the scholastic year.

The prizes, at the annual distribution in June, are arded to those who attain the required excellence in the ekly competitions and the terminal examinations.
Promotions ordinarily take place at the beginning of first term.

## EXTRACTS FROM RULES.

The object of the discipline of the College being to train the students in the way of faith, true morality and honour, every student is required to conduct himself conformably to such spirit.

Every student on entering the College for the first time must present a certificate from his parish priest ; or if he comes from another college, from the Superior thereof.

All letters pass through the hands of the Superior.
No day scholar is allowed to take out letters or messages for boarders.

Matriculated students and philosophers will have the advantage of a study hall of their own and a special rule.

All accounts must be paid in advance in three terms, the first Tuesday of September, the 10th of December, and the 20th of March. The amount for each term is $\$ 55$. If paid within the first two weeks of a term a discount of $\$ 5$ is allowed.

Interest will be charged upon arrears.

No reduction is made for the absence or withdrawal of a student unless arrangements be made with the President or Treasurer.

Articles of clothing will not be furnished by the College unless a deposit for that purpose be left with the Treasurer, who will give a detailed account of its outlay in his regular statement.

It is important that students should have a full supply of clothing, underwear, towels, nightshirts, \&c. A second suit is required for Sunday wear.

Books, material for drawing, and medicine ordered by the doctor form the only extra charges. No charge is made for stationery.

A physician visits the College regularly to attend to the health of the pupils.

All possible care is bestowed upon the domestic comfort and cleanliness of the students.

No student will be allowed to remain in the College during the summer vacation. Suitable accommodation, when desired by parents or guardians, may readily be obtained through the authorities of the College.
